

STRONG REPRESENTATIONS RESULT OF FLAG INCIDENT

GERMANY AND GREAT BRITAIN ARE WARNED

"DESTRUCTION OF U. S. VESSEL WOULD LEAD TO GRAVE COMPLICATIONS"

EXPRESSION OF DISPLEASURE

Pointed Statement That American Vessels Should Have Free and Unrestricted Passage

By Associated Press. Washington, Feb. 11.—The United States has warned Great Britain and Germany respectively, that general use of the American flag by British vessels will be followed by grave consequences and the destruction by Germany of any American vessel in the newly prescribed war zone would lead to serious complications.

It became known today that the text of the two notes sent last night to England, Germany expressed more emphatically than had been generally known the displeasure of the United States at the use of neutral flags by British merchantmen and its solicitude over the implication that neutral vessels were liable to destruction by German submarines in the waters around Great Britain and Ireland.

In the document transmitted to Ambassador Gerard at Berlin for presentation to the German foreign office, there is friendly but pointed statements that American vessels should have free and unrestricted passage through the high seas routes unobstructed and that destruction of an American vessel might lead to a change in the hitherto friendly relations between the United States and Germany.

Representations made to Great Britain are not based on the German incident in the statement by the British foreign office justifying the use of neutral flags by its vessels and the United States has stated unequivocally, it is understood, that a continuance of the practice would be highly dangerous to neutral vessels and would be viewed with the deepest animosity here.

CREATES PROFOUND IMPRESSION

The text of the documents is expected to be published by the state department tomorrow. Among the diplomats here the fact that the United States has taken a pronounced stand created a profound impression. No joint representation with the United States on the same subject have been made by any of the neutrals through the various foreign offices, through their ministers here, have consulted the American government as to its attitude.

"LABOR SPECIAL" DUE TO MAKE ITS TRIP TODAY

Farmers have been notified in advance of stops to be made by the "labor special" and to have a list of names of those to be on hand to meet the train. The schedule of the train is: Leave Dallas 7 a. m., stopping at Richardson, Plano, Allen, McKinney, Melissa, Anna, Van Alstyne, Howe, arrive at Sherman at 4 p. m.

HOTLY DISPUTED POINT IS CAPTURED BY FRENCH

Hill Dominates Wide Section of Country—British Also Take Important Position

By Associated Press. St. Omer, Feb. 11.—The capture of the Hill of Notre Dame de Lorette by the French has been announced at headquarters here. The hill which dominates the entire region has been fiercely disputed for weeks. A position captured by the British close to Viozennes station was of considerable importance as it overlooks Labasse. The Germans made several attempts to recapture it but the British troops held strongly fortified lines and repulsed these attacks with heavy slaughter. The British captured on Sunday night two trenches near Fustenberg taking 500 prisoners who belonged apparently to the newest class of German recruits, nearly all of them were young men and wore new uniforms.

NO POSSIBILITY OF PEACE DISCUSSIONS

GERMANY'S TRADE BLOCKING OF GERMANY'S TRADE

More Stringent Measures Are To Be Undertaken, Declares Premier Aquith

London, Feb. 11.—Premier Aquith in an announcement made to the House of Commons late today said the British government was about to take more stringent measures against the trade of Germany. "The recent public utterances in Germany give no reason to suppose that the purposes in view will be promoted by adopting the course suggested," he was the answer of Sir Edward Grey, British foreign secretary to a question in the House of Commons this afternoon, asking whether, with a view to ending the terrible loss of life in the war, Great Britain was ready to declare publicly the basis whereupon the allies were willing to discuss terms of peace.

GAIN IN ARGONNE FOREST IS CLAIMED BY GERMANS

Snow Interferes With Movements in Easy Prussia—Some Gains in Poland

By Associated Press. Berlin, Feb. 11.—The German official statement reads: "In the western theatre of war an attack in the Argonne resulted in a gain of ground for us. Six officers, 207 men, two machine guns and six small arms were captured. In the central and southern Vosges we gained a small local success.

EVACUATION OF LODZ BY GERMAN TROOPS REPORTED

Supplies Are Being Hastily Moved to Katice According to Petrograd

Petrograd, Feb. 11.—The evacuation of Lodz by the Germans has been confirmed according to Petrograd dispatch to the Havas agency which states that more than 100,000 people and 100,000 tons of supplies are being removed to Katice. A refugee camp escaped to Czerkocowa the dispatch credits with the statement that the Germans have resumed with redoubled vigor the construction of heavily fortified lines suspended six weeks ago.

RULES THAT STATE CANNOT BUY PUNCH FOR GOVERNOR

Attorney General Holds That Items in Appropriation Bill Are Improper

Austin, Texas, Feb. 11.—The "chicken salad" and "panch" items for the governor's mansion included in the devalency appropriation bill are improper expenditures of the state funds, according to a ruling by Attorney General Looney. The opinion expresses the belief "that the legislature exceeded its authority in appropriating money for groceries to examine the deficiency items of the governor's mansion for the last two years, and if any were found improper to take the necessary steps for the return of the money.

FIERCE BATTLE IN RAPIDLY RAGING 10-MILE FRONT IN CARPATHIANS TODAY

Geneva, Feb. 11.—Eighteen hundred were killed and wounded in a single charge by Russians upon Austrian trenches in the battle which began in the Carpathians February 7 and still is raging furiously along a front of 60 miles from Mount Polonica Runa to Mount Maco, according to the latest information received here.

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WILHELMINA CARGO SEIZED BY ENGLAND

Palomoth, Eng. Feb. 11.—The cargo of the American steamer Wilhelmina was seized by the British authorities here today in accordance with the decision of the foreign office. The cargo is to go to a prize court.

NEW MANEUVERE IN SHIP BILL FIGHT

SENATE FILIBUSTER WILL BE SUSPENDED FOR THE PRESENT

To Then Come Back To Senate As New Proposition—Will Pass Appropriations Now

Washington, Feb. 11.—The situation in the fight over the administration ship bill underwent a complete change today as the result of a conference between President Wilson and Congress leaders. It was determined to relax the fight in the Senate suspending the historic filibuster while the important appropriations bills are passed. Meanwhile Senator Gore's substitute for the administration bill will be introduced in the House as an amendment to the Weeks bill another ship measure which already has passed the Senate.

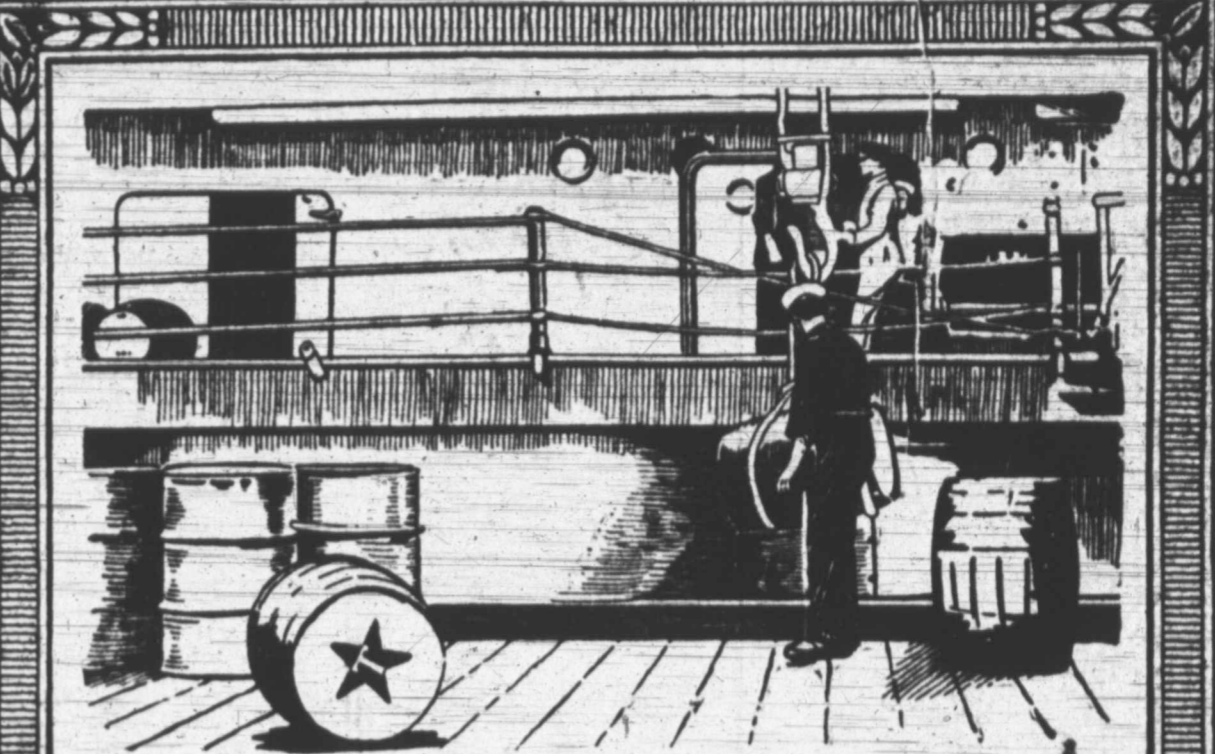

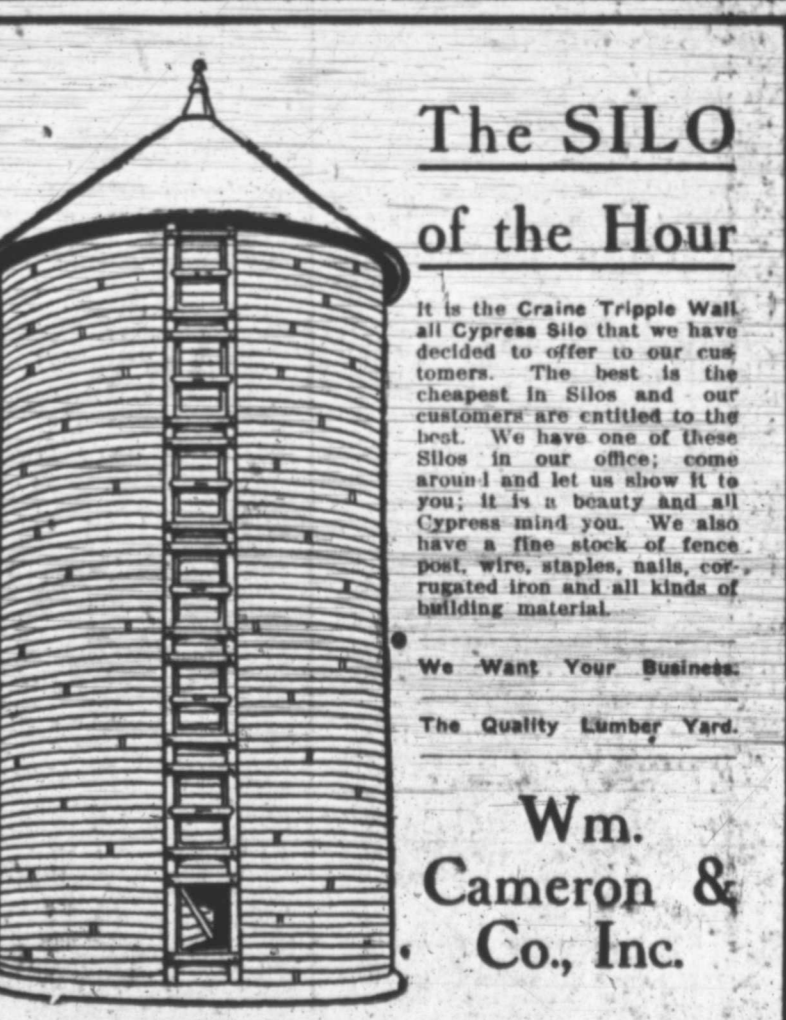

GALICIA IS NOW THEATRE OF IMPORTANT FIGHTING

Some Gains By Austrians Reported—Whisper Of Peace Comes From Prussian Sources

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 10.—The eastern battle front completely overshadows the western fighting line today as the center of interest in the military operations. The Teutonic allies eventually are making desperate efforts to advance especially in the region of Galicia, to the south of Przemyśl and Limberg where attempts have been made to gain positions by sheer weight and number.

The general offensive movement of the Austro-German forces along the Carpathian mountains has been successful at the eastern end of the range where the Russians are retreating into Bukovina, but London military authorities are of the opinion that the Austrians must forge ahead a long way in this direction before they can hope to affect the general Russian positions. A German report states that heavy artillery actions are in progress in the Carpathians and that an advance is being made on Bukovina where the important town of Wama has been occupied by the Austro-German forces.

Some whispers of a demand for peace come from the Teutonic allies in the form of reports of a Socialist's speech in the Prussian diet declaring that the people want peace and a petition is said to have been sent to Baron Burian, Austro-Hungarian minister of foreign affairs by some Hungarian deputies demanding that steps be taken to end the war.

SAYS GERMANY'S SOCIAL DEMOCRATS DESIRE AN HONORABLE PEACE

By Associated Press. Berlin, Feb. 10.—Herr Hirsch, Socialist representative in the Prussian Diet yesterday told that body the German Social Democrats desired an honorable peace.

UNRELENTING STRUGGLE ALL ALONG EASTERN FRONT IS DESCRIBED BY PETROGRAD

By Associated Press. Petrograd, Feb. 10.—The general state of the Russian army has given out an official statement as follows: "The Germans who gradually had been concentrating in East Prussia with fresh troops began a series of energetic reconnoissances on February 7. They opened offensive operations with considerable force in the district between Horzele and Johnsburg and undertook at the same time active operations on both wings of their front in East Prussia. In the vicinity of Ladshen on the east of Tilsit we drove back a German attack and annihilated in almost complete annihilation one of the German battalions opposed to us. "Following this encounter our cavalry moved forward in the direction of Serpeck traveling over the road to Riten. Judging from the corpses abandoned by the Germans in front of our positions they would appear to have lost in dead and wounded several tens of thousands of men in the six days fighting in front of Borplow, Goumin and Wola Szydlowicka. In the Carpathians. "In the Carpathians the fighting continues in Bartfeld and Svidnik. The enemy here undertook active operations but they did not thus continue and finally retired, leaving prisoners in our hands. In the vicinity of Mount Loupouk we continued our pursuit of the enemy and in one day we captured 49 officers, 5200 men and eighteen machine guns. "German columns, having made their way over the Tuholka pass, delivered during the day of February 7 no fewer than 22 violent attacks on certain points in the region of Koslowka occupied by us. The Germans came forward on this attack several ranks, deep presenting a full front line; under our violent cross fire the Germans twice took possession of a certain height, but were dislodged by counter attacks delivered by our infantry. This success was preceded by long and violent hand to hand fighting with the bayonet which is without precedent in history. The losses sustained in this engagement

ANOTHER STEAMER USES AMERICAN FLAG

CUNARD LINER ORDUNA FLIES IT WHILE CROSSING IRISH SEA

KEPT HOISTED NEARLY 24 HOURS

Flag Raised Soon After Boat Left Liverpool According To Passenger's Statement

By Associated Press. New York, Feb. 10.—Passengers on the Cunard line British steamer Orduna which arrived today from England said the steamer flew the American flag nearly 24 hours on January 31 while passing through the Irish Sea.

TO OPEN BIDS FOR STATE DEPOSITORIES

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Feb. 10.—The board created under the state depository law will open bids for the sale of \$800,000 of the state's funds, on Feb. 20, according to State Treasurer J. M. Edwards. The law provides for a depository in each congressional district, such contracts awarded to keeping the money to run for two years. The state derives an average interest on such deposits of a fraction over four per cent.

RECEIVER IS ASKED FOR CONSTRUCTION COMPANY

Architects Firm Declares Agreement To Divide Profits Was Not Fulfilled

In a petition filed in the district court Glenn Bros., architects, ask for the appointment of a receiver for the Maxwell and Stewart Construction Company of this city. In their petition the plaintiffs claim that they entered into an agreement whereby they were to have half of the profits on certain buildings for which they secured contracts for the defendants and that now the defendant company is failing and refusing to fulfill such contracts. A paragraph from the petition follows:

"That on or about the fourth day of December, 1914 the plaintiffs and defendants entered into an agreement to the effect that they would secure and fulfill certain contracts and divide between them the profits arising therefrom; that in pursuance of said agreement the said parties did secure the contract for the erection of a school building in Bronson, Sabine county, Texas for the total price of \$7100; that it was agreed and understood by and between the said parties that the plaintiffs were to secure said contract and prepare and furnish plans and specifications and superintend the construction of said building and said defendants were to construct said building and furnish all materials and labor required for same and the profits arising from said contract, if any, were to be divided equally between plaintiffs and defendants.

The petition then alleges that a reasonable expectation of profit from the contract would be \$1200, but that the defendant company has failed to fulfill its agreement and the contract has not started work on the building.

WHEN FRANCE SOUGHT PEACE

UNSUCCESSFUL PLAN IN EARLY DAYS OF WAR TO END STRIFE

CEDING OF COLONIES

Annexation of Belgium Also Provided For—Allies Agreement Stopped Negotiations

By Associated Press. Paris, Feb. 10.—Certain French newspapers today reprint with the consent of the government, contents of an article published in the Democrat de Delamont stating that prior to the battle of the Marne a party existed in France which was ready to sign a peace treaty, at the same time ceding to Germany the towns of Briey and Nancy, French Lorraine, the island of Madagascar and the protectorate of Morocco as well as paying an indemnity. The article continues:

"General F. Joffre, President Poincaré and most of the cabinet ministers were opposed to the plan but the situation became so tense as to necessitate the resignation of Adolphe Messimy, as minister of war and the formation of a ministry of national defense. After the battle of the Marne, Germany proposed peace through ex-premier Joseph Caillaux, offering to give up the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine, with the exception of Strasbourg, residing in an island change in the North Sea coast extending from Calais to Dunkirk; France in addition was to acknowledge the annexation of Belgium by Germany.

"The answer to this proposal was the signing of a convention by the allies to make no separate peace. After this M. Caillaux was appointed to an important position in the pay corps but later was relieved of this post and sent on a mission to Brazil."

DOESN'T WANT EXEMPTION FROM POLLUTION MEASURE

Protest Against Bill Is Sent To Austin By Resident of River Valley

Calloway Dean, living down the Big Wichita River, who was in town today, says that he is strongly opposed to the exemption of Wichita Falls from the anti-stream pollution bill and believes that practically every man living between Wichita Falls and Red River is in the same attitude. Mr. Dean has written several members of the legislature protesting against the amendment of the bill and believes that if the residents along the river are given an opportunity to be heard they can prevent the bill's amendment.

NEGRO SOCIAL CLUB NOW UNDER FIRE OF OFFICIALS

Two Arrests Have Been Made Following Recent Investigation By Grand Jury

GOVERNOR FERGUSON ATTENDS HEARING BEFORE COMMITTEE TODAY

HEARING ON MINIMUM WAGE

Many Club Women Attend—Drainage District Measure Passes House

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Feb. 10.—"We can do anything in Texas that can be done anywhere else and just a little bit more," said Governor Ferguson at a meeting of the House educational committee this morning when the bill providing for the printing in Texas of text books for Texas schools was taken up for consideration. The governor spoke in favor of the bill.

Present were commercial printers from practically all the large cities in the State prepared to assure the committee that there would be no difficulty about the printing of books in the State, so far as equipment was concerned. The hearing will be continued tomorrow.

Dish-Washing Bill Passes. The House today passed finally two Senate bills; one by Bailey of Harris placing drainage districts under county auditors and the other by West-brook, known as the "dish-washing" bill. This bill requires that all dishes and spoons, etc., in restaurants be sterilized. The measure, which this bill passed was 68 to 58.

Minimum Wage Hearing.

Senate committee on labor spent about two hours hearing the arguments of opponents of the minimum wage bill introduced in the Senate by Senator Bee. There was a large delegation of women representing civic societies and clubs present, and also a large number of business men.

Land Bill Debated.

In a speech for its fortuitousness, its eloquence and its unqualified adherence to the principles of Democracy as he understands them, Senator Breiford yesterday afternoon held the rest attention of his colleagues as he spoke for the passage of the land tenure bill. The frank and vigorous espousal of this bill by the senator was a notable and memorable event that attracted the attention of the entire Senate.

Senator Breiford's land tenure bill embodied Governor Ferguson's views on farm rentals, was the feature of the senate session, and was made interesting by addresses from Senators Lattimore and McNealus, who preceded Breiford.

Lattimore spoke in favor of his amendment, including details of building and property in cities and limiting the rental to 10 per cent of the market value of the property rented. This amendment, he said, that attracted Senator McGregor to his effort in defense of his bill, although he was just from a sick bed.

Lattimore said that because Ferguson had been elected in no reason why a man who disagreed with his policies in the campaign should be disgraced with him now. He thought the whole bill unconstitutional, but if laws were to be made for farmers, then why not for the poor of the cities; why not protect them in the rental charged for their homes, and why not charge for the rent a landlord may charge for stores, warehouses, etc. He said he lived in Fort Worth, representing the Texas city that has the largest tin bucket brigade of any city in the state and he wanted relief for those people who are being crushed by extortionate rentals. He held, though, that the bill was an invasion of the right of private contract and violated the constitution.

Senator Breiford interrupted to read the platform declaration on the tenant question in the El Paso platform and asked Senator Lattimore if he and the senator both are not bound by the platform declaration of the political party with which they affiliate.
