LATTER DISGUISE BOAT UNDER ABOUT FIFTY COUNTIES WILL JAPANESE FLAG AND EN-TER HARBOR

Emden Adds Fourth Smokestack II Order To Make Disguise More Effective

Tokio, Oct. 29.—The British embassy hears that the German cruises Emden flying the Japanese flag and disguised by the addition of a fourth smokestack entered Tenang, a British possession in the Straits settlement and fired torpedoes which sank the Russian cruiser Jemtchug and a French destroyer.

REVERSES FOR GERMANY IN BOTH EAST AND WEST

Believed Allies' Superior Numbers Beginning To Tel!—Lull Apparent In Flanders Fighting

By Associated Press.

London, Oct. 29.—From west and east Ger man reverses are reported. Germany acknowl edges a check in Russian Poland, but concerning the great battle in Flanders she is silent. The bes information available indicates that notwith standing dauntless attacks and heavy losses the invaders are further from the coast than when the battle began.

The one great factor on which the allies build their hopes of an eventful triumph apparently, is according to their information, beginning to tell the almost inexhaustible supply of men that may be drawn from the vast reaches of the British and Russian empires to it. To it is ascribed German reverses in Russian Poland. A British correspond ent at Petrograd estimates the Russian emperor's army at eight million men. This enables the Rus sians to keep an immense reserve for every army and never leave men on the firing line long enough to become stale.

Meanwhile the British who describe the forces now on the continent as an advance guard are training at home 1,100,000 men of whom 600,000 are from her colonies. Today's French statement while optimistic, gives little specific information On the extreme west of the battle line where the fighting has been fiercest there is "nothing new." All dispatches seem to agree that there was a temporary lull yesterday between Nieuport and Ypres but reports are far from unanimous as to whether this was due to an armistice to bury the dead and remove the wounded which must be numerous on the field or whether it was caused by the exhaustion of the contending forces or the German lack of ammunition. The London press hazards al three guesses and contends at any rate that the position of the allies is satisfactory.

There is no indication, however, that Germany intends to abandon the fight for possession of the North Sea Coast. Unofficial reports have it that reinforcements are being poured in from every part along the battle line. The Germans, if they find the northern route to Dunkirk and Calais impassable may shift to the south with Boulogne that Napoleon waited in vain for his troops to embark for England and the taking of this city by the Germans would stir the German people as nothing else could. Berlin claims there has been no recent progress in the struggle in Flanders and as if explaining this says sixteen British warships are operating on the coast. This number never has been confirmed from British sources, but dispatch from Dover reports that a battleship equipped with twelve inch guns has gone to the assistance of the British monitors which have been shelling the Germans on shore. Other reports speak of heavy firing in the North Sea as if a big naval engagement had taken place but the ad-

. In the eastern arena of the war, the Russians appear to have driven in the German right wing as a fortnight ago they shattered the left before Warsaw. In confirmation of this is the German official announcement that their troops, together with the Austrians, had retreated in Poland.

Paris, Oct. 29.—The French official communication given out in Paris today says yesterday the French troops made progess at several points on the line, but particularly around Ypres and to the south of Arras. The text of the communication follows:

"During the day of yesterday, we made progress at several points along the line of battle around Ypres and to the south of Arras. There is nothing now on the front between Nieuport and Dixmude. Between the Aisne and the Argonne we took possession of some trenches occupied by the enemy and not one of the partial attacks undertaken by the German resulted successfully. We advanced also in the forest of Aprimont."

EFFORTS BEING MADE TO PLACE BUSINESS WITH HOME CONCERNS.

Articles Manufactured in Germany o Austria Have No Sale

Paris, October 28.—French trade aggregating 1,800,000,000 francs or \$360. 000,000 a year is thrown into the mar-ket as a result of the war. Such was

ria to the amount of 54,000,000 francs. Local committees are being organ-ized with a view to placing this business to the best advantage. The Committee of Industrial and Commercial Defence is taking up the interests of small manufacturers, who have not been in touch with the foreign consumer in a way to enable them to make new connections directly. Proposals are being made to English business organizations with a view to an exchange of visits in the two countries of representatives of commercial and industrial concerns. The importance of this work to the United States may be understood from the fact that of the purchases from Germany last year there were 177,000,000 francs in machinery, while France purchased from the United States only 57,000,000 francs in this line. Germany supplied 103,000,000

Germans Control Hotels Another committee is being formed o consider the question of hotels nands of Germans, while those con-lucted by Frenchmen had mostly German and other foreign employees. One proposition is to establish a numer of hotel schools, such as the one already in operation at Thonon, where every branch of the hotel business is taught practically. French hotel keepof languages for their younger en the place of Germans, as the question of language has always been a weak oint with French employees.

Everywhere is seen evidence of the intention to follow strictly the injunctions of the official decree in the boycotting of German and Austrian products. In the stationery stores

Monsieur Lelievre, President of the industrial Defence Committee, states that the principal difficulty the Com-mittee encounters is in the case of houses which are practically known to be thoroughly German but continue business under names adopted for the contingency. There are no statistics giving the number of Germans occusied in commerce and manufacturing in Frence, mbut the proportion is very important and the Defence Committee proposes to ask for radical measures of protection against their continuation inder false colors.

Crawford, who is farming in the irrigated district near Lake Wichita, brought a bale of cotton to town ble, was that such men (whether they today and was offered 6.40 for it by a buyer without looking at the cotton, but refused to sell. He planted forty acres to cotton this year, and so far has picked 18 bales. He thinks, or rather feels sure that he can easily pick 10 more bales from the forty acres. Of the eighteen bales picked he has sold enough to pay his debts, and now has on his hands eight bales, together with the ten bales he expects to gather and which he intends to hold if necessary, for two years, or unit such time as the price will justify him to sell. He is a renter, and his condition, so far as finances are concerned, is about that of the average cotton farmer in this part of the State. They are well able to hold their own cotton without calling on the banks for money to tide them over. In a communication published in The Times a few weeks ago one of our bankers took occasion to say that while all the banks of the city had plenty of money to loan on cotton, that but few cotton farmers had taken advantage of the offer. The reason is that our farmers, as a rule, are not in debt and nost of them are depositors instead of borrowers of money. It speaks well for the condition of the country.

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
