We are fortunate to have a medical facility like PCCH and all our fine medical personnel that serve the community. Your donation to Project Christmas Card will be sincerely appreciated.

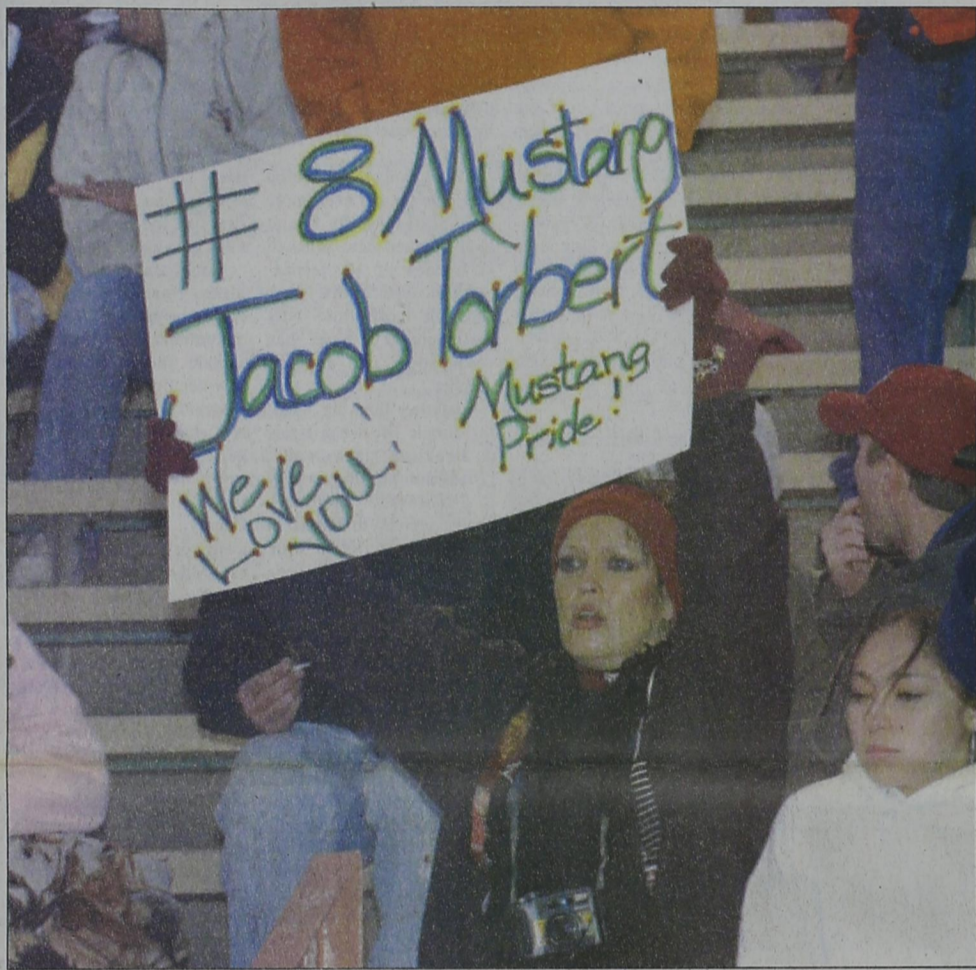
WT nursing students will give healthy heart seminar

DPS: slow down, buckle up, drive sober

All available DPS troopers will be patrolling Texas roadways during the Thanksgiving holiday. Troopers will be looking for drivers who are intoxicated, speeding or not properly secured—or who have passengers who are not properly secured.

"Texas travelers should know that we will be on the lookout for unsafe driving," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the DPS. "We want to make sure that everyone reaches their destination safely."

If last year's numbers are any indication, troopers will

be very busy. During the 2004 Thanksgiving holiday period (Tuesday through Monday), DPS troopers arrested 653 people for driving while intoxicated. Troopers also wrote more than 18,800 tickets for speeding; more than 3,500 tickets for seatbelt violations; and cited more than 4,600 drivers for operating a motor vehicle without insurance.

"We would rather that Texas drivers voluntarily comply with the law than have to write them tickets," Col. Davis said. "Besides, complying with these laws will make you—and your loved ones—safer when you travel."

Since roads are more likely to be crowded, DPS reminds drivers to leave themselves plenty of time to get where they're going. Avoid bad driving habits that lead to road rage, such as: not using turn signals, driving in the passing lane, tailgating, flashing lights or honking, using high beams in traffic, and not allowing adequate time for a given trip.

When confronted with aggressive drivers, the DPS recommends that you: put your pride in the back seat and move aside, do not speed up, block lanes, slam or tap on brakes, report extreme cases of reckless driving to the appropriate authorities, do not retaliate, gesture or make eye contact, and make sure everyone is buckled up.

School board holds final review of proposed student drug testing

The Friona ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday, November 21, 2005 at the Central Administration building. Members cast ballots for the Parmer County Appraisal District board of directors. The Friona High School choir attended the meeting and modeled their new concert attire for the board.

Sealed bids on the four acre site of the Black Community School were received and reviewed. The board awarded a contract to Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad for purchase of the property. The winning bid was \$15,000.

In other business, the board approved a budget amendment for a single classroom unit to be placed on the high school cam-

pus. The building will be used for a secondary art classroom and the FHS Choir will occupy the existing art classroom.

The board also conducted a final review of a proposed student activity drug testing program for grade 7-12 students involved in activities or utilizing school parking facilities. After legal review the proposal will be available for public comment and participation before final adoption.

A 2006 Chapter 41 WADA agreement with Lake Travis ISD for the sale of attendance credits was approved. Proceeds from the sale of attendance credits are targeted for student intervention programs and technology instruction.

I started thinking about the simple life when I saw a headline last week: "Medicare website mystery to seniors." Medicare wants seniors to enroll in the new prescription drug plan over the internet. They seem surprised most seniors ain't doing it. The article says that the government website produces some great recommendations about the drug plan but "it will take the average person 45 minutes to two hours to get to them."

They want seniors to enter data and do an analysis. One observer in the article said, "If you're 88-years-old and have cataracts and arthritis, you aren't going to do it."

It is a shame that a program designed to help, only creates more consternation and stress. If you are a Parmer County senior that takes many costly medications, go ask Mike what your best bet is. If he can't answer your concerns he knows people that can.

As always many well-meaning experts are on television telling us how to eat healthy and not pig out over Thanksgiving dinner and the leftovers. I'm telling you to ignore them. Eat as much as you want, then eat a little more. And don't forget the turkey or ham sandwich Friday with plenty of mayonnaise. I'll be joining you.

What am I thankful for? It's simple. As Minnie Pearl used to say, "Howdee! I'm just so proud to be here."

When Penny and Grainger Esch married three years ago in Salado, they had an idea to start a theater. Both had performing backgrounds.

"I was a Ringling Brothers and Bailey Circus clown for several years," says Grainger. "I traveled with the greatest show on earth. After doing a few years with them, I migrated out to California, worked from gig to gig. I worked at Universal Studios theme park, I was Stan Laurel out there, worked in movies and television, doing commercials."

Penny worked in movies, too. "Really, like Grainger, just gig to gig in whatever you could find out there because there's a million people out there trying to do the same thing you're doing."

They met while both were working on the movie, **HOW THE GRINCH STOLE CHRISTMAS** with Jim Carrey. "It was almost

until the production was over before we knew what each other looked like," says Penny. "We had prosthetic makeup and foam body pods and wigs."



They grew tired of the Hollywood scene and decided they wanted to realize their dream of owning a theater. They sold their home in California, went to Salado and turned an old granary into a theater they named **THE SILVER SPUR**. It has been open a year.

I had a great time visiting with these two. Their enthusiasm, energy and dedication are amazing. Grainger can leap flat-footed from the floor of the theater to the stage, a jump of 4 feet. They went through their entire range of sound effects for me.

"What we do is combine live vaudeville acts with classic cinema," says Grainger. "We do comedy routines, we have a sing-along at the end of every show, there's always live music. We show movies generally from the twenties and thirties,

a lot of them silent movies with live music accompaniment and live sound effects. We do a lot of slapstick comedy, good old fashioned family entertainment."

65 Years Ago

November 22, 1940

Friona—Since Saturday of last week, Friona can boast of having a real bowling alley, probably the first of the kind that has ever been in operation here. The recreation center is under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Dorsey, formerly of Bovina, and they state that their business will be conducted to entertain spectators and bowlers.

40 Years Ago

November 24, 1965

Friona—Nine members of the Friona Chieftains' District 3-AA championship team were named to the all-district team, which was announced this week by district coaches. Named to the first team of offense were Travis Graves, Gene Weatherly, Bob Sims, and Bing Bingham. Ray Braxton was picked to the first team defense along with Weatherly and Sims. Making the second team offense were Bill Perkins and Joe Mabry. On the second team defense were Bill Weatherly and Terry Fite.

35 Years Ago

November 26, 1955

Friona—Five members of the Friona Chieftain football team were named to the all-district teams. Making the first team defense were line-backer Bill Bailey and corner-back Wesley Clark. Safety Don Fortenberry and

lineman J.V. Finley were listed as honorable mention. On offense, James Weatherly made the first team as a guard. Bailey was listed as honorable mention at runningback and Finley made the offensive team at tackle.

30 Years Ago

November 26, 1975

Bovina—After an unusually mild fall season in this area of Texas, the first wintry blast of the season hit Bovina and Parmer County Tuesday night and Wednesday morning of last week.

Friona—Two large trucks escaped with minor damage after jack-knifing on Highway 60 east of Friona Monday. Gene Weatherly was driving a "Big A" machine belonging to Jerry Loflin when a hose busted and

caused some of the mixture to spill along about a tenth of a mile of the highway. The trucks hit the solution and slid sideways.

25 Years Ago

November 26, 1980

Bovina—Bovina Supermarket suffered extensive damage Sunday morning when a grain truck driven by Pedro Sanchez ran into the west side of the building.

15 Years Ago

November 24, 1990

Friona—Parmer County farmers planted a total of 52,421 acres of cotton in 1990, according to a spokesman for the Parmer County ASCS, but of that number a total of 3500 acres were reported as failed, leaving 48,895 harvestable acres.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Capital Syndicate sold bonds to the English through the Capital Freehold Land and Investment Company Limited in London. This was to finance the XIT ranching operations. Major directors of the company were the Earl of Aberdeen, Quintin Hogg, The Marquis of Tweeddale, governor of the Commercial Bank of Scotland, Sir Wm Q. Ewart, Sir Herbert Maxwell and others. The company was dissolved in 1909. Parmer County Deeds show some of this information.

Roundabout under construction in Clovis

Local residents going to Clovis will want to avoid the intersection of Llano Estacado and Norris streets for a while. Traffic at the intersection has increased as construction continues in the area and shoppers from the Lowe's, Wal-Mart area use Llano Estacado over to Norris to avoid Prince Street.

A traffic light has been needed at the intersection for a while but city officials have decided to construct a roundabout instead. That is the politically correct word for a traffic circle. The roundabout was chosen because it is half the construction cost of a conventional signal light. Also there is no maintenance cost for a roundabout while traffic signals cost about \$5,000 a year.

The Clovis News Journal reports that all traffic will be rerouted around the intersection during construction. The speed limit on the roundabout will be 15 mph and it will flow in a counter-clockwise direction. No date was given for completion of the project.

Memories of October 13, 1960

I will always remember that storm which caught us by surprise October 13, 1960. When the siren began screaming, I was at a club committee meeting at Flora Mae Ayers home.

I jumped in my car and took off going west on 5th Street, trying to get to my home, "the old two story" house east of McLellan's where my ten-year-old son was home alone.

I knew that my older son was at football practice on the "old" football field and I knew I could not do anything there. I thought the girls were all right. One at a Rainbow Girls meeting and the youngest child with the baby sitter, Pearl McLean. Another story there.

I felt like the car was floating as I drove; then I thought the end had come when I saw the Elk Drive-In disintegrate with pieces of wood flying in the air. (Remember, I was very close to it.)

Then the twister crossed Highway 60 and tore up the other Drive-In. I flew on home on 60, rushed into the house and told the ten year old that we were in a tornado warning. When I told him we should go to the basement, he kept on calmly lighting candles and told me, "This is not tornado season." That silenced me.

There are numerous versions of that October "twister". Ask anyone who was living in the area at the time. The boys who were on the football field scattered like leaves in the wind. Jay Claborn got the credit for alerting the coach that they should seek cover.

Two boys climbed over the tall fence, which was at the north end of the field at that time; some of the boys rushed to the basement of a home across the street from the school building. Others climbed in one of the dad's pickups and headed south. The storm covered such a large area that nobody knew what to do. I believe my ten-year-old son was in the safest place!

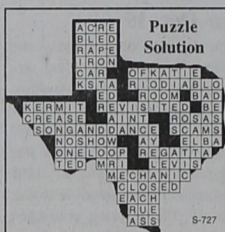

What is a Cataract?

As people get older, many changes occur in the human body. One of the most obvious is the development of a "clouding over" of the natural "lens" of the eye. The lens is located just behind the colored part of the eye, the iris.

A cataract will result when chemical activity in the lens slows down significantly due to aging. Ninety-five percent of individuals sixty-five and over will have some cataract development. However, aging is not the only cause of cataracts. Diabetes, eye trauma, or certain medications can cause a clouding of the lens. Usually people with a cataract will notice that their vision is hazy and distorted, and may become more sensitive to glare, although not always.

Fortunately, cataract surgery is now a simple and effective procedure, restoring vision more than ninety-five percent of the time. An artificial lens, called an "implant," is usually placed where the cataract was. If you suspect you have cataracts, the experts suggest you visit your eye doctor today.

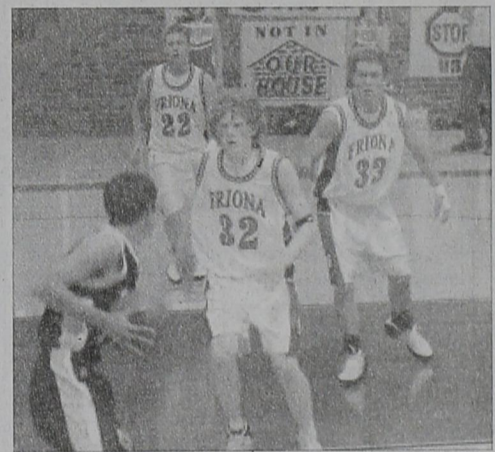



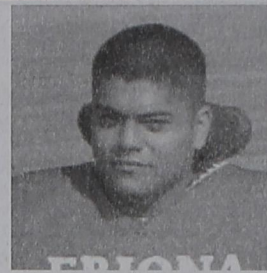
Named to 1st team all-district defense were Chance Lewellen, junior lineman; Octavio Moreno, junior defensive

I had no Nintendo, Xbox, PlayStation, MP3, or laptop computer. I did have an electronic football game with two complete teams of figures that I hand-painted the colors of the San Diego Chargers and Green Bay Packers. When I turned on the power, the offensive lineman would just stand there, the wide receivers would run in circles, and the running backs would head for the opposite end zone. It was like watching the Detroit Lions. I played for hours.

In today's world children and adults have access to virtual reality games. (This is not the

virtual reality I experienced in college when a girl told me that talking to me was almost like talking to a real person. Virtual reality is a simulation that is not the real thing but makes you feel like you are having fun. You can create dialogue on a computer screen and interact with other players online. You are not physically present, but you are carrying on intelligent conversation with others. It is just the opposite of faculty/board/office/church staff meetings (circle the one of your choice), in which you are physically present, but there is no intelligent conversation.

Scientists use virtual reality to help people with their fear of flying, fear of heights, and fear of the Detroit Lions. There is even an experiment with virtual church visitation, substituting a video or DVD for the actual person. I wonder, if Jesus were here today, would He still heal a blind man with mud, or would He tell him where to look on the Internet for a cure? Would He heal a leper by touch, or would He play a video of healing seminar?

THINK ABOUT THIS Growing old with God #2

There are several advantages of age. God put a premium on those who have age and experience. Job said, "Wisdom is with aged and understanding in length of days." (12:12)

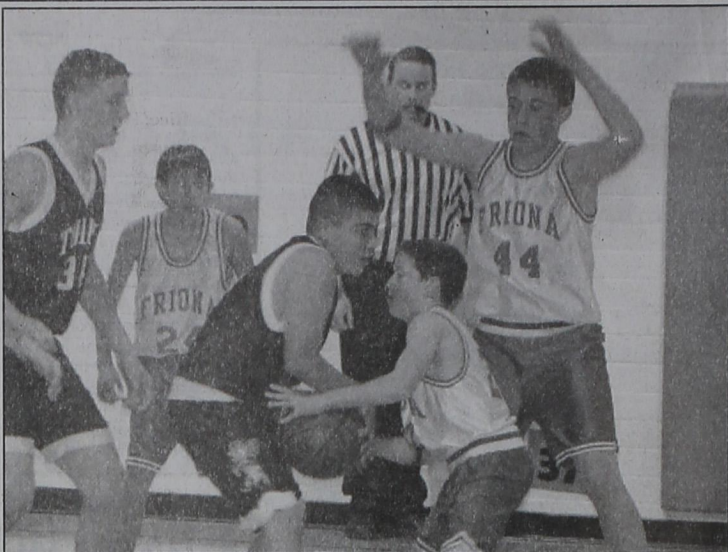

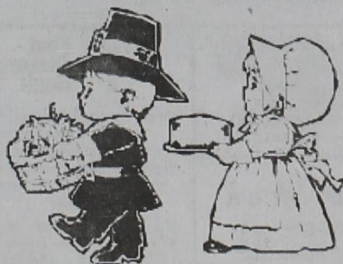

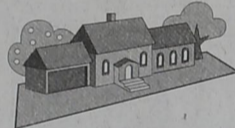

Quanah speed outruns the Mustangs

It was clear and cold at the 5 p.m. kickoff at Dick Bivins Stadium Friday. The Bovina Mustangs, in their first playoff game since 1996, met the Quanah Indians in the area playoff round of Class 1A Region I.

Throughout Bovina's 7-3 season the Mustangs have been praised for their solid defense while the offense has had a season of highs and lows. Friday night the defense stunted and stuffed and frustrated the Indians for most of the game. But the offense was stifled on a potential go-ahead touchdown drive.

Quanah led 13-8 when Frank Martinez recovered the 4th Quanah fumble of the night at Quanah's 32-yard line with about 8 minutes left in the game. Bovina drove to a 1st and 10 at the Quanah 19-yard line and things looked positive for a Bovina lead with time running out.

On the first play of the drive the Mustangs were stung with a four-yard loss. Then three consecutive incomplete passes stopped the drive and turned the ball over to the Indians. They drove the 77-yards in 9 plays to increase their game-winning lead to 19-8 and eliminate Bovina from the playoffs.

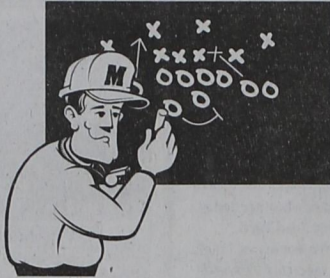
Bovina scored in the 2nd quarter on a 31-yard pass from Trent Quintana to Chris Heinzman. On the extra point try, holder Michael Ortiz bobbled the snap but alertly picked it up

and tossed a pass to a wide-open Corn Ortiz for a two-point conversion. It gave Bovina an 8-7 halftime lead.

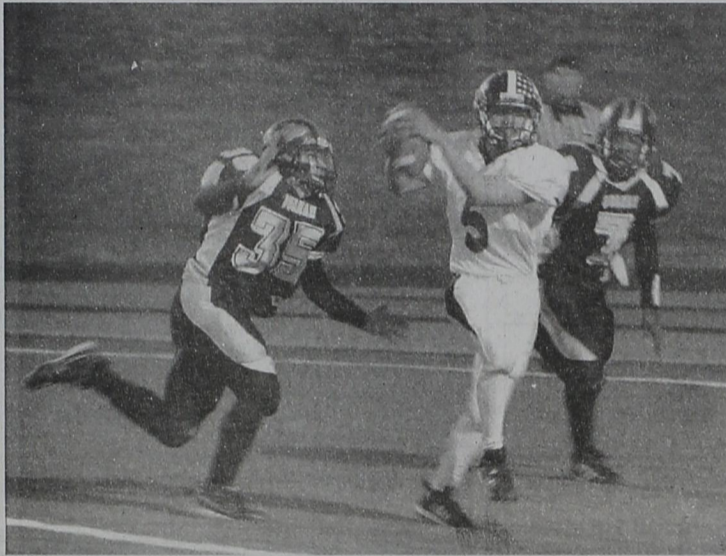
The Mustangs had several opportunities in the game as Quanah fumbled four times, all recovered by Bovina. One bad break was a long pass from Quintana to Ortiz that was ruled incomplete about the 15-yard line. The replay on the Dick Bivins Jumbotron TV screen showed the pass was complete and inbounds. Bovina fans were not happy about the call.

Quintana completed 8 of 20 passes for 86 yards and one touchdown. Chris Heinzman caught 2 passes for 40 yards, James Lara 3 for 30, and Michael Ortiz 2 for 16. The Indian defense held the Mustangs to 86 rushing yards. Jacob Torbert had 46 yards on 9 carries, Quintana 10 for 34 yards, Mauricio Garcia 9 carries and 8 yards, Frank Martinez 5 times for 8 yards.

Quanah running back Matthew Hill ran for 165 yards on 23 carries and quarterback Bubba Claudrick carried 16 times for 107 yards and had a 67-yard punt return for Quanah's first touchdown. Coach Kent Torbert acknowledged the speed: "We hadn't seen a team with a quarterback and running back like that this year. With their speed, for us it was take your choice. Our kids have played all year with a lot of confidence and we are really proud of them."

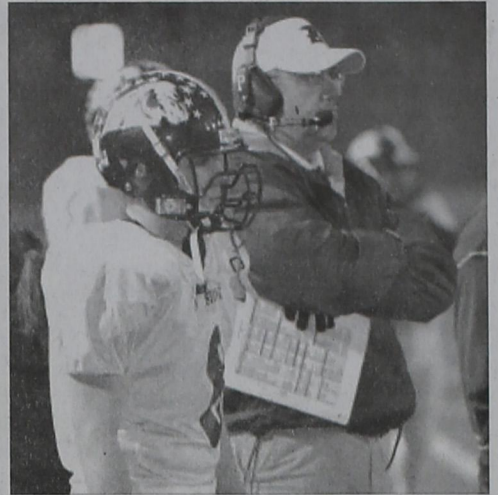

Talking about turkey safety

Whether you bake it, smoke it, fry it, or microwave it, turkey is a tradition we all enjoy gobbling! When we finally get that beautiful bird cooked thoroughly and get it to the table, that is where our food safety challenges can really start. So, in an effort to help you spend your holiday with your family instead of locked in the bathroom or at the hospital - here are some helpful tips for storing and using those turkey leftovers! Your very best friends for determining food safety are a good meat thermometer and fridge thermometer. It may cost you an extra dollar or two at a time when money is tight, but the rewards are great. Keep in mind that our youngest and oldest are at greatest risk for food borne illness. What only makes you uncomfortable, could send those more susceptible to the hospital! These are just a few tips to help you make all those leftovers just as good the second time! And remember the golden rule of food safety . . . *When in Doubt - Throw it Out!*

Tip 1: Return to fridge within 2 hours or less!

This can be a challenge at holidays because we have so much food to store. If space is an issue, just find those ice chests-you used all summer. With ice in the bottom, it becomes a perfect place to store your gobbling goodies short-term.

Tip 2: Small, flatter containers cool off faster!

Since they have invented the disposable storage container, it sure makes food safety easier and more affordable. These little containers also freeze well. And how did we survive without those zippered baggies? These also cool off quickly and are easily disposed of.

Tip 3: Eat up or freeze turkey & dressing within 3 to 4 days!

Gravy within 1 to 2 days! The eggs and meat products make some foods great hosts for bacterial growth. Don't fall victim to salmonella or other food borne illnesses.

Tip 4: Cook Whole turkeys to 180 degrees.

Reheat turkey to an internal temperature of 165 degrees. (Use that handy meat thermometer and test in a thick meaty part away from a bone!)

Tip 5: Frozen leftovers should be used within 6 months.

After about the second meal, we all have a little turkey burnout. So, here are a couple of tried and true recipes for using up those turkey leftovers! They are thrifty, take almost no time to make, and don't remind you of yesterday's Thanksgiving dinner!

Perky Turkey Chili

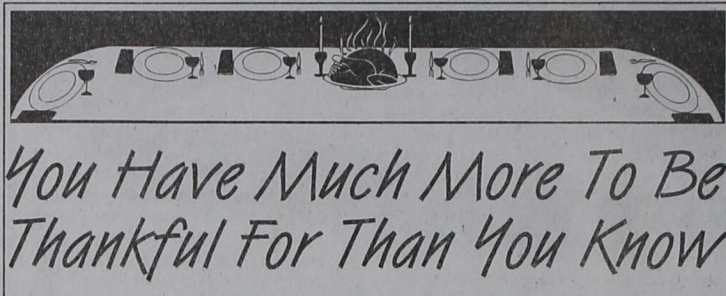
- 3 Cups Chopped Cooked Turkey

- 3 Chopped Green Onions
- 2 Cans of Great Northern Beans (rinsed)
- 1 Small can of Salsa Verde
- Comino, White Pepper, Chili Powder and Salt to taste. Put all the ingredients in a pot on the stove and bring just to a light boil, turn down to simmer for 15 minutes. Serve with warm tortillas and a salad. (Serves about 4)

Turkey Waldorf Salad

- Dressing:
 - 1/3 Cup Reduced Fat Mayonnaise
 - 1/3 Cup Light Sour Cream
 - 1 tsp. Lemon Juice
 - 1/4 tsp. salt to taste
 - Salad:
 - 2 1/2 Cups Turkey White Meat (chopped)
 - 3/4 Cup toasted pecan or walnut pieces
 - 1 Large Rib of Celery, thinly sliced
 - 2 Medium tart Apples, chopped small
- Stir Dressing ingredients together in a large bowl. Add Salad ingredients to the dressing. Stir gently until all ingredients have a light coating. Season with white pepper to taste. For a different splash of flavor, add some orange juice. It makes it sweeter without the empty calories of sugar. Put in a bright colored bowl and place crackers on a tray below. (Serves about 4)

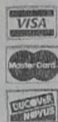



Lexie's first turkey

On Thanksgiving Day 2003 my granddaughters Lexie and Laura were still sleeping after 'spending the night' with us, when I awoke at 6 AM to begin preparing our turkey for baking.

I was really hoping that my oldest granddaughter and first grandchild would wake up also so that I could introduce her to the holiday baking tradition in our family; but I did not really want to have to wake her. I wanted to show her just as my mother, Marie, had shown me and her mother, Pearl, before had shown her.

My grandparents, David and Pearl Wright, had married on November 25, 1925 and had always celebrated their anniversary at Thanksgiving with a huge turkey dinner and family get-together. They

had nine children and many grandchildren so their family gatherings were always very big!

As I went ahead with the preparations, suddenly a sleepy little figure appeared beside me. It was Lexie! At seven, she was curious about just what I was doing.

"I'm fixing our turkey and you can help me!" I said, "Miss Lexie meet Mr. Turkey—Mr. Turkey meet Miss Lexie."

She giggled and said, "Hello, Mr. Turkey!"

As we began to prepare the raw bird, which had been thawing in the refrigerator for three days, she exclaimed, "That's gross!" Perhaps that was a typical reaction for a 21st century youngster's first introduction to raw poultry, but she soon began to take a keen interest

in the project. After we salted the inside of the turkey, we stuffed the cavity with celery stalks to add moisture and flavor. Then, we rubbed the outside with butter so that the turkey would brown evenly.

We put the heavy bird inside a plastic cooking bag (a very modern touch) and then into a pan. Finally, into the oven he went.

Next, we turned our attention to the combread dressing, another must-have for our holiday meal. Lexie diligently tore the slices of bread into small pieces in a large bowl. She then also crumbled the recipe of combread I had baked the night before into the bowl while I chopped onion and celery to add to the mix. Then I added the fragrant sage and other spices to tantalize us with the wonderful smell.

Mm-mm!

It took a little explaining about the neck, gizzard, heart and liver—the giblets, and how they would be used for broth and gravy (also declared gross—maybe this wasn't the year for this after all...).

Soon the dressing was done also and placed in the refrigerator until baking later in the morning closer to mealtime.

Just as we were finishing our project and cleaning up the kitchen (we were still the only two people in the house awake), we looked outside.

While we had been working, snow had begun to fall. What a delightful surprise! The phone rang. It was my son, Cody, Lexie's dad calling.

Guess what! He had been help-

ing to prepare their turkey—and it was his first time also! After wishing us a Happy Thanksgiving Day, he said goodbye and hung up.

Of course, Lexie was just busting to tell the others who were all still asleep about the snow.

"Go tell Grandpa—he won't mind if you wake him up," I suggested.

Grandpa was tending baby Riley, our youngest grandson so that his Mom and Dad could catch a few extra winks.

Sure enough, Grandpa and Riley were soon as awake and as excited as Lexie was. It wasn't long before Lexie had also awakened her sister Laura and her cousin Morgan.

"My Mama always lets me play in the snow," five-year-old

Morgan boldly declared, as he marched into the kitchen.

"Well, you'd better go ask her first," I said.

"Her said I could if I put my clothes and my shoes and my coat on," he relayed just moments later, after having aroused his sleeping parents with news of the snow.

Needless to say, they were not quite as excited as he was.

And so it was that all three of our grandchildren ventured out to play in that rare Thanksgiving Day snow which had accumulated enough to make snowballs. We kept one of those snowballs in the freezer for months as a reminder of this special day. Families sharing moments that will last a lifetime are the BEST traditions of all!

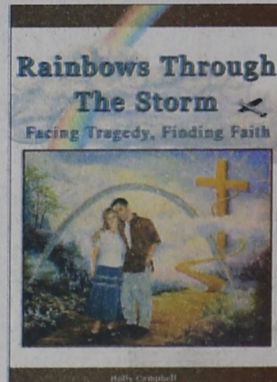
