## ASSASSINATION OF AUSTRIAN ROYALTY CAREFULLY PLANNED

*Little Doubt That Plot Had Its Inception In Capital Of Servia*

**MAY LEAD TO TROUBLE WITH RUSSIA**

*Arch Duke Knew Of His Danger But Did Not Falter—Reprisals Are Likely To Be Taken*

London, June 29.—Every dispatch today from Sarajevo and Vienna brought additional evidence that the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and the Duchess of Hohenbeg was one of the most carefully planned crimes ever carried against royal personages.

Indications are that it was engineered by persons possessing more organizing ability than that of the usual assassins. It is generally believed in Austria and Hungary that the plotters had their headquarters in Belgrade, the Servian capital.

Servian hatred of Austrians, always violent, has been fomented recently by Belgrade newspapers and by agitators who have helped to inflame the minds of students and induce them to sacrifice their lives in the belief that they go down in history as patriots. Yesterday's crime seems likely to have an effect contrary to that desired by its authors.

**Not Unaware of Danger**

Austrian authorities are contemplating severe measures against the Serbs among the inhabitants of Austria and Bervia. These measures are likely to further embitter relations between the two countries and also between Austria and Russia, which protects all Serbs.

Arch Duke Ferdinand, it is said, was well aware of the danger he ran during his tour of Bervia, as inspector general of the Austrian army. This title was conferred on him last year. His chief task was to inspect the army which guarded the Servian frontier during the recent Balkan war and prevented encroachments by Servian troops.

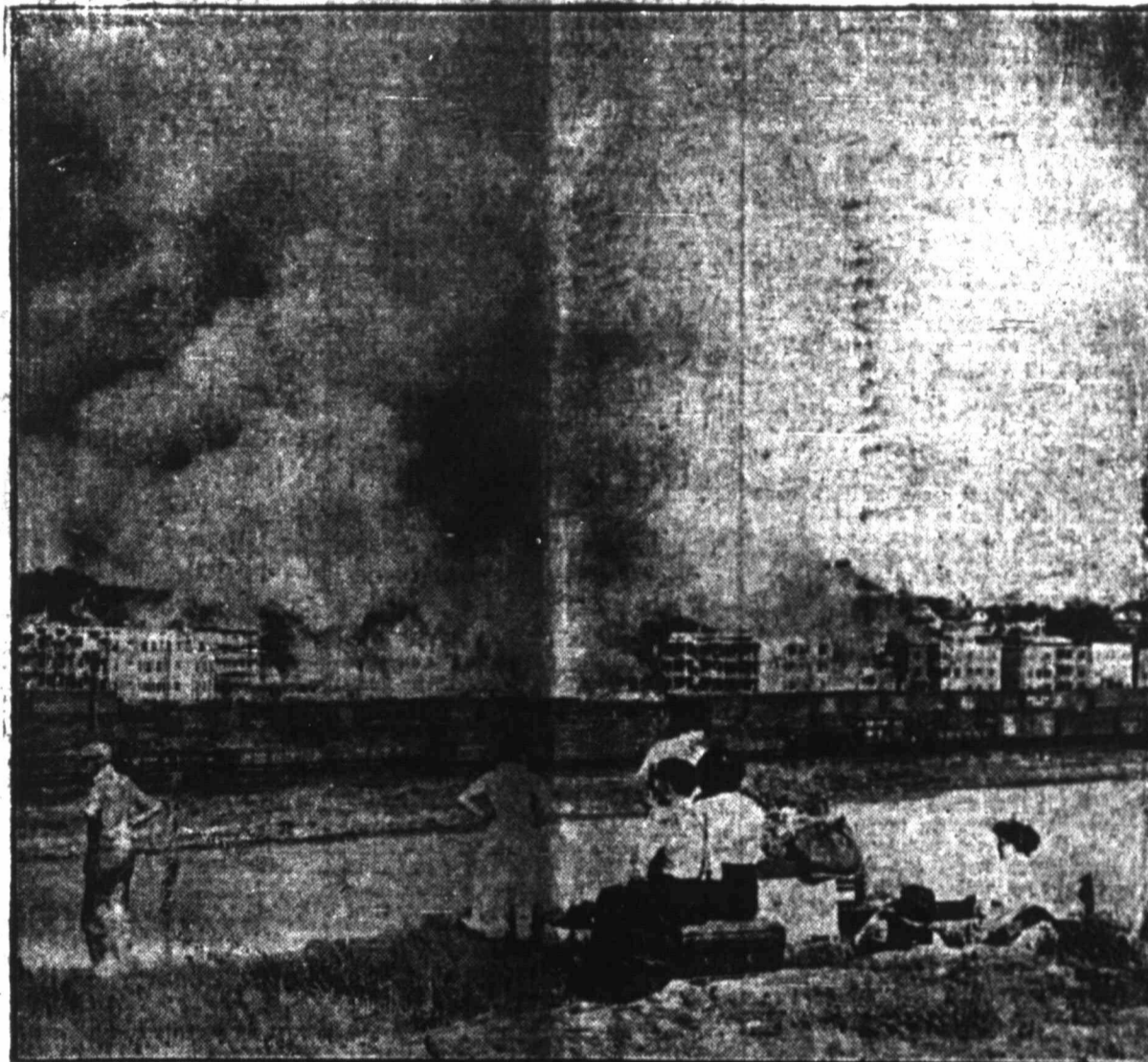
The Servian minister at Vienna told the Arch Duke of the danger of his visit at Sarajevo and implored him, if he insisted on going, at least to leave the duchess at home. When the duchess was informed of the danger of the journey she said her place was at her husband's side. When they arrived at Sarajevo Saturday, hostility was shown by the Serbs there. Just before they passed through the city the authorities got rid of a great display of Servian flags which the people had hoisted instead of Austrian colors.

**Servians Do Not Mourn**

The bitterness rose to an extreme when at a session of the Bosnian diet today, called to express sorrow at the Archduke's death four Servian deputies appeared in light suits instead of in mourning black.

The assassin's plan contemplated blowing up the royal train when the arch duke was leaving Sarajevo, in case the attempt by Gavrio Prinzip failed. Several bombs were found along the railway over which the arch duke would have traveled. Prinzip concealed himself behind a building where it was necessary for the arch duke's automobile to slacken speed. Some accounts say Prinzip actually stood on the step of the duke's car as he fired the shot. The murderers guessed

REFUGEES WATCHING THEIR HOMES BURN IN SOUTH SALEM

## "Thank God" Cry Servian Students When They Hear News Of Tragedy

Sarajevo, Bosnia, June 29.—Martial law was proclaimed today both in this city and in the district of Sarajevo. Count Francis Von Harrach, according to latest accounts of the assassination, was standing on the footboard of the arch duke's car, acting as a shield to the occupants for whom he had constituted himself a special body guard after the bomb had been thrown by Nedeljo Gabrinovisk. The arch duke was joking with the count about his precautions when the shots were fired.

For an instant after the attack, Field Marshal Totiorek, governor of Bosnia, who was riding with the arch duke, thought the arch duke and the duchess, both of whom were seated opposite him had again escaped. Neither of them uttered a sound. In a moment it was seen they had been struck.

Some Servian students here when they heard the news of the assassination, shouted "Thank God, we need not do it ourselves." They were arrested as accomplices of the assassins.

A bomb thrown by a youth standing on the corner of the main street of the Bosnian capital was the signal this morning for a serious anti-Servian outbreak which the troops found considerable difficulty in quelling. The only damage done by the bomb was a slight injury to a passing Mussulman, but the rougher element seized on the incident as an excuse to start a demonstration. They were joined by a number of Croation students and the crowds passed along the streets stoning the windows of Servian shops, clubs, schools and houses and looting the interiors. They paraded the streets with portrait of Emperor Francis Joseph at their head. They sang the Austrian national anthem and attacked everything Servian until confronted by an overwhelming force of soldiers.

## COTTON GAMBLING BILL PASSES HOUSE

IS SUBSTITUTE FOR MEASURE WHICH SENATE RECENTLY APPROVED.

## PROHIBITIVE TAX IS PROPOSED

Is Aimed Especially at Practices on New York and New Orleans Boards.

Washington, June 29.—The Lever bill designed to eliminate gambling on cotton exchanges was passed by the House today by a vote of eighty-four to twenty.

The Lever bill is a substitute for the Smith bill which passed the Senate. The Smith bill would prohibit use of mills for contracts that do not meet conditions of standard cotton grades and commercial differences. That feature is not in the Lever bill. The Senate bill would not tax contracts for future delivery. The House bill levies a tax of one cent a pound on all contracts for all future deliveries which do not meet commercial standards and grades as set out in the bill. This tax is intended to be prohibitory amounts to \$200 a contract. There were several provisions on dealing in cotton futures designed to eliminate certain practices on the New York and New Orleans exchanges. Representative Lever said:

"I believe the practices of the New York Cotton Exchange cost the southern producers annually \$100,000,000. The purpose of this bill is to eliminate the practices which constitute such an enormous burden. Any man voting against this bill puts himself in the attitude of favoring a continuance of practices that have been denounced in every cotton growing State in the Union."

## VIENNA CROWDS LOYALLY RECEIVE THE AGED EMPEROR

Appears in Good Health When He Reaches Capital—Is Greeted by His Apparent

Vienna, June 29.—When the aged emperor Francis Joseph arrived here today from Ischl he was greeted with cheers by large crowds. He drove in an open carriage to his castle accompanied by a full staff of brilliantly uniformed officers. He appeared in the best of health. At the palace he was welcomed by Charles Francis Joseph, now heir-apparent to the throne.

## HUERTA'S TROOPS EXPECTED TO REVOLT IN MEXICO CITY

Uprising or Revolt of Federal Army Predicted Within Next Ten Days.

Vera Cruz, June 29.—The fear that the spread of dissatisfaction among the federal troops might result in an uprising in Mexico City caused the British residents there to hold a meeting Saturday night to arrange special plans for the defense of the concentration district. British refugees arriving here today said the general opinion expressed there was that General Huerta's hold on the capital was wavering. Many predicted an uprising or a revolt of the federal army within a week of ten days.

## APPREHENSION THAT MEDIATION MAY FAIL

Mediators Are Planning to Recess Unless Carranza Agents Treat With Huerta.

Washington, June 29.—Despite continued expressions of hope that plans for mediation will not fail, apprehension was shown today in official quarters. Considerable significance was attached to the fact that the mediation conference plans to recess unless there is definite assurance from Carranza by tomorrow that his agents will meet the Huerta delegates and United States representatives on plans for a provisional government as outlined in the recent protocol.

Carranza's latest reply to the mediators, asking for time to consult his generals who participated in the plot of Guadalupe before agreeing to enter the proposed peace conference, was said here not to have reached the mediators, but that it would probably would get to Niagara Falls by tomorrow morning. Luis Cabrera said today he believed Carranza would yield to the wishes of the United States and accept the invitation of the mediators after he had consulted with his chief.

## STANDARD OIL RESUMES ITS OPERATIONS IN CHINA

Work is Delayed By Activities of Bandit White Wolf—No Oil is Found So Far

Pekin, June 29.—Having obtained military protection against the brigands of White Wolf, the expedition sent out by the Standard Oil Company has left the end of the railroad lines with 600 carts laden with provisions and tools to drill for oil in the province Shen Si. The expedition had been detained several weeks by White Wolf's operations. The oil company failed to find oil in northern Chi Li province but has learned there are quantities in Shen Si. Meantime it is reported the Chinese government already has pledged to a European company oil rights in the other provinces of China to take effect next February after the Standard Oil option expires.

## WILSON TO NAME NEGROES FOR GOVERNMENT POSITIONS

Washington, June 29.—President Wilson has promised to fill all positions under the federal government now held by negroes with other negroes in need of changes. He held this today to Representative Smith of Maryland, who called to urge the appointment of a white man as recorder of deeds in Washington. Mr. Wilson said soon after his inauguration a delegation of negroes urged him to adopt that plan and he promised to do so.

## BUBONIC PLAGUE CAMPAIGN STARTS

SURGEON GENERAL BLUE TO TAKE CHARGE AT NEW ORLEANS

## TO TAKE MEASURES AT ONCE

Not Believed Danger Is Marked, But Government Will Begin Fight Without Delay

By Associated Press.

Washington, June 29.—Surgeon General Blue of the public health service will go to New Orleans to take charge of the campaign against bubonic plague which has appeared with one death there and one other case. Surgeon General Blue said today that neither the city of New Orleans nor the territory surrounding was in danger, but that it was advisable for the federal government to take sharp measures.

Apparatus for rat catching and fumigation are being sent to New Orleans and a corps of experts in plague eradication including Surgeon Creed of the public health service will carry out the eradication plans. As a preliminary measure spread of the infection by shipping, Surgeon General Blue today sent warning to health authorities of the Atlantic coast states and to those of the Mississippi River states as far north as Iowa suggesting that they take up the work of rodent eradication.

Municipal health authorities who have asked for aid are being furnished with advice. The most approved method to prevent spread of infection will be put in force immediately at New Orleans.

**EMBARGO IS ORDERED BY STATE HEALTH OFFICER**

Austin, Texas, June 29.—Declaring New Orleans an infected port, due to bubonic plague, State Health Officer Ralph Steiner today extended the scope of the embargo he had placed against New Orleans when he issued instructions to quarantine officers at all ports to observe strictly the quarantine regulations against bubonic plague. Last night he placed the embargo only against vessels entering Galveston and Sabine.

## WESTINGHOUSE STRIKE IS CAUSE OF DISORDER TODAY

Officers Unable to Stop Trouble When Pickets Try To Block Entrance To Plant

Pittsburg, June 29.—Disorder broke out today at the striking Westinghouse employes in East Pittsburg. Pickets surrounded entrances to the electric works and prevented the office men, foremen and superintendents from entering. Deputy sheriffs and the police failed to quiet the strikers. The sheriff said he would decide later today whether to summon state troops. The company announced that striking employes of the Union Switch and Signal Company returned to work today.

## PART OF CLAY TABLET THAT TELLS ABOUT EDEN FOUND

Is Located in Museum and Will Be Sent To England To Be Translated

Philadelphia, June 29.—The missing half of the clay tablet, the other half of which was translated by Dr. Stephen Langdon of Oxford, told about the flood and the escape of Noah and how the fall of man ensued through man's temptation by the river-god Enki to eat of the tree of life, has been found at the University of Pennsylvania museum. The authorities announced the tablet would be sent at once to Dr. Langdon for translation.

Nothing was said or intimated about Eve or any other woman in connection with the fall of man on the first tablet and Dr. Langdon expressed regret that the tablet was broken "in the most important place." Archaeologists here believe the newly found portion will greatly assist in revealing the complete story of creation, the flood and the fall of man.

### WEST VIRGINIA SOON BECOMES DRY STATE

PROHIBITION BECOMES EFFECTIVE THERE AT MIDNIGHT TOMORROW

### APPROVED BY BIG MAJORITY

Makes Total of Nine Commonwealths Where Alcoholic Drinks Have Been Barred

By Associated Press. Charleston, W. Va., June 29.—Statewide prohibition of the liquor business in West Virginia becomes effective next Tuesday at midnight. It brings the total number of States in the prohibition column up to nine.

With West Virginia added, the list will be Georgia, Kansas, Maine, Mississippi, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Tennessee, West Virginia. These nine states of total prohibition territory, plus the local license areas, make up 2,132,726 square miles in which 46,029,750 persons or nearly fifty per cent of the country's population live according to the latest figures of the prohibition leaders.

The 92,000 majority with which the people of West Virginia accepted the dry proposition was relatively the largest ever given by any state. It was approximately two to one for statewide suppression of the liquor business. It was a surprise even to the prohibition forces, who were indebted largely to the determined stand which many of the large employes took in favor of their cause. (The state has a population of 1,221,119 by the census of 1910.)

Plans For Enforcement. The mandate of the legislature, embodied in the Yost bill for the enforcement of the new law, beginning July 1st, departs in many respects from the methods hitherto tried along this line. The chief features center about the creation of a commissioner of prohibition, whose particular business it will be to see that by next Tuesday midnight some 1200 liquor selling places in the state have disposed of their stocks and that thereafter all persons shall be punished by law if they keep liquor for sale.

The new office of commissioner of prohibition automatically falls to State Tax Commissioner Fred Blue of this city, who has been several months in preparation for strict enforcement of the new law. To save the state the time and expense of taking violations before state courts, he has been urging municipal ordinances governing the violations thus permitting the cases to be brought before the local courts.

"In other states," says Mr. Blue, "where prohibition has been adopted, one of the forces that has had to be contended with has been the drug store. The Yost law will regulate this feature. Druggists may sell alcohol only to persons not addicted to its use upon prescription of a reputable physician, who has examined the person and in detail set forth in the prescription the persons for the use of alcohol. The governing bodies of druggists have approved of this plan. For scientific or mechanical purposes alcohol will be sold only after affidavit as to its intended uses, and uniform records of all such sales will be kept. To be inspected periodically by those in charge of the enforcement of the law. No druggist, however, can sell in any form whiskey, brandy, ale or any beverage of an intoxicating nature.

Clubs To Be Barred. The Yost law also undertakes to do away with the drinking clubs, which have been the source of so much trouble in other states," he said. "It provides that any person directly or indirectly associated in keeping such a club house or other place where liquor is kept for gift, barter or sale, shall be punishable upon conviction by a fine of from \$100 to \$500 and by imprisonment from one to six months.

"The enactment of the Webb-Kenyon law by Congress will be of considerable assistance in enforcing the prohibition law in this state," he said. "One of the benefits of the federal act is that records of interstate shipments of liquors may be required, and therefore every railroad, express company and any kind of transportation company including steam boats and vessels carrying freight or passengers either from another state into ours, or from one part of our state to another part must obey the laws of this state respecting liquors. Every one of the transportation companies will be required to keep special records at the point of delivery showing the receipt of liquors, the kind and quantity, to whom consigned, when delivered and the consignee must sign in person for the shipment. The Webb-Kenyon act vests the right to enforce these provisions of the law and regulation throughout against interstate carriers. None of these carriers will be permitted to receive consignments of liquor at any point where there is not a regularly employed agent to keep such records, and have them open for inspection at all times.

### URGES FARMERS TO HOLD SOFT WHEAT

J. C. HUNT SAYS THEY CAN NEARLY CONTROL THE SITUATION

### SEES GOOD MILLING DEMAND

Points Out That This Immediate Section of Texas Raises Most of Available Supply

That Texas' principal supply of soft wheat is raised in Wichita and adjoining counties this year and that the farmers should hold it instead of dumping it on the market at the present low prices, is the advice of J. C. Hunt, local grain man. His communication follows:

"To the Farmers: It appears so plain to me that I am going to risk the suggestion that you hold your soft wheat and do not sell it at present prices. A strip extending from Wichita Falls south to Young county and to Abilene, south to Childress, north to Ferderick and east to the Rock Island road, contains most of the choice soft wheat in the State of Texas. All of Central, South and East Texas have more or less soft wheat, but it is damaged, is light in test and undesirable for milling.

"All of the Panhandle north of Childress raises hard wheat. "Only a small strip in Oklahoma raises soft wheat and then you would have to go to Missouri to find the best grade of soft wheat in any quantity. The Texas mills will demand a certain amount of our choice soft wheat, and I believe you will be doing yourself as well as the mills in Texas a favor by holding your soft wheat, and not let it move for export, especially at the present low market price. I would not mislead you for anything and while the market may go lower and I believe will so lower on hard wheat, it seems to me to be a wanton sacrifice to permit our choice soft wheat to move from the farmers at present prices, but you cannot expect to force it on the market except on a low level.

### DENIES BURLINGTON PLANS TO TAKE OVER T. & B. V.

President Darius Miller Contradicts Recently Published Reports As to Intentions

### FOUR TWILIGHT GAMES ARE SCHEDULED FOR THIS WEEK

Season To Close Friday—Children's Team Will Play Locals Here On July 4

Denial that the Burlington system of which the Fort Worth & Denver is a part, plans to acquire control of the Trinity & Brazos Valley was made recently by Darius Miller, president of the Burlington, while in Fort Worth. The Fort Worth Record says:

"Notwithstanding the seeming significance of the visit of Darius Miller, president of the Burlington to this vicinity and his inspection of the Trinity & Brazos Valley, immediately following the insolvency of that road, Mr. Miller stated positively Saturday that his company had no intention of taking over the Trinity & Brazos Valley at the present time.

"Mr. Miller, with several other Burlington and Colorado & Southern officials, spent Saturday afternoon in Fort Worth on the return trip from Houston. The party arrived in their special train about 1 o'clock and departed for Denver at 7 p. m. The same party passed through here Thursday on their way to Houston.

"The party included Darius Miller, Chicago, president of the Burlington; C. E. Perkins, Burlington, Iowa, director of the Burlington; H. E. Byrum, Chicago, vice president of the Burlington, and J. H. Bradbury, Denver, general auditor of the Colorado & Southern.

"J. W. Robins received of the Trinity & Brazos Valley, met the officials here and an informal conference was held in the office of D. B. Keeler, vice president of the Fort Worth & Denver. Mr. Miller stated that he did not find the Trinity & Brazos Valley property in the best of condition.

"Mr. Robins left for Dallas Saturday evening. He is keeping closely in touch with Judge Meek of the United States district court. Officials of the Trinity & Brazos Valley, are awaiting the sanction of the court for the abolition of all track arrangements. It is stated that both owners of the road, the Rock Island and the Fort Worth & Denver are in favor of this step and no less an authority than Darius Miller stated while in Houston that as soon as the court consented, that this would undoubtedly be done.

"The cancellation of joint track arrangements will mean a cut of more than one-third in mileage, and will confine the road to purely local business. It will also mean the dismissal of several hundred employees. Especially is the matter of local interest."
