AWAIT EFFECT OF ANGELES' DISMISSAL

MAY CAUSE MORE TROUBLE BE-TWEEN CARRANZA AND

DIFFERENCES BEING PATCHED GENERAL

Believed All Matters Will Be Settled -Carranza's Agents Watch Situation Closely

By Associated Press.
Washington, July 7.—Carranza's ac tion in dismissing General Felipe Angeles from the constitutionalist army. with its prospect of another break with Villa was the principal topic of discussion today among constitutionalist agents here. Charles A. Douglas, Carranza's counsel, declared openly that Angeles must be removed from the situation before peace can be perfected between Carranza and Villa.

According to one personal message from Villa, received today from Torreon, differences between himself and Carranza are being satisfactorily adjusted. No mention was made of Gen eral Angeles.

Pending the outcome of the Torreon conference, Carranza's agents continued their watchful waiting for his decision as to the proposed conference with Huerta's delegates. Juan F Urquidi, secretary of the constitution alist agency, who recently started for Mexico on a confidential mission returned today. His friends urged him not to join the Carranza forces because of his avowed support of

CARRANZA AND VILLA MAY MEET AT SALTILLO

CALIFORNIA TO VOTE ON DRASTIC EIGHT HOUR LAW

Sacramento, Cal., July 7.—One of the most drastie eight hour measures ever written will be submitted to voters at the November election and its passage is believed almost certain. The bill, drawn by Assemblyman Kingsley, the only Socialist member of the California legislature, affects all employers of labor and reads as follows:

"Any employer who shall require or permit or who shall suffer or permit any overseer, superintendent, foreman of other agent of such employer, to require or permit any person in his employ to work more than eight hours in one day or more than 48 hours in one week, except in case of extraordinary emergency, caused by fire, flood or damage to life or property shall be guilty of a misdemeano and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 or imprisoned in the county jail not less than ten nor more than ninety days or both so fine and imprison-

OPEN SEASON FOR DUCKS CHANGED IN NORTH TEXAS

Shooting Can Begin Two Weeks Earlier Than Heretofore. Regulations Amended

Through the efforts of North Texas hunters and federal game officers the open season for shooting ducks and weeks earlier than allowed in the original regulations first promulgated last year. Under the revised regulations the season will open in Texas on October 15th and will close Febru ary 1. The change was made to permit more shooting in northern part of the state. The waterfowl begin to migrate through this section before the first of October. By October 15th the date originally set for the open season most of the birds are gone. Under the new regulations the season is open in Oklahoma from September 15 to February 1, the dates being the same as for Kansas and Missouri. W. E. Skeen, deputy game warden here and John Robertson and other local sportsmen were active in the campaign that brought about the change in the open season.




