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Has Sunk Many Prizes. The Emden has sunk twenty-two ships, mostly British and has captur ed one. Most of the time since last August she preyed on British sipping in the Indian Ocean but late last month she appeared at Penang on Malacca straits. Disguised, she steamed unchallenged under the British guns of the fort and fired torwhich sunk the Russian cruiser Jemtchug and a French destroyer She escaped unscathed. The vessels destroyed by the Emden had a total value of about 4,000,-000 exclusive of their cargoes. The Emden's largest gun was only four and a half inches. Her speed of 24.5 knots per hour was her greatest asset

Koenigsburg Bottled Up. The admirality's statement is 8 follows:

"After the whereabouts of the Koenigsburg had been indicated by the attack on the Pegasus September 19, a concentration of fast cruisers was arranged by the admiralty in East African waters and a thorough prolonged search by these vessels was made. The search resulted October 30 in the Koenisgburg being discovered by his majesty's steamship Chatham, hiding in shoal waters about six miles up the Rufiji river opposite Mafir Island, German East Owing to a greater draught Africa. the Chatham could not reach the Koenigsburg which probably is aground, except at high water.

"Part of the crew of the Koenigs burg has been landed and is entrenched on the banks of the river. Both these entrenchments and the Koenigsburg itself have been-bombarded by the Chatham but owing to the dense palm groves amid which the ship lies it is not possible to estimate the damage done. Pending operations for her capture or destruc tion, colliers have been sunk in the navigable channel to the river only she is now imprisoned and unable to do further harm. The fast vessels which have been searching for her are thus released for other Eervice

Emden Forced To Fight.

"Another search, by fast cruisers of the German cruiser Emden has een for some time in progress. In this search, which has covered ar immense area the British cruisers have been aided by the French, Russian and Japanese vessels working in harmony. The Australian warships Melbourne and Sydney also were included in these movements. Yesterday morning news was received that the Emden which had been complete ly lost sight of after the action with the Russian cruiser Remtchug had arrived at Keeling or Cocos Islands and landed an armed party to destroy the wireless station.

"Here she was caught and forced to fight by the Australian cruiser Sydney, Captain John Glossot. sharp action took place in which the Sydney suffered the loss of three mer killed and fifteen wounded. Emden was driven ashore and burned. Her losses in personnel are re ported as very heavy.
