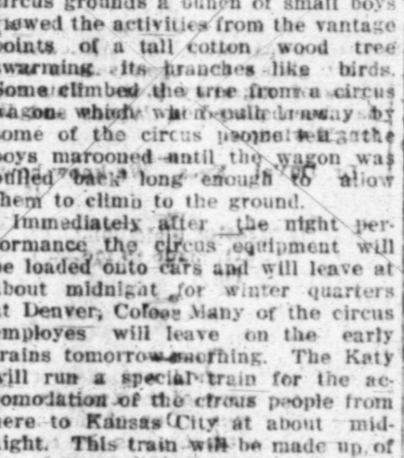

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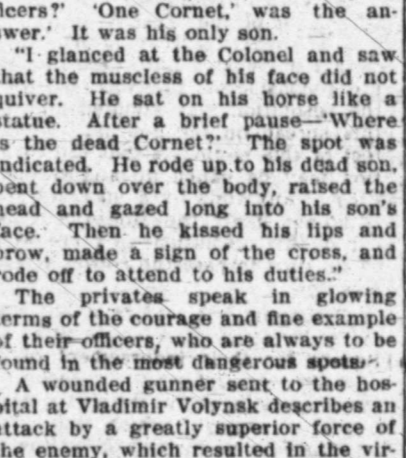

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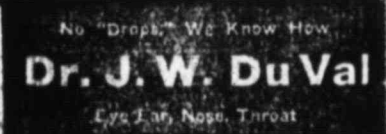

SUCCESSOR TO CARRANZA NAMED AT PEACE MEETING

Associated Press. August Calientes, Mexico, Oct. 15.—Unofficial reports of the result of the peace conference here yesterday say that a successor to Carranza as president of Mexico is to be named soon. These reports, which are very brief, do not explain when Carranza is to resign, or how, but indicate that the conference has finished its work successfully. These reports describe the conference as ending last night with General Benavides arising "amid a tumult of applause as the secret conference of the pacification convention ended" and explaining "the country has been saved; long live Mexico my country, our country." All the generals in attendance appear to be well pleased with the result. The only authorized delegates reported absent were those from Governor Maytorena and from Zapata. The convention today is said to be awaiting the arrival of these delegates to sign the peace pact. After this document is signed it is said a public session of the conference will be held to name a successor to Carranza.

BEEF, LONG BURIED, FOUND STILL APPARENTLY FRESH In Dug Up Four Feet Underground at Home of Dr. T. R. Boger. Probably 10 Years Old. While a flower pit was being dug at the home of Dr. T. R. Boger on Teuth street, a piece of meat, apparently just slaughtered and with the blood still fresh on it, was found four feet under the ground. The meat was encased in hard red clay, which seemed to be petrified into a sort of pottery like a shell on a nut. For ten years, to the certain knowledge of the Bogers, the ground had not been disturbed in any way with the exception of a light plowing for a garden, and consequently the appearance of the meat, which smelled fresh and was firm to the touch, was the source of much surprise. The ground all around was hard and of the same clay and offered no explanation for the phenomenon. The only possible theory advanced is that some ten or more years ago a dog had buried the meat there during cold weather. Natural petrification of the clay set in with the remarkable result before mentioned. The appearance of the meat several hours after being dug up remained the same as any other fresh killed beef.
