

TURKISH FORT TAKES SHOT AT CRUISER TENNESSEE

WASHINGTON THINKS MISTAKE WAS MADE

DOES NOT BELIEVE FORT FIRED
AT BOAT WITH HOSTILE
INTENT

STEPS TAKEN BY AMBASSADOR

Orders Tennessee From Turkish Waters—Explanation is Awaited at Washington

Chios, Nov. 18.—The American armored cruiser Tennessee arrived today in this port. Yesterday while Captain Benton C. Decker was in the ship's launch, which was flying the American flag on his way to pay customary visits to Turkish officials at Smyrna three solid shots were fired on the boat by the fort. The American Ambassador Henry Morgenthau, without investigating the incident, it is said, immediately ordered the Tennessee from Turkish waters at the request of Turkish officials.

Washington, Nov. 18.—The United States cruiser Tennessee or her launch, probably the latter, was fired on yesterday by the Turkish forts at Smyrna. Captain Benton C. Decker of the cruiser reporting the incident today to the navy department, gave no details of the firing, but added that fears had been felt for the safety of the American consulate.

After awaiting further reports from Captain Decker, Ambassador Morgenthau and Consul-General Horton, officials here, have two theories. One is that the cruiser may have been sending a guard ashore to protect the consulate and Americans and other foreigners. They draw this from Captain Decker's statement that fears had been felt for the safety of the consulate. The other is that Capt. Decker had called on Consul-General Horton who after returning the call was being taken back to shore by the cruiser's launch which may have been returning after hours of entry which are very strict.

Officials who regard the incident as a misunderstanding of some kind say that had Captain Decker been convinced that the Turkish forts were firing on his ship as an act of hostility the big fighting machine would not have steamed away to the harbor of Chios without a further incident.

While there is no question whatever of the right of the Tennessee to protect Americans and their interests in the Mediterranean the question of protection of citizens of England, Russia and France which are at war with the Porte may raise a delicate situation.

SOME UNEASINESS RESULTS.
Captain Decker's report confirming last night's news dispatches, caused amazement among officials. Every effort is being made to get complete details. The captain's report does not say whether the Tennessee or her launch had been fired upon. There has been considerable uneasiness about the Tennessee and also the North Carolina, her sister ship, since they went to Turkish waters to look after Americans.

Heretofore Ambassador Morgenthau's reports concerning the safety of Americans have been reassuring. An undercurrent of uneasiness was created, however, when the Turkish commander at Beirut declared that for every Muslim killed in bombardment of an open or fortified fort, three British or French subjects must be slain. He added he could not take responsibility for uprisings of natives against Christians in such events.

Those Turkish officials who remained at the embassy here were confident that the firing was the act of some local official, which would be taken up quickly by the Constantinople government. England and France are asking their commanders in the Mediterranean about the incident.

BRITISH FLEET BOMBARDS POINTS ON BELGIAN COAST

German Military Base is Wrecked and Much Damage Done To Stores and Supplies

London, Nov. 18.—A Daily Mail Rotterdam dispatch says: "The British fleet received information Monday which led them to carry out a vigorous bombardment of Kiook and Zeebrugge on the Belgian coast. The Soubey Company's works on the Bruges ship canal, used as a base for German military trains, was wrecked. Much damage was done to the German stores and supplies."

AMERICAN OFFICERS STUDY EUROPE'S WAR

HAVE COMPLETE AND AUTHENTIC MAP OF EVERY PART OF WAR ZONE

EACH MOVEMENT IS FOLLOWED

Efforts To Compile Similar System of Maps in This Country Has So Far Failed

Washington, Nov. 18.—To the wonderfully complete maps of the European war zones, prepared by the war offices of the belligerents, American army officers owe the detailed study they are able to make of the troop movements in Belgium and France and to some extent, upon the Austrian-Russian, and German-Russian frontiers. When dispatches give the names of villages around which fighting is in progress, it is possible to turn to these maps and see at a glance the character of the country, its roads and byways with details of their construction and even to note the nature of the soil on slopes where the men will have to "dig in" to withstand the storm of rifle, machine guns and field piece fire.

"There are yet no such maps of this country. The European maps are the product of years of toil in preparation for war and those used by General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief, General French, the English leader, and the German chieftains undoubtedly are far more complete than any other foreign governments have been able to obtain showing the regions now torn by war.

With such maps at his disposal the commander can be far in the rear of his long battle line and yet know from moment to moment the exact nature of obstacles in any portion of the front he is facing. He could direct the places of entrenchment to within a few yards of any small detail of a factory of guns and could order forward his heavy artillery along a certain road with entire confidence that the road would carry the huge weight. There is no trail or bypath, ditch or stone fence that is not shown.

For nearly fifteen years the United States has been struggling in a godsend way to supplement its maps of this country so they would offer, to a very modest degree at least, the aid to military operations which European commanders have at hand. The work is known as the Progressive Military Map of the United States and officers are assigned to carry it forward in various parts of the country each year. A dual purpose is served by the assignment since the officers are given practical training in map making which would be invaluable to them in case of war.

The progress of fifteen years on the huge task is described by army officers as "insignificant," outside of its educational value. To obtain adequate maps for military operations covering every possible theatre of war in this country would mean the expenditure of enormous sums of money and no provision for such an achievement ever has been made. The work is being carried forward, however, and as fully as possible under the circumstances, and whenever officers are available they go out to gather data to be added to war department maps. It is possible more attention will be given to the work at a later date and be invaluable as indicating where to concentrate efforts and what changes are to be expected in any section from year to year.

GERMAN LANCES AMONG INTERESTING WAR RELICS

Manchester, Eng., Nov. 18.—Among the most interesting of the war trophies that have found their way over here," says the Manchester Guardian, "are some specimens of the German lance. It is not a wooden pole, but an eleven or twelve foot steel tube. It is very heavy and at first seems quite unmanageable to a man of ordinary strength. But two-thirds of the way down from the head towards the butt is a wrapping of thick twine to give a grip. And if you hold it there, and then only you find that it is so evenly poised that, as one admiring observer remarked, you could write your name with it.

"There have been some descriptions of cases where these tubular lances have crumpled up in action like an overloaded steel mast on a racing yacht. Perhaps that may be accounted for by the peculiar shape of the head. There is no point or spear head of any kind. Instead here is a solid piece of iron shaped exactly like the end of a giant kopie quare and quite blunt."

ARTILLERY DUELS FEATURE FIGHTING

FRENCH REPORT SAYS ALL OF ENEMY'S ATTACKS WERE REPULSED

STILL BOMBARDING RHEIMS

Bayonet Charge By Zouaves in Vicinity of Dixhoote Mentioned As Brilliant Feat

Paris, Nov. 18.—The French official statement given out today in Paris says that yesterday saw numerous artillery duels and some isolated infantry attacks all of which were repulsed. The text of the communication follows:

"The day of yesterday November 17 passed much as did the day before. There were numerous artillery exchanges and some isolated attacks on the part of the enemy's infantry, all of which were repulsed. From the North Sea to the Lys the front was subjected to a fairly active bombardment, particularly at Nieuport and to the east and to the south of Ypres. Near Dixhoote the Zouaves charged with the bayonet and brilliantly took possession of a forest which had been disputed between the enemy and ourselves for three days.

"To the south of Ypres an offensive movement on the part of the enemy's infantry was repulsed by our troops. The English army also maintains its front. From Arras to the Oise there is nothing new to report. In the region of Craonne, our artillery on several occasions secured the advantage over the batteries of the enemy. The bombardment of Rheims has continued.

"From Rheims to the Argonne there is nothing new to report. In the region of St. Mihiel, in spite of counter attacks by the Germans, we have retaken in our possession the western part of the village of Chauvignotte. In Alsace the reserve battalions sent into the action, of St. Marie-aux-Mines have had to be taken out for the reason that they lost one-half their effective strength."

REPORT RUSSIAN VICTORY ON FRONTIER OF RUMANIA

Austrian Troops Are Declared To Be Fleeing In Disorder In Bukovina Province

Petrograd, Nov. 18.—A dispatch from Marmorosh on the Austro-Rumanian frontier declares that furious fighting is going on in the northern part of the Bukovina. The Russian troops are described as victorious. As they advance the Austrians are fleeing in great disorder.

GALVESTON FIRE LOSS WILL REACH \$2,000,000

Export Business in Wheat Will Be Handled Through Two Other Elevators For Present

Galveston, Texas, Nov. 18.—Export wheat business which had been booked through the Southern Pacific elevator destroyed by fire yesterday, will be handled through the two public elevators at this port, according to an announcement given out today. An inquiry was begun today to determine if possible the cause of yesterday's conflagration. The loss is estimated at approximately \$2,000,000. The amount of salvage cannot even be estimated for several days. E. Zimraff and J. Roberts of Dallas, insurance adjusters are here in connection with the settlement.

BELGIANS NOW OCCUPY GERMAN QUARTER IN LONDON

London, Nov. 18.—By a strange stroke of fortune, says the Pall Mall Gazette, a large number of the Belgian refugees who have arrived in London are finding accommodation in a district which, before the outbreak of hostilities, formed one of the chief German colonies in the Metropolis—Forest Hill and Sydenham. Many of the visitors are well to do, and are renting good sized houses in the neighborhood while the less fortunate are being quartered on the German sympathizers. Although the German residents have gone back to Germany, there are still a number of their women folk around Forest Hill.

DEATH OF TWO GERMAN GENERALS IS REPORTED

Berlin, Nov. 18.—German casualty lists just issued record the death of two generals and the wounding of another. General Alfred Von Vrielen was killed November 12; General Von Loel is the other commanding officer reported dead. The capital of the Krupp Company is to be increased from 75,000,000 to 250,000,000 marks.

GERMANY REPORTS NEW POLAND BATTLE

COMMUNICATION CLAIMS GENERAL SUCCESS AGAINST RUSSIANS

FLANDERS FIGHT UNCHANGED

Situation In West Declared To Be The Same In Spite of Attacks at Many Points

Berlin, Nov. 18.—An official communication issued today by the German general staff says:

"Fighting in west Flanders continues and the situation on the whole remains unchanged. The enemy's attacks at the fort of Arras continue. French sorties to the south of Verdun were repulsed. An attack was made against our forces which had moved forward on the western bank of the Meuse near St. Mihiel; although it was originally successful for the enemy, it broke down completely later on. Our attacks to the southeast of Ciry compelled the French to surrender some of their positions. Chailion was stormed and taken by our troops.

"New battles have developed in Poland in the region north of Lodz but no decision yet has been reached. To the southeast of Soltau in east Prussia, the enemy has been forced to retire in the direction of Mlawka. On the extreme western wing, a strong Russian cavalry force which we defeated on November 16 and 17 has been driven back through Tilkallen."

Another official war bulletin given out in Berlin today sets forth that the operations on the eastern front are progressing favorably. The Germans apparently are using their victory at Wloclawek to very great advantage.

The Russian armies, defeated near Lipno, are today probably in the vicinity of Plock and the forces defeated near Wloclawek are now near Kutno and Leszyna. For the continuation of operations, the bulletin goes on to say it will be of the greatest importance for the German troops from the region of Sulda to make further progress against the right wing of the main Russian army.

If the Russians intend to retire behind the Vistula such a retreat considering the extremely bad condition of the roads would be most difficult, consequently the Russians probably prefer to make a definite stand when the German and Austrian forces attack.

MAJOR GENERAL WOTHERSPOON RECOMMENDS FORCE OF 205,000 MEN

FAVORS SYSTEM OF RESERVES

Says Would Be Impossible To Defend Panama or Colonies Under Present Conditions

Washington, Nov. 18.—Declaring it would be impossible to defend the Panama Canal and American territorial possessions against attacks with modern equipped armies unless they are reinforced rapidly, Major General Witherpoon, retired chief of staff, in his report today, recommended the increase of the regular army to a strength of 205,000 enlisted men.

STRAY MEXICAN BULLET WOUNDS AMERICAN AT NACO

Naco, Ariz., Nov. 18.—R. H. Reynolds, United States customs inspector, was shot through the left leg by a stray bullet when the Maytorena forces made a general attack upon the Carranza garrison of Naco, Sonora. Reynolds was in a hotel on the American side of the line. The bone of the leg was shattered. The artillery of the attackers was not well directed and shrapnel burst frequently over the bomb proofs of the American troops guarding the border.

ABSINTHE IS BARRED IN COLONIES OF FRANCE

COMMITTEE WILL HANDLE COTTON FUND

LOCAL AID WILL BE SOUGHT IN DISTRIBUTION OF \$135,000 LOAN

FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD BUSY

Committees Will Be Named In All Cotton Producing States To Advise As to Distribution

Washington, Nov. 18.—With the \$135,000,000 cotton loan fund fully subscribed steps were taken today to clear the way for the actual transfer of the money to southern cotton producers. The federal reserve board acting as a central committee which has general supervision of the fund, carried out the provisions of the understanding with subscribing banks by naming W. P. G. Harding and Paul M. Warburg of the board, A. H. Wiggin and James S. Alexander of New York, James H. Morgan of Chicago, Festus J. Wade of St. Louis, Levi L. Rue of Philadelphia and William A. Gaston of Boston a "cotton loan committee" which shall actively administer the fund.

The first meeting will be held in New York probably on Friday and plans laid for carrying out its purposes. Its first task will be the appointment of committees in each of the cotton producing states which will act there. The state committee in turn will select local committees in sufficient number to safeguard the workings of the plan through familiarity with local conditions and knowledge of applicants for loans.

The committee will be chosen as quickly as possible, but with care since loans must be approved by state committees before coming to the attention of the cotton loan committee, the final arbiter. Although no definite decision has been reached, it is probable the officers of the cotton loan committee will be in New York.

WILL TEST INTRASTATE LIQUOR SHIPMENTS SOON

Case Under Allison Law To Come Up Shortly in Fort Worth Court

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 18.—A test of intrastate liquor shipments will be made by Perry Coleman of Fort Worth, it was announced here today by his attorney, former Senator W. A. Hanson. Already a test case of interstate shipments under the Allison law has resulted in the higher courts dealing the law a severe blow; now it is planned to take up the intrastate shipments. The fight will begin in the district court here and will be carried to the court of criminal appeals.

ENGLAND "DISAPPOINTED" AT FAILURE OF ZEPPELINS

People Seem Almost Sorry That Threatened Invasion Has Not Materialized

Manchester, Eng., Nov. 18.—Speculating on the possibility of a Zeppelin raid on London, the Manchester Guardian says there is a noticeable feeling of disappointment in England over the non-appearance of these airships. While the Zeppelin would not be really welcome, there were those at home so lingering for excitement that as a whole England seemed ready to take the risk.

"It was coldly calculated that even if fifty Zeppelins were sent over their concentrated devastation could not cover more than six acres—or if they dropped all their bombs on the 'square mile' that makes up the city of London proper they could kill something under one in a hundred of the people who happened to be there.

"Over the whole of London, taking the Metropolitan Police area, the chances of escaping would be about 70,000 to one. Over what may be described as the central area of London, within which a Zeppelin might be expected to operate, the chances of escape would be about 1,500 to one.

"Personally, I think it would be a good job if the Zeppelins did come. Even if they did drop a few bombs, the stimulus to recruiting would be worth what little was done," says Frank Hedges Butler, who is founder of the Royal Aero Club.

SAYS GERMANS LOSE 2,700 IN FIGHTING AT DIXMUDE

OFFENSIVE RESUMED BY GERMANS ON EAST FRONT

Turn Suddenly On Pursuers And Now Again Threaten Warsaw— Russia Claims Invasion Unchecked

London, Nov. 18.—No change in the operations in Russian Poland has been more startling than the sudden resumption of the offensive on the part of the Germans, a movement by which the heart of the Russians has been attacked and Warsaw again threatened. As usual there are conflicting reports. Petrograd does not deny that the Germans have resumed the offensive, but dispatches from the Russian capital declare that such a movement will not cause the slightest diversion of the Russian invasion of East Prussia, which is proceeding slowly, but steadily.

Meanwhile Berlin claims a victory near Litno, impelling the Russian forces, which according to German reports must take a stand before crossing the Vistula river as a retirement behind that stream would be too difficult. Berlin reports that the Russians are near Kutno, but Vienna claims a victory for her allies at this victory.

The giving out by the admiralty of the official report of the capture of the British cruiser Glasgow in the naval engagement November 1 off the coast of Chile settles beyond question the fate of the cruisers Good Hope and Monmouth, but offers no solution to the mystery of the battleship Canopus. According to the Glasgow report, Rear Admiral Sir Christopher Craddock, commander of the British squadron signalled the Canopus that he was about to engage the enemy. This is the only mention in connection with this engagement of this British battleship.

EXTREMELY VIOLENT BATTLES WAGED FOR FOUR DAYS AROUND SOLDAU

Paris, Nov. 18.—The Havas dispatch from Petrograd is as follows:

"A terrific battle of unexampled violence has been proceeding for four days around Soldau. The cannonading has ben maintained night and day. The Russians are endeavoring, at any cost, to avenge their check at Soldau and are throwing themselves at the Germans with indescribable fury. They have carried position after position by assault in spite of the infernal fire of the Germans. In spite of torrential rains which have turned the ground into a quagmire the Russians are advancing toward the interior of Germany.

CARRANZA REPUDIATES HIS PROMISE TO RETIRE

In Spite Of Renewed Efforts For Peace, Both Sides Make Warlike Movements

Washington, Nov. 18.—General Carranza has repudiated the telegram sent for him by Gen. Pablo Gonzales to General Gutierrez in which the first chief was reported as saying he would retire. This was announced today in an official dispatch from American Consul Silliman. Carranza declared he had been misunderstood.

In the telegram which Gonzales sent on behalf of Carranza the first chief was described as ready to resign if both he and Villa relinquished their commands. No mention was made of the man to whom the executive power was to be delivered and Carranza now declares that he never intended to resign in favor of Gutierrez and will not deliver his place to any other man whom he would trust to carry out conditions that he imposes.

While American Consul Silliman reported that efforts were being made to patch up the difficulties through intermediaries, other official advice said movements were under way and that a battle was imminent north of Mexico City where the Villa troops are now advancing southward.

MASS MEETING FOR GAS STOVE FACTORY

The meeting was called by R. E. Huff, president of the Chamber of Commerce, at the request of the manufacturers committee of that organization. This committee has worked out a plan for the organization of a stock company with ample capital to handle the business and already two-thirds of the stock has been subscribed.

Has Been Demonstrated. The plant of the size in view of the Chamber of Commerce committee will employ about 35 skilled mechanics at the start, and if the necessary capital is subscribed at once a charter will be secured immediately and arrangements made for the opening of the factory within the next sixty or ninety days.

Understands American Ideas Probably Better Than Anyone in French Republic

By Associated Press. Bordeaux, Nov. 18.—Georges Clemenceau, although he holds office no longer, still remains one of the commanding figures in French public life.

It is now 44 years since he came to Bordeaux as a member of the National Assembly. Even then when all appeared lost, he declared that France would rise again and vindicate herself and he has worked ceaselessly throughout his long and brilliant career to bring about the realization. It was with that end in view that he effected the understanding with England, so fruitful in its results not only on French foreign policy but on the French national character.

He is back in Bordeaux once more under greatly different circumstances. His only regret is that he may not live to see the end of the great epoch through which Europe is beginning to pass.

GERMAN SOLDIERS MARRY BEFORE LEAVING FOR FRONT

Hundreds Claim Their Brides on Eve of Departure For Scene of Battle

By Associated Press. Berlin, Nov. 17.—"War marriages" will materially increase the number of marriages for Berlin this year. When the war broke out many officers and in some cases privates of the reserve and landwehr decided to marry on the eve of their departure for the front with the result that August 1914 shows a total of marriages for Berlin of 5793 as against 1399 for the same month of last year. In the mobilization week, August 2-8, 3941

marriage contracts were made, of which the largest number was due to the outbreak of the war. The first seven months of 1914 showed 11,620 marriages as against 11,620 in 1913.

It is believed here that the number of marriages in Berlin due to the war is not far below 4,500. Some of them had been planned for the autumn and winter seasons and it is expected that for this reason the average for these months will fall below normal. This has already been demonstrated by the records for September in which month 1,570 marriages took place as against 1,832 in September 1913; for 1914, up to and including September the number of marriages is 18,436 as against 14,761 for the same period of 1913.

The outbreak of the war has also materially influenced for the better the legitimization of children born out of wedlock. In nearly all cases this was done by the father of the

child marrying its mother. While in August 1913 only 158 children were legitimized, their number in August 1914 was 1,048 of which number all but five were given a proper status before the law by marriage. In the first seven months of 1914 only 1,409 children were legitimized as against 1,492 for the same period in 1913.

CORPORATION COMMISSION FOR TEXAS IS PROPOSED

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Nov. 18.—Small public utilities corporations in Texas would be materially affected in the event of passage by the Thirty-fourth Legislature of a proposed bill patterned after the Wisconsin law providing for the creation of a State Corporation Commission. This proposed bill has been prepared by Acting Secretary of State D. A. Gregg and it is said, would have been introduced at the recent special session had the

governor been assured of its consideration in the legislature. The measure is to be introduced at the next regular session. It is stated here a corporation is created it is said many small companies would be put to the expense of employing attorneys to represent them before the commission, while larger concerns would put to little expense having the own organization of attorneys, etc. to look after their interests.

On November 28th, Baylor county will have an election on the question of local option. The county has been in the dry column for about ten years, during which time the population of the county and that of the principal towns in it has been more than doubled. This splendid progress, compared with the five years the county was in the wet column, shows a considerable balance in favor of the dry side of the question. However, this is a matter for the people of Baylor county themselves to settle, and they will do to their own satisfaction on the 28th.

Tonight there is to be a mass meeting at the Chamber of Commerce rooms, at which time a proposition will be submitted that, if accepted, will secure for Wichita Falls another manufacturing enterprise—one that will give employment from 30 to 35 men. As The Times understands it, the proposition is to organize a stock company for the manufacture and sale of the Ziegler gas heating stove. Mr. Ziegler, who owns the patents on the stove, has long been a citizen of Wichita Falls, and while he has propositions to organize his company in another city and establish his plant, he prefers to stay in Wichita Falls, and if the people in this city will subscribe for part of the stock—about \$10,000—the stove factory will be established here. There can be no question that the stove is a success. More than three hundred have already been made, and about one hundred are now in use in this city, and so far as The Times is aware, every one of them is giving entire satisfaction. Attend the meeting tonight. This is the proposition. If you do not want to subscribe for any of the stock, there is not any danger of it being forced on you. It is just a plain business proposition, and one that the people of this city should not turn down.

Applications for charters for about one dozen cotton mills have been filed down at Austin. The low price of cotton probably has caused this, and to that extent Texas will be benefited. There should be cotton mills in every cotton market of any importance in the State, and if this was true now the price of cotton would not be as low as now. If anything, the construction of cotton mills in Texas is a plan which to boost the price of cotton than the "buy-back" movement or any other plan or scheme that has yet been suggested. If the next legislature will pass a law exempting cotton mills from taxation for twenty years, that of itself should be sufficient inducement to have a number of cotton mills constructed during the next few years.—Wichita Daily Times.

Texas capitalists should not wait for the legislature or the people to exempt cotton mills from taxation before beginning the work of erection and establishing enterprises that mean so much for the country. We have a few cotton factories in Texas now—one in Denison, and it is a success—they are all successful, and the building of more such institutions would not injure their business in the least, on the contrary would promote it. The South will never come into its own until it has exhausted every effort towards the establishment of mills, factories and enterprises of whatsoever character having for their purpose the manufacture of its immense raw product into the finished article, thereby maintaining the balance of trade by being both producer and seller of the world's necessities.—Denison Herald.

future of our city is as sure as gold bonds. But the Democrat has its figures rather high. Wichita Falls manufacturing concerns are paying a great deal less than eight cents per thousand cubic feet for natural gas. Some of them have a rate as low as four cents per thousand cubic feet, and none of them pay as much as eight cents except the smaller concerns, which are not recognized in the manufacturing class by the gas companies, and they pay the regular domestic rate of 25 cents per thousand feet.

THE FUTURE WILL BE DIFFERENT—THE PAST A BAD DREAM.

President Wilson, in answer to a letter from Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo announcing the opening of the federal reserve banks, concludes it with the following: "The future will be very different from the past, which we shall presently look back upon, I venture to say, as 'the bad dream.' The future will be different in action and different in spirit, a time of healing, because it will be a time of just dealing and cooperation between men made equal before the law, in fact, as well as in name. I am speaking of this new banking system, which it seems to me symbolizes all of it. The opening of the federal reserve banks seems to me to be the principal agency we have created for the emancipation we seek. The 16th of November, 1914, will be a date as marking the time when we were able to realize just what had happened.

"In the anxious times through which we have been passing you have, my dear Mr. Secretary, been able to do many noteworthy things to strengthen and facilitate the business conditions of the country. Henceforth you have a new instrument at hand which will render many parts of your task easy. I heartily congratulate you upon the part you yourself have played in its conception and creation, and upon the successful completion of the difficult work of organization. A new day has dawned for the beloved country whose fasting property and happiness we so earnestly desire. Sincerely yours, "WOODROW WILSON."

CHANCES FOR WAR.

The United States is bound to Europe by a thousand ties. Every one of these ties is like a Spanish net. The commerce of this country spreads like every sea, and it is the duty of the government to protect it. Americans numbering many thousands are in Turkey, where anti-Christian riots and butcheries are likely to follow the outbreak of war. Bellicent nations are assailing the world to hold up search and seize vessels from the United States carrying cargoes which in the opinion of the belligerent nation—not necessarily in the opinion of this country—are contraband of war. An infringement upon the neutral rights of the United States is likely to occur at any time requiring this government to demand respect for its

rights, and to be prepared to back up its demand by force, if necessary.

It is to the interest of some of the warring nations to embroil the United States in war. No doubt plotting and counter-plotting is going on with this end in view.

It is the plain duty of the United States to take stock of its defenses—its army, its navy, and its fortifications. Is it prepared to defend itself? In the collisions among the nations the interests of the United States are ignored and its rights trampled upon. Is it in a position to step forward and maintain its rights? Who will defend the United States if it will not or cannot defend itself?

No nation will deliberately seek war with the United States if it is able to protect itself. Its rights will be carefully respected if it makes plain to the world that it will enforce such respect. But if it adopts the Chinese policy of peace at any price, contenting itself with feeble protests when its territory is violated or its rights trampled upon, it is likely to have war thrust upon it, whether it wants it or not.—Washington Post.

ALLISON LIQUOR LAW REHEARING DENIED TODAY

Court of Criminal Appeals Adheres To Its Former Ruling On Liquor Measure

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Nov. 18.—The court of criminal appeals today refused motion for rehearing in the liquor case which involves Section 5 of the Allison liquor law. The action of the court today settles the question and means that the court of criminal appeals adheres to its former opinion in holding that interstate shipments of intoxicating liquor may be delivered in prohibition territory if such deliveries or shipments are not to be used in violation of any of the laws of the state.

SOCIAL CLUB CASE BEFORE APPELLATE COURT TODAY

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Nov. 18.—The third court of civil appeals was to hear today the bonafide social club case, which is styled State of Texas vs. the Country Club, from Travis county. This is the case in which Judge Wilcox of the Twenty-sixth district court of Travis county, held that bonafide social clubs may dispense intoxicating liquors to its members on all days of the week except election days.
