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LABOR CONTEMPT CASES SET ASIDE

GOMPERS, MITCHELL AND MORRIS CLEARED BY SUPREME COURT TODAY

STATUTE OF LIMITATION

Second Time Tribunal Has Refused to Commit Labor Leaders—History of the Case

By Associated Press. Washington, May 11.—The contempt sentences imposed by the district supreme court on Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and Frank Morrison, labor leaders, were set aside today by the supreme court of the second time, as barred by the statute of limitation.

Justice Holmes, in beginning the opinion, said that the contempt was not to be treated as constraining, a point urged upon the court in behalf of the labor leaders.

The contempt charges against Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and Frank Morrison grew out of the injunction issued by the district of Columbia supreme court to prohibit the Federation boycotting the Buck's Stove and Range Company. Proceedings as to the contempt cases were part of the injunction suit, the district supreme court held the labor leaders in contempt and sentenced Gompers to one year in jail, Mitchell to nine months and Morrison to six months. The supreme court of the United States on May 15, 1911, set aside those sentences, holding that penal sentences had been erroneously imposed in a civil suit.

WILL PREVENT REOPENING

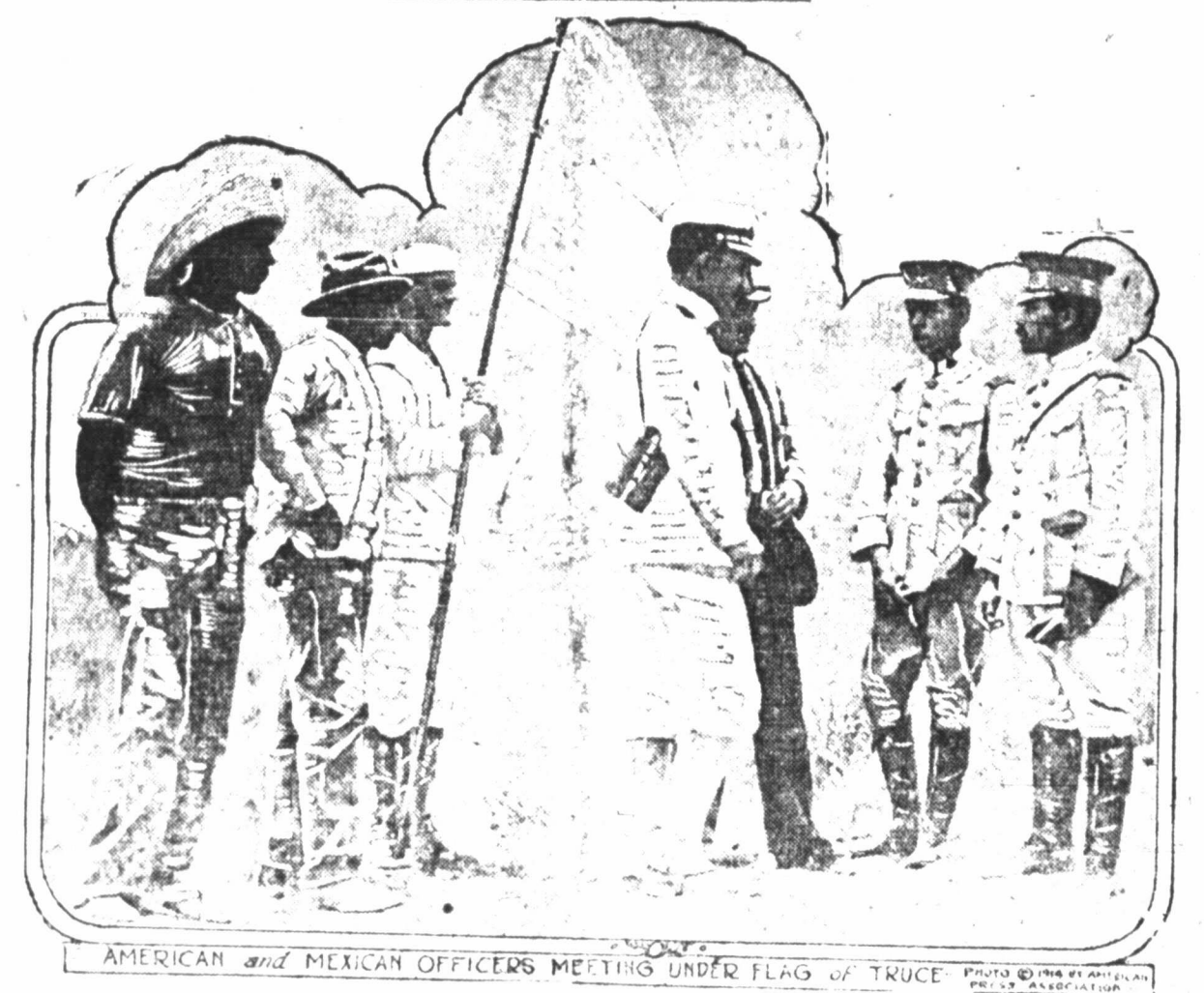
Mines in Which Walkouts Occurred Last September Cannot Resume Operations Now

By Associated Press. Trinidad, Colo., May 11.—The announcement of a definite policy concerning their intervention in the strike torn districts in the coal strike zone by United States army officers commanding federal forces here is approved by fact.

Today attention was turned toward the reestablishment of the Ludlow tent colony and the reopening of mines which have been closed since the series of uprisings which began April 29, and which were attended by a heavy toll of deaths.

By the program which was announced by the war department, no mine in the state which was shut down as a result of the walkout of miners last September will be permitted to reopen for the present. Those mines which were closed as a result of the violence between strikers and mine guard will be permitted to resume operations.

U. S. MEDIATORS ARE NAMED TODAY

ASSOCIATE JUSTICE LAMAR AND FORMER SOLICITOR GENERAL SHERMAN

MAY HAVE ANOTHER LATER

Third Representative Not Yet Appointed and Only Two May Represent Wilson

By Associated Press. Washington, May 11.—Associate Justice Rucker of the United States Supreme Court and Frederick W. Lehmann of St. Louis, former solicitor general, have been selected by President Wilson to represent his views before the South American mediators in the Mexican negotiations at Niagara Falls, Canada.

Secretary Bryan made this official announcement today. Whether a third representative would be appointed, Mr. Bryan declined to say, indicating that it could be assumed that there would be no other, although he did not wish definitely to indicate that such a possibility was foreclosed.

Seizure of Lighthouse. Huerta's protest over the reported seizure of Lopo Island, an important light house port off the coast of Mexico by a landing party from the United States navy was taken up today by the South American envoys, who are seeking to pave the way to peace in the Southern republic. The reported occupation of the island probably to assure uninterrupted operation of the light house, first was revealed in a telegram from Mexican Foreign Minister Ruiz to the mediators, which stated that a party had been landed from the American torpedo boat, that the keeper had been arrested and then released after turning over the apparatus for operating the beacon. The mediators were asked to make representation to the Washington government in connection with the incident.

FULL POWER GIVEN PEACE EMISSARIES

HUERTA'S REPRESENTATIVES CLOTHED WITH COMPLETE AUTHORITY

SOME DOUBT OF SINCERITY

Some Believe Huerta Trying to Make Show—Mexico City Situation is Attracting Attention

Vera Cruz, May 11.—Emilio Rabasa, Augustin Rodriguez and Luis Elguero, the three peace commissioners appointed by President Huerta to represent him at the Niagara Falls conference, who will sail late today for Havana en route to Key West, are clothed with full powers nominally at least, to sign any agreement or convention. The Mexican senate, in a resolution approving President Huerta's nomination, conferred full power and ample authority to judge counsel, carry out business and sign any agreement or treaty.

Many prominent Mexicans here, however, are not inclined to regard this broad authority as real and declare that Huerta has given his commissioners the broadest powers to make a show before the world of having done all in his power to reach a settlement.

Mexico City newspapers continue to make bitter attacks on the United States, and alleged copies of the American articles of war are being published in the capital to inflame the public.

All attention on the main situation has turned to the condition of affairs in Mexico City, where the next scene in the international drama is looked for by many American and foreign observers.

The outside world knows little of what is going on there. It is impossible for any correspondent to have capital to send out any but a closely censored report. Those from the outside who venture into the city—and most of those are foreigners who go protected by passports—see evidence of such a tense situation that they do not think it safe to remain long and make only the most cursory observations.

Signs of Intrigue Apparent. Refugees who arrived at Vera Cruz today and foreigners who have ventured to penetrate Huerta's stronghold describe the capital as surcharged with intense apprehension and despite Huerta's apparent confidence and the pursuit of the daily routine there are signs of undercurrents of intrigue.

To those who would bring to the world a true picture of conditions there, the capital is virtually a forbidden city.

One traveler who returned today declared that Louis Dantine, the only American remaining at the embassy when Charles O'Shaughnessy and his staff departed, had been seized by agents of Huerta and was in danger of execution when the British ambassador intervened and obtained his release, giving him protection in the British legation. The arrest of O'Shaughnessy, correspondent of the Associated Press, and a Washington newspaper photographer, A. J. Eaton, and their detention, while the Englishmen, who were arrested with them, were promptly released, has been taken as an added evidence of Huerta's determination to make the most extreme measures before permitting the rebels to acquire possession of the capital. In this connection various reports are current, ranging from threats to force an outside combination, to a fairly authentic report that Huerta mined the national palace, the postoffice, the department of communications and other public buildings.

Has Flower of the Army. One man, who has been residing in Mexico City, estimates Huerta's force with no great supply of artillery, and ammunition low. The troops about him, however, are described as the flower of the army.

Zapata, after a successful attack on Cuernavaca, is reported to have moved his forces to Jucos, only a few miles from the capital. The northern rebels are meeting with less and less resistance from the discouraged federal command, many of whom have been called into the city by Huerta.

SLAIN AMERICAN'S BODY RECOVERED IN COAHUILA.

Beard is said to have been a victim of General Arzobispo, one a follower of Orozco, and later a member of the garrison at Torreon. Beard is said to have been killed at the same time the federalists retreated from Torreon.

COLORADO PARTY REACHES THIS CITY

SOCIABILITY TOURISTS ARRIVE IN WICHITA FALLS LATE SUNDAY EVENING

ARE INFORMALLY ENTERTAINED

Are Taken to Lake and Given Supper at Westland—Day's Run is Made Without Mishap

By Associated Press. Sunburned and tanned and begrimed with the dust of the road, thirty business men from Colorado Springs, Manitou and Pueblo, reached Wichita Falls at 6 o'clock Sunday evening and pulled out again this morning for the trip to Fort Worth.

The party is making a "sociability tour" of the Southwest, the idea being to acquaint the people of this section with the attractions of Colorado. The trip is being made in nine automobiles, from Fort Worth, the tourists will go to Dallas, Waco, Austin, San Antonio, Houston, Galveston, Dallas, Denton, Sherman, thence through Oklahoma and Kansas and home again. One of the cars left the party last night, its owner being called to Oklahoma and only eight will proceed from here.

Are Met By Wichitans. A large party of Wichitans met the tourists at the county line and escorted them through the oil field and down to this city. A quick run to Lake Wichita was made, and afterwards an informal but enjoyable supper was spread for the visitors at the Westland Hotel. The tourists had requested no formal entertainment, but this request was observed.

Outside of the usual tire trouble, there were no mishaps until two of the cars were on the river bridge last night, when with two Wichita Falls cars, there as a general pile-up that looked like someone would be badly hurt, though it did not result seriously.

About a dozen auto loads of Wichitans met the party at the county boundary and at Electric, including Hugh Weaver, D. P. Talley, Wes Clabsey, Morris Marcus, Phyl Taylor, Wiley Blair, J. L. Art, J. B. Marlow, L. P. Hammonds and several others. The trip to the county line was made with D. P. Talley as pilot. Pink Hammond led the way on the return trip.

Praise For Good Road. Real joy shone on the faces of the tourists, when the cars struck the road between Iowa Park and this city, the highway as smooth as a floor and the big cars hummed down it at express train speed. The visitors said they didn't want to find any better roads. In general the roads in this county were found in good condition, but one circuit north of Iowa Park had some loose planks that caused the Wichitans in the escort party to do some apologizing.

Several pictures were taken, one being made in the oil field at Electric, another on the Iowa Park road and others in Wichita Falls and at the lake. These will be used for picture show slides and will serve to give this city considerable publicity.

MEXICAN PAYS EXTREME PENALTY OF LAW TODAY AT PECO, TEXAS

KILLING OF YOUNG WOMAN

International Controversy Over Case is Closed When Sheriff Obeys Order of Court

Leon, Mexico, May 11.—Leon Cardenas Martinez, the young Mexican, whose case has developed into an international one since his conviction for the murder of Miss Emma Brown three years ago, near here, faced death by hanging here today, apparently every legal resource having been exhausted.

The woman was shot and stabbed to death while riding alone in a buggy, and it is charged that Martinez, who was arrested the following day, confessed the crime. Later he stoutly maintained his innocence.

He was tried and convicted in 1909 and appealed in vain to the criminal court of appeals. Following that case was taken to the United States supreme court where in March this year it was dismissed for lack of jurisdiction.

Only a week ago, the Spanish ambassador on behalf of the Mexican government made appeal both to Secretary of State Bryan and to Governor Coblentz. The latter stated, however, that he would not interfere with the carrying out of the State's mandate.

News has been received here of the death of John W. Maddox of Austin, Mr. Maddox was at one time considerably interested in Wichita county oil properties and visited this city frequently.

TRIBUTE IS PAID TO VERA CRUZ DEAD

BODIES ARE LANDED IN NEW YORK CITY EARLY THIS MORNING

PRESIDENT IN ATTENDANCE

Simple Ceremony is Held for Dead, Following Procession Through Streets of City

By Associated Press. New York, May 11.—The dead from Vera Cruz were landed today on American soil, and city, state and nation paid their tribute. Two hours before the city was astir, seventeen flag-draped coffins were removed from the deck of the armored cruiser Montana and placed on caissons on the plaza in Battery Park. Few people witnessed the ceremony for the sun was but half risen, but crowds later lined the streets to watch the slow procession wind its way to the navy yard.

President Wilson arrived from Washington almost unobserved. It had first been arranged that the president was to go to the navy yard to receive the dead on the government ground but at the last Mr. Wilson changed his mind and was driven to Battery park to participate in the ceremony from the beginning to end.

Procession Through City. When they reached the battery the dead were upon the gun caissons. Police lined the way and the procession was ready to move. Behind the last body came the carriage bearing the president, secretary of navy, senators, congressmen and representatives of the state and city.

President Wilson had no formal address prepared for the ceremonies at the Brooklyn naval yard today. His speech was delivered with slow impressiveness. His voice was low and fervent and his face was grave.

"Mr. Secretary," he said, speaking to Secretary Daniels who had read the names of the dead to him, "I know that the feelings which characterize all who stand about me are not feelings that can be expressed in eloquence or oratory. For my own part, I have a mixture of feeling. The feeling I possess is one of profound grief that these dead should have had to go to their deaths and yet I feel a profound pride and envy that they should have been permitted to do their duty so nobly."

JOY RIDER MIXES THINGS WITH POLICE OFFICERS

Later Makes His Escape—Had Been Using Cars of Other Folks by Working Easy Game

By Associated Press. One of men who escaped from the city jail last night will be looked for with much zest by Night Policemen Humphris and Will Allen. He is a young man they arrested Saturday night for what they believe was an attempted joy ride and now is charged with the theft of an automobile. Several times recently garages here have been called over the phone by supposed owners of automobiles to have their cars ready, as they were sending a man over to get them. This got to be a regular occurrence with a certain automobile owner and one day last week he was asked about the matter at the garage. It then developed that he had never telephoned the garage or had never authorized any one to take out his car.

Saturday night the supposed owner telephoned again to have the car ready, as he was sending over a man to get it. When the fellow came over to get the car Officer Humphris and Allen got him. They were taking him to jail when he made an effort to escape, hitting Mr. Humphris in the eye and Mr. Allen on the back of the head. He didn't get away, however, and the officers landed him behind the bars at the city hall. He was one of the three that got away last night.

It has developed since his arrest that a gang of joy riders has been playing the same easy game at several garages.

Admiral Howard further reported that the rebel artillery at Piedras Island drove the Mexican transport Korrigan out of the harbor. Skirmishing between federal and rebels at Mazatlan continues. All Americans are reported safe in that district.

IMMENSE CROWDS HEAR EVANGELIST

THREE SERMONS ARE DELIVERED DURING DAY AND MARKED SUCCESS ATTAINED

501 ATTEND SUNDAY SCHOOL

Desired Good is Attained—Services Held Today in Christian Church at Electra

A total of 107 persons answered the invitations extended at the Scoville meetings Sunday. Of these sixty-two came down the aisle at the morning service, sixteen at the meeting for men and boys in the afternoon and 29 at the night meeting.

The day was one of manifest blessing for the Christian cause in Wichita Falls. In the Sunday school at the First Christian church, where the meetings are in progress 501 were present this being the largest attendance ever known in Sunday school in Wichita Falls. Sunday's mark had been set at 500 in this Sunday school and although the margin was small there was great rejoicing when the count showed the school had made good. This mark for next Sunday has been set at 600.

A crowd that completely filled the great auditorium gathered to hear the morning sermon. Dr. Scoville took as his text Eph. 4:6, "Awake and Arise," telling the condition of spiritual awakening and its import. When the invitation was extended sixty-two came forward.

While the Mothers' Day Program was being carried out in the afternoon at the First Presbyterian church, Dr. Scoville addressed a great crowd of men and boys at the Christian church. This crowd filled the main auditorium and before Dr. Scoville had finished his text it was necessary to raise the partition at the back to make room for others who came.

In his address Dr. Scoville held up Christianity as a practical religion for manly, virile men. Gathered in his audience were business and professional men, mechanics, farmers and all classes of men. His illustrations were drawn from the lives and experiences of such men and he spoke as one fellow to another. The first Psalm was taken for his scripture lesson. He said that all was not success that succeeds. A man might succeed in being a leech or being an animal of prey but that kind of success would be defeat; it would make a man worse than a turkey buzzard or a skunk. Nobody has a right, he said, to succeed, at the cost of somebody else.

Victory in battles, the speaker declared, was won and lost before they were fought. God never intended for a man to draw his lip down for a lap robe, he said.

The speaker said he had no sympathy with the man who thought he was better than other men because he belonged to church; that his associations with men had shown him that there was an immense amount of good in almost every man. It takes a man to win another man, he told his audience.

"You can win a man as easily as some old cus-customer can lead him to perdition. No man ever rises alone and no man ever goes down alone."

He declared that no man has a right to use his neighbor as a moral garbage can into which to throw over the fence his own moral filth; that no man has a right to take anything that he owns and use it for any purpose that curses someone else.

The speaker took occasion to pay a tribute to W. J. Bryan that brought cheers from his audience.

He had been talking about the use of liquor and had just said that when a man took whiskey into his skin that manhood went out when he referred to Bryan's use of grape juice. "I'm not a Democrat," he said, "but I'm mighty proud of William Jennings Bryan."

The declaration was greeted with a rousing cheer.

At the night service a vast audience assembled. It filled every seat in the big auditorium which had been enlarged by raising all the partitions, overflowed the galleries, filled the windows and the side aisles, and many stood outside unable to gain admittance because of the press of the crowd.

Although not fully recovered from a cold which she had contracted en route here Mrs. Scoville sang with rare sweetness and with much effect "Nobody Knows But Mother."

"As whom his mother comforteth so will I comfort you," was the scripture on which the lesson was taken. The speaker extolled motherhood and mother love. His sermon was particularly appropriate for Mothers' Day. Twenty-nine responded to the invitation at the close of the sermon.

When the invitation was extended and man after man came down the aisle to make his profession the audience gave a cheer to each. Men well known in business and professional circles of the city moved from man to man among those in the audience personally inviting men to go forward. No less than the speaker's frankness and sincerity in his talk as a man to men were the personal appeals of those laymen in their effectiveness.

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Dr. Scoville and his party of evangelists are at Electra today where they are conducting a union meeting to night. Tomorrow night Dr. Scoville will conduct the service at the Christian church at the usual hour. Cottage prayer meetings will be held again tomorrow "The New Birth" will be the theme of tomorrow night's sermon.

DENMARK'S RULERS ROYALLY RECEIVED.

London, May 11.—The King and Queen of Denmark were kept busy this morning receiving and returning official calls. The royal visitors lunched at the Danish legation and received a deputation representing the Danish colony, and in the afternoon Queen Alexandra visited a hospital with Queen Mary.

Tonight they will attend the gala performance at Covent Garden Opera House, at which King George, Queen Mary and the other members of the British royal family, cabinet ministers, court officials and the leaders of society and the aristocracy will be present. The monarchs will drive to the state from Buckingham Palace, escorted by life guards, and a guard of honor with colors and band will be posted outside the opera-house. Stringent police precautions have been taken to prevent interference by suffragettes, and all persons favored with a ticket for tonight's performance, have had to satisfy the Lord Chamberlain that they are in no way connected with the militant votes for women movement. Detectives by the score have been warned for duty inside the building. Tomorrow the Danish visitors take lunch with the Lord Mayor and receive the fresh dogs of the city of London. The state visit ends Wednesday but the Danish King and Queen will stay a couple of days inognito with Queen Alexandra at Marlborough House.

TO REMOVE AMERICANS FROM TAMPICO VICINITY

Washington, May 10.—At 1:45 this (Sunday) morning, Acting Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt instructed Rear Admiral Mayo to remove all Americans from Tampico and vicinity because of the danger of the impending attack on the city by constitutionalists. 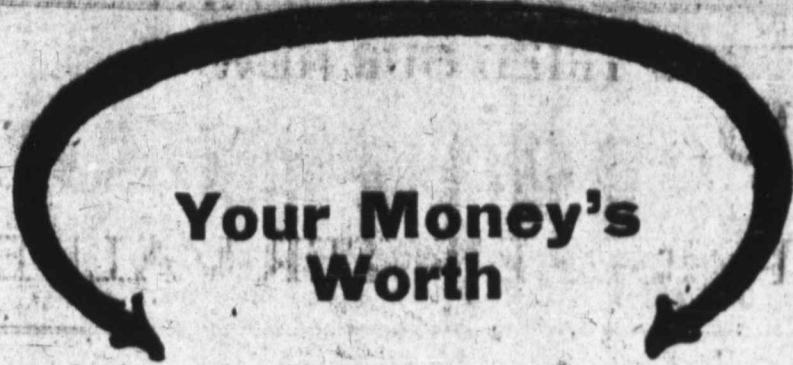

Jelly Roll Recipe

Only Two Eggs Required By Mrs. Janet McKewen Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

This Jelly Roll is fast becoming very popular, by account of the way it keeps fresh. With proper handling it should keep fresh a whole week, providing it isn't eaten up in the meantime, for it is every bit as good as it looks.



One cup sifted flour; scant half teaspoonful salt; 1 level teaspoonful K. C. Baking Powder; 1 egg; 1/2 cup of 1 lemon; 2 eggs beaten light; 1 cup sugar; 1/2 cup hot milk; glass of jelly; 1/2 pint dried sugar.

Bake in a buttered dripping pan; turn out on a damp cloth, trim off the crisp edges; spread with jelly and turn over and over into a roll while still warm. Dredge the top with powdered sugar.

HEAVY TONNAGE FOR PANAMA CANAL. NOW APPARENT GREATER USE OF CANAL WILL BE MADE THAN ANTICIPATED. INQUIRIES NOW POURING IN. Steamship Companies of All Maritime Nations Will Make Immediate Use of Canal. Panama, May 11.—Since announcement that the Panama Canal problem will be ready for thorough navigation by July this year many letters of inquiry regarding the conditions to be imposed have been coming to the canal authorities from all parts of the world. It is apparent that steamship companies of all the great maritime nations expect to make an almost immediate use of the canal. The communications received indicate that in virtually all cases the companies contemplate a through service from European ports to those on the west coast of North, Central and South American countries. Among the inquiries are those regarding tolls, conditions of navigation, pilots, charges for this service, wharfage facilities at Balboa and Cristobal, location and equipment of repair shops, coaling and other items relating directly to the usage of the canal. Most of these questions are addressed to the governor of the Panama Canal direct while others are sent to Washington and are forwarded to the Isthmus. It is planned to turn them over to the newly appointed superintendent of transportation who will be instructed by the governor to supply the desired information. Steamship companies which already are represented on the Isthmus have sent their local representatives to the canal officials seeking similar information. It is apparent to the canal authorities that as soon as the waterway shall have been thrown open much greater use of it will be made than has been anticipated. It has been stated that not more than 10,000,000 tons of traffic could be expected for the first year the canal is in operation. The letters of inquiry seem to make it plain to the authorities here that already a greater tonnage for the first year is indicated. Passenger carrying lines are evincing considerable interest in the question of passenger tolls throughout the canal. This subject seems not to have been settled to the satisfaction of the companies who desire to be informed whether tolls will be charged at all, and, if so, at what rate. The letters indicate that most of the companies are preparing for a heavy passenger traffic through the canal next year at or about the time of the formal opening and thence to the exposition at San Francisco. Schedules of charges aside from tolls for various services to be performed by the Panama Canal are in the course of preparation and probably will be promulgated in an official circular from the governor's office in the near future. BUDGET ADOPTED BY CITY COUNCIL

PROVIDES FOR EXPENDITURE OF \$111,000 WITHIN ENSUING TWELVE MONTHS

FIXES 85 CENT TAX LEVY

Several Improvements Contemplated During Year if Revenue Necessary is Forthcoming

A budget estimating the probable expenditures for the city of Wichita Falls for the twelve months from April 1, 1914, to May 31, 1915, together with a tax levy of 85 cents on the hundred dollars valuation and occupation taxes to raise the necessary revenues were adopted by the city council in an adjourned session this morning. The budget was submitted by Mayor A. H. Britain under the provisions of the new city charter and was adopted without a dissenting vote or without a change in any item. All the councilmen were present with the exception of Councillman Gardner.

The total income from all sources is estimated at \$111,381.96. To put the tax levy into effect an ordinance will have to be adopted. This ordinance will await the return of Councillman Gardner from the firemen's convention at Victoria. The tax levy provides eight-five cents on the hundred dollars valuation for current expenses and for the general improvement of the city, to be known as the general fund, of which at least five cents on the \$100 valuation shall be devoted to maintaining and beautifying public parks and cemeteries. A tax of twenty-five cents on the \$100 valuation is levied for the interest and sinking fund and fifteen cents on the \$100 valuation for laying out, opening, conducting, repairing and improving roads, bridges and streets within the city limits.

Estimates of Income The budget estimates the following income: For general fund \$49,571.08 Parks and cemeteries 3,750.00 Street fund 17,712.00 Sewer fund 29,829.88 Total except bonds \$91,862.96 Bond fund 19,519.00 Total income all sources \$111,381.96 The general summary of income and expenditures for the various funds as set forth in the budget follows:

POPE POSTPONES CONSISTORY AGAIN

Rome, May 11.—From the highest Vatican sources it was today learned that Pope Pius has postponed until the latter part of May the calling of a consistory in order to permit the attendance of the three American prelates of the church, Cardinal Gibbons, Cardinal Farley, and Cardinal O'Connell. The consistory was to have been held at Easter and its postponement at that time caused no little comment as there are now six open vacancies in the Sacred College and the immediate creation of new cardinals is deemed most urgent. Pope Pius' deference to the wishes, however, of the three American cardinals was influenced, it is stated, also largely by his own desire to have them present at the consistory. The latter were obliged to come to Rome this year to make their "ad limina" visits to the Pope and having arranged to do this in May, Pope Pius decided that a month's postponement of the consistory should take place for their benefit. The presence of the three American prelates together with the large number of cardinals to be created is expected to give the consistory almost the same importance and interest as attached to that of 1911 when Cardinals Farley, Falconio, and O'Connell were elevated to the purple.
