GERMANS ARE DRIVEN OUT OF "HAVE VICTORIOUSLY RESISTED ENTIRE GERMAN CORPS"

Fighting Lasts All Day and German Losses Are Declared To Be Heavy

Texas, Aug. 13.—In a Brussels, August 13.—The fighting in the heart of the city yesterday between the Belgian and afternoon at 4 o'clook German armies in the vicinity of Diest,

The battle centered around Haelen, in the Belgian province of Limbourg, extending to Diest in the north of the province of Brabant after passing around Zeelhem. At seven o'clock last evening all the country between the three towns mentioned had been cleared of German troops, except the dead and wounded, who were thickly strewn about the fire zone.

Upwards of 300 dead German sol diers were counted in a space of fifty yards square. A church, brewery and some houses in Haelen were set afire and two bridges over the Demer were destroyed by Belgian engineers.

Grat quantities of booty were col-lected on the battle field and has been stacked in front of the town hall of Diest. Many horses also were cap-tured. The strength of the German column was about 5000 men.

AUSTRIAN TOWN CAPTURED BY RUSSIAN FORCE TODAY

By Associated Press. St. Petersburg, Aug. 13.—A Russian force has taken the town of Dokal, Austrian Galicia, by assault inflicting heavy casualties on the Austrian garrison, according to a semi-official announcement here today. The Austrian garrison consisted of two infantry battalions a regiment of lancers and a regiment of Hussars. After dislodging them the Russian cavalry pursued the Austrians across the River Bug and blew up two bridges and a viaduct. DRIVEN OUT OF GERMANY

Direct Wireless Dispatch Says Two-Thous and Prisoners Were Taken By Germans At Muelhausen

Berlin, (By wireless direct from Nauen, Germany, to the Goldschmidt wireless company's station at Tuckerton, New Jersey,) August 13.-The German troops took 120 French officers and 1110 French soldiers prisoners in the fighting at Muelhausen, Alsace, and also captured four French cannon. Another thousand French officers and men were taken prisoners by the Germans in the battle near Longwy. German soil now is entirely cleared of French troops.

AUSTRO-FRENCH RELATIONS

Diplomatic Relations Are Broken Off At Midnight Great Britain Declares Shipping Is Now Safe

By Associated Press.

London, August 13.—The war nations of Europe became further regularized today with the formal declaration of war on Austria-Hungary by Great Britain. It was officially declared that a state of war had existed since midnight last

The strength of the British fleet in the Mediterranean is unknown, as no movement of warships has been made public since the first outbreak of hostilities. It is known, however, that France has the bulk of her fleet in the Mediterranean so that no apprehension exists here as to the safety of trade routes through that committee chairman.

Now that it seems certain that the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau are out of action, the official press bureau here, describing today the disposition of British cruisers in the Atlantic and elsewhere, expressly urges traders of all nations doing business with Great Britain to send their cargoes confidently and boldly to sea in British, or neutral waters, in all directions except the North Sea, where owing to mines and the probability of naval operations no guarantee can yet be given, although as announced yesterday, passenger services again are running.
