Rebel Forces and Durango and Tor-reon Begin March—Refugee Movement Less Active

Washington, May 7.—Ten members of the Smith family in jail at Tonela are in danger of their lives because of Mexican resentment for their p r. in the recent killing of three Mexicans at San Pedro, according to a report today from Minister Leavell in Guatemala. The Mexicans were members of a rural guard and invaded the Smith home at San Pedro to disarm the occupants.

In the fight which ensued, the Mexicans were beaten, but the Americans later were arrested.

Confirmation of the capture of the entire federal garrison at Acaponeta by constitutionalist forces reached the state department today in a report from consular agents.

The vanguard of the constitution alist forces at Durango and Torreon has started on its march to begin the campaign for the capture of Saltille and Zacatecas, according to a report received at the state department from Consul Ham at Durango.

of Sonora has ceased. Lead Pencils May Cost More. Berlin, May 7 .- There is a threat ening increase in the prices of lead pencils due to the effect of the new conservation laws in the United States. Germany supplies the world with lead pencils, but obtains its cedar from America.

The devastation of the American cedar and cypress forests together with areas now set aside to which ax and saw may not be laid. has created a great scarcity of this wood for lead. pencils. German manufacturers are looking about for some substitute. The scarcity of hickory, also much imported into Germany from Ameri ca and generally used for automobile wheels and handles for carpenters tools likewise is causing manufactur-

OPPOSITION TO REPEAL OF MEASURE

REBEL FORCES ARE GAINING SEE'S HAND OF

Warns Democrats Not to Go Back on Party Platform's Declaration on Subject

Washington, May 7 .- Senator O'Gorman, chairman of the Interocean Canals committee, and leader of the forces opposed to the repeal of the toll exemption clause of the Panama Canal act, gave the Senate today the legal, economic and political reasons

for his opposition. In a three hour speech, the senator discussed exhaustively every phase of the subject. He discovered no ground in international law which would forbid exemption of American coastwise ships from toll payment, saw behind the repeal movement the hand of the railroads and declared that a failure to impose a tax could not be called a

It applies ot only to bona fide emigrants leav ing their native land for the United States or Canada, possibly intending o remain away for many years, but it will also prevent many thousands of farm laborers from going to Gerrany for field work and harvest as has been the custom every summer And further, since the decree makes no mention of any exceptions it is supposed that waiters, tailors, mehanics and other workers who wan o go aboard to complete their trade education will no longer be able to do so. For at the age of thirty-four a man has usually contracted family and business ties which effectually prevent him from leaving his native

The new regulation apparently has been made because the military au thorities recently discovered, when the recruiting levies were called up, entered on the rolls had gone to eign parts. 

FRESH AIR CHILDREN GAIN MORE RAPIDLY THAN OTHERS

Washington, May 7.-That schee children who are taught in fresh air lass rooms advance more rapidly in their studies and make greater im provement in weight and strength han children in regular class rooms s a conclusion demonstrated by F. H. Mann of New York, before the Socio logical Section of the National Association for the Study and Preven tion of Tuberculosis this afternoon. The speaker reported on a series of experiments carried on jointly by the New York committee on the Preven ion of Tuberculosis and the Board of Education in which three groups of hildren were studied to note the effect of fresh air upon them. In one group, the children were placed in ree air classes and were fed during school hours with milk and crackers morning and afternoon; in the second roup, the children were placed resh air classes but were not fed and in the third group, the children vere left in the ordinary class room under regular conditions. Every effort was made to illiminate or equal-'ze in the comparison such variable factors as age, home conditions, physical condition, school conditions, nadren in the fresh air classes were all undernourished and anaemic at ad mission-

The results of this experiment exshowed that all of the poorly nourish ed and anaemic children in the fresh dr classes gained in weight, red corpuscles in the blood, general nutrition and physical tone. The gains were made for the most part independently of the home environment and of the financial conditions of the children's family, suggesting that the associa ion between poverty and malnutri-tion in school children is not so close as has been commonly assumed, and that cases of extreme poverty with lack of necessary food at home are not nearly so prevalent as has been frequently stated. It was also demon strated that, even without school eeding, fresh air classes can be run with advantage to the children of yoor families, although the greatest benefit was obtained where extra eeding of children was employed. "All lines of tuberculosis activity lead more or less directly back to plantations of this disease occur in childhood." was the declaration of Dr. William Charles White of Pittsburg, another speaker this afternoon. in arguing that all movements for the betterment of children should center in the anti-tuberculosis organ ization. Dr. White pointed out that anything which anti-tuberculosis societies did for the welfare of the child was a direct contribution to the prevention of tuberculosis. Dr. John B. Hawes, second secretary of the Massachusetts Trustees of Hospitals for Consumptives, Boston, declared that direct infection of children, by their parents or other members of the family who have tuberculosts is very



ELECTRIC LIGHT FOR TUBERCULOSIS TREATMENT

Copenhagen, May 7 .- Some remark able results in the treatment by elec tric light of "surgical tuberculosis" the Finsen Light Institute. A number of patients who otherwise would have had to undergo operations have been discharged as cured. while many others have shown wonderful improv

The treatment consists in placing the patient about a yard's distance in front of an ordinary arc lamp and directing the rays against the affected parts for periods of from fifteen minutes at first to two hours and a half, the length of time being gardually increased from day to day. Dr. Reyn believes that the light cure may also prove useful in cases of lung tuberculosis, but this has not yet be demonstrated.

The notice has already been published twice in the paper at Burkburnett, two publications yet remaining to be made Judge Felder and Commissioners Mc Cleskey, Smith, Jackson and Barwise are named in the petition which was filed by W. F. Weeks, attorney repre-senting the plaintiffs.

The petition alleges that in the or der on March 10 for the election on April 4th the commissioners court attempted to create a new political subdivision of the county from precinets 2, 3 and 4; that such a political subdivision is not named in the constitu tion and laws of the state. It is claimed therefore that the order for the election was void. Another rea son alleged why the order was void is that the petition was not entered as a part of the minutes of the proceedings of the court.

The fact that the results of the election were not canvassed until the regular session of the commissioners' court on April 13th is made another point of attack. It is asserted that there was no reason why the return of the returns should not have been canvassed and the result declared on the 11th day of April or as soon thereafter as practicable.
