## SEVERAL BILLS ARE REPORTED IN SENATE

### ADVERSE REPORT ON ABOLITION OF DEATH PENALTY IN TEXAS

### INSURANCE LAW AMENDMENTS

#### Bill Would Make Possible Return of Big Corporations Which Left State in 1907.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 21.—Senator Wiley's bill eliminating the death penalty was reported adversely this morning by Senate Judiciary committee No. 2 but will be brought out by a favorable minority report. This committee reported favorable on the Clark bill which provides additional pay for district attorneys. The Conner bill exempting Confederate soldiers from the anti-pass law was reported favorably.

Senator Westbrook's bill which would render null and void all common law marriages received a favorable report as did also his bill providing that no interest contract shall exceed ten per cent.

Senator Gibson is expected to introduce this afternoon his bill amending the Robertson insurance law, so as to provide for a graduated tax on life insurance companies. This bill eliminates the back penalties charged to the 21 big life insurance companies which left the State when the Robertson insurance law was passed.

## OFFICER FACES CHARGE OF MURDER AT HOUSTON

### Woman Is Alleged Victim; Defendant Found On Street With Wound in Head

Houston, Texas, Jan. 21.—Taking testimony was begun today in the trial of Jack Kellett, charged with the murder of Mrs. India Thompson last August. Kellett for many years was a peace officer and at the time of the tragedy was a Democratic nominee for constable.

Two hours after the finding of Mrs. Thompson in a dying condition from gunshot wounds in some grounds adjoining a cemetery, Kellett was found wandering the streets with pistol wounds in his head and was unable to talk. It was not until several hours connected.

The body of the dead woman was first identified by her husband who, while standing near the morgue, heard of a body being there and stepped in, only to discover it to be that of his wife.

### DACIA'S CARGO INSURED, BUT NOT HER HULL

Washington, Jan. 21.—No insurance on the hull of the steamer Dacia now at Galveston, Texas, will be granted by the federal war risk insurance bureau but a policy will be issued probably today on her cargo of cotton. A distinction between the cargo and hull of the Dacia has been found by the bureau, on the ground that the title on the cotton is absolutely vested in an American citizen and it is not classed as contraband.

They were taken to San Antonio today. One of the passengers on the train gave Sheriff G. H. Johnson part of the evidence which led to the arrest.

## BIG INCREASE IN EXPORTS IS SHOWN

### FIVE TIMES AS MUCH WHEAT IN DECEMBER, 1914 AS IN 1913

### PRELIMINARY REPORT PUBLIC

#### Flour Exports Increase 66 Per Cent—Other Large Gains in Foodstuffs Shown

Washington, Jan. 21.—Five times as much wheat and six times as much corn were exported from the United States in December as in the same month in 1913; flour exports increased more than 66 per cent for the same period; beef increased more than twelve fold and generally the exports of "breadstuffs" which include practically all the staple grains, increased five times.

These figures were disclosed today in a preliminary statement from the department of commerce issued in response to inquiries on what foodstuffs were going abroad with resulting abnormal prices at home.

## RECORD IS AGAIN BROKEN BY PRICE OF WHEAT TODAY

### May Delivery Reaches \$1.45 3-8 Per Bushel—One-Eighth Over Former Record.

## GERMAN FORCES IN REAR OF LARGE RUSSIAN COLUMN

### Are Between Northern Army and Warsaw—Russo-Germans Accused of Treason.

Petrograd, Jan. 21.—German forces have appeared in the rear of the Russian army advancing toward the Prussian frontier. They are along the road from Pionisk 46 miles northwest of Warsaw to Goelitz, thus being between the advancing Russian army and the Polish capital. So far as is known only comparatively small bodies of Germans consisting of reconnoitering detachments are in this locality.

The Bourse Gazette says the Russian military authorities have learned that Russo-Germans in this vicinity have given information and other assistance to the Germans. On this account, the newspaper says Grand Duke Nicholas the Russian commander in chief has ordered that all Russo-German residents in the district between Warsaw and the Russian frontier otherwise of their property in six days preparatory to being removed to the interior of the country.

### Democrats To Caucus Tonight On Measure—Senator Weeks Resumes His Speech

"We want to get the facts before the country and we are taking the only way left to us to accomplish this," said Senator Weeks.

## GUTIERREZ APPEALS TO MEXICAN PEOPLE

### ISSUES MANIFESTO DENOUNCING CARRANZA, VILLA AND ZAPATA

### BELIEVED TO HAVE 5000 MEN

#### Carranza Is Waging Offensive Campaign Against Points Held By Villa Forces

Washington, Jan. 21.—Advice to the state department said General Gutierrez had left Pachuca in a northerly direction with "several thousand well armed men" and had issued a manifesto denouncing Carranza, Villa and Zapata and calling on the Mexican nation to support him in an effort to establish peace.

From Vera Cruz General Carranza continued to wage an offensive campaign through General Obregon and Gonzalez against Mexico City and other points controlled by Villa. Conflicting reports have been received as to the strength of the Gutierrez movement, but it is believed that it has at least 5,000 men and aims at the elimination of Carranza, Villa and Zapata.

## ATTEMPT MADE UPON LIFE OF EX-KHEDIVE OF EGYPT

### Is Now Under Treatment For Wound and May Not Lead Turkish Invasion

Buenos Aires, Jan. 21.—(Ind. night)—Ex-Khedive Abbas Hilmi of Egypt, according to Vienna dispatches, is going to Berne, Switzerland to consult a specialist regarding a bullet wound in the jaw sustained there in a recent attempt on his life at Constantinople. The dispatch says the wound has not healed and that this makes it impossible for him to head the army with which it is planned to invade Egypt at the present time. ## RUSSIANS SEEKING TO CROSS VISTULA

### FIGHTING ALONG RIVER FOR DISTANCE OF ABOUT 50 MILES

## SAY GERMANS ON DEFENSIVE

Petrograd, Jan. 21.—Along a 60-mile front Cichenow to the south of Miawa, to Dobryn on the Vistula, twelve miles from Plock, the Germans are on the defensive against the Russian advance toward East Prussia. Heavy artillery engagements have occurred at various points along the line.

Meanwhile the struggle is in progress for possession of the left bank of the Vistula from its junction with the Bura to Wisogrod westward to Dobryn a distance of approximately 60 miles. Possession by the Russians of Wisogrod and a footing on the left bank of the Bura in that vicinity affords them a base for their operations against the Germans who are in force to the west of that position and effectively prevents a movement on Novo Gerogiewsk which has been the German objective in the advance toward Warsaw from the north. In endeavoring to retake trenches captured by the Russians, immediately after the program in this city, it is reported to have lost 900 men.

Southward from Tarnow, Galicia, the Austrians have employed for the first time, the famous German 42-centimeter gun, in an effort to dislodge the Russians from their position along the Dunajek River. According to reports received here they have been unsuccessful having been forced to retreat to the northwest leaving the Russian position intact. Russian officers are of the opinion that the heavy German guns are an impediment rather than aid to the Austrians on account of the bad roads and the long distances it is necessary to transport the guns.

## FIGHTING AT MANY POINTS ALONG LINE

### SEVERAL POSITIONS ARE INVOLVED IN BATTLES IN FRANCE

### ARTILLERY FIGHTS FEATURE

#### Vosges Contest Is Being Waged Northwest of Senhain, Says Official.

Berlin, Jan. 21.—The official statement of the war office today reads: "In the western theatre of the war only artillery duels took place yesterday between the sea and the Vosges which we occupied on the day before yesterday were lost again today. Northeast of Arras the French repeatedly attacked both sides of the road from Arras to Lille, but were repulsed.

"Southeast of Berry-au-Bac we took two trenches from the French and kept them notwithstanding their fierce counter-attacks. French attacks on our positions south of St. Mihiel were repulsed.

"Northwest of Ponta-Mousson we succeeded in recapturing the positions we evacuated three days ago in that vicinity our troops captured four cannon and several prisoners. Fighting still continues for the remainder of the lost trenches.

"In the Vosges northwest of Senhain battles still continued. The situation in East Prussia remains the same. An important engagement to the east of Letnaw ended favorably for us; 100 prisoners remained in our hands."

## RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE NOW BEGINNING TO ASSERT ITSELF

### Three Armies Trying To Advance In East—Roumanian Troops May Enter Soon

## RIVER RHINE OBJECTIVE OF ALLIES IN WEST

### French Trenches Said To Be Only 16 Miles Away—German Reports Still Optimistic, However

London, Jan. 21.—Russia's threefold assault on the Germanic allies has in the opinion of English observers of war, resumed its steam roller characteristics alike in the north, the center and the south. In the north the advance into East Prussia is reported as threatening the German lines of communication and in Poland the trench warfare continues with small results for either side, but the Russians confidently dwell on what they call large German losses, in efforts to hold present positions.

In the South, the Russians declare that the Austrian resistance seems to have broken down entirely and that Transylvania lies open to them. Reports of Roumania's long-awaited entrance into the fight continue to circulate; one rumor today has it, however, that Roumania will not immediately declare war but that she will throw troops into Transylvania, which is Hungarian territory, for the purpose of protecting Roumanian nationals.

Meanwhile, German official utterances continue optimistic. The communications given out every day say the situation in the eastern theatre of war remains unchanged. Certain semi-official summaries of events, received in London by wireless telegraphy from Berlin, are somewhat more communicative. Such a message received recently said the Russians had some successes in which their losses were heavy and that the Turks have been operating successfully in the Caucasus and are now marching on Egypt.

Telegrams reaching here from Berlin record the arrival there of Archduke Charles Francis, the Austrian crown prince, and Dr. Betham-Hollweg, the German imperial chancellor, who are to be joined shortly by M. Burian, the new minister of foreign affairs, presumably for a conference regarding a plan of campaign against Russia as well as the adoption of suitable measures against the prospective entrance into the war of Italy and Roumania.

Recent dispatches from Sweden indicate that German airship attacks on the new Finnish railroad between Sweden and Russia are beginning to be expected. This is the line that runs around the northern end of the Gulf of Bothnia. Its destruction would be a serious blow to Russia as the only other routes of communication between Russia and her allies are by way of the Baltic Sea or through Archangel on the north. The former route has been made impassable by mines and the latter is to be cut off by the ice.

In the western arena of the war the activity has been generally confined to artillery exchanges, except to the south of Metz where sharp fighting promises interesting developments.

Fighting between Austrians and Montenegrins which has been almost at a standstill on account of the winter weather and heavy snows has resumed across the border from Catarro. The Austrians bombarded Montenegrin positions, it is said, at Cetinje, but no damage was inflicted.

The allies now have their eyes on the River Rhine and British troops may be sent to Belfort in eastern France to take part in any possible advance toward the river, says a Geneva report, which lacks verification, however. It is stated that the advanced French trenches are within sixteen miles of the Rhine.

## PROVIDE FOR COMFORT OF AGED

### Wealthy Manufacturer Advocates Reforms Before Industrial Relations Commission

New York, Jan. 21.—Taxation of large fortunes upon the death of their owners to aid the poor, the establishment of government agencies to work for the unemployed and provisions for the comfort of aged workers were advocated by Daniel Guggenheim, president of the American Smelting and Refining Company, in testimony today before the inquiry of the commission of Industrial Relations into the great philanthropic foundations and the causes of industrial unrest.

Mr. Guggenheim said that as a capitalist he favored these measures in spite of the fact that they constituted some of the cardinal ideas of socialism.

He also advocated "industrial democracy" wherein workers received a portion of the profit derived from the products of labor.

**WAR IN ITS RELATION TO JUDAISM DISCUSSED**

New York Rabbi Speaks On This Subject Before Audience In Chicago

Chicago, Jan. 21.—Dr. Samuel Schulman, Rabbi of the Temple Bethel, New York, who delivered an address Monday before the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, on the subject of "The War and Judaism," said the profoundest cause of the war was the intense nationalism which prevailed in all thought.

"Nationalism," he continued, "seems to overshadow all consideration of universal human interest, all questions of humanity. Everything seems to have been concentrated into the self-justification of the nation. It has come to worship itself, to limit the world to its national horizon. No nation is as yet ready to sacrifice itself for humanity, even as the individual is called upon to sacrifice himself for the state or nation. No nation has outgrown its barbaric childhood. It has not become mature. If it has not made its guiding principle a consideration for the interests of humanity, if it does not look upon mankind as larger than itself and a higher ideal than its own aggrandizement or glorification."

Dr. Schulman said he believed the idea of nation based on race was wrong and that it was destined to pass away. The ideal state should be based on the rights of men, irrespective of race or creed, he said.

"It is not kings alone, as is sometimes superficially said," Dr. Schulman continued, "that bring on war. Despots may lead themselves into a war. It is the tremendous selfish interests, the terrible passions, the unreasoning hatreds, the greed that break out into the fury of war. There is therefore not to be self-righteous, let us be fair, even as we are sympathetic towards the unfortunate people of Europe that are engaged in this, the darkest war of history.

"The conflict had been preparing for decades. Every nation that is in the war today is there because it wished it. If it would be out of it, it would have found another way. And this will and wish, prepared for decades, and the very preparation brought on the conflict. This is the tragic irony of human limitation and contradiction in life. A nation cannot, should not remain unprepared. It is a crime for any nation to leave itself unprotected, exposed to the arbitrary might of any other nation. The heaping up of the magazine makes it possible that any spark will explode."

"The war has not proven the failure of religion," Dr. Schulman asserted. "Thousands no doubt all over the world, have had their faith shaken. Men and women have asked, Where is God?"

Has Praise for Wilson  
"God may be at a distance. He may seem to hide himself, but He is never,theless real and active in the world's history. Aye, in the profound and tragic sense, He is even amidst the horrors of this war. From time to time there come upon the world great conflicts between good and humanity that would not learn of God's will in quiet and rest and peace, is compelled to learn through combat, through a disaster, through suffering, destruction and death."

Dr. Schulman characterized President Wilson's policy toward the war as "the greatest work of his administration."

"It has been said that the President's policy was weak and unwise and wise with prophetic foresight. America will be called upon to play a great role when this war will approach its end, and it can only exert influence on behalf of freedom and of right, if it comes with skirts absolutely clean with the record of the strictest kind of neutrality."

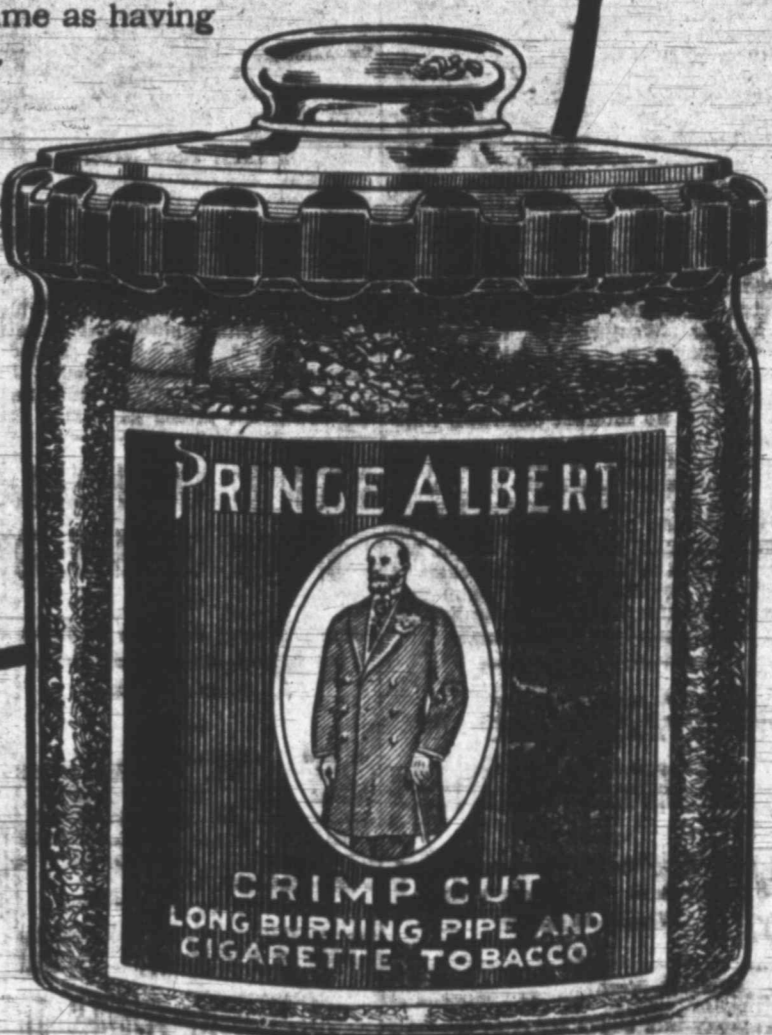

**MORE THAN TWO MILLION BELGIAN REFUGEES IN FRANCE**

By Associated Press  
Paris, Jan. 21.—There are now more than two million Belgian refugees in France, Monsieur Berardi secretary of the Franco-Belgian relief committee has informed the Associated Press.

"France has received them with the greatest consideration and generosity," he said, "the government allowing them the same amount as their own unemployed, 25 cents per day to each head of a family plus 10 cents for each child. This, of course is sufficient to keep them from starvation, but nearly all of them have other pressing needs as they fled in a majority of cases with insufficient clothing and lacking other necessities. We are doing all we can, aided by the French government to solve the problem by finding employment for such as are able to work, but France has her own stricken population in the northern departments to care for and Belgium is obliged to appeal to other generous nations for these people whose need, as the world knows is not their fault."

Monsieur Berardi said Belgium would never forget what America has already done for Brussels where the population was on the verge of starvation.

The first refugees that arrived were sheltered at the Cirque de Paris and at the Northern Terminal but these quarters, summarily prepared, were inadequate for the accommodation of so many persons living almost entirely in common. Now several hundred canal and river barges are being fitted up with more comforts and sanitary arrangements for their reception. Hundreds of children who have lost their parents have been adopted by French and Swiss families and many owners of villas in the country have placed them at the disposition of Belgian families. These measures relieve the pressure on the committee somewhat but the refugees continue to arrive.

A movement is on foot to establish colonies in Tunisia for such as wish to emigrate but the proposition is said to be no more likely to succeed than the suggestion to send them to California. The Belgian, as a rule, is not inclined to emigrate, habituated as he has been to steady and fairly remunerative employment in the industrial bee hive that Belgium was before the war.

English spinning industry has given on prices to 800 Belgian workmen and many have secured berths on the Metropolitan underground railway in Paris; others have been placed on farms in the south and center of France, but the large part of these two million unfortunates is still to be provided for.

**ENGLISHMEN CEASE TO CRITICISE GOVERNMENT**

Adverse Comments On Its Preparation For War Are No Longer Being Heard

By Associated Press.

London, Jan. 21.—Criticism of the government's war preparation which was rampant during the early stages of the war has largely ceased, indicating that the general public has either settled down to the belief that everything is being done about as well as possible, or has tired of writing letters to the press.

The war office has now enlisted the services of business men with experience in carrying out big enterprises to take part in the work of supplying the army, and the labor unions have volunteered to watch the execution of government contracts, not only to see that proper equipment and rations are supplied to the soldiers, but to prevent sweating.

Arnold White, a prominent writer and former colonial official has been making a thorough inspection of the training camps for the purpose of detecting any scandal and mismanagement. Having been a bitter enemy of the Liberal government his point of

view was not prejudiced in its favor. He writes:

"Having visited thirty-six camps in various parts of the country, I am thoroughly cheered. In the majority of cases business men are handling the difficult problems of war. Dwellers inland have no conception of the thoroughness, efficiency and silence with which the War Office and the Admiralty have co-operated for the business of preventing a German raid or invasion."

"The alarm that is still felt in some parts of these islands is wholly unjustified, because, firstly the business efficiency of the Fleet under Jellicoe has increased since war began; and, secondly, because the practical measures adopted by our military engineers if generally known, would enable the timid to sleep quietly in their beds. If I were out to pick holes in our Administration, it would not be in the general management of the war."

**SAYRE BABY WILL NOT TAKE GRANDFATHER'S NAME**

Washington, Jan. 21.—Francis will be the name of the President's grandson, the child of Mr. and Mrs. Francis B. Sayre, who was born at the White House Sunday. Wheat is selling on the streets of Wichita Falls today for \$1.40 per bushel. That's just about twice as much as the bulk of the 1914 wheat crop sold for last summer.

There is this much to be said in favor of the Germans: So far they have not even been charged with having forced the lowering of an American flag on an American vessel.

Governor Ferguson's first message to the Legislature reads like a strong document, and if the Legislature gives him the proper support every demand made by the El Paso convention will be enacted into law.

The Texas Corn Growers Association held its convention at Waxahatchie Jan. 19-20, and it was the largest attended and the most successful affair that has been held since the organization of the association.

The report came that ex-Governor Malcolm Patterson of Tennessee, is to be a candidate for United States senator next year. Mr. Patterson was a candidate for this high office four years ago and lacked only a few votes of election.

THE PLAN AND ITS END.

The plan to create a fund of \$135,000.00 to be used in making advances on cotton and removing a big part of the crop from the visible supply, seeking a market, was brought forward with some measure of pretentiousness.

The plan was formulated and details are known. Plenty of money now to care for cotton, it was said. But as people began to investigate the details, the stipulation that cotton had created a situation of concern and stress.

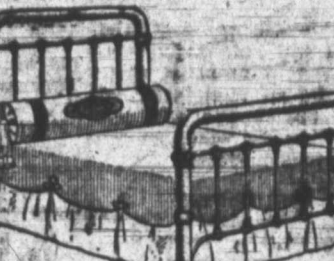
