

NO AGREEMENT IS REACHED GENERAL CARRANZA DILATORY

Huerta Delegates Will Oppose Selection of any Man Active on Side of Rebels

Niagara Fails, June 13.—The crux of the Mexican problem, the selection of a man for provisional president acceptable to all factions in the Mexican and foreign governments generally was reached today in a conference between the mediators and the Mexican and American delegates. Various names were discussed, but there was no agreement. Details of the peace plan are virtually set aside now for the greater task of finding a man who can maintain peace in Mexico, while a constitutional election is held and normal order re-

General Carranza's note advising he mediators that constitutionalist by the representatives of Huerta and delegates were on their way to the mediation conference with full instructions arrived today. It contains no reference to an armistice and there was nothing to show that the mediators had altered their determina tion not to admit officially Carranza's representatives unless an armistice was declared. Some other way of dealing with them, perhaps through the American delegates may be found.

Make Up of Government. The composition of the new provisional government, its form and personnel was discussed today American and Mexican delegates in an informal talk with the mediators No agreement was reached, but it is believed this plank in the peace plan will set forth that the new government shall consist of a provisional president and four cabinet members comprising the portfolios of foreign affairs, finance, war and interior





In fairness to the management of Hilburn Bros. glove factory we ask that you kindly print this article.

When a machinist, or boiler-maker, or men of other similar trades start out to learn such trades they agree to work long months on half pay in order that they may have the oppor tunity to become skilled in these different occupations. . They are willing to do this on account of the reward that comes later.

Lawyers, doctors, dentists, teachers and preachers pay out much money for their schooling, and then practice several years on very meager incomes before they can hope to do very much. All trades and professions wherein

brains and skill count for much are very similar to these. Glove-making is no exception. There must be weeks and menths of training and practice in order to attain proficiency. Fortunately, the time required is not so long as in some other trades. .

In explaining the nature of the work that they cannot earn much, at the beginning, but by studious application they can learn to do very well. We also tell them that our shop is not a place to secure temporary work for eight, ten or twelve weeks; that unless they are situated so they can continue the work for a longer time it is best not, to begin. Notwithstanding this







In many cases sites were offered for buildings to be erected by the govern-ment. The same reply has been made all such offers; the treasury department and members of the federal reserve bank organization committee have absolutely nothing to do with the providing of banking quarters for the new institution. Directors will have control of all work.

The five active members of the federal reserve board and the staff they employ at the treasury department in Washington are really the only persons on federal pay rolls who will have a part in the operation of the twelve new banks. Each bank will pay its own employes and handle its affairs quite as independently of dinary national bank.





FIRST TO FINISH THRESHING AV-SIGNAL HONOR CONFERRED ON REV. J. W. HILL BY SOUTH-WESTERN UNIVERSITY BUSHELS

Dr. J. W. Hill received a telegram rom the Southwestern University at leorgetown Saturday notifying him that he had been elected to receive the degree of doctor of divinity from that institution. The telegram re-quested that Dr. Hill be at George-town Monday morning for the ceremony. He will leave this afternoon

This honor comes as a surprise to Dr. Hill who had not solicited it and is therefore all the more pleasing. Dr. Hill's friends here and all over the North Texas conference will be pleased to hear of this honor coming to him. The recipient has been a preacher in the North Texas conference more than thirty years and dur-ing those thirty years has filled all the more important stations in the conference. He is now in his third year in Wichita Falls and is well beloved not only by the members of his own church but by all the people of

Has Had Many Honors. Dr. Hill has been honored many times by the conference but this honor is one which he prizes probably higher than any. Will Go To Georgetown For Ceremony—Thirty Years in North
Texas Conference

Eighty Cents Per Bushel is Being
Paid Here—Crop is Nearly
All Harvested

Several thousands of bushels wheat of the 1914 crop have already been marketed in Wichita Falls and local elevator men are preparing to handle a big rush of wheat this week. The first farmer in this section to finish threshing, so far as can be learned, was A. Bartel, who lives east of town. Mr. Bartel's crop averaged between twenty and twenty-two bushels per acre and graded No. 2.. He had counted on an average of fifteen

bushels per acre so his surprise at a bigger yield was very agreeable. Among other farmers marketing wheat Friday and Saturday were H. F. Hagerman, Henry Musgrave and F. M. Keller. Only one load of wheat markeed so far has tested less than fifty-nine pounds and this load tested fifty-eight and one-half pounds. Some of the wheat that has been marketed has tested sixty-one pounds.

Good Milling Demand.

Eighty cents per bushel continues-to be the quotation for wagon wheat here. This is three and a quarter cents above the price the export price warrants and is due to the demand from Texas millers. Exporters are paying 85 and three-fourths cents a bushel for wheat delivered at Galveston. The freight amounts to nine cents a bushel from this section of the state which would make the market here seventy-six and three-fourths cents. The milling demand makes the dif-ference and dealers say that as soon as the demands of the Texas millers are supplied the price will drop unless there is a raise in export price which few think probable in view of the fact that the country's crop is the largest ever grown.

Provide Plenty of Sacks. There are more threshing machines in the country than ever before and there is a prospect of a big rush of grain on the market within the next week. The only thing except weather conditions that will prevent will be enough teams and men to haul the erop into market. Several carloads of sacks are coming into local eleva-tors so that the lack of teams and men will not be felt so keenly as at Butter may be kept firm and cool during hot weather by placing it in a dish and standing the latter inside a larger one containing weak vinegar and water.

men will not be lett so keenly as at some other places where the supply of sacks is likely to be short and where they have no elevator to store the grain previous to shipping.

At such points the railroads will be expected to furnish cars for the wheat as it is hauled in from the threshers. The task is a big one but the rall-roads have been preparing for such a rush for weeks and have a big supply of empties on hand.

Is Nearly All Cut. Most of the wheat in this section in the shock, it being estimated cent of the crop in Wichita county is still-standing. Binders will run again today in many fields. The grain left standing is now dead ripe and ever hour of delay in getting it nto the shock is an added risk.
