Tattle tale, tattle tale!

I'm good to drive again until October, 2011.

I had a birthday in October on which my driver's license expired. The nice folks at the driver license bureau had sent me a letter earlier, which allowed me to renew by mail. Our local driver's license lady. Amelia Taylor, said they let people renew by mail once and a while if they've been

She also advised me to send it in early, which to no great surprise I didn't. So I appeared in person, read the chart, posed for a gosh-awful picture, and tucked the receipt in my wallet. A few days later my replacement arrived with a letter warning me to destroy the old license since it is against the law to carry two driver's licenses

I'm legal to drive until my 2011 birthday. Never mind how old I'll be then. Hope I'm still able to drive and can afford the gasoline.

The letter that came with my license also encouraged me to be a tattle-tale. I haven't thought much about being a tattle-tale since I was in elementary school. I know tattling was not a good thing when I was growing up. Momma would bust your bottom if you came in the house tattling on your siblings or

playmates

I can remember playmates on our school yard running around taunting "Tattle-tale, tattle-tale, hanging on a bull's tail." In looking back I have no idea what it meant but at the time it was pretty scary to be branded a tattle-tale.

Now days authorities encourage us to tell on our neighbors. Terrorism has had a lot to do with that but most of us are natural born finger pointers. We are all supposed to "be vigilant" and report any suspicious activity. If you are going to buy some fertilizer these days you better make sure you have a yard to put it

Students are reminded to report fellow students suspected of using alcohol, drugs, or bringing weapons to school. Reporting such activity is the right thing to do when personal safety is concerned. But is it my duty to report a fellow student for cheating? There is a fine line in there somewhere.

One of the more ridiculous tattle-tale opportunities came with my driver's license. In addition to the warning about two licenses, my letter encouraged me to "Report smoking vehicles online at...." It gave a website, smokingvehicle.org, and a phone number, 800-453-SMOG (7664).

The website actually belongs to the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality (TCEQ). The page is headed, "Controlling On-Road Mobile Source Vehicle Emissions." Bookmark this page to quickly report smoking vehicles, it commanded.

There are a couple of rules you need to know about before you go smoking vehicle

*You have to get close enough to the car or truck to write down the license plate number. If it is smoking real bad, good luck seeing the plate.

*The car has to be emitting visible exhaust smoke for more than 10 consecutive seconds. Carry a stopwatch or a friend who can count.

*You have to "submit your report", i.e. tattle, within 30 days of observing the smoking vehicle. Don't be diverted by personal life issues. Get the report filed.

*Report Texas vehicles only. We can't chase a smogger across state lines.

You do not have to give your name. Tattlers Anonymous would be proud.

It would also be helpful to the offender if he knew what color the smoke was. Smoke color can be helpful in indicating the potential source of the vehicle's problem, so says the

website. I'll be jotting down the color of the smoke at the same time I'm writing down the license number, date, time, and location. How many colors does smoke come in anyway?

Once you turn in your fellow Texan's vehicle, the TCEO sends him a registered letter. The letter notifies them their vehicles were spied on and tattled on and encourages them to make repairs. Since the program started in 1992 (did you know about it before now?) the TCEQ has sent more than 160,000 letters to smoking vehicle owners. Thousands have replied saying they fixed their cars. Ain't that dandy?

If you get a letter, don't worry. Their website says they don't do anything about it except send the letter. Here is the beauty of the bureaucracy, direct from TCEQ: "The TCEQ does not investigate reported sightings nor issue any enforcement actions for alleged violations based on the reports received."

That's not good. If you are a serial tattler my advice is to forget the smoking ve-

What fun is being a tattletale if nobody gets in trouble.

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION USDA halts FSA closing plans

U.S. Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Saxby Chambliss (R-GA) expressed satisfaction at USDA's announcement to stop plans to close 713 Farm Service Agency offices. USDA notified Chairman Chambliss in a letter Tuesday morning.

"I appreciate USDA's decision to halt its plan to close an excessive number of county and local FSA offices. I had serious concerns with the plan, including USDA's failure to demonstrate that FSA Tomorrow would yield better service for producers," said Chambliss. "Although this specific modernization plan has been abandoned, I sincerely hope that the Farm Service Agency will work to improve service to producers and the agriculture community. We appreciate the work of FSA employees in the field, and I encourage FSA headquarters to focus on improved program delivery, including finding solutions to computer software development issues and releasing long-overdue farmer payments."

With USDA's abandonment of the FSA closings, Chambliss announced cancellation of Thursday's hearing to bring top USDA officials to testify before the Senate Agriculture Committee. The review was sparked by Senator Jim Talent's unanimously-approved Senate appropriations Amendment requiring the Secretary of Agriculture's thorough analysis before any offices would be closed.

"This is tremendous news for our producers who rely on their local Farm Service Agency offices to provide a wide range of agricultural services," said U.S. Senator Jim Talent (R-MO). "I was especially concerned because the office closure plan was issued with little or no consultation with our local offices and producers. We all want our FSA offices to operate as efficiently as possible, but the key with the way we handle these offices must be service and accessibility to the agriculture community and to our producers."

Neugebauer statement on FSA decision

Congressman Randy Neugebauer released the following statement regarding U.S. Department of Agriculture's decision to delay "FSA Tomorrow" plant, which would have reorganized or closed a large number of FSA county offices: MR BOLD VIRTUO DE BE "Today, USDA announced that it has decided to set aside the

"FSA Tomorrow" approach and timetable. I think it is a good move by USDA to get more input from producers and other stakeholders who may be affected by any changes to the structure of FSA before moving forward. Additional input will prove to be very beneficial as USDA works to provide more effective and efficient service to our farmers, and I look forward to working with USDA on this effort.'



Common Costly Misconceptions About Carpet Cleaning

#3: One method of carpet cleaning is as good as another.

No. The dry cleaning methods - which are dry foam, dry chem and dry compound -do not rinse your carpet in any way. Instead they leave a residue. You might say they clean your carpet only half way. The most effective cleaning method is hot

Hot water extraction means a hot water cleaning solution, under high pressure, is forced into your carpet and then extracted out of your carpet. Shaw industries, the world's largest carpet manufacturer, recommends hot water extraction as the primary method of cleaning carpets



Do you truly understand the reason for "dilating" the eyes? A dilation is needed to more completely view the retina. Drops are used to relax the pupil. In so doing, the pupil widens. This enables the doctor to see the retina with an "indirect ophthalmoscope."

This instrument allows for an excellent view This instrument allows for an excellent view of the central and peripheral retina. There are many eye diseases with no symptoms. Some of these diseases may show up as



Some of these diseases may show up as changes on the central and peripheral retina. Without a dilation, those changes could be more difficult to detect, and may go unnoticed.

It is sometimes best to have someone with you to drive after you're dilated. That's because you'll be light sensitive for several hours afterward. Your doctor can provide more information on this important procedure.

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

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
