LITTLE NEWS FROM EAST FRONT

Austrians Being Pushed Back On Cracow Where Siege Prepara-tions Are Under Way

By Associated Press. London, Dec. 1.—Unofficial reports that the Germans again have attacked Ypres marking the beginning of a great battle, received no confirmation in teday's communications from the French and German war offices. The French statement contains vague reference to renewed German attacks in the region in which they have been expected to try to break through to the English channel. It is said that the enemy was showing considerable activity north of Arras. Germany continues to give no intimation of a reversal by the Russians. Today's announcement says 9500 more prisoners have been taken in the engagement near the Vietula River which were said yesterday in Berlin to have resulted favorably for Germany. Official Petrograd maintains its attitude of reserve. Such reports as are made by any of the three nations engaged in the East deal only with particular phases of

the campaign so that the picture as a whole is blurred. The Russian advance is pushing the Austrians back into Cracow. Inform tion reaching Lemberg is that the Austrians are evacuating position af-ter position with great losses. It is stated that the Austrian line of retreat is strewn so thickly with dead that the Russians have not time to bury them. The cold is so severe that the bodies are frozen. German officers are said to be in supreme control at Cracow. They are placing machine guns, light artillery and wireless apparatus, it is reported, on the cathedral and other historic edifices drawing the fire of the Russians to these buildings. Recent arrival from the provinces of the Galicia state that the inhabitants of all the regions evacuated by the Russians are facing famine.
