STOP GERMAN COMMERCE, ENTIRELY, ENGLAND'S PLAN

All Commodities Included In Block- ade Policy Announced Today By Premier Asquith

By Associated Press.

London, March 1.—The establishment of a virtual blockade of hostile countries is Great Britain's reply to Germany's attack on merchant shipping as announced officially today by Premier Asquith in a momentous speech in the House of Commons. The plan of the allied governments for the regulation of shipping to and from ports of hostile nations contemplates the prevention of commodities of every kind reaching or leaving those ports, without however, risks to neutral vessels or their crews. The allies will hold themselves at liberty to capture goods presumed to have come from hostile countries or deemed to be destined for them.

They have no intention, however, of confiscating ships or cargoes which are detained unless they are liable under confiscation under normal conditions of war. The premier revealed these measures of reprisal to Parliament and the nation on introducing the third and fourth votes for credit to meet the expenses of the year. These are respectively \$185,000,000 and to balance the expenditures of the current fiscal year making the total cost of eight months of war \$1,810,000,000 and another vote of \$1,250,000,000 as the first installment for the year opening April 1.

"Germany has driven her opponents to adopt retaliatory policies to prevent commodities of every kind from reaching or leaving Germany," said Premier Asquith. The proposed measures of reprisal against Germany, he said, would be enforced with strict observance of the dictates of humanity but the allies did not propose "to allow their efforts to be strangled in a network of judicial niceties." Referring to the German naval campaign against British shipping Premier Asquith declared Germany had violated systematically all the conventions intended for the mitigation of warfare. She had taken further steps, the premier said, by organizing an "undersea campaign of piracy and pillage." Germany, he declared, was not blockading, and never could blockade English shores.

Referring to what he termed whispers of peace, Mr. Asquith said it was not time to talk of peace, that this time would arrive "only when the great purpose of the allies is in sight of accomplishment." He declared that the allies would hold themselves free to capture goods wherever there was a presumption that such goods were destined for the use of their enemies or had been sent from hostile countries.

OVERDRAFT RULING NOW IN FORCE IN LOCAL BANKS

Becomes Effective Today and Checks That Aren't Covered Will Be Returned

Better watch the stubs in your check-book from now on. The ruling of the Controller of the currency, forbidding overdrafts, became effective today and the national banker who heretofore has obligingly put his o. k. on your check that wasn't covered by funds, is no longer allowed to do so. It is stated that no exceptions will be made and the check that comes in without funds on hand to cover it is apt to go back with the little mark "naff" on it. Bankers are hopeful that their depositors will watch matters closely and avoid overdrafts, which are embarrassing to the banker and depositor, especially to the latter.

MANSION EXPENSE PROBE IS FAVORED

RESOLUTION FOR INVESTIGATION RECOMMENDED BY SENATE COMMITTEE

COMPULSORY EDUCATION BILL

Favorable Report Given In Senate— Postpone Cottonseed Trust Probe Resolution

Austin, Texas, March 1.—A favorable report was given today by Senate committee on state affairs on a resolution for investigation of the expenditures of the appropriations made for the years of the Colquhoun administration for the governor's mansion. This report, however, was followed by an adverse minority report, signed by Senators Hudspeth, McCallum and Page.

The Senate committee on educational affairs today reported favorably the House compulsory school attendance bill which was passed in the House last Friday.

The McGreggor bill providing for a probe of an alleged cottonseed trust which has been pending since last Friday was postponed again today by unanimous consent until Wednesday. The Senate finally passed a bill by Bailey of Harris appropriating \$25,000 for proper representation by Texas at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

Senator Townsend offered a resolution in the Senate today which put the Senate on record as opposed to repeal of the Robertson law or any material change; the resolution was referred to the Senate committee on insurance.

The House refused to engross the Nabours bill to prohibit usury by a vote of 52 to 51. It was the only measure of the day that caused a debate. Representative Nabours declared that many banks are violating the law of usury and are charging all the way from fifteen to 115 per cent on small loans and that the small loans are the kind which tenant farmers usually need.

PRECAUTIONS TAKEN BY AMERICAN LINER

LIFE BOATS READY FOR INSTANT USE WHILE IN WAR ZONE

NATIONALITY IS PLAINLY SHOWN

United States Flags Fly Prominently and Vessel Is Kept Ablaze With Lights

New York, March 1.—The American liner New York today arrived here from Liverpool after having taken unusual pains to make known her nationality. The vessel, passing through the war zone declared by Germany. Extraordinary precautions against mines were observed to the extent of having the life boats swung outward ready for immediate use.

Flying the American flag, the New York left her dock in Liverpool shortly after midnight February 20. Her lights were all lit as she steamed out to sea and some of the passengers said searchlights played on American flags which blew from almost every mast. The ship remained ablaze with lights and with all flags up while steaming through the war zone and until safe waters were reached.

Although it was reported that the New York's course was guarded by British torpedo boats to the limit of the war zone no such craft were seen by those aboard.

BERLIN STATEMENT SAYS FRENCH ATTACKS REPULSED

Makes Mention of New and Deadly Bombs in Use By French

Berlin, March 1.—The German official statement follows:
"In the western theatre of war near Verdun north of Tilly an English flying machine has been forced to descend by our fire. At a certain part of our front the French have made use, as they have done on previous occasions, of a particular kind of shell which on exploding, throws out evil and poisonous gases; these, however, did not damage us.

Our positions in the Champagne country were repeatedly attacked yesterday by at least two army corps. These forces were repulsed after fierce fighting at close quarters. In the Aronne at Vouglons the French made five attempts yesterday to break through our line. All these attacks were broken down with heavy loss to the enemy. The positions which we have occupied to the northwest of Adonville were regained yesterday in spite of the attempts of the enemy to recapture them.

"In the eastern arena of the war, we repulsed Russian attacks north of Oshna and northwest of Ostrolenka. Otherwise there was nothing of importance to report."

GIGANTIC FLANKING MOVEMENT FAILURE

RUSSIA THINKS THIS WAS PLAN OF GERMANS AT PRZASNYZ

CLAIM VICTORY WAS DECISIVE

Prussians Said To Have Lost Many Guns and Men In Their Rapid Retreat

Petrograd, March 1.—The highest importance is attached by the Russian military authorities to the German defeat at Przasnyz. It is asserted by Russian staff officers that the Germans' hope of success during their operations of the last fortnight along the northern front was based upon their confidence in breaking the Russian line at Przasnyz. This attempt by the Germans to strengthen their position on their left wing, which was an important part of a gigantic enveloping movement extending from Augustowo to Eastern Galicia, is said today by the Russian leaders to have failed definitely.

The Russians assert that the retirement of the Germans in the north is more precipitate and disorderly than any previous retreat in this theatre of the war. They state that the Germans have abandoned large numbers of heavy and light guns and have even left behind slightly wounded soldiers in an effort to execute a hasty retreat. This condition of affairs according to the Russian viewpoint assumes added significance from the fact that the Germans are said to have employed some of their best troops in this fighting. There are many indications that the Germans were getting confident of success.

The reported German plan for undertaking a wedge of Grodno would now appear to be abandoned, with the Prussians advancing along the left bank of the Nieman toward East Prussia and in endangering the position of the German left flank.

RUSSIAN PROGRESS NEAR PRZASNYZ IS CLAIMED

Prisoners and Artillery Captured in Fighting North of Grodno; From Beet Corps

Petrograd, March 1.—Semi-official announcement is made in Petrograd as follows:
"Russian troops should be credited with the initiative in the movement north of Grodno. Prisoners and artillery captured by the Russians north of Grodno are from the best corps of the German armies now on the eastern front. Russian progress in the region of Przasnyz has been notable. We have captured one village after another, taking several hundred prisoners at each place. In some actions the Germans are delivering counter attacks, bringing fresh troops into action and certain villages pass from the possession of one side or the other. Nevertheless our front advances measurably each day."

TURKEY IS READY TO MOVE CAPITAL TO ASIATIC SIDE

British And French Flags Fly Over Dardanelles—Early Taking Of Constantinople Not Expected

VERY STUBBORN STRUGGLE IN NORTH POLAND

Violent Engagement In Bukowina— French Gains In Champagne Not Admitted In Berlin

London, March 1.—The flags of Great Britain and France now are flying at the entrance to the Dardanelles over the Turkish forts reduced by the sea power of the allies. While it would appear to be a fact that the allied fleet had reached Chanak fifteen miles from the Mediterranean entrance to the straits, the British press warns the public not to expect the immediate fall of Constantinople. Nevertheless the operations of the British and French warships against the sea defenses of Constantinople are creating a tremendous stir in the near east.

Broussa in Asiatic Turkey has been selected by the Turks as their new capital in case it becomes necessary to evacuate Constantinople. The Germans in Turkey, it is declared, wanted the Turks to move to Adrianople in European Turkey, but the Turks would have none of this and started shipping their archives to Broussa.

Interest in the fighting along the eastern battle front has been deflected for the moment from the Carpathians to the north of Poland where the Russians appear to be making a desperate effort to regain the ground Field Marshal Von Hindenburg won when he forced them from East Prussia. Consequently the stubborn struggle continues on the line from the Bobr to the Naraw rivers where Grand Duke Nicholas has yet to establish his ascendancy. Vienna reports a violent engagement in Bukowina without saying anything about the outcome while Petrograd claims to have checked the Austro-German advance in this region.

In the west interest is centering on the fighting in the Champagne region where fierce attacks and counter attacks have marched the operations of the last week. Berlin claims to have repulsed the continued French advances in this region while Paris asserts the French troops have been successful in making progress in repulsing the German counter attacks. Paris claims also the capture of nearly two miles of trenches to the northwest and north of Beausejour.

DECIDED GAINS CLAIMED BY FRENCH IN CHAMPAGNE

Two Kilometers of Positions Held— Slight Progress Made in Re- gion of Voignes

Paris, March 1.—The official statement follows:
"There is nothing to add to the communication of yesterday evening except that in Champagne the different supporting positions we successfully secured now form a continuous chain two kilometers in length to the north and northwest of Forches, and that in the Vosges our attacks made slight progress at Chapelotte, three kilometers north of Celles."

VICTORY BY VILLA FORCES CLAIMED AT SAN MATEO

Capture of Town of Acambara From Carranza Forces Is Also Reported

El Paso, Texas, March 1.—A battle between Villa and Carranza troops at San Mateo, Chihuahua, and the capture of Acambara, Guanajuato state is reported in a brief telegram signed by Francisco Villa, received here last night by the Associated Press. The message, dated Guadalupe reads:

"I take pleasure in informing you that in a battle held yesterday (Saturday) at San Mateo the forces belonging to the column of General Urbina defeated the Carranza force who lost between 45 and 50 men. They also captured seven prisoners and about 200 fugitives, besides 50 rifles and a rapid fire. In the State of Guanajuato the forces under General Isaac Arroyo of the northern division took the city of Acambara, capturing several locomotives and a large quantity of war supplies."

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

Recipe for White Cake

Two cups of sugar, one cup of butter, one cup of milk, whites of seven eggs, well beaten, three rounding teaspoons of baking powder, one-half teaspoon each of lemon and vanilla and enough Swansdown cake flour to make batter of proper consistency. Cream butter and sugar, add milk and egg whites. Then add stiffly beaten whites of eggs and flour, in which the baking powder has been sifted, stirring in a little flour then folding eggs in alternately. Add flavoring last.

Frosting: One cup of sugar, one-half cup of water, one tablespoon of vinegar. Boil until syrup threads, add one-half pound of marshmallows to syrup when done, then pour over whites of two eggs, well beaten, and beat until cold.

WILLIAMSON COUNTY SCENE OF OIL BOOM

MUCH EXCITEMENT FOLLOWS RECENT DISCOVERY IN THRALL VICINITY

MANY WICHITANS VISIT SCENE

Leases Are Being Taken on Large Scale and Much Work is in Prospect

Williamson county now has a regular oil boom; following the discovery of oil at Thrall, near Taylor, several days ago. A Taylor dispatch to the Dallas News tells of the situation there, as follows:

The bringing in of the Fritz Fuchs oil well near Thrall, and eight miles east of Taylor, last Sunday morning has given new life and an impetus to all mercantile lines in Taylor, and business here is brisk. Especially are the banks, the lawyers' and land agents' offices, the hotels and boarding and rooming-houses scenes of activity, principals and employes of same working overtime to accommodate the visitors, promoters and prospectors now arriving here on every train. The hotels are crowded to overflowing bedding and cots being placed in hallways and bathrooms to supply the demand for lodgings, while cafes and restaurants are enjoying fine patronage.

It is estimated by conservative land agents that farm lands in the vicinity of the oil well have increased from 100 to 500 per cent in value. Hundreds of hundreds of leases are and have been negotiated and many options taken.

Among the latest arrivals in Taylor from other oil centers are A. W. Statti and C. Statti of the Houston-Oklahoma Oil Company, also H. T. Staff of Houston, president of the Prairie Oil Company, and the Houston-Oklahoma Oil Company. The latter official said concerning the new field:

"This is a most exciting here. Of course there is cause for it. There is no question in my mind but what the Thrall field is a great one. I think it is an extensive field and not just a pool. The oil is of splendid quality. To the extent of the field it must be remembered that for some time it has been known that you could strike oil in some quantities in this section. In some other places the oil sand seemed shallow. In the Thrall field they are striking a good thick sand. Some big prices are going to be paid and some good propositions are going to be overlooked. A month from now we will be back here, and both of us will be laughing at some things which have been done in the rush and confusion. This is a real oil rush."

Another oil man, like N. Bettison of Corpus Christi, the man who successfully capped the Lucas well near Beaumont, when the gusher ran wild, arrived in Taylor today and has several drilling outfits which he is bringing to the Taylor-Thrall field.

Stock companies for the drilling for oil are being formed at Taylor, Thrall, Rockdale, Thorndale and Elgin.

Reports from the well today are that since packing the six-inch pipe to four inches, thus creating a conservation of gas, the well is flowing more steadily, with an output daily of about five hundred barrels. Surface tanks are being constructed to retail the oil until a pipe line can be constructed to Thrall, a distance of two miles.

Of the many prominent oil men of Texas now here watching the Thrall field are Lee Hager, Dave Beady, Howard Fig, Les Blaffer, P. H. Richardson, Bass, J. S. Callinan, Wright and the Statti brothers, and others of Houston.


