

MAKING LIGHT OF GOD, SERMON THEME

REV. MILLER SAYS INCIDENTS IN LIVES OF CHURCH MEMBERS PARTLY RESPONSIBLE

THE CHURCH NEEDS DIGNITY

Men Ought To Give Same Attention to God's Business They Give Their Own

And still the people continue to crowd the house at the Baptist revival being held at the First Baptist church; and still the music under the leadership of Rev. S. L. Raborn improves with each day and night; and still the promise of everlasting life hangs in the balance. Incidentally, more young people appear in the choir now than at the beginning of the meetings.

Last night Rev. R. C. Miller read his text from Mat. 22:5, in which we are told: "And they made light of it and went their way, one to his farm and the other to his merchandise." "Why do men make light of God? Why do they ridicule religion and crack their stale jokes at the church?" the speaker asked by way of opening his sermon.

He went on to answer his own questions by stating that it was because there were little incidents in the life of every church member as well as in the life of all living humans that would not stand the religious searchlight of inquiry. An ordinary man who made no claim for religion did not have those incidents counted against his conduct like those of a church member.

of pithy, powerful words and not around the same intense feeling that would come if he were treated as though no word was necessary to express the contempt.

But, he explained, that's exactly how you are treating God. You are treating Him with silent contempt. You may not say anything or joke about Him, but you let it die at that. Neither do you say anything for Him. "You treat Him with silent contempt."

While this silence is the attitude of some people, there are others who seem to think that it is a mark of wisdom to crack a particularly clever joke about religion. He said that one ought to find it those who come in contact with him throughout the day were Christians.

Find in the grocery boy who has been the recipient of your roasts for probably years belongs to a church. Act in such a manner that he will know you are a Christian. The speaker asserted that most grocery boys have a perfect right to think the religion of the customers a hilarious joke.

A fireman once informed the speaker that he told his audience, that if the average scoffer at the church and its members could be on a thundering locomotive as it rounds a dangerous curve at the rate of fifty miles an hour and see another of like speed rushing forward to meet it, the average cracker of jokes would become as serious as the Bible itself.

The sermon was ended with the lesson that you must honor your religion if you expect other people to honor it. You must pass out into the street from the door of the church with the same amount of pride that you would use if you stepped out of your business office. "You must step out with dignity that cannot help but uphold the honor of the church," he avowed.

FATHER J. DOLJE WILL LEAVE HERE

GOES TO SUBIAGO, ARK. TO TEACH IN BENEDICTINE FATHERS' COLLEGE

PASTOR HERE EIGHT YEARS

Church Has Grown in Membership and Influence—His Successor Not Yet Announced

Rev. Father J. Dolje, who for the past eight years has been pastor of the local Catholic church, has resigned his pastorate and is packing up his belongings to leave in a few days for Subiago, Arkansas, where he goes to accept a professorship in the Boyd College at that place conducted by the Benedictine Fathers. He will have the chair of Christian doctrine for which his education and training have especially fitted him.

His successor here has not been announced, but is expected to arrive at any time. As soon as he is installed Father Dolje will leave for his new home, as the college term opens next Tuesday.

Father Dolje came here in April, 1907. During his pastorate the local Catholic church has increased in membership and influence and he leaves it about to start the building of new church which will be one of the handiwork of the session of the state. Over \$15,000 is already on hand to start the building of the church. Father Dolje will leave many friends here whose good wishes will go with him to his new work.

FERGUSON'S SLAP AT BAILEY UNKINDEST CUT

Tom E. Wheeler writing the Austin American says:

Ferguson's slap at Bailey, if a slap was intended when the next governor yesterday refused the invitation to address the House, was the unkindest cut the former senator and his numerous busy friends in the legislature have received since the El Paso convention.

In the first place, the vote given the Ferguson invitation resolution was a direct tribute to the Temple farmer-banker and it may be taken as a gauge of popularity the next governor is held in about six times as much favor among the representatives as is Bailey, for Ferguson was invited by a 6 to 1 vote, while Bailey just nosed through.

But ten more than half of the members voting invited Bailey. He was nearly as unpopular as was "Cyclone" Davis, to whom an invitation was refused by a majority of one vote.

In the second place, to remain unchronological, Ferguson seems to have struck a responsive chord when he intimated that the attentions of the legislators could best be devoted to relieving the crisis facing the farming and financial interests of the State than in hearing speeches. That, claim some of his friends here, is putting the public interest above self-advancement and doing it with a vengeance.

BOY WITHOUT PLAY GROWS INTO MAN WITHOUT WORK

Henry S. Curtis in the American Journal on Sociology.

The average activity of children in the closely built up American cities, when measured in terms of distance, is two or three miles a day less than it is in cities that make ample provision for organized play. Our cities are too frequently mistaken loitering for play. They mistake being in the open for exercise. This fallacy, unless corrected with reasonable speed, is apt to result in the distant future in a generation of Americans that will find it difficult to uphold the standards of capacity and ability laid down by their fathers.

The child in the congested city does not expend all the energy that a child normally should expend in play and exercise. Loitering in a stuffy alley is exercise after a fashion, but it is not the vigorous exercise that a child gets from going out with a crowd of boys on a fishing or swimming expedition. The insufficiently taxed energies of the youngster encourage sluggishness. The working of the entire nervous system is brought down to a lower tone and in most cases remains that way throughout life. To put it epigrammatically, "the child without the playground is often father to the man without a job" because of the defective capacity due to want of proper exercise.

The King and Winge brought on the crew of four sailors from the whaler Elvira, which was crushed by the Arctic ice nearly a year ago. The shipwrecked party included W. C. Allen, president of the Arctic Whaling Trading Company. These men were transferred from the steam whaler Belvidere at Point Barrow, after having been cared for aboard since the wrecking of the Elvira. On account of having to keep these men, the Belvidere, which was short of provisions, was obliged to abandon the whaling grounds at the height of the season and hasten to Point Barrow to meet the King and Winge.
