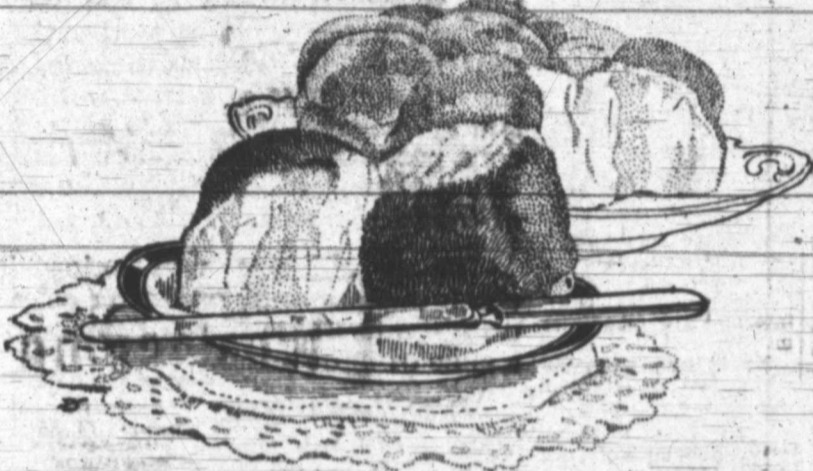

NOT A SINGLE LOAN FROM \$135,000,000 COTTON POOL

Saturday Last Day—Bankers Believe Some Good Was Accomplished by Movement

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 2.—The \$135,000,000 cotton pool expired Saturday and not one application for loans was made through the Texas committee. The time for obtaining loans from the pool was fixed at February 1, but as the last of the month fell on Sunday, Saturday was the last opportunity offered to the borrower.

Many Texas bankers believe the pool had a sort of psychological usefulness in that it stimulated the farmer to hold his cotton, showing that the bankers of the country had confidence in the value of the staple and were willing to back this confidence with hard cash.

The cotton loan fund probably filled an important sentimental or psychological usefulness in the earlier stages of its organization, in that, at a most critical time, its existence strengthened the cotton market. Both foreign and domestic buyers believed that the fund would enable the owners of the surplus cotton crop to carry such surplus over and that consequently a tremendous amount of cotton would not be dumped on the market regardless of price.

No persons connected with the pool received compensation for services and no reimbursement for what they might have spent in its organization and in the administration of its affairs.

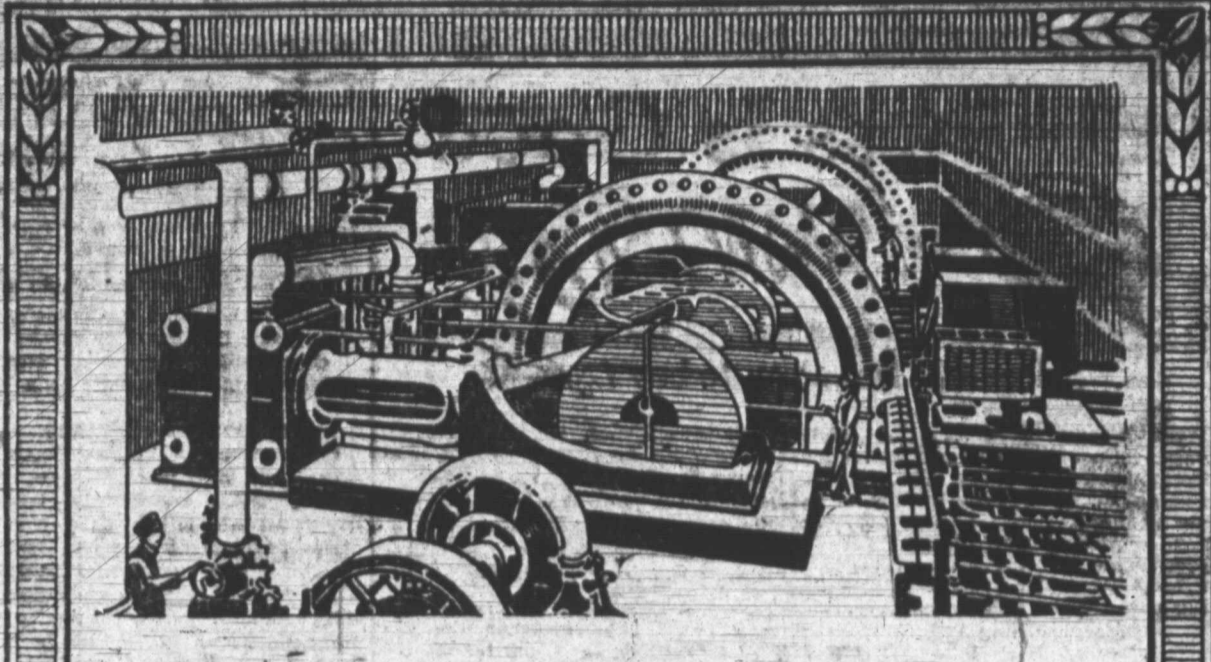

TURKISH DESERTERS TELL OF SUEZ CANAL CAMPAIGN

Forced To Start With Insufficient Supplies—Alleged Methods of German Officers. By Associated Press. Cairo, Egypt, Feb. 2.—Although there has been no further fighting in the Suez Canal district, a number of Turkish deserters have surrendered. They have given graphic descriptions of the march from Jerusalem by the way of Beerababa and Al Arish, near the boundary of Egypt and Palestine. They say they were provided only with a meager supply of provisions and were compelled to buy food at exorbitant prices from Bedouins. The deserters were under the command of a German officer, whose insistence upon maintaining strict discipline was exceedingly irksome, they assert. A wounded Turkish soldier told of being ordered to climb a telegraph pole and cut the wires. When he refused, saying "climbing was not part of a soldier's duty" the officer is said to have cut off one of his hands with a sword. NEW STATE RESOLUTION MEETS MUCH OPPOSITION Austin, Texas, Feb. 2.—Vigorous opposition has been aroused over the joint resolution to make two states out of Texas, including the El Paso territory, to be called "Jefferson." Senator Johnson of the Panhandle district introduced the resolution in the senate. While there is, of course, little chance of it being passed in the legislature and still smaller chances of it being adopted by the people at the polls, the resolution has caused quite a flurry in legislative circles.

An account of the incident reached London in a soldier's letter. "One night after we had moved toward Ypres we heard a light footfall to our out post. The man in front challenged quickly, and raised his rifle to his shoulder with the intention of firing if he did not get a satisfactory answer. "Don't shoot, I'm Irish," came the reply and then a pretty young woman dressed as a man stepped out of the darkness. "We are always suspicious nowadays no matter what the person looks like, and for a time we would not take this woman at her own valuation. We allowed her to approach, but covered her with rifles all the time. "She soon satisfied us that she had made her way from the Irish convent at Ypres. She was sent home to England the next day."
