Strawberry Short Cake

For dinner every Sunday and once or twice on week days is not too often to serve this delicious dessert as long as strawberries last. The whipped cream for the top is not essential, but it makes a short cake more attractive to the eye as well as to the taste.

K C Strawberry Short Cake

By Mrs. Janet McKenna Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.

2 cups sliced pastry flour 1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup butter 1 egg
1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup strawberries 1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 cup or more double cream

Hell, wash and drain the berries; reserve a few choice berries to garnish the top of the cake; cut the rest in halves and mix with the sugar. Beat the cream and set aside to chill. Put together, three times, the flour, baking powder and salt; work in the shortening; then mix to a soft dough with the milk. Spread the mixture in two-layer cake pans. Bake about twenty minutes. Turn one cake out on a hot plate, spread liberally with water, pour over it the berries and cover with the second cake, also spread with butter; pour over the rest of the berries and the whipped cream above, with the whole berries here and there.

CANAL TO OPEN NEW TRADE OPPORTUNITIES

WILL PROVIDE MARKET FOR MANY NEGLECTED SOUTH AMERICAN PRODUCTS

GRAPES AT \$4.20 PER CLUSTER

Fruit Will Be An Important Item and New Delicacies Will Be Come Available

Washington, June 1.—When the Panama Canal once opens for business many industries which have hitherto been more or less dormant in South America will be stimulated into activity. The United States furnishes a profitable market for many products of the southern continent, and with more and more transportation facilities supplied this market will extend to perishables as well as to more durable products. One of the most profitable industries for which some of the South American countries are especially well adapted is that of fruit growing. In a recent article in the Monthly Bulletin of the Pan-American Union Mr. W. F. Wright of the United States department of agriculture writes: "South America probably has a range of climate and variety of conditions that will admit of the successful cultivation of every known fruit. Very nearly all of present importance have been introduced into one locality or another. In the tropical or sub-tropical regions are those adapted to such a climate, namely, the sapodilla, mango, breadfruit, banana, tamarind, pomegranate, loquat, olive, fig, orange and lemon in addition to those native. In temperate regions nearly all of the deciduous fruits grown in the United States have been introduced.

In Argentina the grape is the fruit which has attained the greatest commercial importance and the Mendoza country seems to lead all other sections. According to Mr. Wright undeveloped land in the vicinity of Mendoza is considered worth from \$10 to \$250 per acre. Planted in vines it is valued at \$50 to \$1,200 per acre. The net profit from vines in good bearing condition is said to be about \$170 per acre. One grower's native Argentine stated that table grapes trained on an overhead trellis yielded him a net profit of \$840 to \$1,000 per acre, and that he had received as high as \$4.20 for single selected clusters in Buenos Aires. The area in vines for the whole of Argentina is stated at 255,000 acres in 1910 and the production of wines as \$2,574,000 gallons.

the barren heights of the Andes at an altitude of more than 10,000 feet the traveler arrives in Chile. One seems to have reached another California, but with a climate possibly even more mild. There are in fact many similarities and all of the fruits grown in California are produced in Chile, probably in equal perfection but with far less care and the industry has not developed as in North America. Here, too the grape is the most important fruit, the annual production being about 42,000,000 gallons of excellent wine. The section about Valdivia is also noted for its fine apples, those from one well known grower having frequently sold in Buenos Aires for \$10.50 a box of 140 apples.

Leaving Chile and going northward to Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador, one reaches countries that are wholly within the Tropics and yet in consequence of the high altitude of some sections they present a range of climate as great as that of any country on the continent and as well suited for the cultivation of delicious fruits.

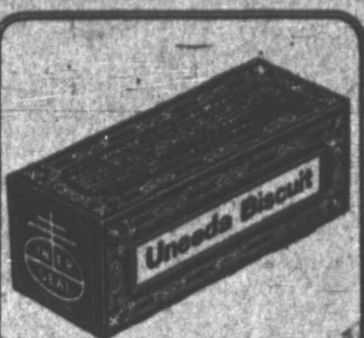

"PURPOSEFUL LIFE" SUBJECT OF SERMON

REV. C. C. SMITH DRAWS LESSON SUNDAY EVENING FROM LIFE OF DANIEL

EXCELLENCE OF HIS EXAMPLE

Slave Boy's Determination Not To Defile Himself Held Up As Good For Everyone

An interesting lesson was drawn from the life of Daniel Sunday evening in the sermon by Rev. C. C. Smith, pastor of the First M. E. Church. The subject was "The Purposeful Life." The pastor showing how Daniel by his fixed purpose not to defile himself, set an example for everyone. The text was from Daniel 1:8—"But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself. A condensation of the sermon follows:

"This text is the crux of a remarkable story of a successful young man, a young man who made good abundantly amidst adverse conditions. Daniel was probably not more than fifteen or sixteen years of age when he faced this great ordeal. He was a captive Hebrew lad impressed into service in the Babylonian court and in training for court service to the king. It was the policy of Babylon to denationalize prospective leaders of these captive peoples and to unseat their religion so that they might be more easily made the tools of the king for furthering his sway over the nations. To that end Daniel and his associates were being trained and fed. Meat and wine were set before them which had godliness been offered to idols and to partake of it meant to give up their religion. Daniel, the slave boy, could not give up his religion. This was a trying place. He was coming into contact with an order of the king, but he was tactful, as all religionists should be and won his way without awaking needless antagonism.

"There is no disparity between religion and common sense. Daniel had sense and got along the better for it. It was a courageous thing for a slave lad, without friends or influence to do, but his conviction of right was strong and he won and prospered marvelously in following his sense of duty. There is nothing unnatural in the story of Daniel. The principles involved which made him successful will win success today for any one who will apply them as he did.

"What is the secret of Daniel's success? Our text says, 'He purposed in his heart.' That answers our question. He lived a purposeful life. But the conviction remains that he must have been unusual in some way or that God especially favored him. He must have had very strong parents who imparted this nature to him. Doubtless his heredity was very good but it was not all. His youthful training must have been fine and sufficient to explain his character. No doubt, since his parents were devout Jews his training was fine. But heredity and early environment, strong as they are, can not explain the strength required to meet this occasion. He was still a lad, captive and removed far from parents and friends. What made him strong? He purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself. That is it. He purposed: No doubt but what early influences had been good but he had come to a place very early in life where he must exercise his own personality and choose to do right. Eugenics is a great science. Hygienics is of immeasurable importance. But these sciences alone can not reach far into life. Heredity and environment, strong as they are, can not make a man. If in the end we fail to arouse the personality and come short of purposing to do well that life is a failure. It was the power of choice that revealed the strong character of Daniel.

"The high moral life is not lived by accident. There are many downward gravitations in life. The young man or woman who does not purpose to keep undefiled will surely be defiled. Sin is on every hand and sin defiles the soul. There are appeals from sinful associates; from deliberate attempts to degrade; from our own unrestrained impulses. We may have allowed some sinful habits to fix themselves upon us and they are forever pulled us down. We should shun sin as we would leprosy. We must master our impulses, determine our companionships and direct our paths so as to get away from the downward pull. We must seek development. The best way to keep from going down is to climb up. There are no standstills. When we attempt to maintain a dead level presently we find ourselves sinking. We must not only refuse to gratify the low but we must purpose to nurture the high in our souls if we would grow into the full stature of a man.

Need For Clean Bodies.
The right attitude toward sin is direct opposition and not placid toleration. We need not be fanatical or impractical. Daniel was sane and judicious but without conscientious. He in no way compromised with principle. It requires strength of character to purposefully avoid sin but if we are to escape its consequences we must purpose not to defile ourselves. A clean body, clean associates and the prayer life will bring one out master of the forces of sin. This means to have been about what characterized Daniel's life and gave him victory and the same principle will give victory to any one who will follow it honestly.
