

Friona-Muleshoe Still A Big Rivalry

Probably the toughest team on Friona's schedule for 2001--Muleshoe, will host the Chieftains in game #4 Friday night in Bailey County.

The Mules are fresh off a year like Friona experienced in 1996--a year that got them to the state semi-finals, and even to Texas Stadium, before they tasted defeat.

At first it sounds like Muleshoe might have to do some rebuilding--"only" nine lettermen, four offensive and four defensive starters back--but you have to remember this is off a team that went 14-1!

In addition, the Mules will be bolstered by a junior varsity group from a year ago that was loaded.

Senior quarterback Lincoln Riley led the Mule offense on its 14-game winning streak in 2000, and he will be tough to stop. Riley is a 6-3, 190-pound senior for the Mules.

Daniel Johnson, a 285-pound senior lineman will anchor the line, with help from another senior, Bradley Thomason.

The Mules have beaten the Chiefs the past three years, and going into Friday's game, Friona's lead in the all-time series has been trimmed to one game: 25-24-1. The series dates back to 1926, and is the oldest one on Friona's opponent list.

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What's This? City Tax Rate Decreases!

In its regular meeting on Monday, September 10, the Friona City Council passed an ordinance setting the tax rate for the city for fiscal 2001 at .727 cents per \$100 valuation.

The old rate had been .74 per \$100 valuation. The motion passed by a 5-0 vote.

The council then considered the approval of an Economic Development Commission grant to Big Ticket Video in the amount of \$5,000.

After motion for approval was made by alderman Jim Atwell, it passed by a 4-0 vote, with alderman Osborn abstaining.

Earlier in the meeting, Mayor Clarence Monroe opened a public hearing concerning the fiscal year 2001-02 city budget.

The council reviewed

written reports from the EMS, Library and Prairie Acres. The police report was given by Chief of Police Given.

The council then approved the purchase of a four-wheel drive vehicle for the police department from Western Chevrolet in the amount of \$19,375, to be paid from the city's drug forfeiture fund.

The council then approved on the final reading, an increase in city water rates, to take effect on the billing date in September.

The board approved a request for a carport variance for 1401 West 7th Street.

The council approved the FY 2001-02 city budget, by a unanimous vote, paving the way for approval of the new tax rate, which will be 1.47 cents per \$100 valuation lower than it was previously.

Parmer Co. Plans 3% Tax Rate Increase

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday voted to propose a 3 percent tax increase for county residents.

The proposed rate will be .4309 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The tax rate will be adopted and the budget for 2002 will be set at 1:30 p.m. September 24 at the County Courthouse in Farwell.

In other business, the commissioners received one bid for the sale of 2 barns in Friona, in commissioner Kirk Frye's precinct.

David Grimsley bid \$9,280. The bid was rejected as too low.

The Commissioners received a bid from Donald Copley to buy a John Deere bucket and a truck bed. He bid \$25.10 and \$251.77, respectively. His bids were accepted. Both items were from Frye's precinct.

Discussions began on dealing with jail im-

provements. Money will be set aside in the new budget. A major decision will be whether to expand the jail, or make the necessary federally-mandated changes within the current facility.

The exact site for foreclosure sales was changed from the Courthouse's west door to the south door. The west door is no longer used due to elevator being built.

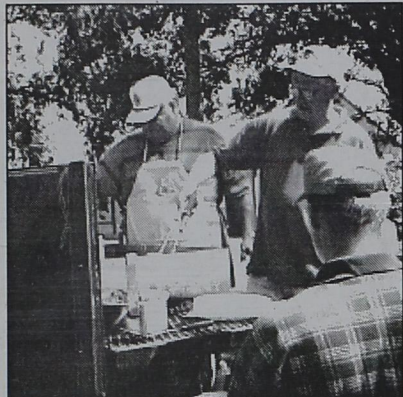
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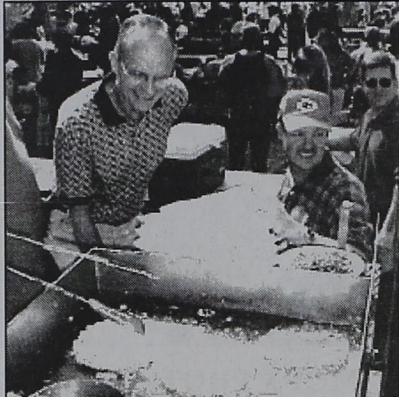

He was born August 9, 1909, in Raymondville. He married Lupe Olvera in 1936, in Harlingen. She passed away October 21, 1995.

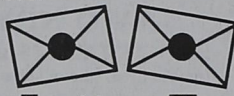
Raymond had lived in Friona for the past 38 years, moving here from Harlingen. He worked in cotton gins in the area as a ginner.

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HOME COMING vs DIMMITT

Chiefs Please Crowd With Their 42-14 Win

Although the visiting Dimmitt Bobcats had some momentum at halftime, as they had just tied the score, the Chieftains regrouped in the second half to run off with a 42-14 win, pleasing the large Homecoming crowd.

The Chieftains believed in very short (in terms of time) throughout the game.

For instance, after taking the opening kickoff, the team went 64 yards in only five plays, to take the lead. Nathan Haile was the main cog. He gained 53 of the 64 yards, the big gainer being a 40-yarder with a pitchout from QB Brock Field.

Two plays later, Haile virtually walked into the end zone. Brian Wiseman nailed his first of what became six point-after kicks, and Friona owned the scoreboard 7-0 with only 2:54 elapsed in the game.

Dimmitt, on the other hand, used clock-eating drives. The 'Cats went 73 yards eleven plays to tie the score when quarterback Matthew Wright dived into the end zone, and the score became 7-14.

Friona responded. Haile slashed through the line on a trap play, got into the secondary and ran 64 yards for his second touchdown. The drive took three plays, after offsetting five-yard penalties. Wiseman's kick made it 14-7. There was still 3:57 left in the opening quarter.

The Chieftains recovered the ball on the kickoff, getting it at the Dimmitt 43. Had Friona made it "three for three," they might have put the Bobcats away early.

But penalties stalled this drive, and the Chieftains punted. Adam Bandy's seeing-eye kick rolled to the Bobcat five.

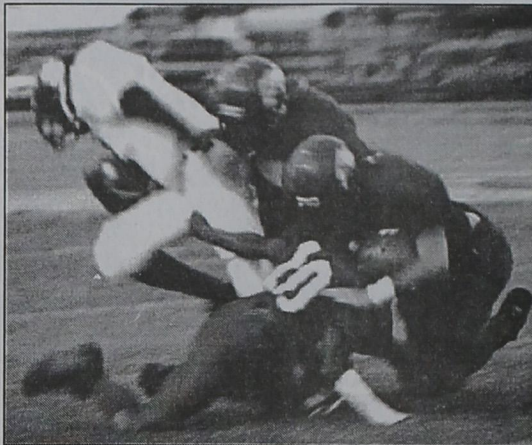
Dimmitt drove to the Friona 18 before being turned away. A little later Bandy backed the 'Cats to their own five with another great punt.

The Bobcats took to the air, gaining 60 yards on a pass and run play, then Wright hit Austin Sherman in the end zone as time expired in the half. The Dimmitt kick made it a tie at halftime, 14-14.

Whatever Coach Scott told the team in the dressing room caused them to turn both their offense and defense up a couple of notches for the second half.

The 'Cats were "three plays and out" in their first possession of the second half.

By contrast, the Chieftains covered 65 yards in their three plays to regain the lead. Haile ran 15 yards; Field rolled out for 22 yards;

and Haile went the final 23 yards on a good, tough run that reached the end zone. Wiseman's kick made it 21-14, with only 2:28 into the third period.

Defensive plays by Frank Dominguez, Chris Wiseman and Isaac Arzola caused the Bobcats to have to punt. Or at least they tried to.

A high snap from center caused the kicker to be tackled at his own 20.

This gave Friona a very short field, and they needed only two plays to get on the scoreboard once again.

This time, Friona's sophomore quarterback, Field, showed his running ability, getting around the left end and outrunning the defense to the end zone. Wiseman's fourth kick extended Friona's lead to 28-14 with 3:25 left in the third.

Dimmitt threatened to answer following the kickoff. They drove from their own 24 to Friona's 16 in just seven plays. But Friona defensive back Adam Bandy stepped up to intercept Wright's pass at the Chieftain goal-line, and rambled 68 yards before finally being tackled at the Dimmitt 32.

It was the second game in a row that a Chieftain had run an interception back 68 yards.

Three plays later, Friona was back on the scoreboard. Field rolled out and lofted a pass into the end zone, as Cody Grimsley was coming open. Grimsley made a good catch, and after Wiseman's kick the lead became 35-14, on the third play of the fourth quarter.

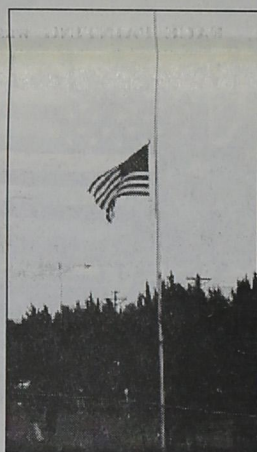
Dimmitt gambled on

fourth down from their 37, and Arzola made the Bobcats pay, sacking the quarterback.

Friona took advantage, driving 37 yards in six plays. Bandy sparked this drive, getting 28 yards on the drive, including the last seven, on a good run to make into the end zone. Wiseman topped off his night, and the score became 42-14 with 6:02 remaining.

The frustrated Bobcats fumbled the kickoff, and Arzola claimed it for the Chieftains. This was Coach Scott's cue to send his bench into the game to run out the clock.

As time was running out, defensive back Heath Gammon got Friona's second interception on the final play of the game.

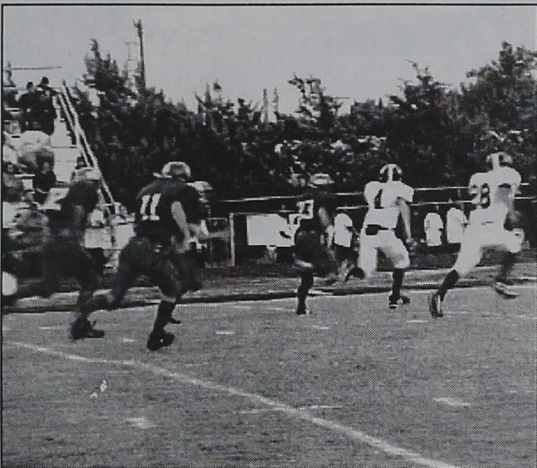

Out Here

by Ron Carr

From Ground Zero: Day 1



Ron Carr is away this week. He and his mother Hannah Lookingbill are in Lufkin at the bedside of his younger sister Kathy who is gravely ill.

We don't think Ron will mind if we fill his space with the following piece written by a young fellow who is a 1996 graduate of West Point Military Academy. He is a friend of one of Bill's many cousins. He gave permission to reprint his article about his day of volunteer work following the bombing of the World Trade Center Towers in NYC.

Pete Engle: A Volunteer at Ground Zero

I was at work in midtown Manhattan (I'm a trader at a hedge fund) watching the events unfold on CNBC. Upon hearing that trading was to be suspended for the day, my firm emptied out. I decided to head downtown to see if I could volunteer my help.

A huge plume of smoke loomed in the distance as hordes of people briskly made their way past me, away from the demolished financial district and toward home. On the way, many individuals were crowded around windows showing the news, and many bodegas were handing out free water to anyone walking or running past.

At Canal Street, I asked a few police officers where the volunteer point was. I was directed to #1 Lafayette Square, in front of the downtown courthouse. The few blocks between Canal and the designated volunteer site, were absolutely filled with cops, firemen, National Guardsmen, ATF, NTSB and other personnel, as well as hundreds of police cruisers, ambulances, tow trucks, fire vehicles, Humvees, etc.

At this distance, the plume of smoke was huge, black and terrifying, blowing toward the southwest of Manhattan. By now (about 12 noon) drenched with sweat, I arrived at the volunteer site where about 200-300 people were already standing. The organizers asked us to divide into blood donors, ex-military, and medical groups.

I joined the ex-military crowd whose job, "search team," would ostensibly be to locate the survivors and the dead in the blocks around the WTC -- not in the actual building debris. We were given dust masks, designated t-shirts, gloves, tourniquet cords, and bottles of water for the trip into "ground zero" as they had begun calling it. While waiting, the masses of us, except for the blood donors, were given down-and-dirty first aid lessons.

We wound up standing in our groups for several hours, as Air Force jets flew overhead, protecting NYC airspace. It became a little frustrating, as all many of us could think of was that we were losing our windows of opportunity to rescue some of the critically injured in small pockets.

At one point as we waited for transportation into ground zero, the wind shifted and a strong gust of the smoke plume came through #2 Lafayette Square. Everyone, myself included, was wearing their mask around their necks. Far more than a plume of brown cigarette-style smoke or even the nasty stench of an oil fire, this smoke was noxious. My eyes welled up with tears and clamped shut. After that, even though the smoke thankfully didn't come through the volunteer area again, everyone kept their masks on.

The ex-military group, 100+ of us by my hasty count, got on the buses to go into the devastated financial district, at about 3:00 p.m. The leaders of our group, among whom were some police, etc., laid down some ground rules. "If you can't take it, get back on the bus. It's not a test or competition. Do not tell any survivors of the details or casualty estimates. Do not photograph the dead, etc."

I've worked on Wall

Street in the financial district and for a period of time on Broad Street, two blocks from the WTC, since 1996, and so I was almost paralyzed with shock at seeing the alien landscape. In fact, I'd come through the WTC on my way uptown in switching from the PATH train to the 1/9 Uptown subway at 7:00 a.m. that very morning.

Now, the street, sidewalks and vehicles were covered with pulverized concrete, ash, and papers, Excel spreadsheets, brokerage research reports, hand-scribbled Post-It notes, and most heart-rending to me, the occasional photo of wives, husbands, or children that had been taped to someone's computer monitor or sat on their desk for weeks, months, maybe even years.

The ash, dust, and concrete ranged from about one inch deep, four or five blocks away, to what must have been over two feet deep in places. There were bits of office furniture, wheels to rolling chairs, paper catches from printers, etc., scattered around the streets. Flattened vehicles, all four tires flat and with windows devoid of any glass whatsoever, lined the

streets. Large chunks of concrete, steel, and shards of glass were also scattered throughout what I can only describe as now an entirely unfamiliar, unidentifiable landscape.

We came to stop at the corner of Greenwich and Jay Street, where we were relegated to a courtyard and told to prepare both mentally and physically. We were hydrating and resting in the shade as firefighters, cops, U.S. Marshals, FBI, ATF, National Guard, Marine Corps, etc., were feverishly preparing for renewed attempts to search the rubble for survivors, herding the occasional stunned or hiding stragglers into the Red Cross area, and towing destroyed vehicles out of the area.

Just as we were starting the grisly task, at about 5:12 p.m., we heard a loud crunch two or three blocks away from us, as Seven World Trade Center (the building across the street from the towers) collapsed as a result of the heavy damage it had sustained earlier in the day. Because it was a stout, fortress-like building, it fell sideways and several streets

were blocked. Huge clouds of dust kicked up and immediately engineers sought to re-open several routes to the WTC area.

We were sent back to the courtyard, and waited for several more hours until word was passed down that, with the structural integrity of many other local buildings in question, and with the long night of opening blocked streets ahead, we'd be best off returning tomorrow.

I returned the next morning, but was turned back by the NYPD. They'd had thousands of more volunteers come during the night, more than they could use, and were turning folks back to keep the streets clear.

I personally know two people who worked in the WTC; one e-mailed me late Wednesday night to say that he was alright, and the other is, at last I heard, still missing. But I also saw total strangers selflessly loaning cell phones to one another to contact their families; some literally giving the shirts off their backs to workers for bandages; and others of all ages, teenagers and the elderly, bringing personally-owned shovels, flashlights,

the brotherhood of mankind, the resilience of America, and reasons why I'm damned proud to be an American and specifically a New Yorker.

Also the deli owners opened up their bottled water inventories for pedestrians fleeing the city on foot, and so many blood donors that the wait to give was over five hours.

Chalk a few up there for

God bless America and freedom loving people everywhere.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Special Election

NOVEMBER 6, 2001

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)

Proposition 1 would amend the constitution to relinquish the state's claim to certain disputed land in Bastrop County. The amendment would confirm legal title to that land, excluding any mineral interests, to the individuals who hold a disputed title to the land. The amendment would prevent a loss of title by people who bought and paid for property that was never transferred by the state because of faulty surveys.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the owners of certain land in Bastrop County."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonies. Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border colonies."

PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."

PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 1)

Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pension commissioner."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 32)

Proposition 5 would amend the constitution to allow a municipality to donate outdated or surplus equipment, supplies, or other materials used in fighting fires to an underdeveloped country. Current state law does not allow anything of value belonging to the state or its political subdivisions to be donated to another nation.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloped countries."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the governor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential electors when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes will be cast.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the governor to call a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain circumstances."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 82)

Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mortgage loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve veterans' cemeteries.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for veterans' housing assistance and to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide for veterans cemeteries."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 97)

Proposition 8 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for construction and repair projects or for the purchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Texas Youth Commission, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the

Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the Parks and Wildlife Department, the adjunct general's department, the Texas School for the Deaf, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Public Safety, the State Preservation Board, the Texas Department of Health, the Texas Historical Commission, or the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$850 million in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for construction and repair projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 47)

Proposition 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for filling vacancies in the legislature without an election if only one person is a qualified candidate in the election to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal property from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on the matter.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commercial purposes."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

Proposition 11 would amend the constitution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school administrator who serves as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town, or other local governmental district, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a governing body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensated directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow current and retired public school teachers and retired public school administrators to receive compensation for serving on the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, including water districts."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 75)

Proposition 12 would amend, repeal, or relocate several sections of the current

constitution to improve the clarity, organization, and consistency of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to eliminate obsolete, archaic, redundant, and unnecessary provisions and to clarify, update, and harmonize certain provisions of the Texas Constitution."

PROPOSITION 13 (SJR 2)

Proposition 13 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a board of trustees of an independent school district to donate real property and improvements formerly used as a school campus in order to preserve that property. The board may make the donation if the board determines that the property has historical significance, that the donation will help to preserve the property, and that the school district no longer needs the property for educational purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an independent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical significance in order to preserve the property."

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 44)

Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of income.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)

Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, turnpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility projects."

PROPOSITION 16 (HJR 5)

Proposition 16 would amend the constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a contract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would

authorize the conversion and refinancing of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on a homestead.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or renovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinancing of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a forced sale."

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."

**NOTICE OF CHANGE IN ELECTION PRECINCTS
IN PARMER COUNTY**

Pursuant to authority vested in the PARMER County Commissioners' Court, under Section 42.035 of the Texas Election Code, the Court has made certain changes in the boundaries of Commissioners' Election Precincts in order to properly perfect a new redistricting plan for the County.

The new redistricting plan and the changes in the Election Precinct Boundaries were adopted at a Special meeting of the Commissioners' Court on the 29th day of August, 2001.

Therefore, pursuant to the mandatory duty imposed upon the Commissioners' Court, pursuant to the Texas Election Code, to-wit:

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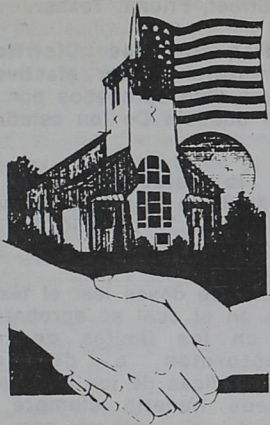
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Afghani-American Gives Different Perspective

The following was written by Tamim Ansary, an Afghani-American writer, who gives his "take" on the mess we are in.

I've been hearing a lot of talk about "bombing

Afghanistan back to the Stone Age."

Ronn Owens, on KGO Talk Radio, today allowed that this would mean killing innocent people, people who had nothing to do with this

atrocities, but "we're at war, we have to accept collateral damage. What else can we do?"

Minutes later I heard some TV pundit discussing whether we "have the belly to do

what must be done."

And I thought about the issues being raised especially hard because I am from Afghanistan, and even though I've lived here for 35 years I've never lost track of what's going on there. So I want to tell anyone who will listen how it looks from where I'm standing.

We come now to the question of "bombing Afghanistan back to the Stone Age." Trouble is, that's been done. The Soviets took care of it already.

Make the Afghans suffer? They're already suffering. Level their houses? Done. Turn their schools into piles of rubble? Done. Eradicate their hospitals? Done. Destroy their infrastructure? Cut them off from medicine and health care? Too late. Someone already did all that.

would have to be first. Will other Muslim nations just stand by? You see where I'm going. We're flirting with a world war between Islam and the West.

And guess what: that's Bin Laden's program. That's exactly what he wants. That's why he did this. Read his speeches and statements. It's all right there. He really believes Islam would beat the West.

New bombs would only stir the rubble of earlier bombs. Would they at least get the Taliban? Not likely. In today's Afghanistan, only the Taliban eat, only they have the means to move around. They'd slip away and hide.

Maybe the bombs would get some of those disabled orphans, they don't move too fast, they don't even have wheelchairs.

It might seem ridiculous, but he figures if he can polarize the world into Islam and the West, he's got a billion soldiers. If the West wrecks a holocaust in those lands, that's a billion people with nothing left to lose, that's even better from Bin Laden's point of view.

But flying over Kabul and dropping bombs wouldn't really be a strike against the criminals who did this horrific thing. Actually, it would only be making common cause with the Taliban--by raping once again the people they've been rapist all this time.

Who has the belly for that? Bin Laden does. Anyone else?

So what else is there? What can be done, then? Let me now speak with true fear and trembling. The only way to get Bin Laden is to go in there with ground troops.

When people speak of "having the belly to do what needs to be done," they're thinking in terms of having the belly to kill as many as needed.

Having the belly to overcome any moral qualms about killing innocent people. Let's pull our heads out of the sand.

What's on the table is Americans dying. And not just because some Americans would die fighting their way through Afghanistan to Bin Laden's hideout. It's much bigger than that, folks.

The soil is littered with land mines, the farms were all destroyed by the Soviets.

These are a few of the reasons why the Afghan people have not overthrown the Taliban.

Because to get any troops to Afghanistan, we'd have to go through Pakistan. Would they let us? Not likely.

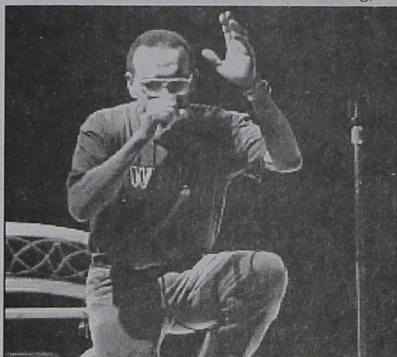

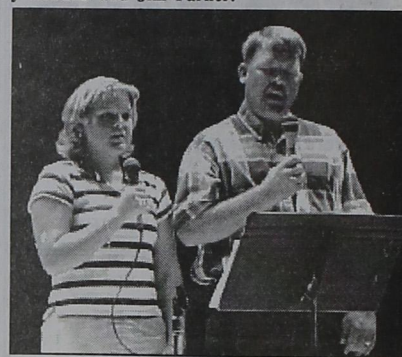

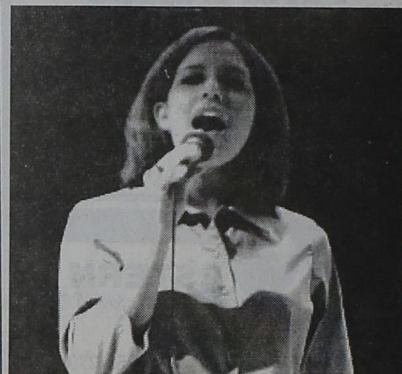

Parmer County SWCD Sets Director Election

The election for a Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation Board director has been set for Wednesday, October 3 at 8:30 a.m. at Wilbur-Ellis Co. at Clay's Corner.

Mike Miller has held a position on the board representing Zone 5 for eighteen years, and plans to run again this year.

Please feel free to support your Conservation District by stopping by and casting your vote on October 3.

The following are eligibility rules for voting and candidacy:

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a Soil and Water Conservation District director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be eighteen years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a Soil and Water Conservation District must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be eighteen years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and Water Conservation directors serve four year terms of office. Zone 5 includes all land in the Lazbuddie School District.

Current members of the board of directors of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District are M.C. Osborn, chairman; Mike Beauchamp, vice chairman; Kevin Welch, secretary; Todd Christian, member; and Mike Miller, member.

The purpose of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District with headquarters in Friona is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations. The district has the authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner of operator or other potential users of the S.W.C.D.'s programs.

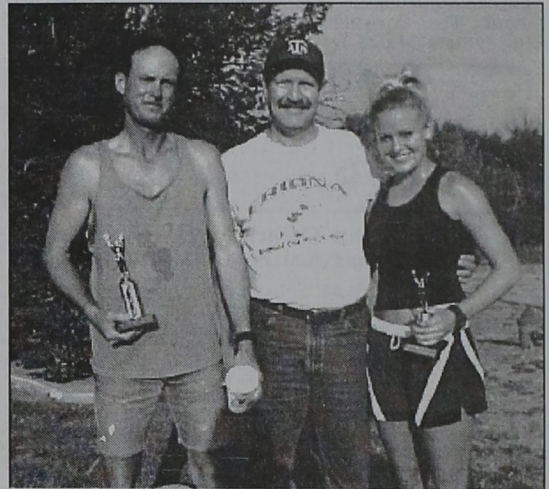

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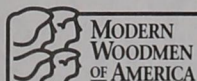

Tax Plan Offers Opportunity To Boost Retirement Savings

To most of us, \$1.35 trillion sounds like a lot of money. And in fact, the \$1.35 trillion tax relief plan passed by Congress and signed by President Bush is pretty sizeable. But what does it mean for you?

Initially, you may be most interested in the \$45 billion in tax rebates and tax cuts that took effect this summer. These moves will put more money in your pocket right away. For example, if you're married and you had taxable income of more than \$12,000 in 2000, you will receive—or you already have received—a rebate of \$600. And you also got the equivalent of a small raise when the government started withholding less money from your paychecks in July.

What will you do with this money? If you're like many people, you'll spend it. In fact, the government hopes that you; and millions more like you, will spend at least part of your tax rebate—thereby stimulating the economy, which has slowed in recent months.

Helping to boost the economy may be a laudable goal—but you might be better off putting your rebate into a retirement plan.

You might not think that the additional money you get to keep will be enough to make much of a difference in your life. But you might be surprised. Suppose, for example, that you get to take home an extra \$100 in income each month. If you were to put that \$1,200 per year in a tax-deferred retirement account that returned 7 per cent annually—a reasonable assumption—you would have accumulated approximately \$51,000 after 20 years, and about \$117,000 after 30 years.

That amount of money can make a big difference in your retirement savings—and it all started from that \$100 a month you got from this year's tax break. Furthermore, the extra \$100 isn't really "costing" you anything, because you didn't have it in your possession in the first place.

This year's tax relief package also helps you save for retirement in other ways. That's because the tax plan also includes provisions to gradually increase the contribution limits to important tax-deferred savings plans such as your 401(k) and your IRA. For example, starting in 2002, you may be able to contribute up to \$3,000 a year to your IRA (\$3,500 if you're 50 or over), up from the current limit of \$2,000.

As positive as all these tax-break numbers are, you do need to keep one thing in mind: Tax laws can change again in the future. That's why it's important to get the most out of the opportunities you have right now. By taking advantage of the provisions found in the tax relief plan, you can make substantial progress toward achieving your retirement goals—but you've got to take the first step.

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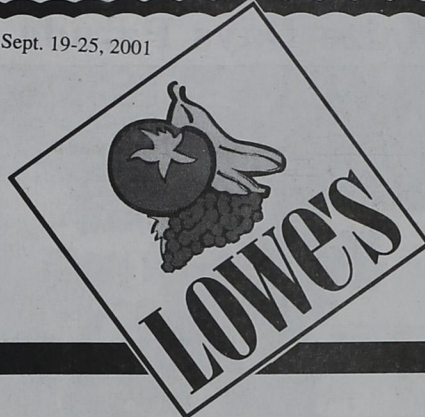
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
