

Meat Theft Arrest Made Wednesday

Acting on a tip, the Parmer County Sheriff's Department launched an investigation several weeks ago into alleged theft of meat from the Excel Friona plant.

On Wednesday evening, December 12, the Sheriff's office, assisted by the Friona Police Department, initiated a search warrant at a Friona residence.

While the warrant was in relation to the meat theft, officers got a bonus when two occupants at the residence were also charged with possession of marijuana.

Charged with felony theft of meat from Excel was Sheon Anthony Polk, 22. He was also charged with the marijuana possession. His bond was set at \$5,800 and at press time he remained in the Parmer County jail.

Carl Polk, 60, was not implicated in the meat theft but was arrested at the residence for marijuana possession.

Sheriff Randy Geries said other suspects in the Excel theft ring were being investigated. Polk and others were allegedly stealing the meat from trucks and the final processing area at the Excel location and selling most of it.

One theft incident was valued at \$2,800. The final tally has not yet been completed. Several boxes of meat were discovered during the search.



Chieftain Band Members Earn All-Regional


Region I All Region band auditions were held at Panhandle on December 3. Friona Chieftain Band members participated in the auditions and received several positions in the band.




Funeral services for Maurine Dunn, 91, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday, December 8 at Friona's First Baptist Church.

Mark Stovall, pastor, officiated at the services. Burial was in Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Mrs. Dunn died Wednesday, December 5 at Prairie Acres Nursing Home.

Born March 3, 1910 in Duncan, Oklahoma, she had been a resident of Friona 56 years, moving here from Marlow, Oklahoma in 1944. She married Caycee Dunn, Sr. on May 4, 1930 in Marlow, Oklahoma. They lived there before moving to San Francisco, California in 1942.

She was a member of First Baptist Church in Friona since 1944. She and her late husband owned and operated a cafe in Friona and she taught piano and tap dance lessons.

Having attended Oklahoma College for Women at Chickasha, Oklahoma, two years, and in 1963, she attended West Texas State University in Canyon. She was a first grade teacher from 1962-1978.

She was preceded in death by her husband on

March 24, 1963, her parents, Harris and Cecil Gatlin, and a grandson, Stan Smith in April 1990.

When she was five years, her parents moved to the Gatlin family farm so her grandparents could move to town. Her mother was determined that she would not attend a country school, so Maurine boarded with her maternal grandmother, aunts and great-grandparents during the week and on weekends, went home to the farm.

She was fortunate to know her great-grandparents and passed down many wonderful family stories that

she heard sitting at her great-grandmother Sampson's knee.

Survivors include three children, Harris and Wanda Dunn of Clovis, New Mexico, Kathryn Smith of Lubbock and Cayce and Becky Dunn of Aurora, Colorado; four grandchildren, Deanna Dunn of Bradford, Massachusetts, Ted and Vicky Parker of Lubbock, Derek Dunn of Tucson, Arizona and Jennie Dunn of Aurora, Colorado, and three great-grandchildren.

Also surviving are a sister, Margaret Cummings of Lawton, Oklahoma and one brother, Hugh Gatlin of Marlow, Oklahoma.

Farmers, Ranchers Are Urged To Address Operating Needs

Low prices, tight markets and reduced yields due to extreme climatic conditions will squeeze profit margins for some producers to the point where funding needed to produce next year's crop will be difficult to obtain.

As a result, the Farm Service Agency (FSA) announced the availability of operating loans for eligible farmers to secure next spring's planting needs. The November interest rate is five per cent.

FSA provides low interest loans to qualified farmers unable to obtain credit from commercial sources. An operating loan may be issued directly from FSA or in the form of a guaranteed loan secured by the government but funded by a conventional agriculture lender.

"The basis of our loan program is to provide temporary credit to those who can demonstrate both need and repayment ability," said Thomas S. Taylor, farm loan manager. "Our goal is to help farmers show that they will be able to obtain credit from private lenders when they are financially able."

Operating loans are used to purchase supplies and inputs for farming enterprises. Input items may include seed, fertilizer, livestock, feed and equipment. Financing may also be used to pay for minor improvements to buildings and to refinance debt under certain conditions.

"Credit is usually extended to established farmers who have suffered financial setbacks because of economic downturns or natural disasters," said Thomas S. Taylor. "Farmers who do not qualify for conventional loans because of insufficient net worth are also eligible for the program."



PCSWCD TAKING TREE ORDERS...The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is now taking orders for windbreak tree seedlings. The 2001-2002 tree program is a repeat of the past several years where the tree saplings are ordered from the Texas Forest Service. All varieties are grown for this area and climate. Larger trees are available from two other sources. Parmer County will offer more than 30 varieties of shrubs, hardwoods and evergreen trees. These trees, when used in two or more rows as a windbreak, will provide cover for wildlife and shelter to homes and livestock as well as protect roads from wind and snow. Orders will be taken through mid-March, but early orders are recommended to ensure variety selection. Scholarship Application Forms Available In Jan.

Application forms for academic scholarships to be awarded by West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative during 2002 should be available by mid-January.

WTRT will mark its sixth straight year to award scholarships funded through unclaimed capital credit checks.

Applicants must be high school seniors who will graduate in the spring of 2002, have completed high school or have received their GED. Seniors graduating in May and college-minded individuals whose parents or guardians are WTRT members, or who are WTRT members themselves, are eligible to apply.

Applicants, their parents or guardians must have residences served by telephone prefixes 225, 258, 265, 276, 289, 357, 578 or 825. All others are ineligible. Schools in Hereford, Friona, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega could have students eligible to apply.

Application forms will be supplied by the Cooperative to counselor's offices in Dimmitt, Friona, Farwell, Lazbuddie and Vega.

Students in the Hereford school district and post-high school applicants will need to pick up applications at the WTRT business office on South Highway 385, Hereford. Forms may also be picked up at Hereford by applicants from any of the

above listed school districts. Two letters of recommendation should accompany an application. In the event that the student is a graduating senior, one letter must be from a teacher, principal or counselor from the high school the student is attending or recently attended.

If the applicant has been out of high school for a number of years or is currently enrolled in a college or trade school, a letter from a college or vocational instructor is acceptable. Full rules of the program are provided with application forms.

Scholarships awarded by WTRT may be used at any state or church-sponsored college or university, or at any accredited vocational or technical school.



Box 817, Friona, Texas, 79035, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for issuance of Air Quality Permit No. 49798 which would authorize construction of a new Grain Terminal Elevator located at County Road 17 and Highway 60 near Friona, Parmer County, Texas. The following air contaminants will be evaluated for authorization: particulate matter (including particulate matter less than 10 microns in diameter.)

This application was submitted to the TNRCC on November 21, 2001. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TNRCC central office, the TNRCC Amarillo regional office, and the Friona Public Library, 109 West Seventh, Friona, Parmer County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Amarillo regional office of the TNRCC.

The TNRCC executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING You may submit public comments, a request for a public meeting, or request a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TNRCC will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 30 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material or significant public comments.

The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application. A public meeting about the application may be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

If only comments are received on the application, the response to comments, along with notice of the executive director's action on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application.

If a hearing request is timely filed, the executive director will complete the technical review, issue a preliminary decision on the application, and a Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments.

After the final deadline for public comments following any required Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or is on a mailing list for this application.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in

If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing, and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect, must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 30 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

If a hearing request is timely filed, additional notice may be provided. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.



The Gene Linked To Macular Degeneration

Macular degeneration is an untreatable disease that affects 25 million people worldwide. Age-related macular degeneration, most common in the elderly, causes fuzziness, shadows or other distortions in the center of vision while leaving peripheral vision intact. The condition can also strike in adolescence, commonly called Stargardt's disease. Scientists at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation have now identified a gene called ELOVL4 that they believe is behind these forms of macular degeneration. The pattern of degeneration is similar in both diseases. A waste builds up in cells within the eye and causes the degeneration of the light-sensing cells in both conditions.



The researchers found that severe macular degeneration occurred at a young age when they significantly damaged the gene. Damaging it to a lesser extent caused a much higher level of age-related macular degeneration than found in the general population. Once researchers know more about the genes that predispose people to macular degeneration, they will be able to perform a simple test long before the disease strikes the patient's eyes as well as develop a drug for those individuals who already have the illness. This is not the first gene isolated for macular degeneration. Scientists hope that all genes associated with the disease will be determined within the next five years. A similar amount of time will be required to develop the drugs for intervention.

How to Move Your 401(k) to an IRA

When the day comes for you to change jobs, you may have to decide what to do with your 401(k). By making the right choice, you can save yourself hassles, aggravation--and money.

You actually have several options for dealing with your 401(k). You could, of course, cash it out, but you'd have to pay income taxes on the proceeds, plus a possible 10 per cent early withdrawal penalty. You also may be able to move your 401(k) money to your new employer's plan, if the plan allows it. Or, you may even be able to keep your money in your former employer's plan, although you won't be able to make any more contributions.

However, if you're like most people, you'll move your 401(k) funds to an IRA. In that case, you'll have to decide how you want to make the move: via an "indirect rollover" or a "direct rollover."

If you go the indirect rollover route, you'll receive your 401(k) money in a check, made out to you. To avoid paying any taxes and penalties, you must move these funds to an IRA within 60 days of getting the check.

So far, so good. But the check you get for your 401(k) will be for only 80 per cent of your account balance. The IRS takes the other 20 per cent to cover any possible income taxes you may owe on your distribution. And you must dip into your savings to come up with the missing 20 per cent to complete the rollover within 60 days. If you don't, the 20 per cent will be taxable to you. And if you're younger than 59-1/2, you also may have to pay the 10 per cent early withdrawal penalty.


If you do pay the 20 per cent yourself, you will get it back as a refund, as long as you owe no additional income taxes for the year. But in the meantime, you've been greatly inconvenienced.

You can avoid these problems by selecting the "direct rollover" method of moving your 401(k) money to an IRA. When you close your 401(k), nothing will be withheld, so you won't have to worry about paying taxes or raiding your other investments to come up with the missing 20 per cent. In fact, with a direct rollover, you'll never see your 401(k) money; it moves from your old plan to your IRA.

You also can choose to move the money to a separate IRA, called a "rollover IRA." If you have money in a rollover IRA, you can eventually transfer it to a new employer's 401(k) plan, if the new plan accepts funds from previous plans. But if you place your old 401(k) money in a pre-existing IRA, you'll never be able to put these 401(k) funds in a new employer's plan.

Before making any moves with your 401(k), see your tax adviser--and then take action. The window of opportunity for making the right moves is only open for a short while--so go through it while you can.

Out Here

"With Us or Against Us?"

"Ahab, the Arab, king of the burning sands."

Or is it king of the desert sands? I can't remember the words to the old Ahab the Arab song. I guess if we sang it today though it would be insensitive to our robe-wearing, dictatorial royal family Arab prince friends.

Dubya has said (over and over) that other countries are either with us or against us! That doesn't leave much wiggle room for foreign governments, especially the ones that didn't like us anyway.

I subscribe to a newsletter called The Hightower Lowdown. Jim Hightower is the former Texas agriculture secretary and a liberal pundit that hangs out with the likes of Molly Ivins. They are Democrats. I like to read liberal stuff. It is sort of like spying on the enemy.

But the November issue of Hightower's Lowdown had some interesting info about our "friends" in Saudi Arabia.

The Carlyle Group is the nation's 11th largest military contractor, according to the Hightower Lowdown. Among its contracts is one to build the missile-launch systems currently in use on our ships firing at Afghanistan.

The Carlyle Group also owns BioPort Corp. which has a monopoly on making anthrax vaccine in the U.S.

In October the Carlyle Group reluctantly parted company with the Binladin Group. Wouldn't look good, don't you know, for the elder Bush to be making millions with the family of America's most wanted murderer.

Now here is the with us or against us part. Khaled bin Mahfouz, who controls Saudi Arabia's largest bank, was caught with others in 1999 funneling millions into Osama bin Laden's bank accounts. Mahfouz is also an investor in the Carlyle Group.
