## HENRY STARR CAPTURED IN DARING BANK ROBBERY

### OTHERS OF PARTY ARE CAPTURED

ELEVEN BANDITS LED BY STARR ROB TWO STROUD, OKLA. BANKS

### STARR WOUNDED AND CAPTURED

Other Bandits Are Surrounded By posse in Thicket Near Stroud

By Associated Press. Oklahoma City, Okla., March 27.—Two banks at Stroud, Oklahoma were robbed at ten o'clock this morning and Henry Starr, one of the robbers, was shot and captured; eleven men were in the gang that robbed the bank. The men rode into Stroud at ten o'clock and tied their horses at the stockyards. They were unmasked and walked directly to the Stroud National Bank, it was entered by several of the robbers, who quickly ordered the bank officials to hold up their hands. Other robbers at the same moment entered the First National Bank and robbed it. As they came out the citizens were aroused and began running into the streets, armed with such weapons as they could gather quickly. Many shots were fired. As one of the robbers was mounting his horse in the street, Paul Curry, sixteen years old, ran out with a rifle in his hands. He pointed it at the robbers and as he did so the man reined under his arm for a revolver. "Drop that gun or I'll shoot," young Curry called to him. The robber was Henry Starr, on whose head there is a reward of \$1000 offered by the State.

STARR SHOT IN LEG. Simultaneously Starr dropped the revolver and the boy fired, the bullet striking Starr in the leg and he was unable to mount his horse; he was captured. The other robbers rode out of town in a battle that was hot for a few minutes. They were hardly out of sight before dozens of men were mounting their horses and going in pursuit. In less than 30 minutes the bandits were headed off and surrounded in a pasture two miles east of Stroud. They took refuge in a draw when 300 men surrounded them. At 11:30 hundreds of men were coming from the ground around the draw having been sent out by telephone to farmers and to nearby towns. It was stated that the robbers took about \$2,500 from each bank. Hill Estes, one of the robbers, fell from his horse a mile out of Stroud and was captured by the pursuing posse. He had been shot in the leg in the street and was badly wounded. Estes told his captors he came from Missouri and had lately joined the Starr gang. He had \$75 in silver in his pockets and it was scattered on the ground around the draw when he fell from his horse. Henry Starr had \$1000 in currency in his pockets when captured.

### A GENERAL DENIAL WILL BE MADE BY DEFENDANTS

Government Rests in Trial of 28 Terre Haute Citizens for Election Frauds

Indianapolis, March 27.—That a general denial will be made to the government charges by all the 28 defendants on trial in the Terre Haute election fraud case here was indicated when the defense began the introduction of evidence today. The government rested its case on the afternoon of March 26. Three defendants, Harry S. Montgomery, president of the board of works, William Crockett, superintendent of the city crematory, and Lewis Conroy, assistant city engineer, denied absolutely the testimony of government witnesses. The three witnesses testifying today served as election inspectors and admitted they worked the lever on the voting machine and also instructed voters how to manipulate the candidates' keys. J. G. Stanley, chief counsel for the defendants, said he had read carefully the election laws and that he would find no section which prevents the inspectors performing that function. U. S. Attorney Daily said it was immaterial whether the acts violated an Indiana law, as the government sought to prove election inspectors all over the city had received the same kind of instructions as a part of the alleged conspiracy. A number of inspectors who pleaded guilty testified they received such instructions from Mayor Don Roberts. Sunley stated that Elmer Conover who had pleaded guilty suggested the scheme to manipulate the levers so that it could not register but would fool the voter.

### BELLIGERENTS ARRANGING CREDIT IN UNITED STATES

New York, March 27.—Bankers here it was announced today, have nearly completed arrangements to extend credit to Great Britain, France, Italy and other countries in addition to the \$10,000,000 loan to Germany. The French credit, it said, will be \$50,000,000 and the British twice as large. Negotiations are in progress for a loan to Russia in addition to the \$2,000,000 recently obtained.

### FIVE BANDITS FLEEING TOWARD KELLEYVILLE

Posse Traveling Thirty Minutes Behind Them—Starr Says Five Good Men Left

By Associated Press. Chandler, Okla., March 27.—"We went to the bank to get the money; we got it. We have no one to blame on ourselves. There are five good men left in the crowd," said Henry Starr, while admitting his identity Saturday night. Starr, who is wounded, is in jail here with a wounded companion who gave his name as Lewis Eastes. At 9 o'clock Saturday night, the three official posses scouring the country for the remaining five bandits reported that no trace of the fleeing men had been found. They are accused of robbing the Stroud National Bank and the First National bank of Stroud of \$5,600 Saturday morning about 9:30. At ten o'clock Saturday night word was received here that five fleeing men who participated in the Stroud robbery were headed for Kelleyville, southeast of Chandler. The posse is traveling about 30 minutes behind, according to the report. At the order of Adjutant General Canton of the Oklahoma state militia, Company B was mustered to arms.

### J. S. MARSHALS READY TO GIVE BATTLE TO BANDITS

By Associated Press. March 27.—A posse of United States marshals, all heavily armed, is held in readiness here tonight to give battle to the bandits who today robbed two banks at Stroud, Okla. According to advice received here the robbers are headed for the fastnesses of Knochich mountains. The country is wild and uninhabited and has long been the rendezvous of bandits. Two of the bandits, one of them badly wounded, are reported surrounded in the Mica-caw bottoms, 35 miles southeast of Stroud.

## GRAPPLING HOOKS SLIP AND F-4 DOWN TO BOTTOM OF OCEAN

Honolulu, March 27.—Hope that the ill-fated submarine would be raised before nightfall this afternoon faded when a chain top attached to the disabled craft slipped and the submarine settled back in the bed of the ocean. The most optimistic of the officials here conceded tonight that there was no reasonable chance of any of the crew of 21 being taken alive. The powerful dredger, California, which had been lowered to the station had lifted the F-4 50 feet before the mishap occurred which plunged the vessel back into the lips of the submarine crater in which it is believed to have lodged. ## FRENCH SUCCESS IN VOSGES MOUNTAINS

CAPTURE HARTMAN-WEILERKOPF AFTER LONG AND FIERCE FIGHTING

## FIGHTING IN CARPATHIANS

Italy Has Completed All Measures Preparatory to Hostilities

By Associated Press. London, March 27.—While there has been fighting along the East Prussian frontier and in Bukovina the mountains of both the east and west are the scenes of the most important engagements at present. In the Vosges the French after a long fight in which the positions often changed hands have finally established themselves on the summit of Hartman-Weilerkopf, a mountain-peak 4,000 feet high southwest of Muelhausen and a few miles north of Thann. This is considered an important success, as it gives the French command of considerable country occupied by the Germans. The fight for this position has been a bitter one and has been going on for many days. In the Carpathians...

## ON WESTERN FRONT

On the western front beyond the French success on the Vosges where the Germans abandoned much material and left many dead there have been no reports of importance, neither side being ready as yet for the big effort which everyone has been expecting. There have been the usual bombardments of positions and mine warfare and aviators have on both sides shown much activity. Each day killed airmen flying over the German lines to gather information. They also drop bombs on railway junctions and military works. A Zeppelin this afternoon passed over the island of Schiermonnik-woog north of Holland flying in a westerly direction and an attack on some English towns was expected, but if such were her intentions her arrival along the English coast has not yet been reported. The official returns for the past week of the effects of the German submarine blockade of England show three vessels were sunk and one was torpedoed but reached port, while total sailings and arrivals numbered 1490 vessels. Holland's request for an explanation from Germany of the sinking of the Medea and the capture of other Dutch steamers is interesting in diplomatic circles where it is pointed out that the vessels of other neutral countries have not been molested. Diplomacy continues its activity in Italy and the Balkans, the latest report being that Germany is making an offer of part of Turkish European territory to Bulgaria in return for Bulgaria's continued neutrality. An offer to Bulgaria. Great interest centers in the possible entrance of Italy into the war. The action of Romania and Bulgaria is to some extent dependent upon Italy and Rome dispatches report that the Italian government has completed all measures preparatory to hostilities. An interesting report in this connection is contained in a Sofia dispatch which says that the German Field Marshal Von Der Goltz, who recently visited Bulgaria, has been authorized to offer Bulgaria on behalf of Turkey, that territory north of a line drawn from Enos to Midia in return for Bulgaria's neutrality.

## AIR BUBBLES RISING

Honolulu, March 27.—Streams of bubbles continuing to come to the surface of the ocean indicating that the submarine F-4 was still with water, caused naval officers late today to decide to continue through the night the work of raising the sunken craft. Brilliant moonlight assisted the operations. Crowds continued early tonight to line the water front.

## BELIEVED SHELL WAS CRUSHED BY IMPACT

Navy Officials Think Submarine Struck Rock or Coral Formation

By Associated Press. Washington, March 27.—At the close of a day which brought no report to the navy department from Rear Admiral Moore at Honolulu or Commander Smith of the submarine division of the Pacific fleet, officials had abandoned all hope that any of the officers or crew of the submarine F-4 survived. No word has been received since last night when Admiral Moore reported the vessel submerged in 50 fathoms of water. Some hope was renewed in an early official report that the warships had discovered the submarine's marker nearby but this was found to be a mistake. Failure to discover even the marker buoy inclined officials to the opinion that all within the ship met instantaneous death. Theories of the cause generally advanced tonight was that the boat struck either a rock or coral formation and that her shell had been cracked by an impact against the coral bed.

## ANOTHER TARRANT COUNTY BOY ONE OF CREW OF F-4

Fort Worth, Texas, March 27.—A letter dated March 12 at Honolulu to his uncle Fred Wilson, a farmer near here from Thomas Wilson Hardesty, makes certain that a Tarrant county boy was one of the victims of the disaster which befell the F-4. In his letter Hardesty stated that he was an electrician on the F-4 at that time when the official list of the crew was published the family thought perhaps the boy had been transferred before the accident but they are expecting official information daily that the boy is still alive. Hardesty is serving his second enlistment in the navy; he first enlisted in 1909 in Fort Worth and was discharged in 1912. He is enlisting as an electrician and joined the F-4 last October.

## GERMAN SHIP IS THE CAUSE

Fearing That Attempt Will Be Made to Break Rules By Prinz Eitel Frederick

By Associated Press. Washington, March 27.—The battleship Alabama of the reserve fleet was ordered to Hampton Roads tonight on "neutrality duty," according to an announcement from the navy department. The battleship is at the Philadelphia yards. Secretary Daniels said it was intended to place one large vessel on guard to support the vessels and destroyers which have been on duty since the German commerce destroyer, Prinz Eitel Frederick, reached Newport News. Heavy ships had been employed in neutrality duty at Boston and New York, the secretary said, and it was thought best to take similar precautions at Hampton Roads, as the smaller vessels would be handicapped in the event of heavy weather.

## NAVAL OFFICERS BELIEVE SHIP WILL BE INTERRED

By Associated Press. Washington, March 27.—Although no word has come from the commander of the Prinz Eitel Frederick as to whether she intends to take her vessel to sea, naval officers here are confident that the next two or three days will see the ship interred. The time allowed for repairs has been kept secret, it was generally understood today it expires within two or three days. Naval officers believe the case of the German gunboat Geier at Honolulu, which was given ten days to repair, but interned and they thought the situation would be the same in the Eitel's case.

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## VILLA FORCES HAVE BEGUN ATTACK ON MATAMORES

### ALL RUSSIANS EXPELLED FROM EAST PRUSSIA

Believed at Berlin General Offensive Movement by Russians Under Preparation

By Associated Press. Berlin, March 27.—Russian offensive movements in the north of Poland on Friday night with the expulsion of the last Russians from the province. The invaders were thrown back across the border after a brief but hard fight and the Germans advanced to a point in front of Polangen. The Russians were at Krottingen and Jacobow. Cavalry played a great part in driving the Russians out of East Prussia because a heavy fog made the use of artillery very difficult. The infantrymen were hindered also by the swampy nature of the land and the high waters.

### MEXICAN SHOTS FALL IN BROWNSVILLE

VILLISTAS FORCED TO CEASE ATTACK BY FLANKING MOVEMENT

Brownsville, Texas, March 27.—An unexpected attack from the south late today caused Villa forces to cease their attack on Matamorras but in the meantime stray shots crossed the border and wounded two Brownsville people, neither seriously. The persons injured were struck by shells falling in the residence section; they were Mrs. Luciano Hinojosa, wounded in the foot and Jose M. Lopez, wounded in the arm. Numerous other bullets are said to have fallen in Brownsville.

### RE-INFORCEMENTS FOR BOTH

Carranza Transport at Mouth of Rio Grande—Fighting Renewed Last Night

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NO ARTILLERY IN ACTION

No artillery was brought into action today, the forces limiting themselves to rifles and machine guns. Carranza authorities at Matamorras said their only casualties were eight wounded; the Villa casualties were not known; but 100 men were reported wounded and four officers were brought to the American side. A colonel among them was expected to die. Both sides tonight expected reinforcements. A Villa officer said the artillery had not yet arrived and was ready to move with troops. The transport Oaxaca was reported tonight still at the mouth of the Rio Grande with 1500 troops to reinforce the Matamorras defenders. It was said no suitable landing could be found. The transport came from Vera Cruz according to an American aboard who was allowed to land.

### SEC. HOUSTON DENIED STATEMENT ON ACREAGE

Did Not Say There were No Indications Cotton Reduction—Prices Recover

By Associated Press. New Orleans, March 27.—Cotton made almost a full recovery today, the close being practically the best of the season, a rise of 20 to 22 points. The recovery carried the market close to the highest of the season. The bulge was based wholly on the denial of the staple denial that the acreage that cotton acreage this spring would not be curtailed. The Liverpool market got the denial first and steadied five English points up instead of five down, as due, and the American market felt the full force as soon as they opened. The local market had no selling power at all.

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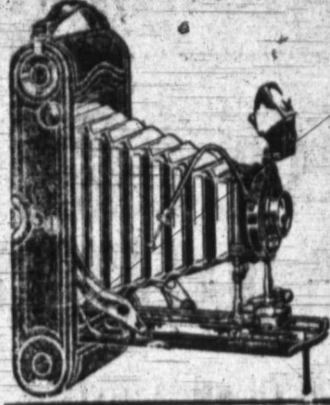

COUNTY EXAMINATION CONTEST FOR DEBATORS AND ATHLETES ANNOUNCED

**WINNERS FOR STATE MEET**

Literary Test for Immigrants Will be Subject for Debating Contest

Track athletes from several Wichita Falls towns will gather in this city next Saturday for the annual county track meet and an interesting contest is expected. The winning team of this county is to be held two weeks later.

Debating teams from the towns in this county will also hold their annual contests here next Saturday, and a debating team to represent Wichita county in the district meet will also be held. The question will be on the literacy test for immigrants.

Friday afternoon the class track meet was held by the Wichita Falls track team members, first honors going to the Sophomores, 22; Seniors, 15; Freshmen, 16. While no starting records were made the general showing of the contestants was excellent and gives reason to believe that Wichita Falls will cop the honors next Saturday.

Yesterday afternoon the city ball park was put into condition for the meet, the track graded and everything made ready.

**Friday's Record**

Luther Bell was the individual star Friday afternoon, making 23 points; Cooper was second with 20. The events resulted as follows: Pole vault—Dugan first, eight feet. Half-mile run—W. Lea first, time 2:43; Hickman second. 220-yard hurdles—Dugan first, 32.5 seconds. Mile run—Carney first, 6:55. 220-yard dash—Bell first, 32.3 seconds; Albritton second. 100-yard dash—Cooper first, 11.6 seconds; Bell second, Albritton third. 50-yard dash—Albritton first in six seconds. 100-yard hurdles—Dugan first, 15.4 seconds, Cooper second.

Bell won all the weight events, the hammer throw, shot put and discus. Among others who figure creditably were Dugan, Cooper, Albritton, Gentry, Nelson, Hamlin, Ward, Bentley and Whitley.

**Program for Saturday**

The order of events next Saturday will be: mile run, pole vault, 120-yard low hurdles, twelve-pound shot put, 100-yard dash, twelve-pound hammer throw, 440-yard run, running broad jump, 100-yard run, running high jump, 220-yard low hurdles, discus throw, 220-yard dash, one mile relay. In each event, first place will count five points, second four, third three, fourth two and fifth one, except in the relay.

**TICK-ERADICATION ELECTION IN ARCHER COUNTY MAY 6**

Archer county will vote on May 6 on the proposition of dipping cattle in that county for ticks. The eradication of ticks will be undertaken with a view to having the county placed above the tick quarantine line and it is expected that the proposition will carry. Baylor county is expected to be put above the line before long, as a vigorous anti-tick campaign has been waged there. Wilbarger county was recently freed of the quarantine restrictions. **NIGHT WAS HIDEOUS WITH ROAR OF GUNS**

ASSOCIATED PRESS CORRESPONDENT DESCRIBES FINAL ATTACK ON PRZEMYSL

**BOMBARDMENT WAS TERRIFIC**

Cossacks Swam Their Horses Across River—Austrians Appear With White Flags

Przemysl, March 23, via Petrograd, March 27, via London, March 27.—The night preceding the surrender to the Russians of the Austrian fortified positions at Przemysl was hideous in the Russian lines with the roar of guns and the shock of exploding shells. Never on the frontier during the war has there been such a bombardment. Standing outside the walls of the fallen fortress an Associated Press correspondent heard the story of the besieged and the besiegers while the smoke of battle still was hanging in heavy clouds overhead. The night of March 21 the Austrians maintained an unprecedented fire on the Russian positions. The hut in which the Russian staff officers had their quarters shook like a leaf and the ground for miles around trembled as though rent by an unending series of earthquakes. All night long the sky was red with the bursting of shells. The cannonading reached its greatest intensity between four and six o'clock in the morning. It is safe to say that nobody in either army slept that night, although accustomed to weeks of bombardment. During these two hours 10,000 shells were fired.

**Russians Close In.**  
"Before dawn a scouting division of Russians drove back the Austrians who were in occupation of the outlying positions and after a sharp engagement occupied the Austrian trenches. Backing up this movement the entire Russian army facing the Austrians began to close in on them. As this advance was made the Austrians from all sides retired to the protection of the fortress.

"Suddenly telegrams began reaching the Russian headquarters from various points declaring the Austrians were blowing up their forts. At the same time the Austrian fire slackened to a certain extent and above the roar of the artillery could be heard the deep roar of explosions from within.

**White Flags Appear.**  
"The Russians continued advancing, the men running forward among the exploding mines. Occasionally rifle fire was heard. Toward 8 o'clock in the morning of March 23 white flags began appearing over the tops of the Austrian fortifications. The Russians fire thereupon ceased. Then a group of Austrians under a flag of truce appeared, making its way from one of the forts in the direction of the Russian headquarters.

"Boys from all directions Austrian divisions appeared and walked quietly toward the Russian ranks. The officers bore their arms, but the soldiers were mostly unarmed. Others were observed throwing away their rifles as they came on. These Austrian troops spoke in friendly and kindly tones to the Russian soldiers, and saluted the Russian officers. The River Vichora, a tributary of the San, separated the Russian from the Austrian forts on the section of. At this point the railroad bridge had been blown up and the Russians had difficulty in crossing. The men made their way as best they could over the remains of the wrecked bridge, while the Cossacks swam their horses.

**City Shrouded in Smoke.**  
"The Associated Press correspondent crossed with the Cossacks. A notable feature of the advance was that all Przemysl was covered with heavy clouds of smoke. Loud detonations continued and it was evident that the Austrians were destroying the remainder of their ammunition. In the suburbs of Przemysl many horses recently killed and still saddled were seen as the Russians came in.

"Discussion of the terms of surrender occupied the entire day. In the meantime and until evening the sound of explosions within the fortress continued. All day long soldiers straggled from the fortress without arms. They were rounded up and taken to Russian headquarters. No civilians were permitted to enter Przemysl.

TO THE ALDERMANIC CANDIDATES.

The Trades and Labor Council adopted a platform and nominated three candidates for aldermen on it on the night of March 5th. Two of the candidates nominated declined to accept, and one week later another convention was held and two candidates nominated to take the place of the two candidates who had declined the nominations, and the platform adopted at the first meeting was also repudiated. Between the two meetings the Times had criticised the platform and this criticism brought forth a communication from a member of the platform committee in which he took occasion to say: "Like an unfortunate prisoner upon his first contact with the light," the editor of The Daily Times upon his unaccustomed sight of a sane and just proposition sees horrible boogers in the labor platform adopted by the Trades Council last Monday night." Now, in view of the fact that the same organized body repudiated the platform one week after it had been adopted would indicate that there are others who had stopped to take a sober second thought, and found themselves in the same awful fix that the member of the platform committee said the editor of the Times was in, and perhaps suffering from the same affliction. But mind you, The Times is not condemning candidates for public office who have the courage to stand for something. It rather admires the candidate who has the courage of his convictions and is not afraid of the light, and who can defend principles for which he stands. On the other hand The Times cannot but have contempt for the candidates for public office that, so far as the general public is aware, stands for nothing. That is "dark lantern" politics, and subjects the candidate for public office who does not express himself on matters concerning the welfare of the public to the criticism of standing for nothing, and after he is safely installed in office depend on others to instruct him as to what he shall do and how to perform his official acts. puted (though one candidate who was nominated at the first convention is still on the ticket, and who has been quoted as approving the platform as adopted, saying it was the best he ever read, and another one of the candidates nominated at the second convention was present and approving the platform at the first convention), it might be of some interest to the people of Wichita Falls to know their views on that platform—as to whether they still stand for it or not. 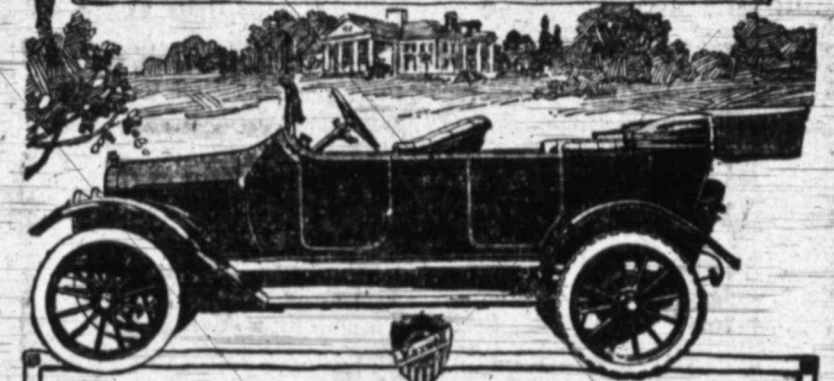

Cohen was taken to Ellis Island late today. He will be released on \$500 bond, which will be supplied by the aid society and the fraternal order.

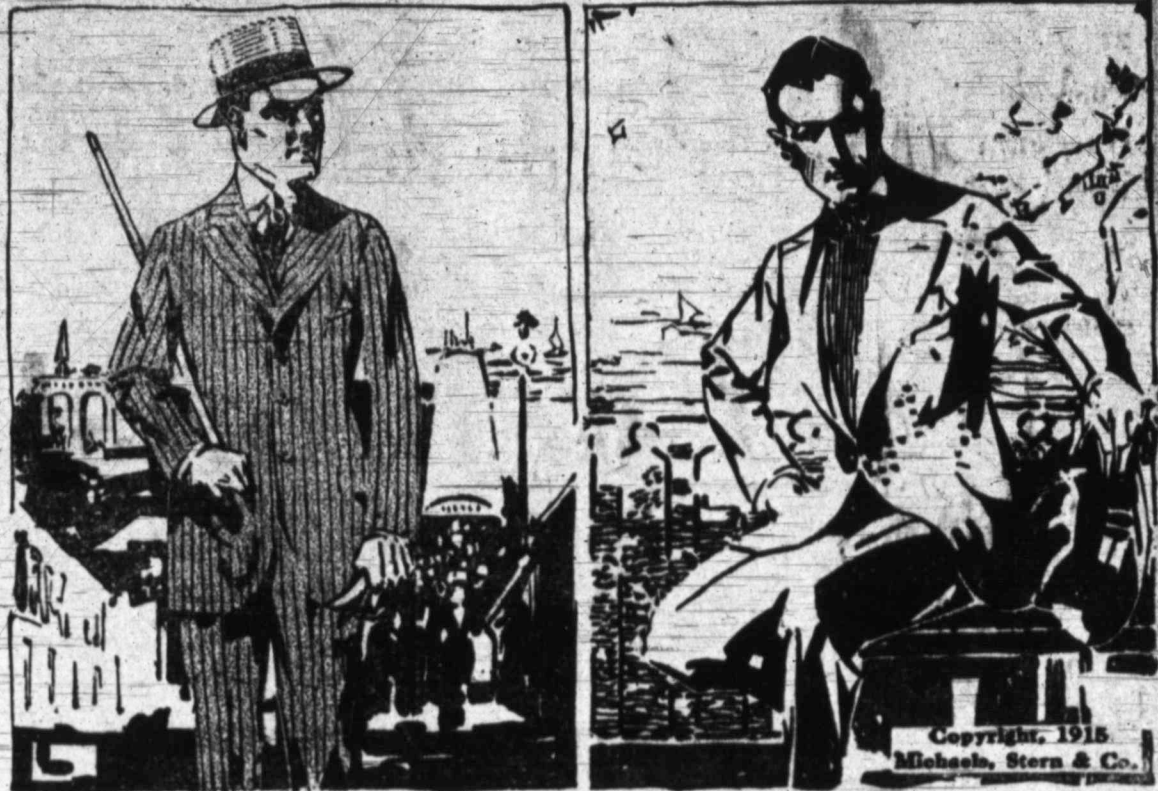
**NEW FIRE STATION IS NEARING COMPLETION**

## SITE BEING PREPARED FOR THE NEW HOSPITAL

Final Plans For Building Expected to Be Submitted in Next Ten Days

Final plans are expected to be submitted within the next ten days for the city and county hospital and another month will probably see the contract awarded. The tentative plans have been approved by all concerned, and the final plans embodying the ideas of city and county officials and local physicians are now being prepared by the architect.

The hospital proper will cost \$34,000 leaving \$16,000 of the \$50,000 voted in the two bond issues of this \$6,500 has been spent for a site, and the remainder will be used for equipping the building and for erecting two brick buildings at the county farm to be used in treatment of contagious diseases. No contagious cases will be handled at the hospital itself.

The site of the hospital is now being cleared and the residence and buildings thereon are being moved away, preparatory to the beginning of work.

## INSECTS REAL DANGER TO GERMAN SOLDIERS

Parasites Carry Spotted Fever From Man to Man—Mails Flooded With Insect Powders

By Associated Press.  
Berlin, March 27.—German railway cars returning from the front in Russia according to an order of the railway authorities, must now be placarded with the following inscription: "From Russia—Epidemic Danger—Before reloading must be disinfected." The regulation further prohibits the use of upholstered cars in Russian Poland so far as possible owing to the difficulties of disinfecting them.  
The insect pest is described as a real danger to the German troops, for the parasites, as has been discovered, carry spotted fever from man to man. Not a few German soldiers have succumbed to it there. Soldiers' letters are accordingly appealing for insect powders and other protective preparations, and the mails have been so flooded with these that the postoffice has had to issue orders excluding all mercury preparations from the mails. Fortunately the soldiers are able to see the humorous side of the matter, as is shown by the names that they have adopted for the different classes of insects. Some are called "infantry," other "cavalry." Still another name for the latter is the "black Hussars." The Cologne Gazette soberly suggests that the soldiers adopt the practice of the Arabs, that of keeping their heads shaven, "in order to leave no room for quartering foreign visitors."

## SALOON LIMITS CASE POSTPONED SATURDAY

Alleged That Charter Provision is Contrary To Local Option Laws

The case of Pierce Nichols vs. Harvey Harris, for mandamus, was to have come up in the 78th district court Saturday, but was postponed owing to the absence of W. J. Weeks, attorney for the plaintiff. At this case attacks the validity of the city charter. The plaintiff is trying to mandamus the county judge to issue a saloon license outside of saloon limits prescribed by the city charter and alleges that section of the charter to be unconstitutional and in conflict with the local option laws of the State. The case will probably come up for trial one day this week.

## WICHITA FALLS BOY ON RESCUE SHIP NAVAJO

Joe Tyson, Son of Dr. L. C. Tyson One of Crew of Ship That Helped Raise Submarine

A Wichita Falls boy, Joe Tyson, son of Dr. L. C. Tyson, is a member of the crew of the navy rescue ship Navajo, which has been engaged in the effort to raise the ill-fated submarine F-4 at Honolulu. Young Tyson enlisted in the navy several years ago and was assigned to the Navajo. Friday's dispatch reported that one of the crew of the F-4 was Walter Covington of Fort Worth, who had given his father's residence as Byers, Texas. His father's name was Sidney Covington. No man of this name was known by residents of Byers with whom The Times communicated by telephone Friday afternoon. A family of Covington's had lived near Byers and there were persons of that name at Burk Burnett several months ago.

## LAST INSTRUCTIONS FOR CLEAN UP DAY

CIVIC LEAGUE CALLS ON CITIZENS TO CO-OPERATE WITH WORKERS

## WAGONS WILL BE PROVIDED

Citizens Requested To Have Trash Piled in Alleys Before Wednesday Morning

With clean-up day only a few days off the committees have practically completed all arrangements for carrying on the work of cleaning up the town next Wednesday. The city will furnish wagons and teams to haul away the trash, the committees appointed by the Civic League will direct the work and citizens will be expected to co-operate with them so that the work will be completed without delay.

Have the premises thoroughly cleaned, collect tin cans, broken crockery and all other rubbish that can not be burned and place in some sort of receptacle in the alley or where there are no alleys, place rubbish in front of house on sidewalk. An important fact that the committees request the people to remember is that all trash must be collected and placed for collection before 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, as trash placed in the alleys after the wagons have passed will have to be hauled away at the expense of the owner.

The district chairman will meet at Bellevue Park Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock where they will find the city's teams at their disposal. It is urged by the League that every householder enter into this work with them—not only as a sanitary measure but for the promotion of the "City Beautiful" idea.

## FLATTERING PROSPECTS REPORTED AT BYERS

The Byers Herald last week contained a number of interesting facts concerning that prosperous little city, as follows:

**Trade from Oklahoma**  
The streets of our town on last Saturday and the Saturday preceding resembled a fall day on account of there being so much cotton on wagons on the street, the most of which was brought from Oklahoma across the big bridge over Red river, from territory adjacent to the river and which naturally belongs to Byers trade territory. On these two days alone about sixty bales of the fleecy staple were marketed here, and besides a great many other farm products, such as corn, chickens, eggs, butter, etc., were in these farm wagons for sale to the high bidder.

Up to this time about 6500 bales of cotton have been marketed in Byers and there are a great many more bales yet to come.

**Season's Ginnings**  
The two gins of our town have turned out in round numbers 5304 bales, the other having been ginned at Charlie and at Gins across Red River.

**The Oil Mill**  
The oil mill here which belongs to local parties has turned out about 100,000 gallons of cotton seed oil, 60,000 sacks of cakes of 100 pounds each, and 300 liners, which is a good showing for this plant.

**Wheat and Corn**  
The two elevators here have bought this season 112,000 bushels of wheat 19,000 bushels of corn.

**Present Prospect**  
Prospects for a record yield of wheat are very flattering now, as there is enough moisture in the ground to bring the grain almost to maturity; besides the corn is being planted and everything looks good.

There will be some reduction in the cotton acreage on account of a large planting of grain, but what will be planted ought to do well on account of the good seasons and we can count on more rains later.

**New Brick Building**  
The concrete foundation for the new building which G. A. Parker is erecting on his lot just north of the Parker store has been laid and work on the building proper will commence at once. This will be a one-story building, and will be occupied as a store, by whom we are not informed. Byers needs just such substantial buildings as this will be and hope to be able to chronicle others soon.

**Masons to Build**  
We are reliably informed that the masons of Byers will build an addition on top of the present store building occupied by Polk & Draughon, the same to be used as a Masonic Hall. They will complete an organization here at an early date.

**Car Turned Turtle**  
The car belonging to G. A. Parker, while being driven by Ernest Davis Tuesday afternoon, on turning a sharp corner in front of Byers' Ranch, turned turtle and considerable damage was done to the car but the occupants, Gen. Parker, Barnett Oliver and Ernest Davis escaped without injury.

**A Big Oil Well**  
Byers 23 on block 13 Byers subdivision, which was brought in recently and reported at the time as being only about a fifty barrel well has developed into one of the best producers in the field, it now producing about 400 barrels per day.

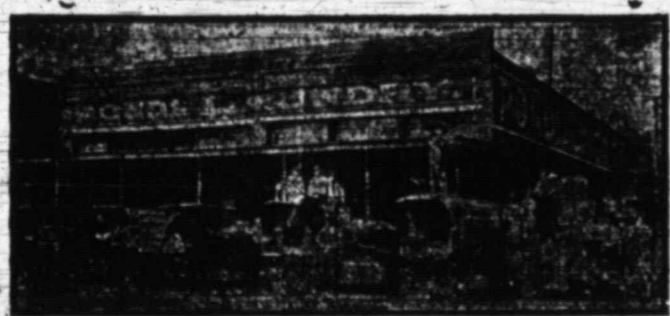

### SKILL AND AGGRESSIVENESS

White Man's Weak Points—Has Advantage in Youth, Height and in Weight

By Associated Press. New York, March 27.—For the fourth time since he won the heavy-weight championship from Jim Jeffries in 1910, Jack Johnson will defend his pugilistic title at Havana, Cuba, April 5. On that date Jess Willard, the most formidable among the white aspirants for the world's premier ring honor, will meet the negro in what is scheduled as a forty-five round battle for the championship. In his long career as a pugilist, Johnson has never faced an opponent of the huge physical proportions of Willard. Because of this advantage in weight, height and reach, as well as the ten years difference in their ages, the followers of Willard hope to see his youth and endurance triumph over the superior boxing skill and ring experience of the champion. It is this meeting between the master pugilist and gigantic novice that lends interest and uncertainty to the battle. Willard shorn of his physical advantages would be but a mannikin in the hands of the negro who has learned every trick of boxing known in expert ring strategy during his many years in the squared circle.

Although Johnson's ring career antedates the present century by a few months, his prowess as a fighter did not bring him into prominence in the heavyweight division until ten years ago and then his standing did not give much promise of championship possibilities. At that time he began meeting men of his own color such as Sam McVey, Joe Jeannette, Black Bill, Walter Johnson and others whom he defeated, in several instances decisively. Chelsea, Mass. in 1906, however, demonstrated that he would have to be reckoned with by the best of the fighters, white or colored, with championship pretensions in heavyweight class.

Jeffries Returns to Ring  
At that time Jeffries had retired from the ring, having handed the title to Alvin Hart. Tommy Burns by defeating the latter and also Jack O'Brien who claimed the championship, assumed the world's title in 1907. Johnson meanwhile was plodding along, incidentally knocking out Felix Lang in Australia and ending the come back propensities of Bob Fitzsimmons in two rounds at Philadelphia and an eleven-round knockout of Jim Flynn at San Francisco the same year—1907. In December 1908 Johnson had the better of Tommy Burns at Sydney, Australia, when police stopped the boat in the fourth round. This placed the big Galveston negro right at the top of his class and while no one was willing to recognize him as the world's title holder, Johnson went right on fighting successfully finishing up with the knockout of the late Stanley Ketchel in twelve rounds at Colma, Cal., on October 16, 1909.

It was then that the negro's pronounced ability and recognized cleverness stung Jeffries into action. The big Californian's self-enforced retirement ended abruptly and Jeffries reentered the fight arena to again defend the title. This seemed to suit Johnson perfectly and the great match for the world's championship was quickly arranged with the result that Johnson scored a decisive victory over Jeffries at Reno, July 4, 1910. From that time to the present Johnson has been the undisputed champion heavy-weight of the world. During the past five years he has been called upon on three times to defend the title. His fight with the Spaniard at Las Vegas, New Mexico, was stopped in the ninth round by the authorities and Johnson was declared the winner. In Paris, France the bout between the champion and Battling Jim Johnson was called a draw and last year he gained the referee's decision over Frank Moran in a twenty-round bout which also took place in the French capital.

Willard Giant  
Jess Willard, who was born in Pottawatomie County, Kansas, twenty-eight years ago is a giant in stature, standing fully 6 feet 4 inches, without shoes, and when in good condition for a bout, turns to scale at 235 pounds. Four years ago he was first seen in a ring fight when he lost on a foul to Louis Pink in the tenth round of a bout at Sapulpa, Okla., but within six weeks from that time he knocked out Pink in three rounds at Oklahoma City. He followed up with five knockouts and two ten-round winning brackets on points, during his first year of fighting in public, 1911.

Five knockouts and two no-decision contests gave him a clear record for 1912. The two no-decision bouts were with Arthur Pelky and Luther McCarty in New York City and in each Willard had the better of his opponents. The big Kansan also scored two of his five knockouts in the East at New York and Buffalo his victims being Soldier Korns and Sailor White. Out of eleven fights which he took part in during 1912 Willard lost only one. This was to Gunboat Smith in twenty rounds at San Francisco. Smith was the best man that Willard has met in his ring career, with the possible exception of Carl Morris whom he defeated in a ten-round go at New York. Last year Willard met Tom McMahon in a ten-round no-decision bout and scored knockouts over Dan Daily in

JOHNSON-WILLARD MATCH POSTPONED FOR ONE DAY ONLY

### CUBAN PRESIDENTS REQUEST

Objections To Holding Boxing Match On Holy Day Cause Postponement

By Associated Press. Havana, March 27.—The fight between Jack Johnson and Jess Willard which had been scheduled to take place here April 4 for the heavy-weight championship of the world, weight champion who has been postponed until Monday, April 5 at 12:30. The postponement was due to a request by President Menocal of Cuba. In a letter to the fight promoters he said great objection had arisen in Cuba and United States to the fight taking place Easter, a holy day, and he requested that the event be postponed until the following day. A meeting of the principals and promoters was held at once and the request of President Menocal was acceded to. Americans have been surprised at the opposition in Cuba at holding the fight on Easter; the promoters were assured that at least 5000 more people would attend any day other than Easter. The date originally was set for April 3 but was changed to Easter at the request of several Havana associations. Each pugilist says the change will not upset their training as they will have a full week's notice. Light road work was the only feature for the forenoon at the two camps. It is probable that Monday will be made an unofficial holiday. Havana merchants and others regretting in this manner of the change in date.

These disadvantages however, may have been remedied by some strict attention to the coaching of his handlers and what he has learned from his sparring partners in training. He has three distinct advantages over Johnson in youth, height and reach, the possession of which, combined with a splendid constitution made Willard the most formidable opponent that has been matched against Johnson during his entire career in the prize ring.

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SACRED CONCERT BY CHORAL SOCIETY

THE CRUCIFIXION WILL BE GIVEN AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH THIS AFTERNOON

THE PROGRAM IS ANNOUNCED

Choruses Will Be Accompanied By Organ Piano and Orchestra—3 O'clock, Hour

During the last three months the Wichita Falls Choral Society has been hard at work upon the program to be given this afternoon at three o'clock in the First Christian church.

The chorus will be accompanied by organ, piano and orchestra. It is hoped that there will be a very large attendance, as there are many who have not yet had an opportunity to hear this chorus.

4. Chorus, From the Throne of His Cross, from Stainer's Crucifixion, (solo Mr. Benninger).

6. Trio, Protect Us Through the Coming Night, Cushman, Miss Agnew, Mrs. Clifford, Mrs. Thompson.

7. Chorus, The Heavens are Telling Hayden (from "The Creation").

Accompanists, Mrs. Carnes, Mrs. Strang, Mrs. Machlin.

Director, Mrs. C. B. Machlin.

Owing to the illness of Mrs. Carpenter, it is most unfortunately necessary to omit her solo from the program. Mrs. Carpenter, as announced last week, was to have sung "For My Soul Thirsteth for God," from Mendelssohn's "As the Heart Pants." A free will offering will be taken.

A Review of the Crucifixion

The following review of the Crucifixion by Sir John Stainer has been prepared by C. B. Machlin, director of the chorus:

The words, selected and written by Rev. J. Sparrow-Simpson are full of reverence and holy zeal, and the music amply supplements and strengthens them.

The Crucifixion is a meditation on the Passion of our Blessed Redeemer. It is divided into four principal parts: The Agony in the Garden; the Procession to Cavalry; the Mystery of the Divine Humiliation; and the Appeal of the Crucified.

Part one describes the Agony in the Garden, and the scenes attendant thereon. A tenor recit "and they came to a place called Gethsemane," shatters in the first subject "Could ye not watch with me one brief hour?" The chorus "Jesus, Lord Jesus," which follows, is a dialogue between Jesus and His Disciples. The tender mournful approach of "Could ye not watch?" is answered by the disciples, "Jesus, Lord Jesus, bowed in bitter anguish, and bearing all the evil we have done, Oh teach us how to love Thee for thy love. Help us to pray, and watch, and mourn with Thee." The first part closes with a brief account of Christ's capture, trial and condemnation. This is in the hands, principally, of the tenor soloist, and is a very dramatic piece of writing, ending with Christ's being "led away to be crucified."

The second part opens with a processional march, representing the journey to Cavalry. The words of the opening chorus, "Flung wide the gates" might be thoughts of a devout believer, viewing the procession from a distance, and recognizing it not as a journey to execution, but as a triumph, leading to life. "O death, where is thy sting; oh grave, where is thy victory?" are evidently the substantives of his thoughts, as he stands watching. For there is no note of despair, no hint of failure, in the joyous, exuberant outburst, "Flung wide the gates for the Savior waits, to tread in his royal way. He has come, above, in His power and love to endure and suffer and die."

The third part, "The Mystery of Divine Humiliation," contains perhaps the most beautiful number in the entire cantata. The treatment is confined almost exclusively to solo-work between the tenor and bass leads. But the climax is reached in the quartet, "God so Loved the World." This is a masterpiece of beauty and skill. There are but few sacred quartets written which may even compare with this sublime inspiration; and I know of none which surpass it. Again tenor and bass solos close the movement, ending with a short male chorus, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do."

The fourth part, "The Appeal of the Crucified," opens with a bass recit, "Is it nothing to you all ye that pass by? Behold and see if there be any sorrow—like unto my sorrow—wherewith the Lord hath afflicted me in the day of his fierce anger! The chorus which follows, "From the Throne of His Cross" is the most dramatic number in the cantata. Taking its cue from the last words of the bass recit, "His fierce anger," it opens with a raging minor theme, scored for full orchestra, and organ, fortissimo. The theme is so soon announced that the chorus takes it up to the words: "From the throne of His Cross, the king of grief cries out to a world of unbelief, O men and women, afar and nigh! Here the accompaniment dies away to a whisper, the chorus takes the words "Is it nothing to you, all ye that pass by?" This appeal, the touching eloquence of which cannot be described, is repeated in many different shades of meaning. First, and several times thereafter, in tender, sorrowful approach; but finally in

ferce and intense scorn. The chorus (it is not perhaps the happiest arrangement for many voices to represent one man) is speaking, presumably, the thoughts of the dying Savior. "Is it nothing to you?" I wept for the sorrows and pains of men, I healed them and helped them and loved them. But then they shouted against me 'Crucify! Crucify!' Here is the most dramatic part of all, the representation of the frenzied mob clamoring for the death of the Savior. Each voice in turn takes up the cry, coming together at last in one wild shriek, "Crucify!" A faint moaning wail of agony, "Is it nothing?" follows this outbreak. The appeal changes again "O come unto me, for why will ye die?" and

Trying to Sell an Automobile?

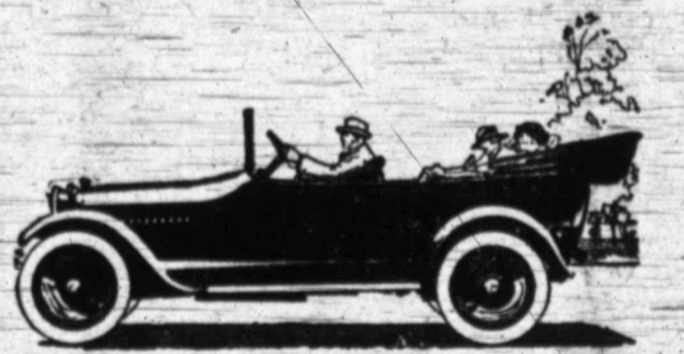

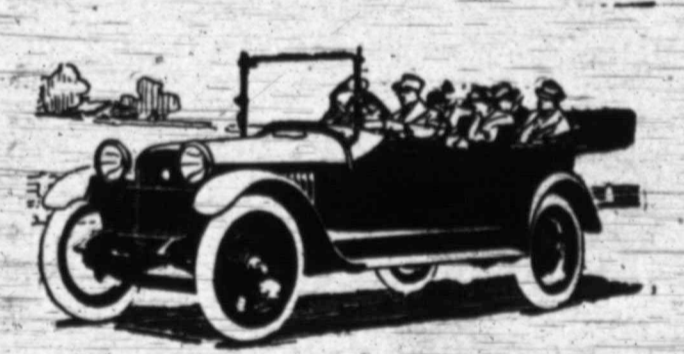
