Declared To Be Necessary in Interest American Producers To Combat Conditions

Washington, Jan. 25.—Evidence of extraordinary increases in trans Atlantic freight rates since the out break of the European war, amount ing in some instances to 900 and even 1150 per cent, was presented to the Senate today in a joint report from Secretaries McAdoo and Redfield.

"It will be observed" says the report, "that the greatest increases in rates and the heaviest tax has been made upon the products in which the American farmer is most concerned; namely, grain and cotton. The government has no rower to control or regulate ocean freight rates. The eteamship owners can increase rates without notice and upon the instant our business men are helpless."

The report concludes with an argument in favor of the ship purchase

"It may well be asked," the report continues, "which of these interests is entitled to the superior consideration of the government; the farmers and producers of the great grain states of the west, the farmers and producers of the great cotton and tobacco states of the south the merchants, manufacturers and business men throughout the country whose combined activities represent our vast trade or the owners of the comparatively few American steamships engaged in the foreign trade whose aggregate investment is approximate-\$69,000,000? There would seem to be but one answer-that it would pay us many times over to invest the \$10,000,000 as provided in the shipping bill, in an American merchant marine and bring about as quickly as possible a restoration of normal ocean freight rates with a saving to American business of more than \$200,-

OFF IN POLL PAYMENTS

Austin, Texas, Jan. 25.—The federal war revenue tax may result in decreasing poll tax payments in this State according to officials here, because of a recent ruling of the internal revenue collectors department. This fuling holds that a power of attorney authorising another person to pay poll taxes is taxable under the war revenue law in the sum of twenty-five cents and that when more than one person signs the same power of attorney, the owner of such document is subject to a tax of 25 cents for each person signing it. I'n der the law of Texas it is permissible for a voter to authorize another person to pay his poll tax, when given power of attorney

NEW GERMAN ARTILLERY THROW SHELL 28 MILES

Shoots Projectile Weighing a Tor and Has Muzzle Velocity of 3,700 Feet Per Second

Berlin, Jan. 25.—Remarkable fig ires regarding a new German naval gun are given out by a German ar tillery expert writing in the "Artillcrostische Mondts Heste." cussing an assertion by the London Times that the German navy possesses a gun which carries miles farther than the best British weapon the writer admits Krupps are manufacturing a gun whose proectile weighs about a ton and which develops muzzle velocity of about 3700 feet per second. The expert reckons from these figures that the gun has 58 per cent more muzzle force than the British navy's best weapon and has a range of about 28 while the channel at Dover is only about 22 miles wide

SOMETHING FUNDAMENTALLY WRONG" WITH CONDITIONS IN COLORADO

In Statement Today Indicates That Policy Toward Men Is To Be Changed

New York, Jan 2 .- In a statement oday to the United States commision on industrial relations on the Colorado labor situation. John Rockefeller Jr., denied he had, he said he had been charged "at tempted to exercise a kind of absolu tism over the coal industry in Colo rado" or that he had "sought to dictate a policy of non-recognition of unions." On the contrary, he said, he was in favor of labor unions so long as their purpose was to promote the well being of the employes and they had due regard for the interests of

the public "As to the strike, I confess mysel there was something fundamental wrong in a condition of affairs which rendered possible the loss of life, engendered hatred and brought suf fering upon hundreds of human beings. Without seeking to apportion blame I determined to seek means t avoid similar conflicts. It was this way that I came to recommend to my colleagues in the Rockefeller foundation the institution of a series of studies into the fundamental prob lems arising out of industrial rela tions which resulted in the securing the services of Mr. Mackenzie King former minister of labor of Canada to direct the studies.

GERMANY CLAIMS ENGLISH CRUISER SUNK IN SEA FIGHT

Admits Loss Of One Of Own Ships In Sunday's Engagement-Others Return To Port

Berlin, Jan. 25.—The following official announcement of the naval engagement in the North Sea yesterday was given out today in Ber-

"During the advance of our cruisers Seyblitz, Berssinger, Moltke and Bluecher, accompanied by four smaller cruisers and two flotillas of torpedo boats steaming in the North Sea these vessels became engaged with a British detachment composed of five battle cruisers, several small cruisers and 26 torpedo boat destroyers. The enemy discontinued the engagement after three hours time, at a point 75 miles northwest of Heligoland and retreated. According to the information available one British battle cruiser and one of our armored cruisers, the Bluecher, were sunk. All the other German ships returned to port. (Signed) Von Behncke."

AUSTRIA ATTEMPTS TO CHECK RUSSIANS; ANOTHER TURKISH REVERSE REPORTED

London, Jan. 25.—A new attack on the Russian armies has ben initiated by Austrians in conjunction with the German forces in the East in accordance with the plan believed in Petrograd to have been adopted by the Teutonic allies. Austrian forces have struck at their opponents all along their 300-mile front. Heavy fighting is in progress, but so far as is known in Petrograd no important results have been achieved. Desperate fighting at close quarters is in progress in Central Poland where many men have died from cold. The most determined efforts of the opposing forces have not resulted in breaking the deadlock.

The Turks, according to London reports, have suffered another reverse at Khorasan in Turkish territory.

The question of food supplies is being considered urgently in both London and Berlin. The British government has appointed a cabinet commission to consider the matter. The labor party has demanded that the government take control of British shipping. As to the food situation in Germany the Berlin press is re-inforcing the demand voiced at a mass meeting that the government commandeer all stocks of food. By way of Rome there have come reports of bread riots in Austria and Hungary during one of which the governor of Crotia was badly wounded and his palace burned.

Sin is self slaying the soul at the command of the body. Sin is self allowing the temporal body that soon must crumble into dust to dominate the soul which is immortal and when the body dies in he natural course of things the soul is already dead because of sin. For this reason we say that sin is moral suicide. It is self willfully destroying self and since it is eternal in consequence it is of tremendous importance for us today. If we can see the significance of sin certainly we will be aroused to action and

London, Jan. 23.—"If Belgium be permanently annexed to Germany, she will prove a new Lorraine, another and more truculent Finland," said M and more truculent Finiand, said M. Emile Vandervelde, the Helgian so-cialist and labor leader, in an address here under the auspices of the Wound-ed Allies Relief Committee. M. Van-dervedle, who accepted a cabinet min-istry at King Albert's request at the outbreak of the war, gave the views of his party as follows:

"Speaking as a socialist, an anti-na-tionalist and a pacifist, I consider this war must be fought to a finish, precise-ly because I am a socialist, an anti-na-tionalist and a pacifist.
