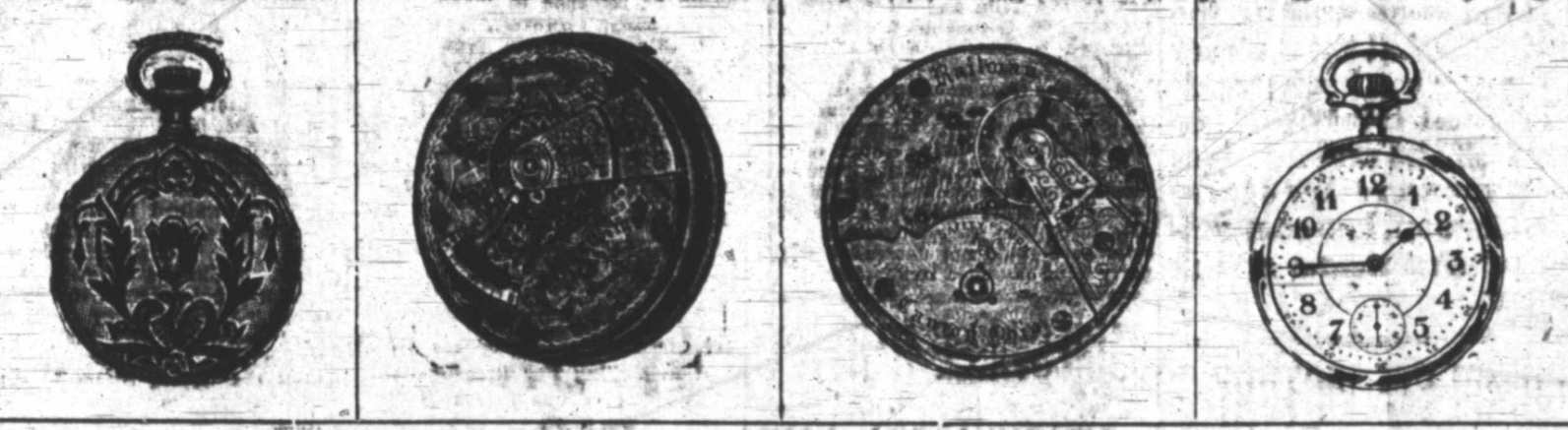

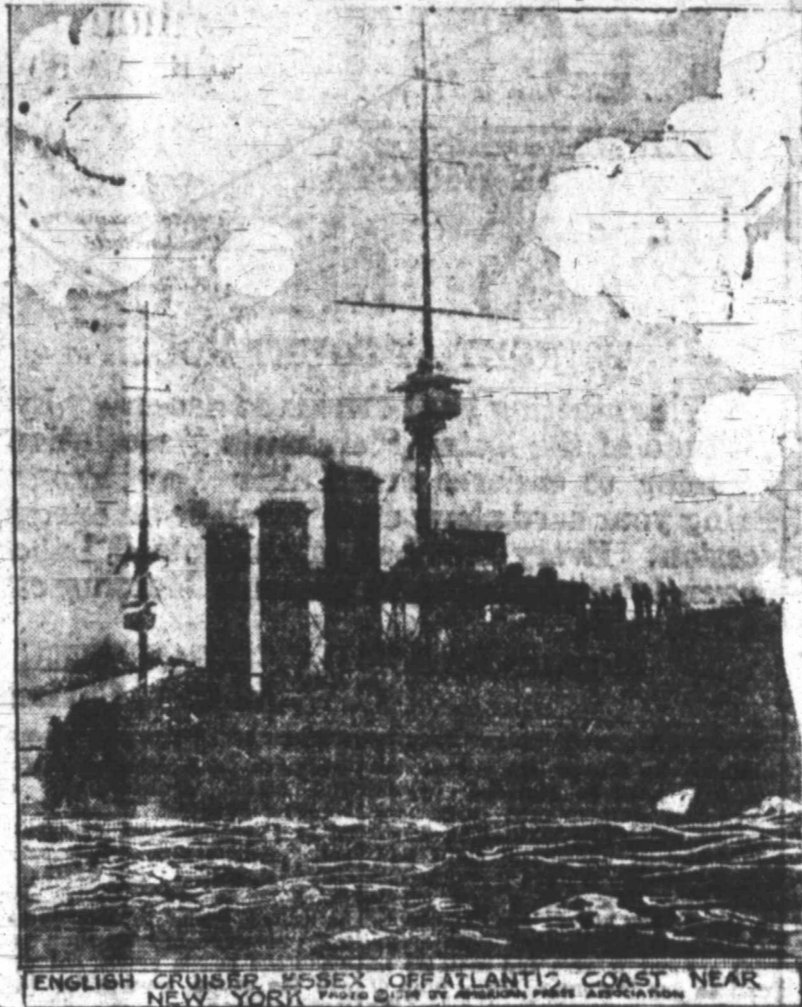

## COTTON WAREHOUSE MATTER DISCUSSED

### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE APPOINTS COMMITTEES TO TAKE ACTION

### REPRESENTATIVES TO BE SENT

### Local Banks Promise Aid—Premium to Be Raised For First Sale of Cotton Here

The first steps toward providing a plan for financing and warehousing the cotton crop of this section were taken by the Chamber of Commerce this morning when a committee of three was named to select a delegate from Wichita Falls to attend a meeting of the Southern Cotton Association at New Orleans on August 27th and 28th, and another committee was named to report on plans for building a warehouse in Wichita Falls.

The meeting at New Orleans is called by Harvey Jourdan and commercial bodies throughout the South in States have been asked to send representatives. Plans for financing of a market for account of the European war will be discussed. Messrs. J. G. Pennington and Hines were appointed a committee to select a representative from Wichita Falls to this meeting.

### Will Ask Co-operation.

Acting Secretary Thomas was instructed to send out letters to other commercial organizations in this section of the State asking them to send representatives to this conference.

While no definite plan was advanced for warehousing cotton here it was the consensus of opinion that some plan should be devised, and that immediately. The importance of providing warehouse facilities and financing for every bale of cotton that might be brought to Wichita Falls was stressed. The committee which was appointed on this matter comprising Messrs. Henderson, Hines and Ward, was instructed to confer with the Farmers' Union here

The gin men will be asked to tell the farmers who bring in the first cotton. While the premium will not be confined to cotton raised in Wichita county care will be taken to ascertain that first sale premiums have not been paid on it elsewhere.

Secretary Thomas called attention to the visit of the Gainesville excursionists here this afternoon and a committee was named to meet the train. An appropriation was also made to pay the fares of the Boy Scouts to the lake and return. Mention was made of the ladies' band accompanying the excursionists and Secretary Thomas, Linn Boyd, J. S. Bridwell and N. Henderson were appointed a special committee to look after their entertainment.

By Associated Press. London, Aug. 18.—A dispatch from Brussels to Reuter's agency today says that all the German troops recently fronting the Belgians have taken up strictly defensive entrenched positions, according to an official announcement by the Belgian war office.

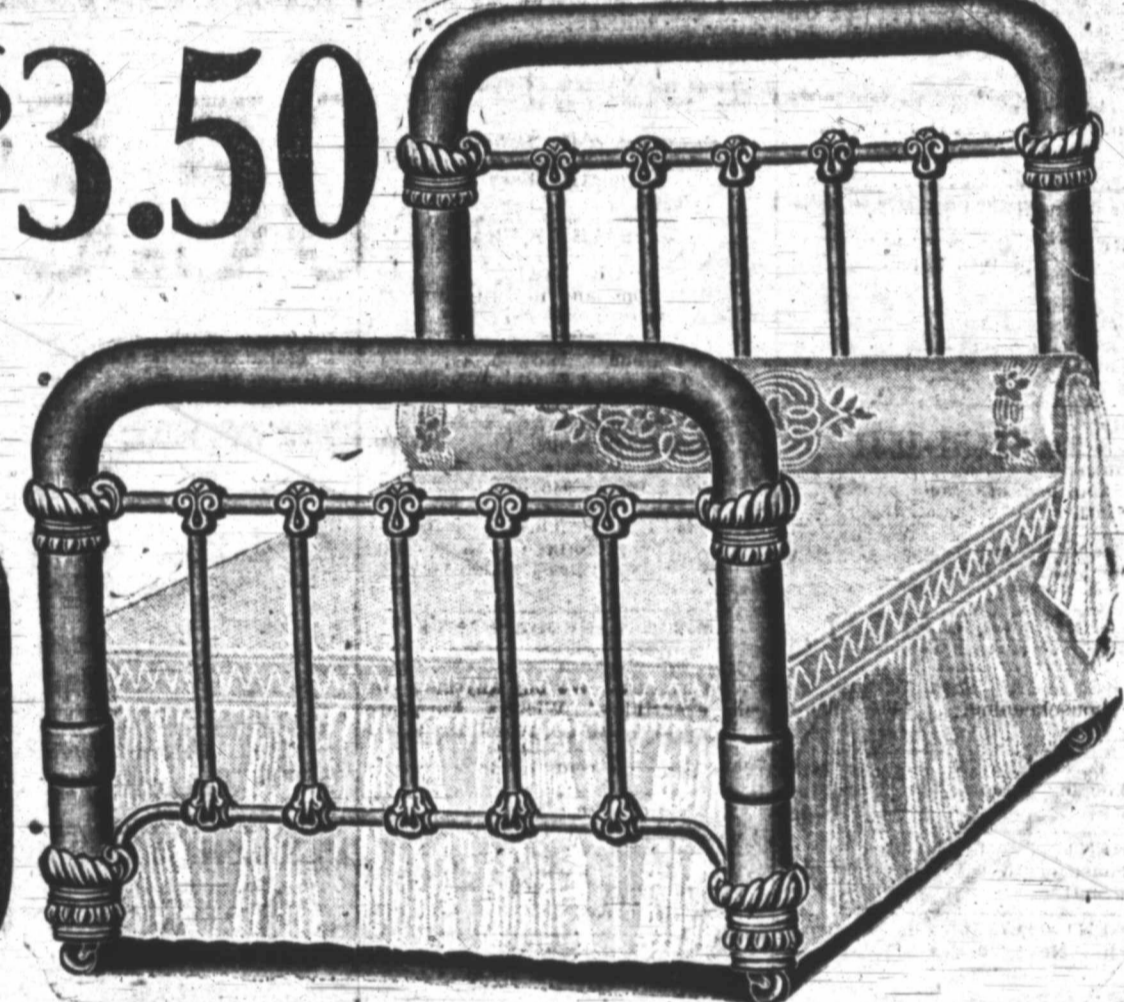

### ABOUT \$900,000 TO CREDIT OF BANK GUARANTY FUND

Four Banks Have Failed Since Law Became Effective and Depositors Were Paid

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Aug. 18.—Since the passage of the bank guaranty fund law under which the 874 state banks in Texas are operating, only four banks with deposits aggregating \$378,497, have been closed and liquidated, according to an announcement recently made by Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Collier, which today was regarded as showing the new law has proved successful.

The figures on the banks liquidated were given by Mr. Collier, who added that it became necessary to use \$133,347 from the guaranty fund in liquidating three of the banks and of this, \$77,842 had been repaid from

their assets. On the fourth bank it was necessary to use \$87,476 of the fund of which Mr. Collier says \$61,223 has been repaid, leaving approximately \$900,000 to the credit of the fund at present.

### ELECTION FOR NEW CHARTER BEING HELD IN WAXAHACHIE

By Associated Press. Waxahachie, Texas, Aug. 18.—An election for a new city charter for Waxahachie was held today. The proposed charter would provide for a city manager receiving not more than \$2400 per year; election of five aldermen at large instead of the present six who are chosen by wards; aldermen to act as board of directors and serve without compensation. City secretary and city attorney to be made appointive. Tax rate limit \$1.50. Rate for current expenses raised from 25 to 30 cents. Street road and bridge tax raised from 15 to 20 cents. Five cents provided for acquisition and maintenance parks and other public grounds. School tax raised from 45 to 50 cents.


