About one and one-half miles west of Friona on the south side of Highway 60, is a trailer washout facility for cattle haulers. The railroad crossing that leads to the location is marked only by a stop sign and railroad warning sign.

That was not enough Friday afternoon, December 9, when about 3:30 pm. an eastbound train slammed into a 2005 Peterbilt tractor and killed Charles Curtis Berry, 32, and Teresa McBirde, 39, both of Canyon. The two had dropped off their cattle trailer at the washout and were exiting over the crossing at the time of the wreck. The rig was owned by Dee King Trucking of Friona.

The impact killed the two instantly and scattered wreckage debris for almost a mile along the tracks, according to the Sheriff's department. An accident at the same crossing in August 1993 claimed the lives of three local residents, members of the same family, when a westbound

train hit a 1984 Mercury. According to the 1993 story in the Friona Star, a total of five fatalities occurred in a 10-month period at crossings within a couple of miles west

Applications for emergency farm gible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the above disaster.

Taylor said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agri-cultural business, whichever is less For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Taylor said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in

determining their loss. Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 24, 2006, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing with possible delays into the new farm-

Festive lights decorating homes and businesses across Texas are a bright sign that the holiday season is in full swing.

But state and local law enforcement agencies warn that there are some lights that Texas residents will not want to see this the flashing red and blue lights that signal a traffic month: enforcement stop.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) announced December 8 that officers will be stepping up enforcement of the state's driving while intoxicated laws through January 2, TxDOT has made grants totaling \$661,955 to 61 Texas cities to help defray expenses to crack down on impaired drivers.

"Officers will be out in force, so we want to remind people to et someone else drive if they've been drinking," said Carlos Lopez, TxDOT's traffic operations' director. "Designate a sober driver, call a taxi or just stay put until you can drive safely. We want everyone to have a happy and safe holiday season. That's why extra officers will be on the streets to arrest drunk drivers this month.

Safety advocates credit stepped-up enforcement of the state's DWI laws and ongoing advertising about the penalties for drunk driving with the recent decline in impaired driving fatalities. Federal officials reported recently that 130 fewer people died in six months in jail.

Texas last year in alcohol-related crashes than in 2003. Along with the Texas Department of Public Safety and local police departments and sheriff's offices statewide, the Texas Restaurant Association, the Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Com-mission, the Texas Municipal Police Association and Valero Corporation are also participating in the holiday DWI-prevention campaign.

Penalties for a first-time DWI offense include driver's license suspension for up to one year, a fine of up to \$2,000 and up to

Dear Coach Dewitt, I came across this article in some newspaper back in No-

vember and wanted to share it with you and Al. It is a heck of a piece of trivia, for me at least, The headline read "College basketball celebrates 25 years with 3-point shot" Here is the story written by Jim O'Connell of the Associated Press:

It isn't one of those dates that jumps to mind, even for the most devoted of college basketball fans. Even on its silver anniversary, it went virtually ignored.

On November 29, 1980, in Reid Gym on the campus of Western Carolina in Cullowhee, North Carolina, Ronnie Carr made the first 3-pointer in college basketball history. Think how the game has changed since that line first appeared on a court. From strategy to broadcasting vernacular, the 3-point shot has become as much a part of the game as the dunk, the zone, and the shot clock.

The night Carr made history, the line was 22 feet from the basket and the Southern Conference had volunteered to try it out for the 1980-81 season.

The Catamounts were playing Middle Tennessee State that night and the 3-point line really wasn't that big a deal in pregame chatter. Carr took the first shot from behind the line less than two minutes into the game. He made the first 3 on his next attempt with 16:09 left. The 23footer went through the net at 7:04 p.m.

"I wasn't concentrating on that even though it was part of my game and even though we were briefed on it and the magnitude of it," Carr said Wednesday, a day after his alma mater honored him in a ceremony for that long jumper 25 years ago.

Representatives of the Naismith Hall of Fame were there to document the moment. The ball is still on display in Springfield, Massachusetts. Carr missed his two other 3-point attempts that night in Western Carolina's 77-70 victory. Larry Caldwell, Carr's teammate, and Rick Campbell of Middle Tennessee both made a 3 during the game. But Carr was first ball team reunion. My gosh

and he's proud of it. "I give three or four interviews a year about it," said Carr, who was involved in a serious auto accident before his senior year. So what does the man who hit the first 3 six years before it became official think of the current line at 19-9?

"I think to make it a real special shot, I wouldn't be opposed to moving it back," Carr said. "I'm so grateful to be a part of it. It changed the very makeup of basketball and did more to change the structure of the game than anything in history.

So there you have it Coach Dewitt. Guess you didn't realize that I went on to play basketball and become famous as late as 1980 after Al and I had been out of high school for 23 years. Thanks to you I ended up in the Hall of Fame. In my own mind, of course.

In this story they also mentioned the dunk, the zone, and the shot clock. Correct me if I am wrong coach but in the era of the 1950s when we played, the only one of those we had was the zone. Or did we just play man-for-man? I forget now. I'm not sure even you could

dunk in your heyday could you? Have you been to any high school basketball games the last several years and looked at the equipment they have now and the uniforms they wear. Especially the uniforms. I looked us up in my 1957 annual. We wore short-shorts compared to the baggy versions they wear today. (Duck Owens would have tripped and fell on the shorts they wear now.) Our shirts were like tank tops or undershirts and our shoes didn't have any writing or swoosh marks on them either.

The kids that need glasses today either play in contacts or shatterproof prescription goggles. I can remember mother cutting up an old innertube to make thick rubber bands to hold my glasses on. Athletes today don't need that kind of contraption and if they did it would be near impossible to find an innertube.

Hey coach, I saw your picture in the Hillsboro paper with the 1955 HHS state finalist foot-



I'm going to send you the picture, Al. You will be amazed. See if you can pick out John Stanley Moore without looking at the names. Wow!



Japan lifts U.S. beef ban By Blair Fannin, A&M Extension Center

Japan's decision to lift a two-year ban on U.S. beef imports could strengthen the current cattle market.

'It should be a positive thing for cattle prices," said Dr. David Anderson, Texas Cooperative Extension livestock economist. "As we start re-capturing some market share, that's going to pull some supplies off in an already tight market.

It may take some time to see the market effect of the announce-ment, Anderson said. Japan was the largest U.S. beef trading partner before the end of 2003, importing \$1.4 billion of beef

"Since that time, that void has been filled by Australian beef and Japanese imports of U.S, pork," Anderson said. "How soon we recapture that market share is the key question to how soon we'll see the impact of the decision. It may be a long-term process. It's highly likely it won't be an overnight thing."

Another factor is gauging how fast Japanese consumers return to eating U.S. beef, Anderson said. Various reports have shown a majority of consumers are hesitant about buying U.S. beef, but

Anderson said it's hard to draw conclusions Japan's decision comes at a time when seasonal supplies of cattle are "tight."

"We're at a point during the cattle cycle where we have low supplies of cattle and low supplies of beef," Anderson said "That plays into high cattle prices and we've all seen high beef prices at the grocery store.


That also plays into exports as well when we have a higherpriced commodity, it makes it tougher to move into the market place.


JV Mustangs Lose to Hale Center



Local soldier returns home




