### FORTY CENT TAX RATE IS ADOPTED FOR THIS YEAR

No Increase Is Found Necessary—Levies For School Districts Are Also Fixed

The county commissioners late yesterday formally adopted the tax levy for the current year, fixing the rate at forty cents on the hundred dollars valuation, the same as last year, as indicated in yesterday's Times. The necessity of adopting a rate of a cent and a half for the \$25,000 hospital bonds recently voted made it necessary to slightly lower the rate for other interest and sinking funds. The ordinance provides the following rates:

For general purposes—18 1/4 cents.  
For general county roads and bridges—10 1/2 cents.  
Special road and bridge—7 1/2 cents.  
For interest and sinking fund \$16,000 road and bridge bonds—1/2 cent.  
For special road and bridge bonds—3/4 cent.  
For interest and sinking \$20,000 jail bonds—1 cent.  
For interest and sinking \$25,000 hospital bonds—1 1/2 cents.  
The usual poll tax and occupation taxes were levied.

The total assessed valuations in the county are approximately \$21,500,000. The levy on tax therefore would produce a revenue of \$86,000 not including occupation taxes nor school taxes.

### RAILROAD SCHEDULES SHOW EFFECT OF HEAVY RAINS

Nearly All Trains Behind Time—Some Damage Results—Frisco Bridge Goes Out

With tracks soft from the heavy rains Wednesday and the previous days of the week trains running into Wichita Falls are running cautiously and most of them are behind their schedules.

With the exception of a washout near Dundee that delayed the north-bound Wichita Valley train Wednesday afternoon about eight hours there were no washouts on any of the railroads entering here that stopped traffic. The track was repaired at this washout and the passenger train got into Wichita Falls last night at about 8 o'clock. Water ran over the Fort Worth & Denver's tracks north of Iowa Park but did not carry away the grade. The Wichita Falls & Southern protected its dump at the Little Wichita in Archer county by covering it with sacks of earth.

Water ran over the railroad grades in a number of places on all the roads without causing damage.

Other railroads did not escape so fortunately. North of Quanah the Frisco's railroad bridge over the Red River was washed out and trains on that branch of the Frisco are now being detoured from Quanah to Chillicothe by the Fort Worth & Denver and thence to Altus, Okla., over the Orient. Heavy rains were reported last night from Quanah to Fort Worth. The rain continued at Fort Worth throughout the night. Yesterday's rains extended northward to the Kansas border and to Abilene and beyond to the south.

### TWO CALVES ARE KILLED IN STORM SOUTH OF TOWN

Minor Cyclone Strikes Near Factory District and Some Damage Results

A small cyclone south of town near the factory district yesterday afternoon, at the Sanitary Dairy, owned by W. A. Skidmore. The twister took off a corner of Mr. Skidmore's dairy barn and tore up the grass in his pasture for a distance of several hundred feet. Two calves were struck by a piece of flying scantling from the wrecked barn and were instantly killed. Mr. Skidmore was about a hundred yards away from the strip where the storm struck and has revised his attitude toward cyclones generally and will build a storm house as soon as he can get time to do it.

The order of cancellation sets forth that through manifest errors and the action of the attorney general holding the special act providing for such elections unconstitutional, to attempt to issue the bonds would doubtless involve extensive litigation and probable defeat.

War Adds Still More To High Cost of Living—Sugar Now Eight Cents a Pound

The h. c. l. went up again this morning when sugar advanced to 85 per hundred pounds in the local market. The raisins are not making any particular effort to unload any great quantity even at that quotation. They say that the advance is due to the anxiety of the belligerent governments in Europe to secure an adequate supply with the result that their bidding has forced the Americans to pay more.

Coffee is up about two cents a pound since the war started and beans have also advanced together with cured meats.

They stopped over here last night and today proceeded on with their trip.

### TEXAS COTTONSEED MEN ARE TO MEET AT HOUSTON

D. P. Talley and others here have been advised of meetings of Texas cottonseed men at Houston and Dallas to discuss plans for financing the 1914 crop of cotton seed. The first meeting will be held at the Rice Hotel in Houston on August 17th, and the second at Dallas later at a date not yet set.

Representatives of the Texas Bankers' Association are expected to attend these meetings.

Cotton seed oil manufacturers say that the market price on cotton seed products has in the past been based upon the European demand. The war has destroyed European market and the oil mill owners claim that there exists no precedent for selling prices and nothing upon which to base a buying price. The meetings called are expected to evolve a means for the handling of the 1914 crop.

At the meeting in San Antonio,

Aug. 7, the oil mill men declared in favor of federal assistance and decided to ask the federal government to hurry the placing of the emergency currency in circulation to relieve the stringency caused by the hostilities in Europe. The mill owners believe that should the government send a portion of this money to the South that the cotton farmers will be able to hold their crops over until a market for cotton and cotton seed has become stable.

According to the oil mill men the total annual value of cotton seed products in Texas is fixed at about \$50,000,000. Of this amount \$36,000,000 is needed to buy and crush the seed during the three fall months.

Yesterday at El Paso Ex-Senator Bailey intimated that he might be a candidate for the senatorship, meaning of course, in the event that Senator Culberson would not again offer for re-election. Governor Colquitt, it is pretty well understood, will also be a candidate, regardless of whether Culberson offers again or not. But, should Culberson decide not to offer for re-election, and the Democrats of Texas are to choose between Bailey and Colquitt, the chances are that our little Governor will come out of the contest a very bad loser. There are thousands of Democrats in Texas who do not particularly admire Bailey, but who will give him their support in preference to Colquitt.

According to estimates made by military authorities, about 1,500,000 will be killed when the main forces of the present European war come together which it is thought now will be within the next month. When the time came and the signal was given, the machine rolled over Mr. Bailey and all other opposition. But Bailey, seemingly, anticipated what was going to happen to him and announced in advance that if he failed to get the convention on record against National prohibition and woman's suffrage, he would appeal direct to the State by becoming a candidate for the United

States senatorship. After the convention he reaffirmed that he would be in the race for the senatorship. The question now is: Can he come back? There will be other candidates, among them Governor Colquitt. And then, there is Cyclone Davis, who threatens that if Bailey attempts to come back he will meet him at the State line. The very thought of a joint debate between Ex-Senator Bailey and Cyclone Davis makes one wish the contest was closer at hand than it really is. But there will be other candidates for the senatorship other than Bailey, Colquitt and Davis.

A TRIBUTE TO MCKAY.

A great deal has been said by the press of the state and by the public regarding the remarkable victory of Mr. Ferguson; of the odds and the handicaps that were met and overcome, and credit has been given, in most cases, where credit was due—even the little old Daily Telegram coming in for a reasonable amount of praise. But the real facts are, and will ever remain, that, next to Mr. Ferguson himself, one John G. McKay is the man to whom we must remove our hats for the wonderful victory. The man who sat behind the desk up at headquarters and directed the movements in the field; who directed the forces of offense and defense; who weighed and judged the possible effect of every move, charge and counter charge before it was made; the man who was called upon to act quickly and definitely upon the many exigencies as they arose one after another in rapid succession, and do just the right thing at the right time, working constantly under high tension and with the realization that one false move, one force released in the wrong direction at the wrong time meant defeat—that is the man, we say, who, next to Ferguson himself, deserves credit for the victory won.

Being in constant touch with all the phases of the campaign, he must have realized many times during the contest that the fight was a hard one, but he never once lost his head—never once became confused or "got rattled." Cool-headed and determined, he counseled his lieutenants and imparted to them confidence even at times when the fight seemed hopeless to many. It was never given up. If at any stage of the fight he ever experienced a feeling of fear or of doubt he kept it well to himself. Even from the very beginning of the contest, before the eliminations got in their work, and when there were more than a dozen candidates in the field, John McKay adopted for his watchword, his battle cry and his shibboleth, "We will win." And he stuck to it all through the campaign. Therefore, he is now able to say, literally, truthfully and with the best of grace, "I told you so."—Temple Telegram.

And Mr. Lewis was re-elected president of the Farmers' Union without opposition. All of which indicates that the great majority of farmers who belong to the union are well pleased with the part he and Uncle Peter Radford played in the recent gubernatorial campaign.—Wichita Falls Times.
