### PRIZES ARE PLEDGED FOR FARM EXHIBIT ON SATURDAY

Large Number of Young People Expected Here For Occasion From Over Country

Arrangements have been perfected for the exhibit to be held here Saturday by the boys and girls farming clubs of Wichita county and it is expected that a large number of the young people will be on hand for the meeting, dinner and awarding of the prizes. A Chamber of Commerce committee yesterday completed the list of prizes which will be awarded and this feature of the occasion has been arranged for.

The place where the exhibits will be placed has not been definitely determined, but it is probable that the building used until recently by the Ford agency on Ohio avenue between Sixth and Seventh, will be available.

### MILITARY HONORS FOR DEAD OF BOTH FRENCH AND GERMANS

Paris, Oct. 29.—German and French soldiers who died in hospitals here are buried with military honors. Their graves are marked in precisely the same manner in the cemeteries of Pantin and Bagneux. French soldiers are buried in one section and Germans in another. The graves are simple. At the head of each is a black wooden cross with the soldier's name, regiment and date of death. Graves of French soldiers are covered with flowers. Visitors buy them at the entrance and throw them upon the graves of the French soldiers. Not a flower is to be seen upon those of the Germans.

### FINDS GAME LAWS FAIRLY WELL OBEYED IN THIS CITY

Representative of State Department Here and Has Discovered Some Violations

Shooting of ducks at night may result in some Wichitans facing trial in the federal courts, as some who have been indulging in this practice have been spotted by a representative of the state game warden, A. R. Stewart of Austin, who has been here for several days. While the law against shooting ducks at night is a federal regulation and does not come under the state department, representatives of the latter are co-operating with the federal authorities, and it is probable that all who have been detected violating the law will be reported.

While the laws, both state and federal, have been fairly well observed here with regard to the shooting of birds, Mr. Stewart has found some violations. Among other things, residents of Oklahoma have crossed Red River and hunted in this state without paying the \$15 license which the Texas law requires of them. In his efforts to enforce the hunting laws, Mr. Stewart has been receiving the co-operation of a number of local sportsmen.

An examination was held recently to select a game law official for this district which comprises Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and part of Louisiana. When this official takes charge, enforcement of the laws will be more strict.



### BATTLE IN AFRICA ENDS IN VICTORY FOR BELGIANS

Fighting in Region of Belgian Congo Results in Defeat for German Forces.

Paris, Oct. 28.—A Havas dispatch to the Atlanta reports that the vice governor general of Catanga, in the Belgian Congo, announces that the Belgian troops defeated the Germans at Kissele on Lake Tanganyika, which lies between Belgian Congo and German East Africa.

### GERMAN TRADE WITH FRANCE VERY HEAVY

EFFORTS BEING MADE TO PLACE BUSINESS WITH HOME CONCERNS.

### BOYCOTT STRICTLY ENFORCED

Articles Manufactured in Germany or Austria Have No Sale in France.

Paris, Oct. 29.—French trade aggregating 1,800,000,000 francs or \$360,000,000 a year is thrown into the market as a result of the war. Such was the total value of goods purchased by France last year from Germany and Austria, the balance of trade being in favor of Germany to the amount of 265,000,000 francs and in favor of Austria to the amount of 64,000,000 francs. Local committees are being organized with a view to placing this business to the best advantage. The Committee of Industrial and Commercial Defence is taking up the interests of small manufacturers, who have not been in touch with the foreign consumer in a way to enable them to make new connections directly. Proposals are being made to English business organizations with a view to an exchange of visits in the two countries of representatives of commercial and industrial concerns. The importance of this work to the United States may be understood from the fact that of the purchases from Germany last year there were 117,000,000 francs in machinery, while France purchased from the United States only 67,000,000 francs in this line. Germany supplied 163,000,000.

### GERMANS CONTROL HOTELS

Another committee is being formed to consider the question of hotels which are to a great extent, in the hands of Germans, while those conducted by Frenchmen had mostly German and other foreign employees. One proposition is to establish a number of hotel schools, such as the one already in operation at Thionon, where every branch of the hotel business is taught practically. French hotel keepers in Paris have organized schools of languages for their younger employees in order to fit them to take the place of Germans, as the question of language has always been a weak point with French employees.

Everywhere is seen evidence of the intention to follow strictly the injunctions of the official decree in the boycotting of German and Austrian products. In the stationery stores Austrian pencils have disappeared from view and it is impossible to find any of the usual German articles in the delicatessen shops.

Monsieur Lelievre, President of the Industrial Defence Committee, states that the principal difficulty the Committee encounters is in the case of houses which are practically known to be thoroughly German but continue business under names adopted for the contingency. There are no statistics giving the number of Germans occupied in commerce and manufacturing in France, but the proportion is very important and the Defence Committee proposes to ask for radical measures of protection against their continuation under false colors.

### INSPECTION OF DAIRY COWS IS TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK

Will Be Examined For Tuberculosis—More Than 300 Animals Are To Be Inspected

Examination of cows from which milk is sold to Wichitans will be undertaken next week by Dr. R. T. Bohn, food and milk inspector. Since the ordinance went into effect Dr. Bohn has been kept close to his office issuing permits and getting the measure into effect, so that he has not had an opportunity as yet to make inspections for tuberculosis in cows.

It is estimated that there are fully 300 cows to be inspected and some of these are on farms ten and twelve miles from Wichita Falls, so that the inspection is a task of considerable magnitude. The ordinance is being gradually put into full force, erroneous impressions regarding it corrected and the inspections gotten under way.

### EIGHT AIRSHIPS SEEN ON BELGIAN-GERMAN FRONTIER

London, Oct. 29.—Eight airships passed over Hasselt on the German-Belgian frontier going westward and evidently making for Brussels and Antwerp where it has been previously stated Zeppelin sheds were being constructed according to a Rotterdam dispatch to the Daily Mail.

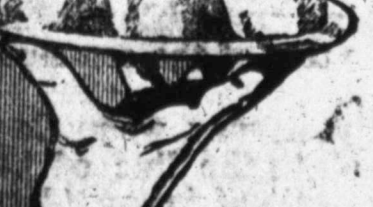

Recipe For Farm Gingerbread.

Allow for this dainty one-half cupful of butter, one cupful of sifted powdered sugar, one-half cupful of milk, one and three-quarter cupfuls of flour, one rounded teaspoonful of baking powder and two level tea spoonfuls of ginger. Cream the butter, add gradually the sugar and beat until very white and creamy. Beat in the milk, adding it very slowly. Stir in the flour sifted with the ginger. Invert a dripping pan and butter the bottom. Spread the mixture very thinly and bake in a moderate oven. Turn the pan often that it may bake evenly. Cut in square before removing it from the pan.

### LAKE WICHITA IS MECCA FOR LOCAL DUCK HUNTERS

Duck hunters have been very busy at Lake Wichita during the past ten days, especially since the recent cold snap, and some large bags of birds have been brought in. Every morning sees a large number of hunters at the lake and competition is rather keen. While Lake Wichita draws most of the duck hunters, Denver Lake, the Wichita River and the small bodies of water in the vicinity are also visited by hunters.

Teal predominate among the ducks at Lake Wichita and most of the bags consist mostly of this kind of duck. Some mallard are also brought down and a few wild geese have also been killed, though these last are not plentiful.

The dove and quail season will open Sunday and many will be out after these birds. Doves are, quite numerous around here, but quail are not so much in evidence.

General Sir Charles Wittingham, formerly Douglas, chief of the British staff, is reported as dead. Dispatches do not relate whether it was merely his name or a dum dum bullet that got him.

The London Times, in its editorial, says the Associated Press is the greatest and most reliable news gathering association in the world. This is the organization of which The Times is a member and through which this paper receives its telegraphic news reports at the same time it is received by the newspapers published in cities larger than Wichita Falls.

Mr. Gill, former commissioner of insurance, is authorized for the statement that the people of Texas have been swindled to the extent of about \$20,000,000 during the past five years through the sale of worthless bonds and stocks. This should remain so that on November 3rd there is to be an election in Texas, and besides voting for a full set of State officers, there are four proposed amendments to the constitution to be voted for against, the most important by far being that which increases the pay of members of the legislature to \$1200 for the first year, and fixing compensation for the second year of the two year term at \$5 per day during any session of the legislature that might be called during the second year. The State needs better laws, but until the people send more experienced men down to Austin to make our laws, the State can't hope to get what she wants in that line.

J. W. Crawford, who is farming in the irrigated district near Lake Wichita, brought a bale of cotton to town today and was offered 6.40 for it by a buyer without looking at the cotton, but refused to sell. He planted forty acres to cotton this year, and so far has picked 18 bales. He thinks, or rather feels sure that he can easily pick 10 more bales from the forty acres. Of the eighteen bales picked he has sold enough to pay his debts, and now has on his hands eight bales, together with the ten bales he expects to gather and which he intends to hold if necessary, for two years, or until such time as the price will justify him to sell. He is a renter, and his condition, so far as finances are concerned, is about that of the average cotton farmer in this part of the State. They are well able to hold their own cotton without calling on the banks for money to tide them over. In a communication published in The Times a few weeks ago one of our bankers took occasion to say that while all the banks of the city had plenty of money to loan on cotton, that but few cotton farmers had taken advantage of the offer. The reason is that our farmers, as a rule, are not in debt and most of them are depositors instead of borrowers of money. It speaks well for the condition of the country.

A few years ago the people of this part of the State wanted the constitution of the State amended in such a way as to give to them the right of forming irrigation companies in order that they might store the storm waters and make use of them during times of drought for crop-making purposes, but the people of the balance of the State, particularly in South Texas, said to us in the language of

Walker Halk "Dust thou are, and to dust thou shall return," and voted down the amendment. Now, the people of counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico want sea walls to protect them and their property from tidal waves, and one of the amendments to be voted on next Tuesday, if carried, will fix it so that these walls can be constructed. Doubtless, these sea walls are needed just about as much as irrigation is needed in some parts of the State where the soil is fertile, but where crops suffer for the lack of rain at the proper time, and for that reason the amendment should carry. But there is not a great deal of enthusiasm in this part of the State over it. Enthusiasm is confined to the counties that will be most benefited by the construction of the sea walls. It was that way with us when the irrigation amendment was voted on. We wanted it bad, and voted almost solidly for its adoption, but it was snuffed under by a most brutal majority. The sea wall amendment is therefore likely to share the same fate for the reason that unless the people of the State as a whole can be made to see where they will be directly benefited, they are not inclined to vote for any proposition involving the amending of the constitution.

In commenting on the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on at the election on next Tuesday, that most excellent newspaper, the Waco Semi-Weekly Tribune, has the following to say of the one that proposes to raise the compensation of members of the legislature.

The proposed change will give a legislator a salary of \$1,200 for one year and mileage, all sessions, of five cents, going and coming. If special sessions are called by the Governor, the pay will be five dollars a day. Men who have served in the legislature such men for example, as Hon. Seth P. Mills, (et M. Neg and others) and men who have given the matter careful thought, unite in the declaration that the amendment should be adopted. They hold that it will encourage capable men to accept legislative service. As it is now, many such men have to make a sacrifice of business interests if they go to the legislature. Take the case of a man who knows that he is doing a good job of those men can make far more money by staying at home than they can draw from the State as pay for their service. The existing law is a deterrent to a capable and worthy man, who is asked to serve as a legislator, for he knows (unless he is well-to-do and has relatives that he must sacrifice business interests. Men have gone to Austin and are there now as a matter of public spirit. A greater evil is the possibility of mediocre, possibly incompetent men seeking legislative service only to find and to show that they are not fit to be there, and that they are not fit to bear. Most of us have seen instances of men aspiring to legislative places who, if elected, were in no wise equal to the

justified in making such a sacrifice of what business interests they had at home. The result, and it was inevitable, was that such men (whether they realized it or not) were subjected to more or less of suspicion as to their real motive in seeking the place. We have ever preferred to be charitable to such men and conclude that they were honest and really desirous to render public service; that ambition ("that sin by which the angels fell" as Cardinal Wolsey depicted it), had lured them to essay work beyond their strength, risk, sacrifice or personal interests, rather than to impulse to them secret, hope of opportunity to profit—in one way or another—by being in the legislature. But no matter how great their pretensions, we have heard criticism of the motives of such men, and it is better to have a system that will safeguard the incompetent than to have either undue ambition or unjust and unkind criticism and suspicion. Make the remuneration as proposed and capable men will be encouraged to serve. Likewise a man of modest means—for God forbid that only the well-to-do shall feel able to render public service—will not incur invidious criticism and suspicion of perchance, ambition patriotic spirit shall inspire desire to become a lawmaker of the State. The amendment ought to be adopted. It is wholesome in purpose and detail.

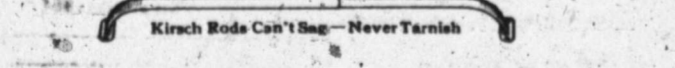

WANT ENGLAND TO CHANGE RECRUITING REGULATIONS Much Objection To Order Barring Men Under Five Feet Six in Height By Associated Press London, Oct. 29.—Why England should restrict recruiting to men of the minimum height of 5 feet 6 inches in days when battles are fought with long range weapons instead of broad swords and battle axes is puzzling many young patriots of under size who are anxious to go to the front. The old rule has already caused medical men to protest both in print and to the Army Medical Advisory Board. One of the medical journals points out that what is needed these days is not brute power to wield heavy weights, but a wiry physique able to stand bad weather, irregular feeding, broken sleep, long marches and trains to take cover and shoot with skill and patience. The short man weighs less, needs less food, is easier of transportation, stands hard marching without his feet giving way, offers a smaller mark to the enemy, keeps himself warm in a smaller space and can shelter in a trench better than a big man. The heavier the man, the more food he needs to keep up, a given amount of physical exertion and a man of 170 pounds requires a fifth more food than one of 140.
