CAPTURE OF PRZASNYSZ IS EFFECTED BY GERMANS

Important Victory Over Russians Is Gained In Fighting In Northern Poland

ENGLISH SYMPATHY FOR RUSSIAN SEA HOPES

Significant Political Announcement Is Made By Sir Edward Grey. Little Change In West

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 25.—Another important victory over the Russians was announced today by the German war office in the capture of the Polish town of Przasnysz. The heaviest fighting in northern Poland has taken place in the vicinity of this city, and its fall is said to have led to the capture of more than 10,000 Russians. Petrograd has also confirmed the report.

The French and German official communications of today indicate that the calm on the western front is unbroken. French attacks in Champagne continue without important results.

A declaration in the House of Commons today by Sir Edward Grey constitutes perhaps the most important political development since the opening of the war. The foreign secretary announced that Great Britain was in sympathy with Russia's operations for access to the sea. He referred to Russia's hope of obtaining Constantinople as a result of the war with Turkey.

The second week of Germany's submarine campaign opened today with the loss of two more British ships, the steamers Western Coast and Deptford being sunk off the English coast either by mines or torpedoes.

BELIEVE BRITISH TRANSPORT SUNK

By Associated Press. Berlin, Feb. 25.—According to dispatches reaching Berlin from points on the North Sea the Norwegian steamer Orla when coming through the English channel recently sighted a quantity of floating wreckage in which were to be seen British military uniforms. It is supposed that this clothing was from some British transport which had been sent to the bottom.

RUSSIANS AGAIN INVADE BUKOWINA

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 25.—Russian troops have re-invaded Bukowina and reoccupied Sadagora on the railroad four miles north of Czernowitz according to a dispatch by the Evening News from Mamornita in Roumania. The Austrians, the correspondent added, are pushing up their troops toward Czernowitz to meet the new Russian attack.

WAR NEWS SUMMARIZED

Germany's first week of blockading English ports is reported to have resulted in the loss of three of her submarines, but this is not confirmed. Eight steamers were sunk during the first week, five being British, two Norwegian and one French.

The capture of Przasnysz by the Germans gives them control of the railway line from East Prussia and may have a decided bearing upon the fighting in Poland.

The most important fighting in the west has been in the Champagne district of France, around Perthes, where the French have, it is claimed, been making slow but steady progress.

Norway is said to be preparing a very strong note to be sent to Germany in connection with the recent loss of some Norwegian ships by mines.

TWO MORE BRITISH BOATS ARE VICTIMS

SUNK IN ENGLISH CHANNEL BY EITHER MINE OR TORPEDO

ONE SAILOR REPORTED KILLED

Other Members of Crew Are Saved—Believe They Saw Wake of Submarine Near

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 25.—One sailor lost his life when the small British steamer Deptford, 239 feet long and 1200 tons was sent to the bottom in 20 minutes by either a German torpedo from a submarine or by coming in contact with a mine in the North Sea at 3 o'clock yesterday morning at a point off Scarborough. The fifteen other members of the steamer's crew were saved and were landed at South Shields early this morning.

The captain of the Deptford says he was on duty in the stockhold at the time the explosion in the torpedo room took place. He says he saw a flash of blue flame shoot up from the bottom of the ship and through her deck. The explosion threw him violently down and stunned him. He managed to reach the deck, however, as the vessel was heeling and just as the life boats were being launched. It was the carpenter of the Deptford who lost his life.

After hours in an open and leaky boat in a snowstorm which caused them to suffer acutely the men say they signalled a steamer but no notice was taken of their appeal. Later however, they encountered the steamer Falgout which picked them up and brought them into South Shields.

Some members of the crew say they saw the wake of a submarine after the Deptford was struck. The boat was owned by a London firm.

SMALL COASTING STEAMER SUNK IN ENGLISH CHANNEL

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 25.—The small British coasting steamer Western Coast has been struck by a mine or torpedo in the English channel at a point off Beachy Head. The crew was landed at Portsmouth today.

NAREW RIVER FIGHT STILL IN PROGRESS

TWO RUSSIAN REGIMENTS ARE SURROUNDED, BUT MAKE GET AWAY

CARPATHIAN GAINS CLAIMED

Report Tells of Successes at Several Points—Minor Victories Against Turks Mentioned

By Associated Press. Petrograd, Feb. 25.—The Russian official statement today reads: "North of Grodno there were actions Tuesday evening. Jastrubno and Stablino. In the Augustowa forest two regiments of the 29th Division which had been surrounded during the retreat broke through the enemy's lines and rejoined our forces. Patrols of the enemy are attempting to cross to the right bank of the Nieman river.

The battle is extending on the right bank of the Narew where attacks by the Germans are continuous all along the front from the Bobr district at Jedwabno as far as the section of Bodzow on the Vistula. Fighting is becoming very intense in the Przasnysz region on the right bank of the Vistula. We repelled attacks of the enemy at the village of Boguslav and at points to the west of Otoczno and Looschke.

At daybreak February 23 near Zawadzka we captured three lines of trenches on a height which is almost a sheer precipice. The Germans defending the height were killed or taken prisoners. German attacks were repulsed south of Myto Koulouka. We carried a height south of Ducia after a stubborn fight. We checked the enemy in the Dolina and Salthke roads on the right of Hostk.

JOHNSON TO MEET WILLARD IN HAVANA

SCHEDULED FIGHT AT JUAREZ HAS BEEN CALLED OFF

By Associated Press. Havana, Feb. 25.—Tom Flanagan who trained Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist for the fight with James Jeffries at Reno, announced today that he had received a cablegram from Johnson at Havana in which Johnson said he had called off the fight with Jess Willard set for March 5 at Juarez and that the fight would occur in Havana. Flanagan gave out the text of the cablegram as follows: "Will fight Willard here. Fight will draw as much as Jeffries-Johnson fight. There is not a chance for me to go to Mexico."

CURLEY DOESN'T BELIEVE JACK JOHNSON SAID IT

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 25.—Jack Curley, promoter of the Johnson-Willard fight before his departure today for Havana was told that Jack Johnson was reported as having said his fight with Willard would not be held at Juarez but in Cuba. "I don't believe Johnson ever said that," said Curley. "I am going to Havana to see what is the matter."

DACIA NOW NEARING HER JOURNEY'S END

ONLY 400 MILES FROM ENGLAND ON FEBRUARY 23, SHE REPORTS

WITHOUT INTERFERENCE YET

By Associated Press. New York, Feb. 25.—The steamship Dacia, which sailed from Norfolk February 11 for Rotterdam with cotton in the face of assertions she would be seized by British men of war, inasmuch as she had been a German vessel at the outbreak of the war, had almost completed her trip across the Atlantic without interference on February 23, according to messages received here today.

These messages said the Dacia was 400 miles west of Lands End, England on that date and she would proceed through the English channel to Rotterdam if not taken.

LAW ENFORCEMENT BOARD IS PROPOSED

WOULD LIMIT POWER OF ATTORNEY GENERAL TO COMPRO-MISE SUITS

BILLS PASS IN BOTH HOUSES

Two New Normals Favored—Change Is Made In Law For Railroad Damages

By Associated Press. Washington, Feb. 25.—Senator King is preparing a bill creating a board to be known as the "law enforcement board." The object is to prevent dismissal of suits brought by the attorney general's department unless, occurred in, by a majority of the board which is to be composed of the attorney general, the chairman of the railroad commission and the governor. It is understood that this bill is aimed at the attorney general for the compromise with the Katy railroad which closed some days ago.

A fight was started in the House today when the resolution to investigate the railroad was introduced by Leavelling, Byrne, Cope, Reeves and Dove. Representative Tamplin and Wagstaff opposed the resolution and Representative Cope made a strong appeal for it.

The Clark bill increasing pay of state attorneys was killed when brought up for final passage. Smith's semi-monthly pay day bill was passed finally.

The Senate passed finally today the bill by Senator Conner requiring the payment of attorneys' fees by corporations which refuse to pay damages within 30 days and when suit is brought to recover damages. The bill also adds to the present law of damages incurred by railroads and other corporations in the burning of their stacks and other feed products as well as livestock in transit.

New University Amendment. The Senate committee on education reported favorably Senator Gibson's joint resolution which removes the constitutional inhibition against the construction of buildings for A. M. College and the University of Texas out of general revenue funds. Notice of adverse minority report was given.

A favorable report was given Conner's Central West Texas Normal bill and also to Henderson and Butor's Northeast Normal College bill. Senate Judiciary Committee No. 1 reported favorably Senator Nugent's county depository bill which would reduce the bond on county depositories to only cover the first year's receipts instead of two years.

The Senate passed the scalp bounty bill by vote of 21 yeas and 13 nays. Wednesday afternoon Clark's racing bill was finally passed, 13 to 8, with three paired and one present and not voting.

Lewelling's bill prohibiting corporations or their representatives from making contributions to political campaigns was killed by the majority refusal to adopt the majority favorable report after voting down Page's minority report against the bill. The vote on the majority report was 17 yeas and 11 nays. Opponents of the bill contended successfully that the measure did not sufficiently cover contributions by corporations.

Bigger's House bill declaring prairie dogs a public nuisance also was killed by striking out the enactment clause, the opposition being based on the provision authorizing the sheriff to kill dogs on vacant lands and charge the expense to the property owner, it being asserted this would amount to unlawful confiscation.

Morrow's joint resolution to increase the supreme court to five members was passed by the Senate, 10 yeas and 10 nays. Favorable report was made on Cowley's bill prohibiting slot machines in depots and other public places unless an attendant is present to refund coin when the machine fails to make good.

There will be a joint meeting of the Senate and House committee on agriculture Saturday morning to consider the permanent warehouse bill and amendments.

Governor Ferguson is in hearty accord with the proposition for an increase of the Ranger force and told Senator Hudspeth, Representative McFarland, John Ammons, sheriff and tax collector of Valverde county and C. C. Belcher of Marfa, district attorney so when they called on him and presented data showing wholesale raids and theft of cattle, sheep and goats from West Texas ranches. In Valverde county alone they showed that 30,000 sheep and goats had been stolen in the last few months, and Senator Hudspeth himself has lost 700 sheep from his ranch. A tentative plan to add sixty men to the force, half to be paid by the State and half by the federal government, was submitted and it is this plan the governor will take up with Washington officials.

FOUR CHARGES OF MURDER FOLLOW GRAHAM TRAGEDY

DIDN'T KNOW THAT ANTWERP WAS TAKEN

CAPTURED RUSSIAN COMMANDER IN IGNORANCE OF WESTERN DEVELOPMENTS

GERMAN OFFICIAL STATEMENT

10,000 Russians Said To Have Been Captured What Przasnysz Was Taken By Germans

By Associated Press. Berlin, Feb. 25.—The German official statement follows: "In the western arena of the war in Champagne the enemy yesterday continued his desperate efforts which in spite of the strong forces engaged were again absolutely without success. Otherwise there has been nothing of importance on the western front."

"In the eastern arena the engagement on the Memel, Bobr and Narew rivers continue. The town of Przasnysz in Russian Poland which had been extensively fortified was stormed yesterday by the East Prussian reserves. After a stubborn fight we were victorious, capturing more than 10,000 prisoners, over 50 cannon, a large number of machine guns and a very large amount of war material in other engagements fought north of the Vistula. In the last few days we have taken 5000 Russian prisoners. In Poland, south of the Vistula the Russian advance to Mogily which is southeast of Bolinow, and occupied their positions. Their force in this movement outnumbered ours, five to one. Otherwise there is nothing of importance to report in this region."

It is characteristic that the commander of the 57th Russian reserve division, taken prisoner at Augustowa asked German officers whether it was true that Antwerp was being besieged. When the German and soon would fall. When the situation on the western front was explained to the Russian officer he refused to believe that the German western army was on French soil.

BRITISH RED CROSS SHIP ONE OF FINEST IN SERVICE

Luxurious Passenger Steamer Has Been Converted—Claim Germans Fired On It

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 25.—The British Red Cross hospital ship Asturias, which the allies assert was subjected to a submarine attack, is by the finest hospital ship in the British service. It flies between Havre and Southampton. In the old days the ship was in the "south American passenger service and was then noted for its luxurious accommodations and steadyness in rough water. Luxurious fittings are now cleared away, but nothing has been lost on the side of comfort. There are twelve hundred swinging beds for the wounded, who receive every care possible in a land hospital. While surgical operations at sea are generally avoided on hospital ships, unless of a minor kind, the operating theatre of the Asturias is so well equipped that many serious cases are handled there.

The Asturias is painted white with green stripes and carries a huge cross painted in red amidships on both sides. At night, the red cross is illuminated by electric lights and can be seen clearly from a long distance. Besides the doctors and orderlies there are twenty women nurses aboard.

BULLET IS REMOVED FROM BODY OF BRAKEMAN TODAY

Could Not Have Come From Own Pistol—Important Clue Is Being Investigated

The bullet which entered the back of R. F. Carter, the Fort Worth & Denver brakeman who was killed near Bowie Monday night was removed this morning. The bullet was not one which could have been fired from Carter's revolver but its size has not been made public.

It is understood that a clue which promises to lead to some development has been discovered and is now being investigated.

The body of Carter will be shipped tonight to Hoekley, Texas, near Houston. J. A. Guina, step-father of Carter arrived last night from that place. Several members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen will accompany the body to Hoekley.

STATEWIDE PROHIBITION MEASURE SIGNED IN IOWA

ACCUSED BROUGHT HERE AND JAILED

COMPLAINT AGAINST REPRESENTATIVE E. W. FRY IS ALSO INCLUDED

AUTO TRIP WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Accused Placed in Separate Cells—Two Deaths Result From Tuesday Morning's Shooting

Arriving at 11 p. m., Judge E. W. Fry, representative from Young county in the State legislature, and Peak Fry, his brother and John Lischke and Rufe Todd were brought over from Graham county in an automobile by Sheriff M. M. Wallace of Young county and Sheriff Sam Rogers of Jack county and are now in jail here.

All are charged with murder in connection with the death of Deputy Sheriff E. W. Cherryholmes who died at Graham at 3:30 yesterday afternoon from wounds received in an exchange of shots between guards at the Young county court house and four men who attempted to hold them up, with intent, it is believed, to enter the court house.

Pat Carlton, one of the four men alleged to have attacked the guards, died at 10:30 last night as the result of wounds received in the exchange of shots. Peak Fry is suffering considerably from pain on his head but it is not believed serious. It was well dressed by physicians at Graham and a change of dressing will not be necessary today. The wounded man ate a light breakfast at the jail this morning and when asked whether he wished for a physician said he did not think it would be necessary to call a physician today.

All of the prisoners were taken this morning and were described as "down faced." In compliance with a request by Sheriff Wallace at Graham, Sheriff McPhee at the jail here immediately to see the prisoners who are locked in separate cells.

Removal Was Requested. The Young and Jack county sheriffs arrived with the prisoners at about eleven o'clock last night and after turning them over to Deputy Sheriff McPhee at the jail here immediately to see the prisoners who are locked in separate cells.

Makes Antwerp Statement. Before his departure to Deputy Sheriff Cherryholmes made a statement in which he said he and Riley Collins, the other guard at the court house, were commanded by Pat Carlton and R. M. Todd to throw up their hands which instead of doing they opened fire. The man known as Lischke and Peak Fry is alleged to have been in the shadow of the court house at the time and joined in the shooting during which Cherryholmes was mortally wounded.

John Lischke, one of the men in jail here, is said to be from Fort Worth. Pat Carlton lived at Graham. Peak Fry and Rufe Todd were also residents of Graham. Cherryholmes leaves a widow and four children. He was about 45 years of age and was highly respected. Carlton was unmarried.

Additional Guards Placed. Additional guards, it was learned here today, were placed on duty at the Young county court house last night and every effort will be made to securely protect the records of the commissioners court and the warrants on which the prosecution of Judge Fry and the civil suits against the former county clerk and treasurer and their sixty-five bondsmen are based.

These warrants were in Wichita Falls several weeks ago, having been brought here by the present commissioners court and the county attorney for examination by Attorneys John C. Kay and P. A. Martin who have been retained by the Young county authorities in connection with the civil suits to recover \$25,000 alleged to have been illegally taken from the county treasury. It is believed that the tragedy Wednesday morning resulted from an attempt to secure possession of these documents.

KILLING 22 YEARS AGO IS CAUSE OF MURDER TRIAL

Bell County Citizen Faces Jury At Georgetown In Connection With Sberic's Death

Georgetown, Texas, Feb. 25.—The charge of murder against Theo Armstrong, a well known citizen of Holland, Bell county, was called in the criminal district court here today. Armstrong is charged with killing Sheriff John T. Oliver of Williamson county one dark night, September, 1892 while the sheriff was waiting with United States Marshal John T. Henkin for a train to go to Belton. On the platform at the little station of Echo Oliver was shot from the darkness and died in Taylor the next day. Armstrong was indicted 22 years afterward. Governor Ferguson and Secretary of State John G. McCoy are among the witnesses summoned.

As yet the other pupils have not learned the cause of their classmate's exemptions from French chatter at the table. If they do find out it is feared that doctor's certificates will become epidemic.

Five of these were British, one French and two Norwegian, but only four lives were lost. So it will be noticed by this that the German blockade is really amounting to more than was at first expected. Many were inclined to believe that Germany was only bluffing—that she had threatened to do something that was impossible for her to put into execution, but one week of the blockade has demonstrated that Germany can and is making her threat good.

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT ENDORSES WILSON'S FOREIGN POLICIES. The other day in a public address ex-President Taft gave his endorsement of the manner in which President Wilson is handling the foreign affairs of this nation in the following: "Our efforts for peace have been made as complete as possible, for the president already has tendered his good offices by way of mediation between the powers, and they have not been accepted.

In preserving the commerce of the United States with the belligerents however, we are face to face with a crisis. We are threatened with a serious invasion of our rights as neutrals in trading with the belligerent countries. What certainly is an innovation on previous rules in respect to neutral commerce and contraband of war has been initiated by belligerents of both sides. The planting of mines in the open sea and the use of submarines to send neutral vessels to the bottom without inquiry as to their neutrality when found in so-called war zones of the open sea, are all of them a violation from the rules of international law governing the actions of belligerents toward neutrals.

"When their violation results in the destruction of lives of American citizens or of American property, a grave issue will arise as to what the duty of this government is. The responsibility of the president and Congress in meeting the critical issue presented in protecting our neutral rights and our national honor on the one hand, with disregard to the awful consequences to our 90,000,000 people in engaging in this horrible world war on the other will be very great. It involves on their part a judgment most momentous in its consequences, that we should earnestly pray that the necessity for it may be averted."

M. Bell, guilty, five years, suspended; Arthur Bentley, horse theft, guilty, two years; Bob Lewis, guilty, two years; T. N. Stubbs, forgery, five years, suspended; W. F. Hardeman, theft, guilty, three years, suspended; Joe Lewis, not guilty; Tom McNeill, guilty, two years, suspended; Charles Echeleman, robbery, guilty, five years; Jim Sparks, robbery, guilty, five years; Bob Carroth, keeping gaming table, guilty, two years; Leo Jordan, guilty, two years, suspended; Charlie White, guilty, two years, suspended; Charlie Madison, burglary, two years; T. M. Grisham, murder, not guilty; R. Rhodes, wherein convictions were secured at the June term, were appealed and reversed. The case of Alva Johnson was appealed and affirmed but Johnson was later pardoned. Hex Warnock withdrew his appeal and is now serving a sentence of two years for bootlegging at Electric.

RED CROSS NURSE WRITES OF EXCITING EXPERIENCES

Hospital Under Fire and Attendants Forced To Stay In Cellar For Safety.

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 25.—A letter received by an English family from a daughter serving as a Red Cross nurse in Flanders gives a thrilling glimpse of a girl's life on the Neuport-Dixmude line.

"We had a lively day of shelling on Monday," she writes. "At about 10:30 whizz-bang! just outside our house, and all our glass came shattering down. Whizz-bang! another, and another, and yet another. Just then the Belgian doctor came in and told us we had better go into the cellar. We went down into the cold, damp cellar and stood about on bits of wood and coal. I listened to the continuing whizz, bang and crash of big shells. The noise was pretty near deafening, and they must have plumped in about 100. Out of all that lot luckily we only got two wounded men—a priest, wounded by a flying bit in the face and a soldier. It was extremely lucky on that day the trenches opposite our house were not occupied or there would have been many killed and wounded."

Continuing her letter on the following day, the writer says: "The big cannonade is still going on. There must be a tremendous battle, I am hoping they are getting ground, and that we shall move on down the road. I should just love to move forward into Brussels. The weather has been truly awful lately, nothing but rain. I live in knee-high rubber boots and my oilskins. I am sure I will never be able to get into hobble skirts and 'fashionable sides' as our American nurse says. We are thinking of going to Furnes for the afternoon, just for a joy ride. We have been hard at it for nearly a week now without a break, so we think of going. You have no idea what a pleasure a trundle into Furnes is, when you have not done a thing but remain in two smelly stoves daily in and out. I will tell you what the pleasure consisted of: getting into a motor ambulance that has seen its best days, and splashing over broken, holey roads that nearly jolt one's inside out; probably at least once, and perhaps twice, sticking in the deep mud and slogging to get out and push and shove to get the car out, and eventually arriving at Furnes and having a mad rush round the shops and grabbing all stores we can find, but it all seems so new and interesting after a desolate town. Then a mad rush back again, over the same bumpy, holey road and home to our tumbled-down cottage. Yet you have no idea what a great treat it seems to us."

SAYS GERMANS LOST 50,000 IN RAWKA RIVER FIGHTING

Correspondent of French Paper Believes Army Is Showing But Surely Wearing Out.

Paris, Feb. 25.—At least 50,000 men were lost by the Germans in their attack on the Russian position on the Rawka river and in the regions of Borlimow and Gumbliaken, according to Ludevik Naudean, the Journal's correspondent who witnessed the operations. He considers the general situation highly favorable to the Russians and says: "The Germans are being gradually but implacably worn down. Whether they attack or merely defend themselves their armies melt away from day to day. Their feverish activities and their frightful sacrifices of lives show they realize they are fighting against time."

MASTER PLUMBERS GUILTY OF TRUST LAW VIOLATIONS

Thirty-Six Are Convicted at Des Moines Today on Sherman Law Charges.

By Associated Press. Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 25.—Thirty-six master plumbers who have been on trial here since February 10 on charges of violating the Sherman antitrust law were convicted by a jury in the federal district court Wednesday. Judge John C. Pollock will pass sentence later.

DRASTIC QUARANTINE IS ORDERED BY COMMISSION

Absolutely Prohibits Importation of Livestock Into Texas From Any Where.

Fort Worth, Texas, Feb. 25.—The most drastic quarantine ever placed upon the State of Texas was drafted by the state livestock sanitary commission Wednesday and sent to Austin for the signature of the governor. The measure means that the importation of any form of livestock, by any means and for any purpose, is strictly prohibited. All railway companies and corporations are warned not to accept the shipments destined for Texas. Continued prevalence of the foot and mouth disease in other States is cited as the cause for the proclamation. This style of quarantine is deemed necessary by the commission in order to protect the livestock interests of Texas. So far this State is immune from the disease. The commission has adopted this plan of keeping it so. A corrected draft of the measure was sent to Austin for the approval of the governor. With his signature the measure becomes effective. Following is the draft of the quarantine: "Owing to the continued prevalence of the contagious, communicable disease, known as foot and mouth disease, among livestock throughout the United States, and the livestock sanitary commission of Texas having been petitioned by numerous representative livestock owners of this State to use every precaution within its power to prevent the possible spreading of this dreadful disease in the range of Texas, all previous orders relating to foot and mouth disease are hereby annulled and the following orders promulgated: "Effective on and after Feb. 25, 1915, the importation of any and all classes of livestock, including cattle, horses, mules, jacks, jennets, sheep, goats, other ruminants and swine, into the State of Texas from any State in the United States, District of Columbia, Dominion of Canada or Republic of Mexico, unless said cars shall have first been cleaned and disinfected with a 5 per cent solution of carbolic acid or 3 per cent solution of Cresol compound, U. S. P., and to either of which disinfectant a sufficient quantity of lime must be added to show where the disinfectant solution has been applied. "It is further ordered that, effective February 25, 1915, every person, company, corporation, their agents or servants, are hereby prohibited from bringing into the State of Texas from any State in the United States, District of Columbia, Dominion of Canada or Republic of Mexico any hides, hoofs, horns or skins of any livestock, or any hay, straw, fodder, cottonseed or other products or material calculated to carry infection of foot and mouth disease."

KILLING 22 YEARS AGO IS CAUSE OF MURDER TRIAL

Bell County Citizen Faces Jury At Georgetown in Connection With Sheric's Death

Georgetown, Texas, Feb. 25.—The charge of murder against Theo Armstrong, a well known citizen of Holland, Bell county, was called in the criminal district court here today. Armstrong is charged with killing Sheriff John T. Oliver of Williamson county one dark night, September, 1892 while the sheriff was waiting with United States Marshal John T. Rankin for a train to go to Belton. On the platform at the little station of Echo Oliver was shot from the darkness, and died in Taylor the next day. Armstrong was indicted 22 years afterward. Governor Ferguson and Secretary of State John G. McKay are among the witnesses summoned.

SOLVE FARM HELP PROBLEM

Scores of Tenant Houses Being Built for Accommodation of Men With Families.

Year-round farming, with diversified crops that furnish something to sell at every season, tends to make uniform the labor needs of the farm, a writer in the Country Gentleman says. Such places most need steady, dependable men, with greater skill and a knowledge of the details of a number of different operations, and it is here that the married man stands the best chance.

Scores of little tenant houses are being built this year as a solution of the labor problem. An attractive cottage, with garden, poultry yard and cow will go a long way toward persuading a reliable man to sign a year's contract. And when the landlord has a man and his family well established in a comfortable cottage he need not be worried over the prospect of his help's disappearing after the weekend holiday. The average farm hand with a family is more sober and reliable than the fellow without attachment, who is inclined to rest from job to job at intervals of two or three months.

No investment will pay quite so immediate a return as the money spent in erecting a good tenant's cottage and in making it attractive. The last point is by no means unimportant, since many a farm hand is kept on the job because his family likes the tenant house and is able to get a good living from the place in addition to his wages.

Artificial Seasoning of Timber. Methods of artificial seasoning of timber have been devised within recent years. Seasoning that would occupy three or four years by natural processes can now be accomplished in proper kilns in from three or four days to as many weeks.

The work is done in closed-in buildings, capable of holding from 20,000 to 50,000 cubic feet of timber. The floor is gently sloping, and the timber is gradually passed down it. A fan draws air over the surfaces of the stems, and the air passes through the piles of boards or planks which are separated about an inch. The air enters at the lower end in order to carry the moisture derived from the timber that has been long in the kiln to that which has just been introduced at the upper end.

The reason for this is that in seasoning the air must be charged with moisture at the beginning and only dry at the later stages. Without this precaution the timber would be "case-dried," the interior remaining damp. In the latter instance it would afterwards warp and crack.
