London, June 29.—Every dispatch today from Sarajevo and Vienna brought additional evidence that the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and the Duchess of Hohenbeg was one of the most carefully planned crimes ever carried against royal personages.

Servian hatred of Austrians, always violent has been fomented recently by Belgrade newspapers and by agitators who have helped to inflame the minds of students and induce them to sacrifice their lives in the belief that they go down in history as patriots. Yesterday's crime seems likely to have an effect contrary to that desired by its authors.

Not Unaware of Danger

Austrain authorities are contemplating severe measures against the Serbs among the inhabitants of Austria and Berevia. These measures are likely to further embitter relations between the two countries and also between Austria and Russia, which protects all Serbs.

Arch Duke Ferdinand, it is said, was well aware of the danger he ran during his tour of Berevia, as inspector general of the Austrian army. This title was conferred on him last year. His chief task was to inspect the army which guarded the Servian frontier during the recent Balkan war and prevented encroachments by Servian troops.

The Servian minister at Vienna told the Arch Duke of the danger of his visit at Saragevo and implored him, if he insisted on going, at least to leave the duchess at home. When the duchess was informed of the danger of the journey she said her place was at her husband's side. When they arrived at Saragevo Saturday, hostility was shown by the Serbs there. Just before they passed through the city the authorities got rid of a great display of Servian flags which the people had hoisted instead of Austrian colors.

COTTON GAMBLING **BILL PASSES HOUSE**

IS SUBSTITUTE FOR MEASURE SURGEON GENERAL TAKE CHARGE A LY APPROVED.

PROHIBITIVE TAX IS PROPOSED TO TAKE MEASURES

Aimed Especially at Practices or New York and New Or.

Washington, June 29 -The Lever bill designed to eliminate gambling on cotton exchanges was passed by the House today by a vote of eighty four to twenty.

The Lever bill is a substitute for the Smith bill which passed the Sen-The Smith bill would prohibit use of mails for contracts that do not meet conditions of standard cotton grades and commercial differences

That feature is not in the Lever bill. The Senate bill would not tax conracts for future delivery. The House oill levies a tax of one cent a pound on all contracts for all future deliveries which do not meet commercial standards and grades as set out in the bill. This tax is intended to be prohibitory amounts to \$500 a contract. There was several provisions n dealing in cotton futures designed eliminate certain practices on the New York and New Orleans ex changes. Representative Lever said: 'I believe the practices of the New fork Cotton Exchange cost the south

rn producers annually \$100,000,000 The purpose of this bill is to eliminate the practices which constitute such an enormous burden. The 92,000 majority with which the people of West Virginia accepted the dry proposition was relatively the argest every given by any state. was approximately 'two to one for statewide suppression of the liquor usiness. It was a surprise even to he prohibition forces, who were inlebted largely to the determined tand which many of the large emloyes took in favor of their cause. he state has a population of 1,221, 19 by the census of 1910.

Plans For Enforcement. The mandate of the legislature, embodied in the Yost bill for the enorcement of the new law, beginning July 1st, departs in many respects from the methods hitherto along this line. The chief features center about the creation of a commissioner of prohibition, whose par ticular business it will be to see that by next Tuesday midnight some 1200 liquor selling places in the state of their stocks and have disposed thereafter all persons shall be punished by law if they keep liquor for sale.

The new office of commissioner of rohibition automatically falls to State Tax Commissioner Fred Blue of this city, who has been spending several months in preparation for strict enforcement of the new law.

To save the state the time and expense of taking violations before state courts, he has been urging nunicipal ordinances governing the violations, thus permitting the cases to be brought before the local courts.

"In other states," says Mr. Blue where prohibition has been adopted the forces that has had to be contended with has been the drug The Yost law will regualte Druggists may alcohol only to persons not addicted upon prescription of ined the person and in detail set forth in the prescription the persons for The governing podies of druggists have approved of this plan. For scientific or mechanical purposes alcohol will be sold only after affidavit as to its intended uses. and uniform records of all such sales will be kept, to be inspected periodically by those in charge of the enforcement of the law. "No druggist, however, can sell in any form whiskey, brandy, ale or any beverage of an intoxicating nature.

Clubs To Be Barred. The Yost law also undertakes to do away with the drinking clubs. which have been the sources of so much trouble in other states," "It provides that any person directly or indirectly associated in keeping such a club house or other place where liquor is kept for gift, arter or sale shall be punishable pon conviction by a fine of from \$100 to \$500 and by imprisonment from one to six months.

act is that records of interstate shipments of liquors may be required and therefore every railroad, express company and any kind of transporta tion company including steam boats and vessels carrying freight or express either from another state into ours, or from one part of our state to another part must obey the laws of this state respecting liquors. Every one of the transportation companies will be required to keep special records at the point of delivery showing the recept of liquors, the kind and quantity, to whom consign ed, when delivered and the consignee must sign in person for the shipment. The Webb-Kenyon act vests the right to enforce these provisions of the law and regulation thereunder against interstate carriers. None of these carriers will be permitted to receive consignments of liquor to any point where there is not a regularly employed agent to keep such records,

and have them open for inspection at all times. Construction of Law.

The man who is engaged in the steamboat business upon our waters, interstate or intrastate, must keep hese records and will not be per mitted to deliver any liquors or make sale of any liquors upon board this vessel while in our waters.

"This brings us to the question of ow far one may get liquors for another. In the first place μ one acts as the agent of the seller, he is guilty of selling. If one acts as agent of purchaser, he is guilty of selling, in other words if one has occasion to go to some point out of the state, and a friend hands him a dollar and requests that he purchase for him a quart of whiskey and he does it and delivers it to him, he is guilty making the sale and by the act is guilty of making it not where he purchased it but where he delivered it in the state. Again the represen-tatives of those who sell liquor can-not come into the state to solicit verbally, by letter or otherwise. There is only one of two ways that a citizen of this state may bring liquors into it; he may upon his own initia-tive order it, and have it sent to himself by common carrier for his per sonal use and not for any illegal purpose or he may go and get it. But in either event he can not bring it here for unlawful purposes. If he orders it shipped by common carrier a record is made, open to inspection: if he goes after it and brings it with him, intending to use for unlawful purposes, he may be arrested and the liquor seized so soon as he comes into the state.

C. HUNT SAYS THEY CAN NEAR LY CONTROL THE SITUA-

Points Out That This Immediate Sec Texas Raises Most of **Available Supply**

That Texas' principal supply soft wheat is raised in Wichita and adjoining counties this year and that the farmers should hold it instead of dumping it on the market at low prices, is the advice of C. Hunt, local grain man. communication follows:

"To the Farmers: It appears plain to me that I am going to risk the suggestion that you hold your soft wheat and do not sell it at pres

ent prices. "A strip extending from Wichita Falls south to Young county and to Abilene, west to Childress, north to Ferderick and east to the Rock Island road, 'contains most of the choice soft wheat in the State of Texas. All of Central, South and East Texas have more or less soft wheat but it is damaged, is light in test and undestarble for milling.

"All of the Panhandle north Childress raises hard wheat. "Only a small strip in Oklahoms aises soft wheat and then you would have to go to Missouri to find the best grade of soft wheat in any quantity. The Texas mills will demand ecertain amount of our choice soft wheat and I believe you will be do ing yourself as well as the mills in Texas a favor by holding your soft wheat, and not let it move for export especially at the present low market price. I would not mislead you for anything and while the market may go lower and I believe will go lower on hard wheat, it seems to me to be s wanton sacrifice to permit choice soft wheat to move from the farmers at preesnt prices, but you cannot expect to force it on the mark







of Considering Conse quences of One's Acts is Shown By Pastor

The certainty that one must har vest what he sows, whether it be good or bad, was the subject of an inter-esting sermon Sunday at the First M. E. Church by Rev. C. C. Smith. He took his text from Galations 6:7. "Whatever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." The pastor said in

part:
"The words of this text are popuarly ascribed to Jesus. As a matter of fact the record does not indicate that he never expressed just these words. The direct statement comes from Paul, but the teaching is older It is a proverbial statement and quot-ed in substance by Job. Solomon, David, Isaiah and others of the Old David, Isaish and others of the Old Testament writers. The principle is reaffirmed by the Christ on several occasions, for example in the parable of the sower and in such expressions as "By their fruits shall ye know them. Do men gather figs of thisties, etc." The principle is older than Paul, older than the historical Christ, it is as old as the being of God and is true not because it has God and is true not because it has been given form in the Holy Word but because it springs from the very na-ture of God. It is an eternal, un-

Nature's Laws Cited It is a commonly known and yet commonly ignored fact. Because little time usually intervenes be-tween sowing and reaping we are in-different as to the reaping. Delayed consequences concern us little because we are so engrossed with the immediate hour. The principle involved in the text therefore needs emphasis today. Because it is such commonplace statement and so fa-miliar we are not challenged by its tremendous truth and because the neglect is freighted with such consequences, it is necessary that it be emphasized with all possible vigor. It is not desirable that we gather our understanding of the principles in-volved from cheap theatricals, but that we look to sane and serious men, to the best in literature and history, to the best there is in life, to nature and to nature's God in order that we shall be able to understand this word of Scripture which has such importance for every day living. It is the law of cause and effect applied in the moral world. It is true as gravity, as certain as the moving of the planets, as invincible as death. We shall reap what we sow, not in quantity but in kind. We may not reap all that we sow or the exact seed that we sow but in kind for our sowing. How

"There are of necessity two kinds of sowing good and bad, and only these two kinds. The law works equally with either. It is a benefic ent as well as a malevolent law. Each individual is responsible both for his conscious and unconscious sowing. The wise man will take heed to his sowing and consciously seek to sow good seed only. Our influence should be carefully srited. The careful farmer grades his oats and wheat before seeding looking to the harvest. We should be more careful in casting abroad our influence. We must expect a harvest more or less immedi ate and certainly we must expect a final ingathering. We may need to die to grow, fifuratively as the grain of wheat. The parent, the teacher, the preacher, the public benefactor must give up self for others that his better self may be reproduced in
