By Associated Press. Petrograd, April 8.—Russian official statement:

"The advance of the Russians, the Carpathians has cut the Austrian army under Gen. Boerodiztch in two places. The eastern wing of this army is in a precarious position. The Russian took Smolinsk east of the Lubkow Pass. The Russians also have thrown back the Austrian forces at Bartzseld. In the district of Lubkow, having advanced through the Rostock Pass they have forced a vedge between the Austrian armies. Smolinsk controls the only road through the Seskid mountains between Mezalaborcz and Ucsok, a dis-

tance of 60 miles.

The western wing of the Austrian army has its base at Guenno and its communications along the roads opening into Hungary are not menaced. The eastern wing to the contrary is joined with the forces operating around Uzok by which they are threat-ened with attack.
