"DESTRUCTION OF U. S. VESSEL WOULD LEAD TO GRAVE COMPLICATIONS

Pointed Statement That American Vessels Should Mave Free and Unrestricted Passage

By Associated Press. Washington, Feb. 11.—The United States has warned Great Britain and Germany respectively, that general use of the American flag by British vessels will be followed by grave consequences and the destruction by Germany of any American vessel in the newly prescribed war zone would lead to serious complications.

It became known today that the text of the two notes sent last night to England, Germany expressed more emphatically than had been generally known the displeasure of the United States at the use of neutral flags by British merchantmen and its solici tude over the implication that neutral vessels were liable to destruction by German submarines in the waters around Great Britain and Ireland. Washington, Feb. 11.—The situa-tion in the fight over the administration ship bill underwent a complete Change today as the result of a con-ference between President Wilson and Congress leaders. It was determined to relax the fight in the Sen-ate this suspending the historic fili-buster while the important appropria-

tion bills are passed.

Meanwhile Semator Gore's substitute for the administration bill will be introduced in the House as an amen measure which already has passed the Senate. Under a special rule it would be perfected to meet the views of the administration and then be presented to the Senate for action as a new proposition. The present bill over which the long fight has ensued will then die in committee. When the new bill comes over from the House, if the fight in the Senate is renewed on it, President Wilson will decide whether to call an extra session of Congress for passage of the ship bill alone.





If England's life is at stake because of the exigencies of war, is not Amrcia's life at stake because of the xigencies of trade?

And which of these two factors in mportant part—trade or war?

Which would England prefer, could to any of those named: she exercise her choice to be su-

reme in a naval sense or in a com nercial sense? Which would give to her the best maranty of permanency, stability and

position of superiority? What is it that has made the Unit. d States great, and what is it that as caused her influence to be prooundly felt throughout the world? Is the maintenance of great armanents, the creation of a mighty navy and the gathering of land through onquest?

Decidedly not. It is the developing of our resources, the enrichment of our people, the expansion of our comnerce and the demonstration that here are victories for a nation beond those of which warriors can Iream

We do not grudge Great Britain the oride she feels in her navy and what t has accomplished, but we do claim he right to be as proud and as jealous of our peaceful pursuits.


