



COMPLETE COUNTY RETURNS DO NOT CHANGE RESULTS

Hawkins For Sheriff And Greenwood For Attorney Win By Small Pluralities

SUBMISSION IS DEFEATED BY 104 VOTES

Many New Faces In This County's Official Family As Result Of Saturday's Primary

A number of new faces will appear in the official family of Wichita County after the November elections, the completed returns from this county bearing out the indicated results as published in the Times Sunday morning. George Hawkins for sheriff and Bruce Greenwood for county attorney, widened their narrow leads and are winners. A new district judge, county judge, county clerk, sheriff, tax collector and constable result from Saturdays primary, many changes being made.

Although it was thought Sunday that this county had recorded a majority for submission, complete returns show that the proposition was defeated by 104 votes. Ferguson has a majority of 370 in the county and a plurality of 857. Hobby for lieutenant governor also received this county's substantial support and in general Wichita county was in line with the state at large.

In the district offices, it appears that Judge Curry has been defeated by Joe Akin of Graham or district judge; State Senator W. A. Johnson as probably beaten R. H. Cocke of Collingsworth county; Judge Buck is reported leading Judge Speer for the court of civil appeals by a safe vote; Congressman Stephens is easily re-elected for representative E. P. Haney has been elected, as indicated Saturday night, carrying every box in the two counties except three.

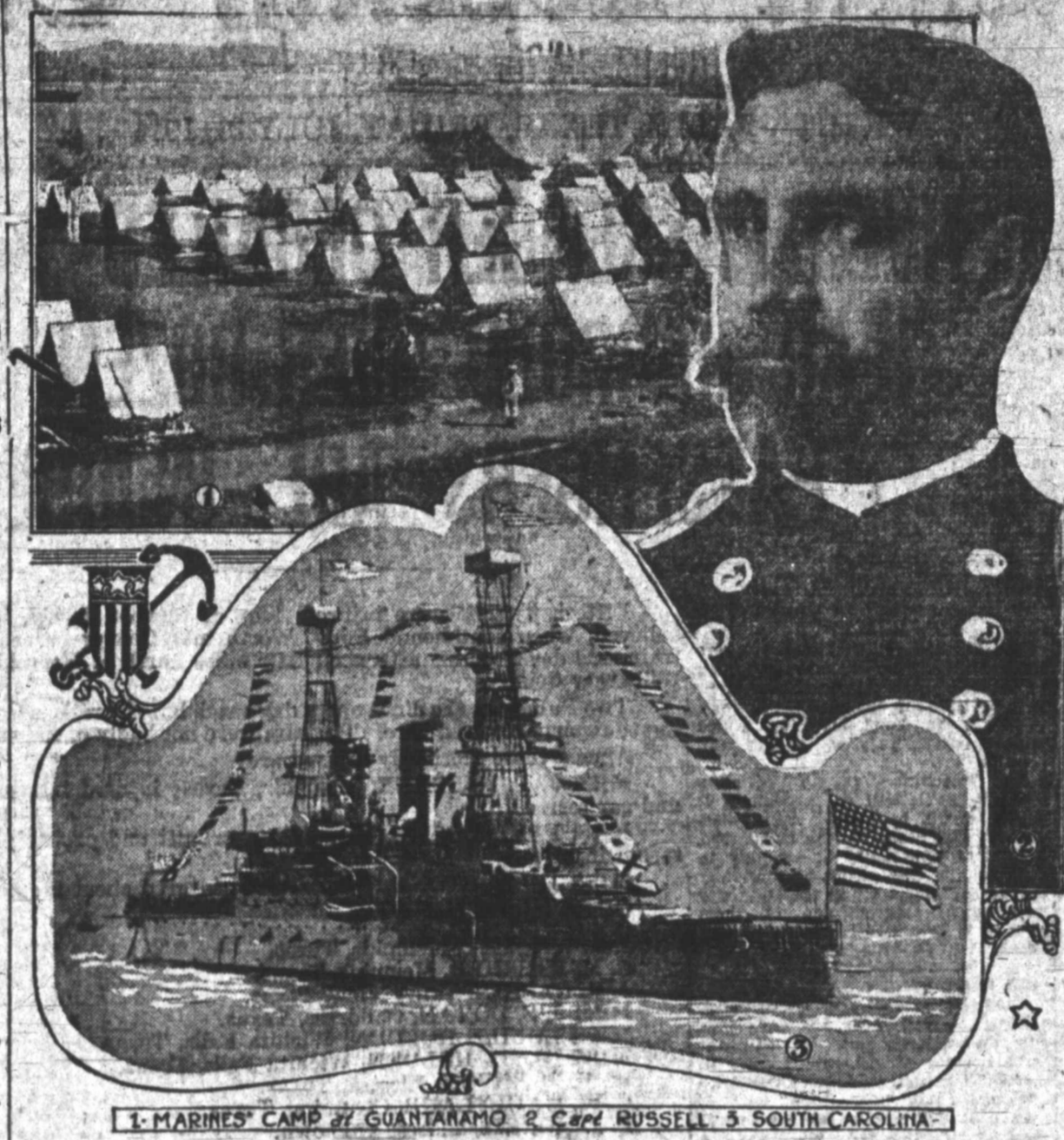
The race for sheriff was one of the most interesting in this county and Hawkins, with all returns in, has a plurality of only sixty-one votes over his nearest opponent, Pete Randolph. Ran Gwinn, who was fourth man, was only seventy-four votes behind Hawkins, and eleven votes covered Randolph, Burns and Gwinn.

Harvey Harris' final majority was 393 votes, which was somewhat above expectations.

Complete returns for county attorney give Bruce Greenwood the narrow margin of forty-four votes over Bernard Martin, who was second man, while J. M. Blankenship was only seven votes behind Martin, making it a neck-and-neck affair.

Final figures on the other races make no change in the standing of the various candidates.

MASS CONVENTIONS HELD IN PRECINCTS

CITY DELEGATES ARE MOSTLY FAVORABLE TO BALL AND SUBMISSION

WILSON'S WORK IS INDORSED

Resolutions Are Adopted Backing Up Acts of Administration at National Capital. From Sunday's Daily. Delegates selected in the precinct mass conventions here Saturday afternoon were not tested by their adherence to Ball or Ferguson or their advocacy of submission or anti-submission, but the test applied to all of them was whether they were supporters of President Wilson and of the national administration and could be depended upon to endorse the administration's record unreservedly. Incidentally however, most of the delegates selected are for Ball and for submission by a good majority. Three of the conventions here adopted resolutions giving the administration the unreserved endorsement. One precinct did not hold a mass convention and another did not adopt any resolution or instruct its delegates. County Convention Called. The delegates selected Saturday will meet next Saturday for the county convention when four delegates to the state convention at El Paso are to be selected. While reports from the precinct conventions over the county were not available early last night there is little doubt but that the Ball adherents will have a small majority in the county convention and that it will send the Wichita county delegation to El Paso instructed to endorse the national administration without reservation. In precinct No. 12 known as the car barn box P. A. Martin, R. E. Huff, J. M. Bland, W. H. Downing, P. H. Cox and G. H. Carpenter were elected as the delegates and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolution Adopted. Resolved, By the Democratic voters of precinct No. 12 of Wichita county in convention assembled: "First, That we heartily endorse the Democratic platform made by the delegates of the party at the last national convention at Baltimore. "Second, That we most heartily endorse the administration of President Woodrow Wilson as wise, patriotic and accurate exemplification of the principles of true Democracy put in action in the conduct of the affairs of the government. "Third, That we endorse the action of the Democratic American Congress in carrying out the wishes of the president and in co-operating with him in his worthy efforts to legislate for the general good of the people of the country. "Fourth, That we especially endorse the tariff bill passed by the present Congress and all of its provisions. The regional reserve bank bill and all other measures of progressive legislation recommended by President Wilson and passed by the Congress of the United States. "Fifth, That we instruct our delegates to the county convention and through them our delegates to the state convention at El Paso to vote for a full and complete endorsement of the Wilson administration and against any utterance of discord with

A. KAHN SUCCEEDS TO LONG ILLNESS

PROMINENT WICHITA FALLS MERCHANT DIES EARLY SATURDAY NIGHT

SUDDEN SINKING SPELL FATAL

Funeral Will Probably Be Held in Fort Worth—One of City's Foremost Citizens. From Sunday's Daily. Alex Kahn, who of the oldest and most substantial merchants of Wichita Falls, died last night at 8:30, after an illness lasting since last March. Death was due to an affection of the heart diagnosed as heart leakage, and from which the medical skill of the best specialists could give no relief. Mr. Kahn was first confined to his bed on March 28th, with what was thought at that time to be only an attack of indigestion. Later developments indicated trouble with the heart and he was taken to Dallas for treatment. He remained there until two weeks ago, everything possible being done to save his life. For several months his life hung in the balance, but since his return home he has seemed so much better that the family and friends were renewed with hope that he would recover. Even up to Saturday night he seemed to improve, and death, coming in a sudden sinking spell, was a great shock to his family. Father Died Friday Night. Mr. Kahn's father, Solomon Kahn, of Dallas, died Friday morning, but notice of his demise was withheld from the family here until last night on account of the illness of the son and the latter passed to the beyond without knowing that his father had preceded him. Mr. Kahn was born in Dallas fifty years ago. Coming here when a young man, he has made Wichita Falls his home for more than twenty-seven years, and was one of the important factors in the rebuilding of this city. For a short time after coming here he worked for A. Zandorf, but soon entered business for himself. Starting in a small way, he builded always for the future, and at his death leaves one of the most substantial mercantile businesses of the city and a comfortable fortune to the loved ones. Funeral Not Arranged. Surviving Mr. Kahn are the widow, three daughters, Misses Blance, Thelma and Anna Ruth, and one son, Darrell, and three brothers and six sisters. Up to a late hour last night no arrangements had been made for the funeral but the body will probably be taken to Fort Worth for interment. Probably no other citizen of Wichita county was better nor more faithfully known than Alex Kahn, and the news of his death as it passed from lip to lip last night bore tidings of genuine grief to a host of friends, who although they knew of his precarious condition, had always hoped that he would recover and again take his place in the business activities of the city. FATHER OF ALEX KAHN DIES IN DALLAS FRIDAY. News was received here late Friday of the death at Dallas of Solomon Kahn, father of Alex Kahn of this city. Mr. Kahn survived his father only about thirty years. The following is from the Dallas Journal of Friday: Solomon Kahn, for twenty-five years a well known citizen of Dallas, died at his home at 618 Broadway street at 7:35 o'clock this morning. Funeral arrangements will await intelligence from relatives in other cities, but the services will be held either Sunday or Monday. Mr. Kahn was born in Bismarck, N. D., in 1885, and came to America in 1888, settling in Georgia, afterward moving to Montgomery, Ala. He enlisted in the Third Alabama Regiment and served through the war, participating in important battles in Virginia. He was taken prisoner and put in the federal prison at Washington. He married in that city in 1885 and removed to Kentucky, and then to Tennessee. From the latter place he went to Fort Worth and after living there a few years came to Dallas. FERGUSON'S LEAD IS 36,000; SUBMISSION BEHIND BY 9,000

Latest Figures From Over State Bear Out Saturday Night's Indications

McLEMORE AND CYCLONE DAVIS ARE ELECTED

Will Probably Be Congressmen At Large—Hobby Still Leads For Lieutenant Governor

The lead of J. E. Ferguson of Temple for the democratic nomination for governor continues to increase as additional returns come in, and figures compiled at noon today show him ahead by more than 36,000 votes, which leaves little doubt as to his victory. It is predicted that final figures will give him a plurality in excess of 50,000. The defeat of the submission proposition is also indicated by the latest figures, it now being more than 9,000 votes behind with the greater part of the vote accounted for. Late figures have increased the likelihood of the election of William P. Hobby of Beaumont as lieutenant governor, over B. B. Sturgeon of Paris. In the other state races the results seem to be determined as indicated above. In the race for congressman-at-large, it appears certain that Jeff McLemore of Houston, newspaper man, political writer and for many years a picturesque figure in Texas politics, will be one of the nominees and at this writing it seems very likely that J. H. (Cyclone) Davis of Sulphur Springs, ex-Populist and an even more picturesque figure than McLemore, will be the other. W. P. Lane is not far behind, however, and may be one of the nominees.

WARBURG WILL ANNOUNCE HIS DECISION TOMORROW

VILLA IS MOVING ENTIRE ARMY TOWARD MEXICO CITY

# AUSTRIA DECLARES WAR ON SERBIA TODAY

## REFUSAL TO ACCEDE TO DEMANDS BRINGS FIGHT

### Declaration Follows England's Futile Attempt To Arrange For A Mediation Congress

### NATIONS WILL TRY TO MAKE WAR LOCAL AFFAIR

### Efforts To Prevent Germany And Russia Becoming Involved—War-like Preparations Are Made

Vienna, Austria, July 28.—Formal declaration of war on Serbia was made by the Austrian government today.

Reports have been received here of the active movement of both Serbian and Montenegrin troops, which are in close touch at Triboj near the frontier of Bosnia.

The actual cause of Austria-Hungary's decision to enter into hostile conflict with Serbia was the reply sent by the Balkan state to the note from Vienna demanding that Serbia take steps to put a stop to the Pan-Serbian propaganda on Austrian territory and also punish those Servians indirectly concerned in the assassination in Bosnia on June 28 of Arch Duke Francis Ferdinand, heir apparent to the Austro-Hungarian throne.

The text of the declaration of war follows: "The royal government of Serbia not having replied in a satisfactory manner to the note remitted to it by the Austro-Hungarian minister in Belgrade July 23, 1914, the imperial and royal government finds itself compelled to proceed itself to safeguard its rights and interests and to have recourse for this purpose to force of arms. Austria-Hungary considers itself from this moment in a state of war with Serbia."

## Powers Decline To Aid England In Her Efforts To Prevent War

London, July 28.—Announcement of the declaration of war by Austria-Hungary, on Serbia, came today almost immediately after Germany and Austria had notified Sir Edward Grey, British foreign minister, of their refusal to join in a mediation conference.

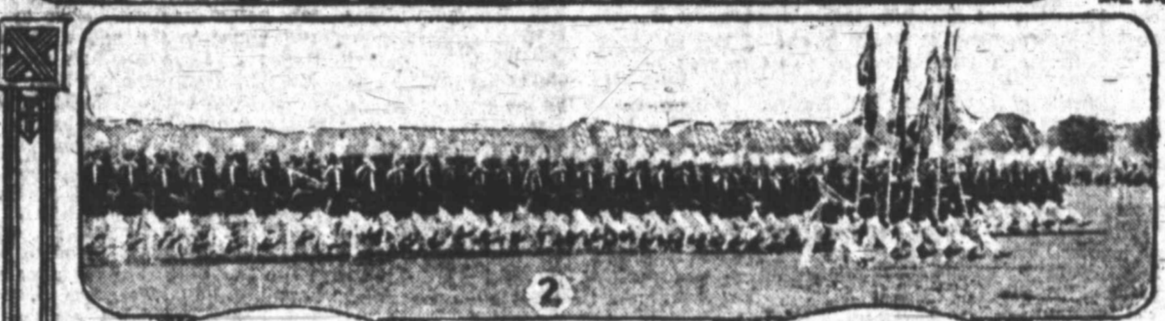
It was presumed here that the efforts of European nations now will be directed toward localizing the area of hostilities.

The refusal by Germany and Austria-Hungary to participate in a mediation conference on the Austro-Serbian conflict, reports of the rapid movement of Austro-Hungarian troops and the persistent downward trend of European stock markets, were the outstanding developments of the European situation today, when news of Austria's declaration came.

Preparations for war proceeded on all sides. Even England's battleship squadron has been mobilized in readiness for eventualities and the publication of official news as to the movements of British warships has ceased. The first and second battle ship squadrons have taken on their war stores and are ready to lift their anchors at a moment's notice. The destroyer-flotillas around the coast also have been prepared and well armed guards were placed today around all the magazines and oil depots.

Germany's definite decision against participation in the ambassadorial conference proposed by Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary in an effort to maintain peace, was regarded here as tantamount to a declaration of German's determination that Austria-Hungary shall have an entirely free hand in chastising Serbia, unless the Balkan kingdom accedes in full to the demands of the dual monarchy. ceived here, Germany's refusal was couched in terms of sympathy with Sir Edward Grey's object, but contended that the suggested conference would place Austria-Hungary in the position of appearing, like the Balkan state, before a European tribunal, to explain her action and therefore likely to increase, rather than decrease, the difficulties of the situation.

Apparently unauthentic reports current here assert that Russia has been given positive assurances that Austria-Hungary has no intention of annexing Serbian territory. If true, this might help the efforts to localize the war when it breaks out. Thus far there has been no official confirmation of the report of hostilities between Austria and Serbia, but a number of rumors have been published, including the seizure of Serbian ships carrying contraband, by an Austrian patrol on the Danube.

A newspaper dispatch from Semlin, on the Danube, says the Serbian parliament after a prolonged debate, was reported to have accepted all the demands made by Austria-Hungary.

Demoralization on the Paris and Berlin stock exchanges was reflected by an erratic movement in the market here.

## RUSSIA REPORTED ACTIVE IN TERRITORY OF POLAND

Said To Have Sent Troops There—Movement of Austrian Forces Under Way

Berlin, July 28.—An unconfirmed dispatch from Gumbinnen, Eastern Prussia to the Taegliche Rundschau says Russia has occupied Wirballen, Russian Poland, with a force of engineers, cavalry, artillery and two regiments of infantry. While the dispatch adds that a squad of German Uhlans has advanced to Eydtkuhnen on the Russian frontier.

Reports from the Austrian border state the transporting of the eighth and ninth Austrian army crop from Bohemia to the Serbian frontier began yesterday and there was no other traffic on the Bohemian railroad except that of troop trains. The two corps consist of thirty-two battalions of infantry with a large number of quick firing machine guns, six regiments of cavalry, two regiments of field artillery and two regiments of the army service corps.

GERMANY ASKS ROUMANIA WHAT HER INTENTIONS ARE  
Rome, July 28.—Authoritative advices received here today from Bucharest state that Germany has asked for positive assurances from Rumania of her intentions in connection with the Austro-Serbian situation.

BLUE SKY LAW PROVING AN EFFECTIVE MEASURE  
Austin, Texas, July 27.—Corporations chartered chiefly for promoting purposes are being materially restricted through the blue sky law passed by the last legislature, according to reports received here.

Secretary of State Wainwright has held up applications to sell stock for quite a number of these concerns because they would not meet the somewhat drastic requirements of this law. The department has made an individual examination into the assets of each firm applying to sell stock. Mr. Wainwright says he believes the law is proving beneficial to the state as a whole.

## CARRANZA STICKS TO SURRENDER DEMAND

WANTS CARBAJAL TO TURN OVER REINS TO HIM UNCONDITIONALLY

## WILL BE PRESENT IN PERSON

To Name No Commissioners—Is Willing To Guarantee Order in Mexico City

Tampico, July 27, via Laredo, July 28.—Upon receipt of official information here today that Provisional President Carbajal will send two delegates immediately to Saitillo to arrange the transfer of executive authority of Mexico to the constitutionalists, General Carranza announced he will leave tomorrow for Monterrey. He expected to reach Saitillo within two or three days.

It was announced Carranza would not select a commission, but would conduct his own negotiations with the Carbajal envoys, who were expected to reach Saitillo about the same time Carranza does.

It was understood here today that official assurances soon will be given through a high constitutionalist officer guaranteeing good order and preservation of property in Mexico City. The statement, it was said, also will declare Carranza will insist upon conditional surrender.

Reginaldo Cepeda, a personal friend of Carranza, arrived here today, but it was officially announced that his visit was purely an unofficial visit, as was that of several delegations which arrived from the capital today to meet Carranza.

## REPORT ABOUT FELIX DIAZ DISCREDITED AT WASHINGTON

Washington, July 28.—Jose Castellot, personal representative here of Provisional President Carbajal today emphatically denied published reports from Toronto that General Felix Diaz was expected General Huerta there to plan a counter-revolution. "The report," said Mr. Castellot, "is attributed to Elguero, one of the delegates to the Niagara mediation conference, and the best proof of its falsity is in the fact that Elguero is now in Europe and has not been in Toronto for several weeks."

The report was very disturbing to Washington diplomats. Mr. Castellot conferred with Secretary Bryan and declared very satisfactory progress toward a peaceful agreement with Carranza being made. The only disturbing factor from the viewpoint of administration officials was the decree by General Antonio Villarreal expelling foreign priests from the state of Nuevo Leon, of which he is military governor, and restricting the activities of the Catholic church.

## DEFEAT OF SUBMISSION NOW APPEARS CERTAIN

### Ferguson And Hobby Increase Their Gains On Later Returns; Buck Defeats Speer

Additional election figures today cause no changes in results as previously announced, but tend to increase the majorities already shown for Ferguson for governor, Hobby for lieutenant governor, and against submission. The race between Davis and Halbert for commissioner of agriculture, which was a very close contest, now appears definitely decided in favor of the former.

A majority of 40,000 for Ferguson and of probably 18,000 against submission, are indicated at this time. The final majorities may be somewhat larger than these figures.

Judge R. H. Buck of Fort Worth has almost certainly defeated Judge Ocie Speer for re-election for associate judge of the court of civil appeals at Fort Worth.

The phalanx of Texas congressmen was broken, in spite of earlier announcements to the contrary. Horace W. Vaughn of Arkansas was beaten for re-election by Eugene Black of Clarksville in the first district.

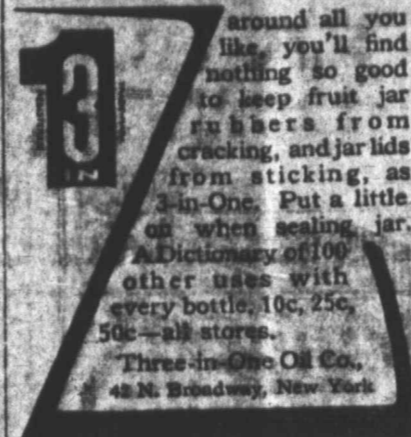

### TEXAS SCHOOL POPULATION REACHES TOTAL OF 1,280,597

Waco, Texas, July 31.—The school population of Texas for the year ending June, 1912 was 1,280,597, according to a report which has just been issued by the United States bureau of education, department of interior. This includes children between the ages of 5 and 18 years. The number of children enrolled during the year was 830,642 and the average daily attendance was 560,172. The average duration of school for the season was 122 days. It requires the services of 22,943 teachers to instruct Texas school children, and according to the report, 15,586 of them are females and 6,455 are males. The salaries of teachers for the season aggregate \$9,815,000 and the total expenditure is \$14,498,000 for the term.

Six of the nine Industrial Workers of the World who attempted to hold a meeting in Tarrytown, N. Y., in May to charge, in inflammatory language, John D. Rockefeller, Jr. with responsibility for the bloodshed in the Colorado mines were convicted Tuesday and sentenced to a uniform sentence of two months in the New York penitentiary. Intelligent people who recognize that labor has just cause for grievance in respect to both wages and conditions would not waste sympathy on the class of agitators referred to above. Their methods are anarchistic, and the American people do not have to settle their problems by any form of agitations that smacks of anarchy.—Houston Post.

Mr. Ferguson's call to the Democracy of Texas for a hearty endorsement of the Wilson administration in the county conventions on Saturday is a wise move. He shows a desire to be fair and an unquestioned interest in the welfare of the party nationally. We are glad to find that the next Governor of Texas feels as he does about the leader of our great party.—Abilene Reporter.

Owing to the war clouds and declaration of war in Europe, there has been some apprehension on the part of the people of the United States that this country would be drained of its gold supply, but on this point Secretary of the Treasury assures the people of the United States there is no occasion to be alarmed on that point. According to his statement there is over \$1,250,000,000 in gold coin and bullion stored in the Treasury vaults, and about \$600,000,000 coin in circulation. Therefore the tremendous shipments of gold to Europe is causing no uneasiness whatever to the administration. There never was a time when this country was in better shape to ship to Europe a few million dollars of its gold. It is also pointed out that while Europe just now is drawing tolerably much on our gold supply, it will come back to this country shortly in payment for the vast quantities of food supplies this country is being called upon to furnish Europe.

The result of Saturday's primary has added to Gov. Colquitt's cap a few feathers, and two years hence he, no doubt, will be a candidate for the United States Senate. Congressman Henry of the Waco district will also be a candidate, as will Dr. Brooks of Baylor University, and probably ex-Governor Tom Campbell. The law governing senatorial primary elections in Texas is different from that of the regular or state primary election for the selection of state officers. In the senatorial primary the nominee is required to secure a majority of the votes cast. If there are more than two candidates, it is not likely that anyone of them will secure a majority at the first primary election, and in that event, all but the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes, drop out, and another primary election will be held one month later with but the two leading candidates in the contest. Of course, if Senator Culbertson decides that he wants the office again, that may make a difference, and it will not make much difference how many candidates there may be, the great confidence the people of Texas have in him will be sufficient, it is now thought, to give him a clear majority over all.

time and as nearly all wheat this year graded low (from 64 to 66), they only received on a basis of 75c for No. 3 from 65c to 75c per bushel. Why should flour advance as it has—on a two cent wheat advance? It is a fact that flour has all the time been too high for the price of wheat. Who sets the price of wheat here, and why does it not advance along with the northern markets? Did you ever figure what it costs to raise wheat per bushel? If you count the use of rent of land, plowing, harrowing, seed, sowing, harvesting, threshing and hauling you will find on average of fifteen bushels per acre, that it costs about 70c per bushel to raise it.

Perhaps the few farmers who held their wheat will in the future get a better price for it—that is, if we can get it to jump two cents at a time—as the northern markets jumps ten cents at a time.

I would like if some one who knows would answer these few questions, and let us know what regulates the price of wheat and flour, and why it is so much slower in advancing here than in other markets.

OLD SETTLER

Reports from precinct conventions held over the state last Saturday afternoon indicate that the Wilson administration will receive an unqualified endorsement from the Texas State Democratic convention to be

held in El Paso. At the same time Senator Bailey has announced that he will attend with the avowed purpose of opposing certain of the Wilson policies, principally the tariff law, as well as the plan in Mr. Ferguson's platform. Thus we have all the elements of a fight of no small proportions at El Paso. There can be no doubt that Democrats will stand by the instructions of the precinct conventions and vote for an endorsement of the Wilson administration, and it is equally certain that Ferguson's friends will not be idle while the former senator attempts to laugh his land plank out of court. Yet Bailey has an influence not to be passed over lightly. If Mr. Bailey is defeated in his efforts to win the support of the Wilson forces, then last Saturday Mr. Hall, with the Senator's o.k., failed to get by. The voters of Texas have endorsed Jim Ferguson, land plank and all, they have given Wilson their endorsement in the precinct conventions

and the Record sees nothing to be gained by trying to set aside these verdicts. Mr. Ferguson having won the nomination his friends are entitled to write the platform, and President Wilson, having put into effect much of the platform made for him by Democrats at Baltimore and having received the endorsement of Texas Democrats in precinct conventions assembled, it is to be hoped that Senator Bailey will fall in his so-called fight for a return of the Texas Democracy to first principles. Otherwise the sentiment of the people expressed at the ballot box and in convention would amount to nothing.—Vernon Record.

ROAD MAKING TESTS IN UNIVERSITY LABORATORY

Austin, Texas, July 31.—In order to supply the demand for information concerning materials for road-making a complete laboratory will soon be installed by the bureau of economic geology and technology of the University. The machines for determining hardness, toughness, cementing value, etc., will be of the newest and best design and construction, modeled after those used by the government laboratory, Washington, by the New York State engineers, etc. An skilled engineer who has had much experience in such matters will be in charge of this laboratory which will form a part of the chemical and testing laboratory now maintained by the bureau. The new laboratory will not be for instruction, nor will there be any lectures on road building or maintenance. The work will be confined to the testing of all kinds of rock, brick and concrete used for making roads. No charges will be made for these tests, although it is required that the press or parcel post charges shall be prepaid by the sender. As soon as the laboratory is open for business a circular letter will be mailed out, giving further information. Address all communications to Wm. B.
