Do the Americans find them domineering, unruly, warlike, etc., because of their superior numbers? 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

IMMORTAL FAME IN A

Germans Take Town From French Who Recapture 1 After Most Desperate Fighting

-A correspondent of the Times sends the following under a Paris date:
"At Mone the British troops have

themselves at home. Everywhere in the town confidence is dom inant. When, with heavy firing audi ble in the distance, British soldier can sit quietly on the banks of the canal fishing with rifles as fishing rods, the spectacle inspires even though from all directions the presence of the readed German cavatry is ind ated." The correspondent proceeded to where he found the populace in great alarm. Bix German cavalrymen suddenly appeared on bicycles and asked whether any French soldiers were there. They were told there were none, but later in the day French troops entered the place and killed the six Germans. The next morning a large force of Germans attacked the town but were repulsed. Proceeding to Valenciennes the correspondent found that troop trains filled with British soldiers wer constantly arriving. The respondent continuest

"Near Charlerio is heard stories of the bravery of the French soldiers. The Germans were bombarding the The French troops made what amounted to a medieval sortic but finding the enemy in much greater force than was expected, were compelled to withdraw. The bombardment continued relentlessly whereupon the Turcos, picked troops from Algeria, debouched from the town and with gallantry which must surely live in history and charged the German battery overrunning all the German gun-

Turcos Win Immortal Fame

"Their losses, it was said, exceeded those of the Light Brigade at Bal-kava. Of a battalion only one hundred returned unscathed. bravery, however, was powerless against the German advance which rept foot by foot through the outskirts of Charlerio to the very heart of the town. 

The forts at Namur still were holding out, it was declared. The claim regarding the Namur fortifications was repeated later by an English correspondent at Ostend who quoted a Belgian officer who had arrived from Namur. He said the Germans had destroyed two forts and still were attacking the others.

It is officially announced at St. Petersburg that the Russian advance in Prussia is proceeding with iresistible force. It has heretofore been stated that the objective point of the main Russian army for the present is Posen in German. Poland. The Germans are represented as having retired

to Osterode in East Prussia. A merchant arriving in London from Berlin is credited with the state ment that trains are bringing many refugees to Berlin from Koenigsburg. which city he claimed civilians had been advised to leave.

Diplomatic relations between Austria and Japan apparently have been formally severed. A dispatch direct from Tokio states that the Austrian



EMERGENCY MONEY

CITY NATIONAL BANKS' APPLI CATION GRANTED AND IT WILL ISSUE CURRENCY

Steps Taken to Make this Available at Larliest Mome... Possible

C. W. Snider, cashier of the City National Bank this morning receiv ed a telegram from the treasury department at Washington stating the bank's application for admission as a member of the National Currency Association of Dallas had been ac cepted, and that the bank would be permitted to issue \$175,000 emer gency currency, in addition to that which is permitted under the regular

This emergency currency rided for under the Aldrich-Vreeland bill passed by Congress some two years ago. This currency is secur-ed by commercial paper, bonds and warehouse receipts taken by the banks as collateral.

The object of the local bank in is suing this emergency currency at this time is particularly to help finance the cotton crop which is coming on the market soon. In anticipa tion of the acceptance by the treas ury department the officers of the institution have already arranged for issuing the currency, which will be available for loans in the course of a very few days.




