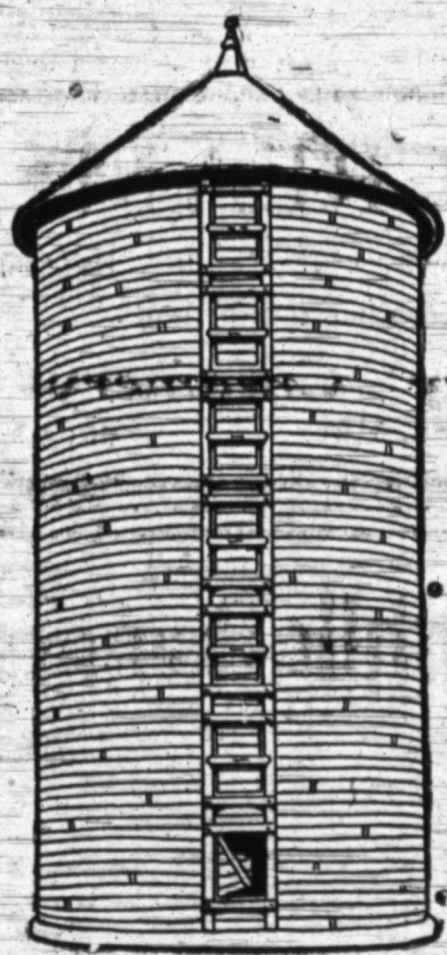

# Black Sea Is Important Key In War—May Witness Decisive Fight

Washington, Feb. 23.—The National Geographic Society in a statement on European war geography, says of the Black Sea:

"The Black Sea is unique among the war theatres. It is the least regarded by the people of the West, and yet, operations there may result in a permanent reorganization of European affairs. Half possession has just served to halt the desires of each of the two empires for full possession and the Ottomans and the Muscovite have long frowned at one another over the waters of this inland sea.

"Enclosed on the north by the southern coast of Russia, on the east by Russian Caucasia, on the south and west by Turkey in Asia and Turkey in Europe, and on the northwest by Bulgaria and Rumania, the Black Sea is in every respect an oriental waterway. Physically, it is a boundary between the East and the West; in reality, the life which surrounds it is strongly related to the East and as strongly foreign to the West. Hence, there is little general interest in the military operations there among Americans.

"The Black, Caspian and Baltic Seas are about the same size, but, of them all, the Black Sea drains the country of greatest natural resources, of most advantageous connections with the trading world, and, by far, of the most commercial importance. From east to west, the Black Sea has a length of 750 miles; its greatest

width of 380 miles; and it covers an area of 180,000 square miles or is considerably greater than the sum of the areas of the American Great Lakes. It has a coastal line of 2,000 miles and a large part of its central basin reaches the extreme depth of 6,000 feet.

**Drains Immense Area.**

"A million square miles of land in Europe and Asia drain into the Black Sea. The Danube, Dnieper, Dniester and Bug, of Central Europe; the Don of Eastern Russia; the Kurban and smaller rivers of Caucasia; and the Tcharuk, Kizil Irmak, Sakaria and other rivers of Asia Minor, carry enormous volumes of water to its basin; it rises and falls according to the increase and decrease in the volumes of its tributary waters. Of tidal action there is little or none.

"Chief among the port cities are Odessa, Sebastopol, Batum, in Russia; Trebizond and Siope in Asia Minor; Varna in Bulgaria; and Koenje in Rumania. Greatest of all the commercial ports is Odessa, one of Russia's most important cities for the shipment of agricultural produce. Batum is a famous oil port. With the mouth of the Black Sea, the Bosphorus, clogged by the Turks, Russia is in the peculiar position of having plenty of grain and plenty of petroleum, and of yet being unable to take advantage of the high prices offered by her allies for these commodities. With Turkey in Europe, the advan-

**Ypres Tragic Story.**

"Ypres, beaten back from the zenith which it reached in the year 1300 over dropping lower in the scale of importance, is today apparently facing the last few scenes of its tragic decline. For weeks Ypres has figured prominently in the war dispatches, as Germans and allies have rolled in quantities of destroyed weapons over its site," says a statement issued by the National Geographic Society today.

"Ypres was formerly the capital of West Flanders. It is situated 25 miles south of Ostend on the Yperlee. The town lies in the midst of a fruitful region, which is drained by rivers and marsh land. Since the flooding of the country as a war measure, the swamp land is today as it was in the Middle Ages.

"In the 14th century, Ypres rivaled Bruges and Ghent. It was one of Europe's great cloth weaving centers, a city of vast wealth and one known everywhere through the excellence and popularity of its products. In its prime, it was a city of 200,000. Prior to the war, its population numbered 17,000.

**Once Fought French.**

"On July 11, 1332 it was their 'red coated' contingent that turned victory to the banners of the Flemings in their battle with the French under the walls of Courtrai, 12 miles east of Ypres. The Flemish army numbered 20,000 citizens of Ghent, Bruges and Ypres and the French 7,000 knights, and 40,000 foot soldiers.

"Several popular risings, the fearful plague of 1347 and then a wild bacchanal of wars blighted the hopes of Ypres, sapped its strength, destroyed its industry, killed off and scattered away its people, ruined its homes, and finally broke its spirit. The re-establishment of an independent Belgium found it hopelessly beaten in the struggle for prosperity and prestige."

**THE BATTLE FRONT**

Petrograd, Russia, Feb. 16.—(L. L. London.) The numbers of dead and wounded of the men at the front is enormous, for men in trenches are exposed only their heads and arms. Many hundreds are hit in the head and death does not result from the wound. Occasionally one may see the slightly retarded walk back with head bowed up or arms in slings. Motor trucks loaded with wounded tear along the roads leading back from the extreme front. ### CONSIDERABLE ACTIVITY BY GERMANS IS REPORTED

Official Semi-Weekly Statement From British Army Tells of Attacks Repulsed

By Associated Press.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—The British semi-weekly report of operations on the continent, given out today, reads as follows:

"The enemy continues to show considerable activity in the neighborhood of Ypres several attacks and counter-attacks have occurred. At six a. m. February 21 the enemy exploded an elaborate series of mines which destroyed one of our trenches. A new line was prepared a short distance in the rear and immediately occupied. Any attempts at further progress have been completely frustrated. Near Givenchy our infantry after a successful bombardment captured a trench of the enemy and blew it up.

"An attempted attack by the enemy along the Babussart canal was easily repulsed by our artillery. A mine in the River Leys there has been increased in artillery and rifle fire in which our troops showed marked superiority. Along the remainder of the front there has been nothing more than artillery duels. The thick weather has handicapped the work of air-craft.

### SENTIMENT DIVIDED ON SENDING JAPANESE ARMY

Large Element is in Favor of Rendering Active Assistance to Allies

By Associated Press.

Tokio, Feb. 23.—Strongly expressed opinion both for and against sending a Japanese army to Europe is found in the Japanese press.

The Osaka Mainichi remarks that although it has repeatedly drawn attention to the impossibility of sending Japanese troops to Europe it is to be regretted that there are still not a few who zealously favor the project of actively helping the allies. The paper continues:

"What most troubles us, however, is the apprehension increasingly entertained in England and in France as to our capacity to help the allies in assisting the allies. This apprehension is largely due to the reckless and imprudent manner in which some of us have insisted on Japan sending an army to Europe.

"To our thinking, those who consider it necessary to help the allies at the present moment do not represent the real opinion of our people and ignore the position which we occupy in our relation to other nations. Should the allied nations really be in need of our arms, their respect for government will command them to formally ask our government. It is not the attitude of patriotic people, with the peace of the world at heart, to cause ill feeling among our friends by insisting on the necessity of assisting the allies. Japan is contented with serious important questions relating to the far East which await urgent settlement and the allied nations would do well to remember that she cannot afford to send her troops to Europe."

The Tokio Yoronku on the other hand, prints an editorial in the French language and points out that Japanese participation would be accepted with joy by France which has never raised or troubled itself with the question of race. England and Russia, far from opposing the scheme, thought the newspaper, would be equally happy to accept Japanese assistance. The writer adds:

"On the day we decided to act in Europe we will receive from the allies a formal guarantee of advantages which will indemnify us for all sacrifices. As to the question of transportation that has certainly already been settled."

### GERMANY'S LAST RESERVES ARE NOW JOINING COLORS

Young Men Are Being Held Back To Form Nucleus For Future Army

By Associated Press.

Hanover, Germany, Feb. 23.—All German men attached to the Landsturm, or last reserve of the army, whether they had had previous training or not, were called out by decree on January 23. The order applied to all men who had not completed their sixth year by August 14, 1914, in the case of those who had been trained, or by December 4 in the case of untrained men. The service of the men is to continue till the end of the war.

The German War Department in calling on the elderly men at the present time is keeping its eyes open for the future. The announcement was made by the minister of war in a recent interview that the recruits due to come up this year in the ordinary course would not be called before the normal date in the fall. This apparent holding back from active service of good material in the shape of young men was decided on as a precaution for the future. The recruits of this year will be needed to form the basis of the new army when the war is over, since the ranks of the standing army, whenever peace may be declared, will certainly be found to have been depleted by casualties to a large extent. To this depletion must also be added the large number of men who will be entitled to return to civil life before the expiring of their full term of service with the colors, since the war service will give them the right to claim their discharge before they otherwise would have been able to do so under conditions of peace. As this will leave the army much below its proper strength, the war office has resolved to retain the younger men to build the nucleus of the standing army at the conclusion of peace.

On the other hand, the youths from sixteen to twenty years old who have volunteered to serve in the army before reaching the regulation age for military service, as well as the regular contingent of recruits called up last fall, are being assiduously trained in depth in all parts of the country in preparation for transportation to the firing line either in the east or the west. The young soldiers display great enthusiasm for the field work in which they are undergoing instruction under the care of experienced non-commissioned officers, some of whom have returned from the front suffering from slight wounds which do not hinder them in their work. Much of the usual stiff drill of the German army has been done away with and the youths may devote more time to and make rapid progress in the more useful warlike arts of shooting and trenching. Many have at first exercised in their civilian clothes, or in old uniforms in consequence of the lack of sufficient stores to supply them, but the gray field uniforms for all was soon provided.

### How Pecos Country Is Helping Farmers To Raise Live Stock

Special to The Times.

Pecos, Texas, Feb. 23.—Great increase in the amount of dairying done in the Pecos country and the profit from it promises to come from the visit of C. O. Moser, of Dallas, who spent five days in this territory for the purpose of explaining the dairy plan of the Texas Industrial Congress and pointing out the value of silos to the stock owners here. Mr. Moser came to Pecos at the request of the Pecos Commercial Club, as a representative of the Texas Industrial Congress.

After showing that any plan for increasing the dairy business of the state involved financing the farmers, Mr. Moser outlined the "Moser Dairy Plan" which provides for the organization of a Guarantors' Association, composed of business men and merchants. The association furnishes credit to farmers desiring to purchase dairy cattle when the application has been duly approved by its representatives, by signing the buyers' notes, which are strengthened by a mortgage on the cattle bought.

"If you don't feel safe about a man," said Mr. Moser, "don't furnish him any cows under this plan. Capitalize your farmers' past good records. If a man pays his debts and stands well you might consider him, but not unless you feel safe for you should assume no real liability. Bankers will do their share in the work, but it is too much to ask them to carry all the load. They must be made secure under the law, and their requirements can be bent satisfied in this way.

"A cow is a factory, and you get out of her what you invest in the way of care and feed, subject to some limitations. The secretary of your guarantors' association will receive an education in the dairy business, and will soon be able to advise the farmers on many points, and pass the lessons he has learned from one to another.

"Remember you provide credit, not cash. Your associations will require an education, the keeping of herds and the pure breeding of cattle. The three prerequisites of success are, the right class of cows; the right feed and care; and the consistent improvement of the breed."

The commercial club decided to investigate conditions and ascertain what steps can be taken to form a guarantors' association as described by Mr. Moser. Circular letters explaining the purpose of the organization, the manner in which the plan will work and a blank application has been sent to the farmers of this county. Farmers furnish information as to the number of cows they own, the number they hope to care for under the plan, the amount of alfalfa they have, the acreage of feedstuffs, their willingness to keep the records which the association may require, and finally, what additional security they may be able to offer when they purchase cows.
