
I have decided not to seek the office of Parmer County Treasurer for the term of 2003-2007.



On Sunday afternoons the kids in the neighborhood would gather at someone's house and play baseball, make ice cream and chocolate cake. When it had been rainy we would go swimming in the old lake. We had a lot of fun. After the bad drought many people had moved away. The school at Hollene consolidated with the school at Bellview which was 8 miles north of Hollene. They bought some land from a man named Rose and built a new school half way between the two. The school was called Rosedale after the man community schools in our area. I attended the one at

man named Kose and built a new school half way between the two. The school was called Rosedale after the man who sold them the land. I met Hershel Hughes (my future husband) at Rosedale. He graduated in 1941, the first year the school was open. I graduated in 1943. We were married on November 22, 1943. We had three children: Jackie who has been a nurse for 20 years in Alabama, Peggy who has taught school in Muleshoe for 29 years and Lynn who farms north of Texico. I have 5 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren. I always helped Hershel with the farm work. I drove a grain truck or what ever needed to be done. There were six ladies in our community who would

There were six ladies in our community who would get together and quilt at each others houses. Whomevers house we were at would make lunch for everyone. One winter we made 21 quilts. Hershel has been gone for about six and one half years. We miss him a lot. It seems like he has been gone longer.





TASP Test Available On Dec. 8

On Dec. 8 Seniors who plan to attend a two or four-year public college in Texas are being offered the opportunity to take the TASP at the Friona High School Cafeteria at 8 a.m. Saturday, December 8. The test will be given in Friona again in late April for sophomores who plan to take dual credit classes next year and for juniors and seniors who need to re-test. The Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) was mandated in the spring of 1987 by the Texas Education Code (TEC) 51.306.

Code (TEC) 51.306. TASP Test scores cannot be used to deny a student admission to a Texas public college or university; however, students are not allowed to enroll in college classes that require passing scores on the TASP. Students must partici-pate in a developmental education program for those sections of the test that they have not passed until all institutional requirements are satisfied.

nave not passed until all institutional requirements are satisfied. To be exempt from taking the TASP, a student must score a 23 or higher on the ACT with a score of 19 or higher in both English and math. Also, students who score TLI of 86 or higher in reading, and 1770 or higher in writing on the TAAS are exempt from TASP. Please note that all three scores on the TAAS must meet the criteria. www.TASP.NEXINC.COM. Students who plan to test on December 8 should contact Mrs. Gallman at Friona High School no later than 4 p.m. Friday, December 7. On the day of the test, students should bring photo identification, Social Security number, and a check or money order made out to NES. No cash will be accepted. The test will last from 8 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. No food or drinks will be allowed in the test center.
