EMPHATIC NOTE TO CARRANZA BRINGS NEW MEXICAN CRISIS

NOTICE SERVED BY WILSON CONDITIONS MUST IMPROVE

Situation Considered Most Serious Since Marines Were Landed At Vera Cruz

ANOTHER CRUISER SENT TO MEXICAN WATERS

Note Does Not Threaten Force But Points Out Possible Consequences If Conditions Continue

By Associated Press.

Washington, March 8.—New and urgent representations amounting to practically a warning have been sent by the United States to General Carranza demanding an improvement of conditions in Mexico City. Diplomats familiar with the contents of the note which American Consul Silliman has been instructed to present to Carranza, interpret it as an entire change of policy on the part of the Washington government toward the Mexican government.

The communication to Carranza, drafted after conferences between President Wilson, Secretary Bryan and Counselor Lansing was guarded with secrecy pending some word from Carranza as to his attitude. It was said by some officials to contain the strongest representations ever made to Carranza and indicates that the American government is rapidly losing patience with his indifference to the objectionable actions of General Obregon at Mexico City.

Those who know the contents of the communication said it did not threaten force and was not in the nature of an ultimatum, but pointed out in explicit language the serious consequences that might follow if the welfare of foreigners continued to be disregarded.

Early in the day Secretary Daniels said no additions were contemplated to the fleet in Mexican waters but later it was learned that the cruiser Tacoma had been ordered from Port au Prince Haiti to Vera Cruz. Secretary Daniels was in consultation later with Secretary Bryan concerning the situation. Further movements of vessels may be decided upon. In diplomatic quarters there were more manifestations of concern over the Mexican situation than at any time since the American forces were landed at Vera Cruz.

READY FOR EVENTUALITIES. The foreign diplomats conferred among themselves and communicated to one another the latest developments as they heard them. Some of the diplomats declared themselves satisfied that the course of the American government would produce results. One of the ministers who had received word that the diplomatic corps would leave Mexico City, called his legation saying that after learning what serious steps the American government had taken, he advised the corps to remain in the capital and await developments.

Just what move is contemplated now is known only to President Wilson and a few of his closest advisers but it was apparent from the attitude of officials at hand which must be met with strong measures. The general impression in official quarters was that even though the use of force had not been threatened the American government was prepared to meet eventualities and would hereafter pursue an insistent course to compel protection for foreigners and their interests.

CARRANZA AND OREGON. Secretary Bryan would say only that conditions at Mexico City had not changed from their serious status of the last few days. He said no word had come directly from Carranza in the last two or three days. When asked whether Carranza and Obregon were at odds and whether the former would control his Mexico City commander, Secretary Bryan replied that the state department had advised Carranza that his government must be a government of law and order. nouncements, practically sanctioned plundering and rioting, even predicting the evacuation of his own forces if the riots developed into extensive demonstrations. An international relief committee composed of residents of the foreign colony came forward with an offer of 250,000 pesos to buy food and take charge of the situation, but Obregon refused freight facilities or permission to undertake the work.

The petition recently sent a petition to the state department described as one of the most sensational character; Secretary Bryan constantly has declined to make it public, although apprised that the object of the committee in sending it was to give the statement publicity in the United States. Mr. Bryan believes that while the American government is bringing strong pressure to bear on Carranza it will not assist the plight of foreigners in Mexico City if the statement is published.

The petition is believed to have been one of the factors that influenced the Washington government to send its note of warning to Carranza, although dispatches from the British minister and other diplomatic representatives at Mexico City have brought advice of a similar nature. In order to give his entire time to consideration of European and Mexican questions, President Wilson will see White House callers only for an hour Wednesday and Thursday during the spring and summer. He will be in almost constant communication with Secretary Bryan and Counselor Lansing of the state department.

FLAMES AGAIN THREATEN PLANT OF THOMAS EDISON. Inventor Discovers Fire and Gives Alarm—Valuable Records Are Endangered. By Associated Press. West Orange, N. J., March 8.—Thomas Edison, at work in his laboratory after midnight today discovered fire in one of the buildings of his great plant here. He summoned his firemen in time to prevent what might have been a serious loss. The fire almost destroyed a building where the most valuable phonograph records were stored. Most of these records, which were in a concrete vault, were saved.

Which he saw the flames, Mr. Edison dashed out of the laboratory in his shirt sleeves and stood directing the firemen for some time before his wife and son who arrived from the Edison residence nearby could persuade him to get on an overcoat. The inventor was soaked to the skin by a hose which twisted out of the hands of the fire fighters. The building burned was the only one not touched by the conflagration which nearly wiped out the Edison plant last December.

ACCEPTING OF REBATES IS CHARGE AGAINST TEXAN. Roy Campbell of San Antonio on Trial Before Federal Court at Houston. By Associated Press. Houston, Texas, March 8.—With more than 50 witnesses present from different sections of the United States and special prosecuting counsel here from the department of justice at Washington, the case of the United States vs. Roy Campbell of San Antonio, charged with accepting rebates under the Elkins law, was called for trial before Judge Burns in the federal court this morning. As head of the Southern Fruit Growers Association, the allegations in brief are that Campbell conspired to secure lower freight rates than were given competitors. The trial is expected to consume most of the week.

SCOTT LEAVES TO TREAT WITH INDIANS

ARMY'S CHIEF OF STAFF TO CONFERENCE WITH RENEGADE, TSE NE GAT

TO TAKE LONG TRIP OVERLAND

Will Try To Induce Surrender By Giving Positive Assurance of Fair Play

By Associated Press. Denver, March 8.—Brigadier General Hugh Scott, chief of staff of the United States army planned today to begin a 1200 mile overland journey into the desert country of southeast Utah for Tse Ne Gat the Plute wanted by the federal authorities on a charge of murder. Tse Ne Gat is being aided in his efforts to resist capture by his father, "Old Poik," and a band of renegade Plutes who are thought to be entrenched a few miles southwest of Hurr, Utah. The purpose of General Scott's journey from Washington is to seek out the fugitives and through assurances of fair treatment induce the surrender of Tse Ne Gat to the federal authorities. General Scott left Denver yesterday for Thompson's crossing, Utah, whence he will cross the desert. He is accompanied by his aide, Col. Robert Michay and an orderly.

The first part of the journey will be made in a light wagon, drawn by four mules, with Indian guides. Will be secured at Hurr, Utah and beyond that point rough country will force the party to travel on horseback.

MEASURE ENROSED IN SENATE BY VOTE OF SEVENTEEN TO TEN

TEXAS COMPANY BILL SIGNED

Many Members of House Will Attend Corner Stone Laying at Dallas Tomorrow

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 8.—The Senate today endorsed the compulsory education bill, seventeen to ten. Senator Lattimore offered an amendment which was adopted providing that children who are needed for the support of parents and who have reached the age of twelve years may be exempted upon the completion of the first four grades.

The Connor amendment that a county or school district may, by a vote exempt from the operations of the law, seventeen to ten.

Despite the fact that the House today did not act on the resolution by the Dallas delegation to attend the laying of the cornerstone ceremonies of the Union Station at Dallas which left in the air Saturday evening at least 100 members will go to Dallas tonight.

The House judiciary committee today reported unfavorably the Senate bill which permitted out of State guests of land owners to hunt on their premises without obtaining a license.

Governor Ferguson this afternoon signed the Texas Company bill.

DECISION NOT LIKELY TO BE REACHED UNTIL LATE THIS AFTERNOON

MANY WITNESSES ARE HEARD

State is Contesting Defense Move and Considerable Testimony is Introduced

Special to The Times. Crawford, Texas, March 8.—The motion to change the venue in the case of E. W. Fry, Pete Fry and R. M. Todd is being presented today before Judge E. W. Nicholson in the district court, with small indication that any decision would be reached before late today. The State is contesting the motion and both sides are putting on numerous witnesses to give their views as to the possibility of getting a fair trial here. The usual question dealing with the settlement throughout the county, the effect of newspaper articles and the like, are being asked. A unusually large number of witnesses was introduced on each side and the hearing will be quite lengthy.

REPORT BOMBARDMENT OF OSTEND BY ALLIE'S AIRMEN

German Official Statement Tells of Resulting Attacks in Both East and West

By Associated Press. Berlin, March 8.—The official statement follows: "In the western arena of the war activities of the enemy have dropped to a minimum. The fighting in the Champagne district continued last night. At Soignin the enemy was repulsed after a hand to hand engagement. Hostilities were resumed during the night. In the district to the east of La Mesnil the enemy attacked in the afternoon but this movement failed completely. Our night counter attack was successful. 40 Frenchmen were captured. We repulsed attacks in the forest of Le Perrie to the northwest of Font a Mousson. In the Vosges in the district west of Muser and north of Senheim the fighting still is going on." "In the eastern arena to the south of Angostowo Russian attacks failed with heavy losses to the enemy. The fighting has been resumed in the vicinity of Lomza. To the west of Przeszyska and east of Plock the Russians have made unsuccessful assaults upon our lines. Furthermore German troops have repulsed two Russian night attacks at Rawa. Russian advances from the vicinity of Nowosietco have not been successful. In the consequent fighting we took 1,000 prisoners."

SAYS KANSAS KATY TEXAS LINE'S "ANGEL"

W. A. WEBB TESTIFIES AT RATE HEARING IN DALLAS TODAY

HELP FROM PARENT COMPANY

Without It, He Says, Texas End Would Have to Go into Hands of Receiver

By Associated Press. Dallas, Texas, March 8.—At the Texas rate hearing today W. A. Webb, vice president and general manager of the Katy declared that without the parent company, the M. K. & T. of Kansas the Texas line would go into the hands of a receiver.

He said that they were without net earnings and some years had fallen below operating expenses.

He added that the road owned W. T. equipment and used that of its parent company without cost except an engine rental which was cheaper than buying. Mr. Webb declared that generally speaking, without parent lines, the State of Texas would have no railroad development.

He pictured the Kansas Katy as the guardian angel of the Texas corporation which came to the rescue as frequently as the earnings of the line fell below self-support. Mr. Webb declared reports that the parent company was "making the Texas lines were absolutely false. He said the Texas Katy owes the Kansas company about \$22,000,000.

FRENCH EXP-RISONERS ARE SENT TO GENEVA

Geneva, March 8.—One thousand French civilians who have been prisoners in the portions of France occupied by the Germans arrived here yesterday. Most of them came from Lille and Maubeuge. The majority of them were women and children of the poorer classes, they will be sent to the French departements nearest Switzerland.

BIG BATTLE IN EAST NEAR WARSAW IS BEING FOUGHT

Allies' Attack On Dardanelles Having Its Political Effect On Conditions In Near East

By Associated Press. London, March 8.—The center of interest on the eastern front again has been shifted with the announcement from Petrograd that a great battle is developing on the left bank of the Vistula at a point west and also southwest of Warsaw. It is not yet clear, judging from messages reaching London, which side has taken the offensive but inspired sources both in Berlin and Petrograd have been hinting lately that vital operations might well be expected in this region.

Messages from the Russian capital have declared that the old field of action in the direction of Posen and Silesia alone could serve as the decisive battle ground, while Berlin has been predicting another brilliant action in the direction of Warsaw by Field Marshal Von Hindenburg. No great activity has been reported elsewhere on the eastern fronts except at Rawa to southwest of Warsaw where German army headquarters claim the capture of 3400 Russians. It is possible that this action may be a part of the great battle which Petrograd says is now under way.

Attacks and counter attacks have taken place as indicated from the text of both the Berlin and Paris official communications covering events on the western battlefield, but there is no indication of a decisive gain by either side. Attempts by the allied fleet to force passage of the Dardanelles as caused a ferment in the near east which has reached the portion of a cabinet crisis in Greece.

No new cabinet has as yet been announced and King Constantine may have great difficulty forming a government with the popular former Premier Venizelos leading the opposition. There is no later news of the situation at the Dardanelles and the British public is awaiting with keen interest the next step in the business like operations marking the work of the storming fleet.

INTERVENTION BY GREECE NEAR, SOME CORRESPONDENTS BELIEVE. By Associated Press. Rome, March 8.—Dispatch to Italian newspapers from Athens describe the situation in Greece as grave. Some correspondents think the present deadlock between King Constantine and many of his advisers regarding the country's intervention in the war is the result of antagonism which had arisen between the ruler and Premier Venizelos, in the cabinet which resigned Saturday, after its declaration in favor of joining the allies was frowned upon by the king.

Other correspondents think the intervention of Greece on the side of the allies already has been agreed upon and that the crisis now apparent is artificial having been arranged to make it easier for King Constantine to decide against Germany, to which he has felt under some obligations for family and political reasons.

DAMAGE TO FRUIT TREES NOT THOUGHT EXTENSIVE

Chief Injury Where Plants Were in Bloom—Another Freeze Recorded Today

This morning's freeze has done no damage to fruit buds that are not in bloom, according to J. L. Downing, the nurseryman, who made an examination of unopened buds just before noon. Trees that were in bloom have sustained some damage but it is not believed to be great. A drop in temperature to 28 degrees was recorded here this morning. A cold wave was general over North and Northwest Texas, temperatures as low as 24 above, having been forecast.

GERMAN TO FACE CHARGE ON FEDERAL INDICTMENT

Man Who Attempted To Blow Up International Bridge Is To Be Arraigned

Machias, Maine, March 8.—Werner Horne the German who attempted to blow up the international bridge at Vanceboro, Maine, was taken to Bangor today for arraignment before a United States commissioner on a federal indictment charging violation of the laws regulating interstate transportation of explosives. He was arrested yesterday on the expiration of a sentence of 30 days in jail for damaging property at Vanceboro.

LABOR COUNCIL TO NOMINATE TONIGHT

Several Names Mentioned—Those Chosen May Include Some Not in Unions

Candidates for the three aldermanic positions to be voted upon at the April election will be nominated by organized labor at a meeting to be held at the labor hall tonight.

ANNUAL REPORT FILED BY NORTH TEXAS GAS COMPANY

Operating Costs Exceed Gross Earnings—Purchase of Gas is Largest Item

Gross earnings of \$75,443.77 and operating costs of \$87,307.95 are shown in the annual report of the North Texas Gas Company filed with the city secretary today.

The value of the tangible physical properties is given as \$124,971.75 and the present book value of the company's property as \$103,992.36 less \$7,772.25 depreciation.

Included in the operating costs are the following items: Salaries, \$104,123; labor, \$382,914; interest, \$94,811; taxes, 1919, \$5; repairs, \$207,346; gas purchased \$55,619.73; depreciation, \$18,554.52; office expenses \$3226; miscellaneous expenses \$1418.65.

SHIPMENTS OF DRY GOODS ARE MEETING WITH DELAY

Manufacturers Cannot Fill Orders Promptly Because of Lack of Imports

Wichita Falls dealers in dry goods and ladies ready to wear are reporting considerable delay in getting their orders filled on account of a shortage of materials in the east where their goods have been placed. The European war has almost completely stopped imports of many articles and materials upon which the American trade has depended heretofore.

American manufacturers who were slow in making preparations to meet the demand for these articles are now finding the demand overwhelming and are unable to fill their orders promptly. There will be very little imported materials on the market this season and dealers say clothing this season will be cheaper and in most instances better than heretofore.
