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LABOR CONTEMPT CASES SET ASIDE

GOMPERS, MITCHELL AND MOR-RIS CLEARED BY SUPREME COURT TODAY

Second Time Tribunal Has Refused to Committ Labor Leaders-History of the Case

By Associated Press Washingtonfl May y the distempt sentences in trict supreme court Samuel () pers, John Mitchell son, labor leaders, were set aside day by the supreme court for the sec ond time, as barred by the statute of limitation.

Justice: Holmes, in beginning the Opinion, said that the contempts were not to be treated as conspiracies, a point urged upon the court in behalf of the labor leaders.

The contempt charges against Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and Frank Morrison grew out of the injunction issued by the District of Columbia Su preme Court to prohibit the Federa tion boycotting the Buck's Stove and Range Company. Proceedings as i the contempt cases were part of the injunction suit, the District Supreme Court held the labor leaders in contempt and sentenced Compers to one year in jail: Mitchell to nine months and Morrison to six months. The Supreme Court of the United States on May 15, 1911, set aside those sen tences, holding that penal sentences had been erroneously imposed in a civil suit.

Action of Committee. The day after the sentences were set aside, the District Supreme Court began new proceedings against the labor leaders. A committee was appointed to report whether there was reasonable cause for holding the men guilty of contempt. It consisted of J. J. Darlington, Daniel Davenport and James H. Buck, atterneys of rec ord for the Buck's Stove and Range

The committee reported that the three men had been guilty of contempt. It charged that Gompers, in December, 1911, had hurried out an issue of the American Federationist containing the name of the Buck's Stove and Range Company on the We Don't Patronize List" so as have it published before the injuntion took effect, and circulated th edition after the onjunction became e fective. It charged contempt for the court in various utterances of Gom pers in speeches and editorially in the Federationist. Sull another charge was that he printed and circulated a paper known as "An Urkent Appeal For Financial Aid in Defense of Free Press and Free Speech," in which it was contented that he sugrested men bers of the Federation might violate the injunction and defeat its object provided they were not within the Dis trict of Columbia

Morrison and Mitchell. Frank Morrison was charged with cooperating with Gompers, as Secre tary of the Federation, in making these publications. Mitchell was like wise charged with cooperation in th circulation of the Federationist and the "Urgent Appeal," and with presiing over a meeting of the l'tited Mi-Workers on January 25, 1908, when resolution was adopted placing the Buck's Stoves and Ranges on the un fair list, and providing for fines for members who purchased such a stove

or range. The report was approved by the District Supreme Court and the identi cal sentences of the first proceedings

The District of Columbia Court of Appeals remanded the case with diremodified to one month's imprisonment and the imprisonment of Mitchell and Morrison be changed to a fine of \$500 for each man.

The District Supreme Court com mittee insisted before the Supreme Court that the Court of Appeals had no right to modify the sentences Alton B. Parker, recent presidential candidate, and Jackson H. Ralston contented that the men had not been guilty of any contempt.







BUDGET ADOPTED

PROVIDES FOR EXPENDITURE OF

JE: Several Improvements Contemplated During Year if Revenue Necessary is Forthcoming

A budget estimating the probable expenditures for the city of Wichita Falls for the twelve months from April 1, 1914, to May 31, 1915, together with a tax levy of 85 cents on the hundred dollars valuation and occupation taxes to raise the necessary revenues were adopted by the city council in an adjourned session this morning. The budget was submitted by Mayor A. H. Britain under the proislon of the new city charter and was adopted without a dissenting vote or without a change in any item. All the councilmen were present with the exeption of Councilman Gardner. The total income from all sources is

estimated at \$111,381.96. To put the tax levy into effect an rdinance will have to be adopted This ordinance will await the return of Councilman Gardner from the fire-


