15-HAS BEEN ARCHBISHOP BOLONGE, ITALY

Was Made Archbishop Boulogne To Combat Modernistic Society There

By Associated Press. Rome, Italy, Sept. 3.-Cardinal Della Chiesa has been elected pope in succession to the late Plus the Tenth. The new pope will assume the name of Benedict 15th.

Cardinal Giacono Della Chiesa, who today was elected pope by the sacred college in succession to Pope Pius Tenth, was created a cardinal May 25, .1914. His is the archbishop of Bologne, Italy. He was born in Pegli in the diocese of Genis, Nov 21, 1854 and was ordained a priest in 1878. He was appointed a substitute secretary of state in 1901. In 1907 was elected to the post of

advisor to the holy office. In 1907 he was appointed papel nuncio of Madrid in succession of Monsigner Rinaldini but this appointment was cancelled three days This incident had occurred just before he was made archbishop of Bologne. When he was made archbishop of Bologne, it was declared in Rome that it was mainly with the object of combating "modern rleigion" ideas, Bologne being the the National cratic League whose members advo cated what is known as "modernism." RADFORD HEADS

NAT'L. FARMERS' UNION WILL URGE CONGRESS FOR FI-NANCIAL LEGISLATION

Will Send Committee to Washington to Work For Necessary Legislation

By Associated Press. Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 3.—The important feature of today's session of the National Farmers' Union convention was expected to be the naming of a committee to take charge of the desired legislation at Washington indorsed yesterday.

President Barrett will appoint this ommittee. Peter Radford, ex-president of the Texas union will direct the work and now is engaged in rais ing \$200,000 for the committee's expense in Washington. He secured \$10,000 yesterday.

The committee will endeavor to get Congress to give cotton farmers direct loans from the federal treasury. It now appears the convention will be able to adjourn by Friday after

The report of the committee on education submitted to the National convention this morning by Chairman . C. Wright puts the farmers' union on record as favoring rural education including consolidated rural schools, ultural and Mechanical colleges as the head of the system.

Direct aid to the farmer from the ederal treasury was recommended in emergency, submitted and approved

"In the judgment of your commitee, but one course is open to any civilized nation when any consider able number of its citizens are threat ened with peril occasioned through no fault of their own, and that is direct aid from the federal treasury, he report read.

"We therefore recommend that the National Formers' Union indorse some bill that will bring the farmer direct relief in this emergency.' Provision was made for the raising

of \$200,000 for the purpose of maintaining a committee to devise plans for relieving the depressing results of the European war.

This committee will include a member from every organized state to gether with the national officers and national executive board. The mem bers will be appointed by Presiden Barret Thursday morning.

Radford to Raise Fund, Immediately after the introduction of this plan, Peter Radford, who was appointed to take charge of the work of raising the fund, began to collect contributions and before the ofternoon session adjourned, \$10,000 had been raised, it was stated.

.The fund will be used in paying the expenses of the committee in Wash ington where an attempt will be mad to secure legislation along the line recommend by the emergency com mittee and the addresses of the presi dent and other members. A war resolution, condemning the

present strife as a relic of barbarism and recommending the establishment of an international parliament and in ternational court, was passed. It fur ther stated that the Farmers' Union was against such a monstrosity as the European war and recommended thot if war cannot be averted, that the emperors, kings, capitalists and statesmen arm themselves and take part. The resolution was introduced by William H. Hedrick of Indiana.



It was frankly a makeshift to bridge a time in which aigimnnets could be made and new political combinations formed in a legislature fresh from a general election. 

Belgium, Germany and Russia use the Mauser, as did Spain in her war with America France uses the Lebel and Austria uses the Mannlicher. While Germany, the rifles of these three countries are very different, and it is simply the basic principal of the Mauser that gov-erns its name.

Many changes have been made with rifles in recent years, and now these magazine rifle can shoot and kill at much further than that distance.
