**VOLUNTEERS ARE CALLED FOR BLOOD TRANSFUSION**

**Former Oklahoman Needs 32 Ounces To Save Life—Sons Cannot Give Enough**

By Associated Press. Portland, Ore., Nov. 30.—Volunteers have been called for by Portland surgeons to give blood to save the life of Charles L. Botsford of Portland, former district judge of Norman, Okla., and secretary of the board of regents of Oklahoma University. Two sons of Mr. Botsford will give several ounces, but 32 ounces will be needed. Mr. Botsford has been suffering for nine years with pernicious anemia and last week underwent an operation for the removal of his spleen. The blood fusion, the doctors believe, will save his life.

**ARKANSAS PLANS LAW ON MINIMUM WAGE FOR WOMEN**

By Associated Press. Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 30.—A minimum wage and maximum hour law affecting the employment of women in the various pursuits will be presented to the Arkansas legislature which meets in January according to J. C. Clary, labor commissioner today. The bill will provide that no woman can be employed more than fifty-four hours a week and that no woman less than eighteen years old be permitted to work before 7 a. m. and after 9 p. m. A scale of wages of not less than one dollar a day is provided.

**PRAIRIE OIL VALUATION SUBJECT OF HEARING**

By Associated Press. Oklahoma City, Nov. 30.—The State board of equalization was to hear here today the matter of increasing the assessment of taxes against the Prairie Oil and Gas Co. from \$35,000,000 to \$69,000,000. The increase in valuation proposed by state "fixers" would be on facilities and investments of the company in pipe lines, leases and equipment, but not on stored oils. The tax fixers insist that, while the supreme court has ruled that leases can not be taxed, as such, the added value to the stock of the company as a result of ownership of valuable oil and gas leases, is a legitimate subject for taxation.

**SUPPLY OF REVENUE STAMPS EXHAUSTED**

**LAW BECOMES EFFECTIVE TO MORROW AND TROUBLE MAY RESULT**

**NEARLY EVERYONE AFFECTED**

**Very Few Will Escape Paying Few Cents To Help Government's Revenue**

With the new internal revenue law taking effect after midnight tonight imposing a stamp tax on many articles and transactions in law and commerce, the supply of revenue stamps in Wichita Falls was practically exhausted today and the lack of stamps may be a serious hindrance to business tomorrow. This will be true especially in reference to the tax imposed on cosmetics, toilet waters and similar articles for which the supply of stamps this morning was entirely inadequate. Several orders of these stamps were expected to arrive today, but if they fail to get in on schedule time colorless faces tomorrow will need no other explanation.

**SUPREME COURT AT WASHINGTON DECLARES IT CONSTITUTIONAL**

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 30.—The judgment of the Oklahoma federal courts which refused to enjoin the operations of the Alabama Jim Crow law was affirmed today by the supreme court. The lower court held the law unconstitutional notwithstanding the section which provides sleeping, parlor and chair cars for white persons only.

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**EDITOR OF LABOR PAPER SENTENCED FOR CONTEMPT**

By Associated Press. Stockton, Cal., Nov. 28.—F. P. Lamoreaux, editor of the Stockton Labor News, was sentenced today to serve five days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$250 for contempt by Judge C. W. Norton of the superior court. Lamoreaux began serving his sentence at once; six other labor leaders who were cited for contempt were adjudged not guilty. Since last July when the Merchants and Manufacturers and Employers Association declared Stockton an "open shop" town a bitter fight has been waged by the employees and the labor unions. The citation of the editor for contempt resulted from an editorial charging Judge Norton with issuing restraining orders against picketing whenever asked by the Employers Association.

**GERMANY DECLARED ON DEFENSIVE NOW**

**FRENCH REPORT TELLS OF CHANGE IN FLANDERS SITUATION**

**CLAIM OF PROGRESS IS MADE**

**Artillery Fire of Enemy is Said To Be Feeble—Attacks in Argonne Repulsed**

By Associated Press. Paris, Nov. 30.—The French official communication given out in Paris this afternoon, is as follows: "In Belgium, the enemy is remaining on the defensive. The artillery fire has been feeble and we have made progress at certain points. In the vicinity of Fay we hold securely the positions we occupied on November 28. In the region of Solassons there has been an intermittent artillery fire directed against the town. In the Argonne several attacks on the town of Bugattele were repulsed by our troops. There has been a heavy fog on the heights of the Meuse.

**GENERAL JOFFRE SEES NEWSPAPERMEN**

**IS "INTERVIEWED" BY PARTY FROM PARIS AT HIS HEADQUARTERS**

By Associated Press. Paris, Nov. 30.—A representative of the Havas Agency together with a party of Paris newspaper men has been received by General Joffre at his headquarters. This is the first time since the outbreak of the war that the commander in chief has consented to see the press. The correspondent says: "The office from which the general directs operations is in a public school in a small town. The correspondents were at once shown up and as they entered the general rose from his desk and stood, like the middle of the room. He was in uniform with top boots and tunic, but wore no decorations. He was just as all Frenchmen picture him. His features reflect the character of a man of every line showing combination of energy and goodness, gentleness and firmness. The formidable fears and anxieties have not bent the athletic frame. His whole personality breathes physical and moral vigor in the highest degree.

**BELFORT ALSATIAN TOWN IS NOT AFRAID OF GERMANS**

**By Associated Press. Belfort, Nov. 30.—"You know," said one of the old Alsacians who sought refuge in this last little corner of Alsace that was saved to France after the war of 1870, "they can't do much more than they did before, while we can do a lot more."**

"The news had just arrived that the Germans were forcing the fighting in Upper Alsace and the sound of cannoning was heard in the distance. The town was none the less tranquil for that most of the inhabitants shared the confidence of this old veteran, who, as he talked, pointed significantly to the great 'Lion of Belfort' that Bartholdi carved in the solid red sandstone on which the citadel is built. The Germans are, no doubt sure they can do 'a lot more' than in 1870. They undoubtedly will, if they can bring up their 17 men mortars but their troubles will begin farther down the 'Belfort Gap'—the open space between where the Jura mountains end and where the Vosges begin. It is an inviting target for an invader which is capable of many deceptions. Colonel Denfert Rochereau, with 17,000 men, could not prevent General Treskow with a whole army from installing his heavy artillery on the Lower Perches and the Upper Perches, the heights to the southeast of the town that dominate the citadel but he prevented them from taking the town and after 103 days of continuous bombardment, marched out only because his own government ordered him to do so.

**WOUNDED, FORCED TO LIE BETWEEN TWO BATTLE LINES**

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—The terrible plight of a German officer of dragoons on the western battlefield is vividly described by the Cologne Volkszeitung. While on patrol duty the officer received a shot through both thighs. He fell from his horse and lay helpless all night in the field. He could see next morning that he was just between two battle lines before him the French in trenches and behind him the Germans. Firing began on both sides.

**CAPTAIN OF STEAMSHIP IS LOST AT SEA SUNDAY**

New Orleans, Nov. 30.—J. S. Boyd, captain of the Southern Pacific steamship Morus was lost at sea sometime during Sunday night, it became known, when the boat arrived here from New York. He was missed at 3 o'clock Sunday morning and passengers assumed he fell overboard. He was one of the oldest captains in the New York-New Orleans passenger service.

**LEAGUE BASEBALL AGAIN IS PROMISED**

**WICHITA FALLS MAY RE-ENTER TEXAS-OKLAHOMA CIRCUIT IN 1915**

**BEN WILLIAMS PLANNING TEAM**

**Would Use Old Park—Hops To Bring Federal Teams Back For Spring Training Season**

From Monday's Daily. Wichita Falls may be represented again during the coming season in the Texas-Oklahoma League. The matter will be taken up at a meeting of the league directors to be held in Denison sometime in December. If a franchise is granted, as it is believed it will be, the work of organizing a team will be taken up at once. B. C. Williams, who so successfully managed an independent team in 1909, is at the head of the movement in which he has the support of a number of substantial business men. He has been assured ample backing in the enterprise. Negotiations are in progress for a lease on the old ball park grounds at the end of Seventh street east of the railroad tracks. A lease on the City Park in Floral Heights will also be asked. If these parks can be secured and a franchise in the Texas-Oklahoma League is granted, the work of building bleachers, grandstand and bleachers at the old park site will be started at once and negotiations taken up with league teams to make this city their training quarters.

**FEDERALS COMING BACK**

**The Kansas City team in the Federal League is already under contract to train at the lake grounds this season. Efforts will be made to bring two more Federal League teams here, one to train at the City Park grounds and the other at the old park grounds. In the event Federal League teams cannot be secured teams of other leagues will be invited. The matter will be taken up with Federal League teams first because it is believed it would be of advantage to them for two or three teams of that league to train in the same town. Under Mr. Williams' management an independent team here in 1909 was self supporting and the fans were given the best baseball they ever saw here. Mr. Williams already has several young players, mostly college men in view and it is certain that he would have no trouble in getting together a team that would make a good showing in the Texas-Oklahoma League.**

Former Venture Recalled. Wichita Falls put the Texas-Oklahoma League into existence and for two seasons its team won the pennant. The team, however, was a losing venture financially and the franchise was given up in 1912. It is believed with the ball park closer to the business section and more popular support that a team could be made self-supporting or nearly so.

**PENALTY FOR NON-PAYMENT OF WAR TAX STARTS TODAY**

Nov. 30.—All persons subject to the special emergency revenue tax or war tax falling to pay the amount due the federal government are subject to a penalty after today, according to Collector of Internal Revenue A. S. Walker. The penalty is 50 per cent of the tax assessed and Mr. Walker says there are thousands of persons in Texas who had not up to this morning paid the amount due. The tax now due is for the period from Nov. 1, 1914 to June 30, 1915—two-thirds of the tax for the full year. The documentary stamp tax becomes effective tomorrow. The levy against tobacco dealers, brokers, etc., is the tax now due.

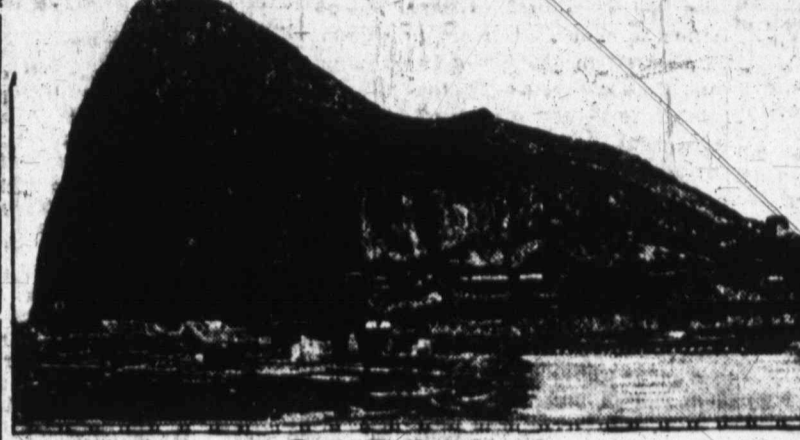

GIBRALTAR HELD TO BE IMPREGNABLE



ROCK OF GIBRALTAR

FUTURE events may test the claim which many military authorities make that the British fortress of Gibraltar holds the key to the Mediterranean. W. D. Hornaday writes in the Pittsburgh Gazette-Times. When viewed from the sea this famous rock that rises out of the sandy plains in the extreme southwestern corner of continental Europe is not so imposing as one who has read of its history might be led to expect, but when closely approached and there comes into sight some of the evidence of what the hand of man has wrought in making it an impregnable fortress, it presents an awe-inspiring spectacle.

SPANISH TOWN A SUBURB

The Spanish town, a suburb of the promontory with the mainland is neutral territory; it lies so low that from the sea Gibraltar has the appearance of an island. The Spanish town of Linea de la Concepcion, practically a suburb of Gibraltar, on the mainland, fronts the isthmus and the neutral ground, the Spanish boundary being marked by a double line of sentry boxes.

THE PROMONTORY, OR "ROCK OF GIBRALTAR," COMPOSED OF GRAY PRIMRY MARBLE, IS IN THE FORM OF AN ENORMOUS HILL.

The promontory, or "Rock of Gibraltar," composed of gray primary marble, is in the form of an enormous hill. Although it has a barrel aspect, algaros, cacti, palmitas, capers and asparagus grow in the crevices; and there are grassy, wooded glens in certain parts.

### MANY AMERICAN SHOES BEING SOLD IN ENGLAND

Are Competing To Very Large Extent With Footwear Manufactured There

By Associated Press.  
Manchester, Dec. 2.—The Guardian calls attention to the fact that agents for American shoe manufacturers are already in England studying the situation brought about by the extraordinary demand for shoes to supply the troops, and the paper predicts there will be another invasion of American shoes unless English firms keep their prices low and make unusual efforts to meet the immediate demand for marching boots of all sorts.  
So far the British government has been forced to take almost any sort of boots it could obtain for its troops. It was impossible at the outset to stick to regulation service boots and conditions do not improve to a marked degree in spite of the fact that most manufacturers are working extra time.  
As much of the best box calf used in high grade men's shoes came from Germany there is a dearth of this sort of material. "Kips" the leather from which the uppers of standard army boots are made, are double the price they were before the war.

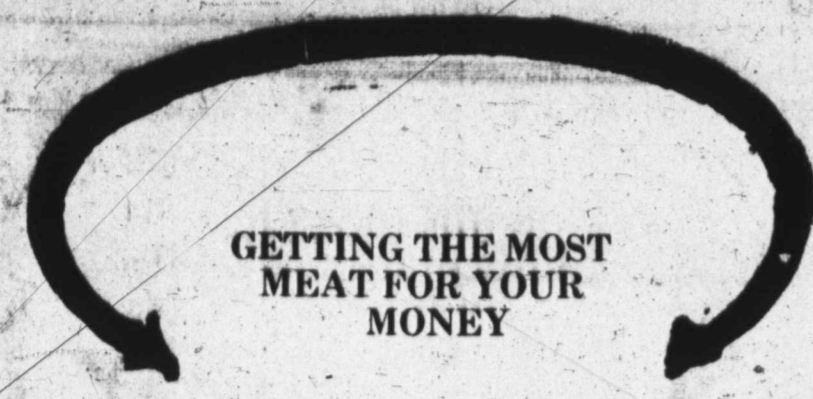

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Dec. 4.—A settlement of the Texas Business Men's Association suit as far as the railroads of Texas who were named defendants are concerned was reached today but neither the attorneys of the railroads and Attorney General Looney, after a conference held in the Attorney General's office. The agreed judgments were filed in the 26th district court.

AUTOS LITTLE USED

IN AMERICAN ARMY

ROADS NOT GOOD ENOUGH TO PERMIT THEIR ADOPTION

Washington, Nov. 3.—The American army mule need have no fear for his laurels because of the great part gasoline motors have played in transportation problems of European armies in the present war. Until American roads generally are brought up to the high standard of the roads of Germany, France, Belgium and other European countries, the army mule will determine through his capacity for hauling the limitation of operations for American military forces.

Only one branch of the United States army is giving serious attention to motor transport. It is the quartermaster's department, experiments are being made, particularly along the Texas border with handling supplies in motor trucks. Motor trucks are in general use, of course, about army posts and wherever good roads are available, but when manœuvres take place in hilly or muddy country roads, where more wheels than horse shoes are the only highways, the six-wheeled team is still master of the transportation situation.

Recent Experiments.

A few years ago it was determined to experiment with motor transportation as a means to increase the radius of field artillery. The most available subject for this purpose was the battery wagon, carrying the forges for gun repairs and horse shoes, and also the saddler's equipment. One such wagon accompanies every battery of artillery in the field. It trails along in the rear of the column and does not go into action. Thus its activities are largely confined to roads, although the battery itself must go cross lots by field and streams, take sharp turns against approaching hostile forces.

General Crozier, chief of the army ordnance bureau, designed a motor battery wagon which was tried out in manœuvres. It proved a flat failure, for it was so heavy that it broke through bridges, sunk to the hubs in soft roads and generally hampered the battery to which it was attached. The experiment was abandoned and the ordnance bureau is now content to await the results of the experiments of the quartermaster's department in self-propelled army transportation units.

Different in This Country.

In many ways, army officers believe, the present war will have little effect on the development of American military transportation equipment. The armies of Germany, France and to some extent England are equipped to fight in the highly developed territory which is the present theatre of war. Transfer them to the interior of the United States and the greater part of their motor equipment and much of their heavy artillery would be found almost useless. It is said. They would have to be re-equipped with horse and mule transportation. The difficulties encountered by German troops who crossed the Russian border, officers say, were those of transportation. Poor roads made it impossible for them to move guns and supplies as their tactical training directed. Several big guns were lost without having fired a shot, it is reported, because they could not be withdrawn swiftly.

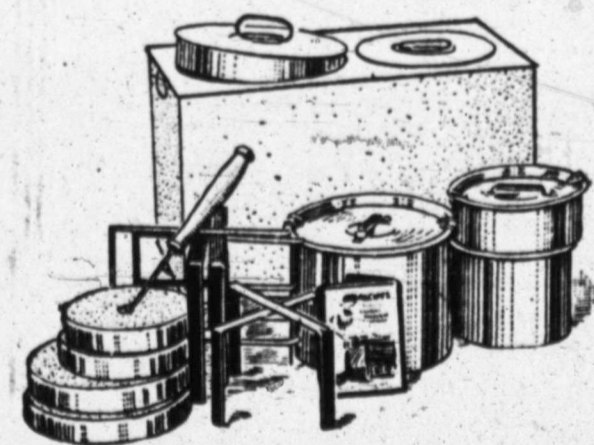

**Tetrazzini Gives a Brilliant Performance of the Great "Linda" Air**

The story of "Linda di Chamounix" tells of an aged couple, Loustolot and Madeline, and their only daughter Linda, who dwell in the valley of the Chamounix (in the French Alps). Linda loves a young painter, Charles, who has come to the valley to paint the mountains. The Marquis de Sirval, who holds a mortgage on Loustolot's farm, visit the old couple and assures them that he will not press the mortgage; but at the same time he is secretly plotting to effect the ruin of Linda.

Linda enters and speaks of her love for Charles. She then sings the gem of the first act, a favorite with coloratura sopranos for more than seventy years. This air, while primarily intended as a vehicle for vocal display, is so spontaneous in its gaiety and so genial in melody, as to possess exceptional captivating charm for a song of this type. In this performance we hear Tetrazzini at her best. The brightness and joy of the opening phrases, the golden notes, the piquant delivery, together constitute a triumph of the true Italian vocal art—the real bel canto. In the second verse a series of elaborations are introduced, bringing in the high C and even D in Alt, and these are effected with a boldness and certainty which amaze the listener. The singing of the chromatic runs for the middle of the voice in the finale, again, is a feat of another kind, which shows artistic mastery over every detail of the singer's art.
