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ANOTHER DEADLOCK ARISES IN SESSION OF MEDIATORS

United States To Object To Any Plan That Carries Recognition Of The Huerta Regime

MOST SERIOUS OBSTRUCTION ENCOUNTERED

Mediators Would Give Dictator The Right To Name Men To Carry On Provisional Government

Niagara Falls, June 10.—A dangerous obstruction to progress on a vital point in the mediation proceeding has arisen which again threatens failure of the negotiations. The United States has said to the mediators in unequivocal terms that it cannot consent to any method of transition from the existing regime to the proposed new provisional government that can be construed as recognition of Huerta's administration.

The mediators are insisting that General Huerta be permitted to make the appointments of the men agreed upon here for provisional president. This the American government refuses to accept, not only because it is committed against recognition of Huerta but because it has been informed by constitutionalists that under no circumstances will they accept a peace plan which permits Huerta to exercise the constitutional function of naming his successor.

On this point, the mediators and American delegates are blocked. One side must give way before any advance is made.

Some of the principals have actually lost hope for a settlement, but there is a growing confidence that the mediators will devise some method of bridging the difficulty rather than allow mediation to founder on the rocks. The mediators were of the opinion that the United States should waive technicalities and consider that the end would justify the means.

It also was suggested that the United States need not extend its recognition until there had been some popular expression, such as the acceptance by the constitutionalists of the new president, when laid down their arms after his installation. Recognition could be accorded then with the idea that the popular will, in effect, had been registered.

The broad plan which has been virtually agreed upon by the mediators and the American and the Huerta delegates, giving to the constitutionalists what amounts to a majority share in the new provisional government. They will have it in their power to insure the holding of a fair election, and if the constitutionalists cause is the popular one, they would experience no difficulty in electing their candidate for president.

It is because the constitutionalists have been given so large a part in the proposed provisional government that the mediators are insisting that Huerta should be allowed to retire with dignity.

SUFFRAGETTE QUOTES BIBLE AS HER CASE IS BEING TRIED

"I Came Not to Send Peace, But a Sword" Is Her Text in Court Room Harangue

Birmingham, Eng., June 10.—Miss Bertha Ryland, the suffragette who yesterday destroyed with a butcher's cleaver, George Romney's "Portrait of a Boy" in the Birmingham art gallery, today was committed for trial. During the hearing she shrieked without cessation and quoted Scripture.

"I came not to send peace, but a sword," she used the text, "I came not to send peace, but a sword," as justification for her act and declared that the militants were "working with Divine guidance for purity and righteousness."

"No surrender" was her parting cry as she went to her cell.

DISPOSITION OF STEAMER ANTILLA IS NOT DECIDED

Secretary Bryan Refuses To Discuss Matter—Says Lind Went Home On Business

Washington, June 10.—President Wilson and Secretary Bryan conferred on the Mexican situation today. As the secretary was leaving the White House he was asked whether the liner Antilla will unload her arms and ammunition at Tampico.

"I cannot discuss the Antilla at this time," Mr. Bryan replied. When asked concerning John Lind's return last night to his home in Minnesota, Mr. Bryan said, "Mr. Lind has merely gone home on business. He will return later. He could be spared better at this time than Alberto and consequently has gone west on a short business trip."

Secretary Daniels said he had neither sent nor received any information of the Antilla. He said he expected to be advised if her cargo was landed.

WOMEN'S FEDERATION IS DISCUSSING SUFFRAGE TODAY

PIERCE CORPORATION REFUSED ADMISSION

SUPREME COURT DENIES APPLICATION TO MANDAMUS SECRETARY OF STATE

OUSTED COMPANY'S SUCCESSOR

Justice Phillips Holds State Has a Right To Deny Permit to Outside Corporations

Austin, Texas, June 10.—The supreme court today denied the application for a writ of mandamus filed by the Pierce Oil corporation of Virginia against F. C. Westart, secretary of state, to compel that official to issue a permit to the corporation to do business in Texas. This means the Virginia corporation is denied the right to enter the Texas field according to the opinion of the court, written by Associate Justice Nelson Phillips.

The supreme court denied the petition on the ground that the Pierce Oil corporation was one to which a defaulting corporation, convicted of the violation of the anti-trust laws of Texas, had transferred its business and property and that it was therefore brought within the terms of Article 7805 of the revised statutes of Texas. This is a statute which prohibits the incorporation of a corporation that has been ousted from the state for violating the anti-trust laws, from ever getting back into Texas.

It is pointed out that the Pierce Oil corporation, shortly after its incorporation in Virginia in 1913, took over by purchase the property of the Western Pierce Oil Company, and assumed all its obligations and which business it now owns and operates. The court did not sustain the contention of the petitioner that it was not the intention of this statute to exclude from the state an independent corporation not a member of any such combination, which would stifle competition in its line.

The supreme court further points out the transaction by a foreign corporation within the state of another than interstate business is a privilege which the state may extend or withhold; that it is not a right which the corporation possesses.

"The state is free therefore," said Justice Phillips, "to prescribe the terms or conditions upon which it grants the authority."

EIGHT PERSONS LOSE LIVES IN TENEMENT FIRE TODAY

LABOR FEDERATION OPPOSES PROHIBITION

TAKES ACTION ON QUESTION IN ITS CONVENTION AT EL PASO

LIVELY DEBATE ON SUBJECT

Throwing of Men Out of Work is Chief Point—Time of Annual Meeting is Changed

El Paso, Texas, June 10.—Resolutions condemning prohibition were adopted this morning by the seventh annual convention of the Texas Federation of Labor. Prior to the adoption of the resolution spirited addresses were made declaring that the adoption of prohibition in a territory automatically threw many laborers out of work; not only those employed in the trades directly affected such as the brewery workers but in many other lines it was said.

Another resolution was adopted changing the date for the annual convention of the federation from the second Monday in June to the third Monday in April of each year. The question of amalgamation of negro unions with white unions was left to the action of individual unions but the convention gave endorsement to the forming of unions by negro workers.

A resolution to fix a permanent meeting place for the convention of the federation was unfavorably reported by the resolutions committee.

CONSERVATION TO HAVE RIGHT OF WAY

FIVE ADMINISTRATION BILLS TO BE TAKEN UP IN HOUSE AT ONCE

NATIONAL PROHIBITION PLAN

Hobson Resolution Likely To Be Voted On Soon With Opponents Claiming Victory

Washington, June 10.—A special rule for consideration in the House of the administration conservation program, consisting of five bills, was voted out of the rules committee. A special rule for consideration of the Hobson prohibition amendment was unacted upon when the committee adjourned until later.

That the House will be forced to vote at an early date on a resolution providing for national prohibition through an amendment to the federal constitution, practically has been assured. This was generally conceded as a result of the express willingness of Majority Leader Underwood to have the question brought before the House for a test. The committee agreed to hear Representative Hobson and Rev. E. C. Diddle legislative agent of the Anti-Saloon League before voting on the rule.

Anti-Claim Enough Votes. In committee there was an effort to force a vote. Anti-prohibitionists in the House declare the necessary two-thirds vote to pass the amendment could not be secured at this time. Majority Leader Underwood said if a vote were delayed now, it would probably not be reached during the present session.

The conservation program arranged in the special rule includes the Ferris bill for leasing of coal lands in Alaska with six hours debate; the Foster radium bill with four hours debate; the bill extending payment period for reclamation projects, with two hours debate; the Ferris bill for conservation of water power sites on public lands with four hours debate; the Foster bill amending the mining laws with four hours debate.

All of the bills on the program have been approved by the administration.

BOOSTER SIGN HERE AND WILL BE INSTALLED SOON

Mammoth Electric Display Sign Arrives and is to be Placed at Foot of Eighth Street

The sign recently ordered by the Chamber of Commerce from a Kalamazoo, Michigan company has arrived and will be put up as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made. The sign is forty-two feet long and thirty-three feet and three inches high. It will be placed on Eighth street leading up from the Union Station.

It will bear the legend "Wichita Falls, Cheap Fuel Oil and Gas. The Factory City." At each end will be a flaming gas torch. It had been hoped to have the sign ready for illumination by the time of the editors' convention next week but this is hardly probable now.

UNVEIL MONUMENT IN NORTH CAROLINA

MEMORIAL TO WOMEN OF CONFEDERACY FROM THAT STATE IS DEDICATED

SECOND TRIBUTE OF ITS KIND

Is Made Possible Through Gift of \$10,000 Left by Confederate Veteran For Purpose

Raleigh, N. C., June 10.—A monument to the North Carolina Women of the Confederacy was unveiled here today. It is the second tribute of the South to its women of the Confederacy, a similar monument having been erected by the State of South Carolina. Members of the North Carolina division of the United Confederate Veterans and scores of prominent men and women from this and other states witnessed the ceremonies.

The memorial was made possible through the gift from the late Ashley Horns, who served as a Confederate soldier throughout the war between the states. As a member of the state legislature from Johnston county, he introduced a measure providing for the erection of a statue by the state. Failing to elicit the necessary support he gave \$10,000, and accepted plans for the monument before his death in October, 1912. The monument stands on the south side of Capitol Square midway between Fayetteville and Salisbury streets. On the southern side, in his relief, is a grandmother in a sitting position, with a book in her lap. The woman is relating the story of the Civil War to her grandson, who grasps the hill of his father's sword.

On the eastern side is a bas relief representing the Confederate soldier going to war. His return in an emaciated condition and ragged, but welcomed by the women of the Confederacy, is depicted on the western side. The monument is inscribed "To the North Carolina Women of the Confederacy."

J. A. Long, chairman of the monument committee, presided over today's ceremonies, which began in the local auditorium and were concluded at the site of the monument. The principal address of the occasion was delivered by Dr. Daniel Harvey Hill, a son of Col. D. H. Hill, who commanded the first North Carolina regiment in the battle of Bethel, 55 years ago today.

The court square where the unveiling took place, was crowded with members of the North Carolina division Confederate Veterans, commanded by General Julian S. Carr, of Durham, N. C., and other spectators. Ashley Horns, the young grandson of the donor of the monument, drew the veil from the statue after which an appropriate poem was read by Dr. Henry J. Stockard, chairman. Long formally presented the memorial to the state of North Carolina, in a short address, which was responded to by Gov. Locke Craig in behalf of the State.

UNITED STATES MAY BRING BALKAN PEACE

THIS COUNTRY'S GOOD OFFICES ARE SAID TO HAVE BEEN TENDERED

TO END ALBANIAN TROUBLE

Insurgents in That Country Refuse Allegiance to New Ruler Recently Installed

London, June 10.—A newspaper dispatch from Vienna today says George Fred Williams, American minister to Greece, has sent a circular to the representatives of the European powers, informing them that the government of the United States is ready to offer its good offices for the restoration of peace in Albania.

The Moslem insurgents in Albania, refused to recognize Prince William of Wied as their ruler and demand the nomination of a Moslem prince. Recently they came into armed conflict with the government forces, which they defeated, but afterwards were routed in the vicinity of Tirana, to the east of Durazzo, the Albanian capital.

NO SUCH INSTRUCTIONS SENT FROM WASHINGTON

VOTE ON TOLL BILL IS EXPECTED TODAY

BELIEVED MEASURE WILL PASS SENATE WITH ONE CHANGE

AMENDMENT BY SUTHERLAND

Would Give Positive Right To United States To Discriminate in Favor of Own Ships

Washington, June 10.—The long historic debate over the repeal of the Panama tolls exemption was in its last stages today.

When the Senate resumed work with the prospect of final voting before adjournment today administration leaders claimed the repeal would pass with a safe majority.

First in order for voting came the amendment to the repeal bill as it passed the House. The principal amendment, a compromise between Senate democrats and republicans, qualifies the repeal with the reservation it shall be construed as a waiver of the rights of the United States to pass American coastwise shipping through the canal free of tolls. It generally was conceded that the amendment would pass the Senate and later be accepted by the House and finally accepted by President Wilson.

While it is said the president will approve the repeal bill with the amendment, he prefers that it be passed without one. Senator Sutherland, republican, proposed an amendment asserting positively the right of the United States to discriminate in favor of its own ships and sought the advantage of having it voted upon first. There were objections, however, and Senator Swanson acting as presiding officer, ruled it out of order.

Senator Borah and Senator Simmons debated the amendment which democratic leaders support, and its variation from the Sutherland substitute.

Ashurst's Little Joke. "This amendment is one of reservation of right," said Senator Simmons, "it asserts no right of the United States in the canal but reserves any right we have in the premises. The Sutherland amendment asserts that the United States has a right to exempt its ships. That raises a square issue for us to decide."

Senator Ashurst, democrat, announced he would vote against the compromise measure.

"I do not know what it will be called in history, the Simmons amendment or the Norris amendment but I think it will be called the Simmons tango because it is one step forward, two steps backward and then a fire step," he said.

HUNDREDS OF NEW HOMES BUILDING IN GALVESTON

Galveston, Texas, June 10.—The rapid growth of Texas cities which has been cropping up in statistical reports of the new directories recently, is evidenced in Galveston by builders figures that at least one thousand new homes will have been constructed here by the end of the present year. If the rate of building maintained for the first six months is maintained.

Statistics on the building of new homes are not often given as evidence of city growth, because they are not usually readily available. Yet they are the first evidence that the visitor sees, not only in Galveston but in every city of Texas and in the smaller places as well. Statisticians usually estimate a new dwelling as housing five persons. From such observations as are possible in the absence of a census of these new homes, it appears that five is a fair average to quote for both Galveston and other Texas cities.

Madrid, Spain, June 10.—The civil marriage of Miss Belle Wray Willard, daughter of the American ambassador to Spain and Kermit Roosevelt, son of Theodore Roosevelt, was performed today. The marriage was performed at the residence of the chief of police by the magistrate of the Buena Vista district.

Police headquarters are located in a populous section of the city and the passage of the wedding party in five automobiles attracted considerable attention. Moving picture men were in force.

Col. Roosevelt and Ambassador Willard were among those present at the ceremony after which the wedding party left the city to spend the afternoon at Toledo.

OKLAHOMA IN NEED OF HARVEST HANDS

TWO TO THREE THOUSAND ARE WANTED ALONG LINE OF NORTHWESTERN

LABOR COMMISSIONER ACTIVE

Wires Here For Men To Supply Demand—Many Work Seekers Have Arrived Here

Between two and three thousand harvest hands are needed at points along the Wichita Falls & Northwestern according to estimates compiled by General Freight Agent C. L. Fontaine this morning. Mr. Fontaine sent out a bulletin to all agents of the Wichita Falls Route this morning asking how many hands were needed at their stations, the scale of wages and whether fare would be advanced from Wichita Falls, Dallas and Fort Worth.

could send from fifty to seventy-five provided fare was advanced. The shortage of labor at Frederick was filled this morning when 300 men from various points arrived there last night and this morning.

The Northwestern agent at Duke has telegraphed that 150 men are needed there and the agent at Houston says that 300 can be used there.

Mr. Fontaine says that 300 men are needed there. Fifty men arrived here last night from South Texas points looking for work in the harvest fields. Most of these will go to Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri and Iowa, the country looking for jobs. While the farmers of this section are fairly well supplied it is believed the men who are actually hunting for work won't find any trouble in getting it.

While no open announcement has been made of the fact it is understood that conductors and brakemen on freight trains northbound over the Northwestern will not be as vigilant as usual in looking for men stealing rides as this is the method that many workers will use in reaching the harvest fields.

RUSSIAN PAPER HAS STORMY EXISTENCE

LABOR ORGAN HAS MANY ISSUES CONFISCATED AND EDITORS IMPRISONED

BOYCOTT GOING FOR UNIONS

Are Forced To Hold Many of Their Meetings In Secret, But Remain Loyal Nevertheless

By Associated Press. St. Petersburg, June 10.—Russian trade unionists have been celebrating the second anniversary of the establishment of a labor press in the country. Notwithstanding the most elaborate precautions taken by the police, meetings have been held in almost all factories, collections made and resolutions adopted in support of the press. In many factories workers have resolved to devote to the press fund a whole day's wages and to try their best to increase the number of subscribers.

Since it was established, *Trud*, the organ of the trades unions, has had thirty-six issues confiscated and it has had to change its name half a dozen times. Besides, fines totaling \$4,000 have been paid by its editors for having been imprisoned and their sentences totaled 47 months.

In fact, throughout Russia, labor organizations, through the interference of the police, are unable to exist openly. This, in the opinion of many of employers is the cause of the frequent strikes and lack of understanding between them and the men. Should a dispute arise and the men appoint the delegates to meet the employers, those delegates are immediately arrested as the ring leaders of some imaginary revolution and as a consequence the negotiations come to nothing. The organizations have been driven to hold their meetings in secret and are practically ruled by secret committees. No man dare disobey the orders of these committees.

Will Observe Eclipse.

Russia is looking forward to an international astronomical invasion for the purpose of observing the solar eclipse on August 21. In the west of Europe the eclipse will be visible only partially, but Russia will be favored by a vision of a total eclipse. It will begin in Norway, pass through Sweden and the Baltic and then travel through Russia from northwest to southeast, treating to Asia Minor and Persia. The duration of the total eclipse will vary from a few seconds to a few minutes and it will be longest at Minsk where it will last 2 1/4 minutes.

DALLAS NEWS EDITORIAL DEFENDS LEASE BY KATY

Calls Attention To Matters Overlooked in Recent Statement by Commissioner Williams

Further explanation and defense of the leasing of the Wichita Falls railway, when that road was first built to the Katy system, is contained in an editorial appearing in the Dallas News of Tuesday which criticized Railroad Commissioner Williams for failure to give all the facts in the case when he recently issued a statement as to the lease.

The leasing of this road to the Katy system is a very important factor in the upbuilding of Wichita Falls and Wichitans are interested in the outcome of the present controversy. The reply of Judge Hiram Glass to Commissioner Williams appeared in *The Times* of Tuesday.

The *News* editorial under the caption, "Some Important Facts and Circumstances," follows: "The *News*, at least is willing to assume that Railroad Commissioner Williams had not acquainted himself with all the facts when, in a communication which we printed June 1, he so severely criticized an unsigned editorial appearing in the Dallas *News* of Sunday for having leased seventeen miles of track from another railroad company at a price apparently so exorbitant. At all events it is made clear by a communication from Judge Glass which we printed yesterday that Mr. Williams omitted to state several facts and circumstances of record, that put on that transaction an aspect radically different from that which he delineated."

It is made evident by the communication of Judge Glass that the case Mr. Williams had in mind was the Katy's lease of seventeen miles of track running between Henrietta and Wichita Falls, belonging to the Wichita Falls Railroad Company. By implication, rather than by categorical assertion, Mr. Williams sought to make it appear first, that the Katy had, consciously and deliberately, entered into a transaction which was exorbitant and, second, that this contract so burdensome to the Katy still has some sixteen years to run. As to the last named assertion the fact is that this contract, instead of having some sixteen years to run, was already a month before Mr. Williams complained of it. It was superseded by a new and entirely reasonable agreement by the dismissal of this State's suit against the Katy, which dismissal had, among its other effects, the consolidation of the line for which the Katy had been paying so heavy a rental. Mr. Williams was opposed to that consolidation, so that he is in the rather unenviable attitude of having sought to defeat a measure which, among other things, had the effect of annulling the very contract which he denounced.

While Mr. Williams did not formally charge it, one could not avoid inferring, from the manner in which he presented this transaction, that the unnamed leasing road had agreed to pay annually a rental for the use of the seventeen miles of leased track the size amount of \$239,000 annually. This is emphatically not true. The facts are that the Katy agreed only to pay certain percentages of the revenue it derived from the use of this trackage. This agreement was made in 1894 at a time when the percentages agreed on yielded only a reasonable rental. Indeed, there were some who thought at that time that the rental which would result from the payment of these percentages would not yield the Wichita Falls company a fair remuneration for the use of its property. RELIC OF PREHISTORIC AGE

Discovery in Germany Has Aroused Antiquarians in All Parts of the World.

The bones of a monster believed to be 20,000 years old were recently discovered in the garden of a mansion at Perivale, near Ealing, Germany. This recent find has led to the belief that a skull of curious formation, unearthed twelve years ago, is that of a rhinoceros of the Pleistocene period, and probably about 20,000 years old. Authorities have pronounced the head to be that of a prehistoric monster. When the excavations were made there were also discovered parts of a Roman wall, several human skulls, coins and spears. The rhinoceros' skull was found underneath a shed which has been standing for 300 years, and the foundations of which consisted of concrete to a considerable depth. It was in the course of removing this concrete and digging some yards below that the discovery was made. As little importance was attached to it, the skull was given to the gardener, who handed it over to his children as a plaything. The lower jaw, teeth and legs of the animal have now been found. The skull itself is about 26 inches in length, and seems to be water worn. The leg bones are short and thick, and this goes to support the theory that the animal was a rhinoceros.

GEORGE W. PERKINS OBJECT OF ATTACK

AMOS PINCHOT URGES PROGRESSIVE LEADERS TO OUST HIM AS CHAIRMAN

TRUST AND LABOR ATTITUDE

Letter is Addressed to Roosevelt and Other Party Leaders Urging Immediate Action

By Associated Press. New York, June 10.—Amos Pinchot made public today the text of the confidential letter he recently addressed to Theodore Roosevelt, the members of the Progressive national committee and other leaders denouncing George W. Perkins, chairman of the national executive committee as a menace to the party principally because of his affiliation with the United States Steel corporation and the International Harvester Company "two great monopolies which have succeeded most completely in exploiting the public and crushing organized labor."

The letter opened by declaring "that a situation exists in the Progressive party which must be terminated before it can gain general popular support." Mr. Pinchot declared:

"An element in our party leadership headed by George W. Perkins favors the protection of monopoly in American industries; Mr. Perkins is actively opposed to recognition of labor's right to organize and deal with capital through labor unions and has frequently gone on record to this effect."

In view of these facts, Mr. Pinchot says the rank and file and majority of the leaders of the party feel that the resignation of Mr. Perkins as chairman of the executive committee is necessary. Mr. Pinchot declares that he believes even Mr. Perkins will agree with him that the success of the party demands such action immediately.

REGULAR INSPECTIONS MADE

Better Conditions Prevail in Business District and Dangers Are Kept at Minimum

Congressman Jones Urges Freedom For The Philippines



Washington, June 9.—Limited self government of a territorial character for the Philippines, with a view to complete independence of the islands in the indefinite future, when the natives have demonstrated their capacity, is proposed in a bill drawn up by Representative William A. Jones of Virginia, chairman of the insular affairs committee. The bill is in strict accordance with the Democratic platform. Several bills in the past have recommended the adoption of a definite date—the most popular being July 4, 1920—for granting independence. Mr. Jones leaves this to the natives themselves, stipulating that this government should turn affairs over to them as soon as they have proved their ability to run a government.

GENEROSITY MARKS DRILLERS' LAST DAY

CLOSING CHAPTER IN LIFE OF FRED SCOTT, DROWNED, IS BEAUTIFUL ONE

HELPED THOSE OUT OF WORK

Gave Away Most of His Last Pay Check To Others Who Were Less Steadily Employed

Acts of friendship for the less fortunate brother workmen of Fred Scott marked the last day on earth of that driller before the waters of Lake Wichita engulfed him Friday afternoon. With several weeks' pay on his person Saturday morning, Sunday morning found him with less than a third of it still in his possession. The rest he had given to other drillers and oil field workers who have not been as steadily employed as he was.

These facts came to light today, and they seem to show that a heart of gold throbbed beneath the rough exterior of Fred Scott. Saturday morning he cashed a check for \$215. During that day he advanced practically all of it in amounts of five or ten dollars to other oil field workers whom he knew were up against it. Some of these had gone to him in their necessity, to others he voluntarily offered the money. Soon less than ninety dollars remained and when an especially needy friend came to him, Scott gave practically all of that amount to him. Later the friend returned all but a few dollars, finding that he would not need it. Scott had about ninety dollars when death came to him.

Like most of his class Scott was generous to a fault, ever ready to help a needy comrade taking little thought of the morrow. He was one of the best drillers the Northwest Texas field ever had and every contractor for whom he worked spoke in highest terms of him; he was able to get work when other less expert workmen were unable to do so and this caused him to be prospering when others, out of work because of slack times in the field, were feeling the pinch of poverty. Sympathy for his fellow man actuated Scott to come to the relief of the others. As one after another partook of his bounty there was not one who dreamed that twenty-four hours later would see him cold in death.

Scott's body will be sent to his old home in Sistersville, West Virginia for burial. The body of D. J. Minick, the tool dresser who met death with Scott, was sent early today to Bradford, Pa., where relatives reside.

SALVATION ARMY CONGRESS OPENS AT LONDON THURSDAY

By Associated Press. London, June 10.—The World's Congress of the Salvation Army will open here tomorrow. OBSERVANCE OF FLAG DAY

PLANNED FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Anniversary of Adoption of Stars and Stripes As National Emblem To Be Remembered.

Next Sunday is "Flag Day" anniversary of the date on which Congress passed a resolution formally adopting the stars and stripes as the country's flag. Plans for the observance of the occasion are being made by the local chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution. The following is the flag as written for the D. A. R. by Miss Helen Beavers:

"Every American citizen will want to remember next Sunday, June the fourteenth, as the one hundred and thirty-seventh birthday of the flag he honors. On that day, that many years ago, Congress passed the following resolution: 'Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation, the stars to be arranged in a circle.'

"Not long before this Washington and Robert Morris had made their famous visit to Elizabeth, or 'Betty,' Ross and she had made the first flag from a pencil drawing of Washington's first demonstrating to him that a star should have five points instead of six. This famous woman made flags for the government for many years and after her death her daughter, succeeded to the business. Miss Sarah Wilson, great grand daughter of Betty Ross still makes duplicates of the original flag. In fact the enormous business of making flags is largely in the hands of women. Every year enough flags large and small are made to give one to every man, woman and child in the United States. The only change is in the number of stars, a new one being added for each state admitted to the union.

"We think ourselves a new nation yet our flag is one of the oldest in the world. When the Chinese first saw it at Canton they reported that they had seen a flag 'as beautiful as a flower' and for many years it was known among them as the Flower Flag. Francis Key called it 'The Star Spangled Banner' but Captain Stephen Driver was the first to call it by what is its best loved name, 'Old Glory.'

"Travelers tell us that the sight of the stars and stripes in a foreign land brings a lump to the throat and a mist to the eyes. The eager home-comer catches sight of a large flag which floats from a pole three hundred feet high at Mt. Clatsop, New Jersey, even before he sees the Statue of Liberty. But nowhere is the flag so beautiful as when it floats over a school-house or playground where sometimes children of more than ten nationalities gravely raise their right hand to a level with the forehead and repeat these words: 'I pledge my allegiance to my flag and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice to all.'

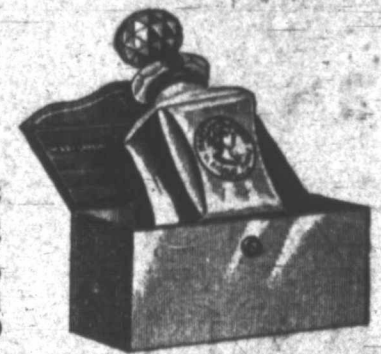
