## ATHLETIC MEET HERE SATURDAY

SCHOOLS IN FOURTEEN COUNTIES WILL TAKE PART IN DISTRICT MEET

SCORES ALREADY ENTERED

Those Who Win Will Represent District at State Meet at Austin Later

Representative athletes from fourteen counties will participate in the Wichita Falls District Track Meet to be held here next Saturday, April 17, and from present indications it will be the largest in the history of this district. The preliminaries will take place Friday and the final meet will be staged Saturday at the city ball park, opening at 2:30 p. m.

At 6:30 there will be a baseball game between Galesville and Wichita Falls High School teams. In addition a tennis tournament will be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Four teams from the district competing for the district championship. The Akis brothers, J. W. and Henry Akis, will represent this county in doubles and singles. Two girls will be selected from the girls' tennis club to take part in the events for girls.

Entrances in the preliminaries will be allowed to all who have won first and second place in the respective county meets, and in the final the contestants will be reduced to five for each event. This meet will bring from sixty to one hundred athletes here to compete for honors in their respective lines. The local high school will be well represented and to judge from their work done in the county meet held here the first of this month, they stand an excellent chance of carrying off their share of the honors.

The silver loving cup, won last year by Bowie, will be hotly contested for this year by a large number of schools. This cup goes to the high school scoring highest number of points and when won three years in succession becomes the property of the champion school. Last year was the first time it was contested for and the present holder is expected to put up a strong fight to retain it. This cup is now on display in the window of B. T. Burgess, the jeweler.

Additional medals, the silver medal offered for the individual championship, the athlete scoring the highest number of points, and the bronze medal, offered for the second highest score on display at the same place. Ribbons will be given for the first, second and third places in each event.

### SPECIAL LECTURES AT COLLEGE OF INDUSTRIAL ARTS

Denton, Texas, April 15.—Ten days of special lectures and demonstrations on some of the most interesting and practical phases of the College of Industrial Arts work will be given in Denton during the first ten days of June in connection with the regular six weeks summer school course of the College. A somewhat similar course was given last year but in response to the enthusiasm of those who took that time, the college has added some unusually good features to the course, and also increased the force of instructors who will direct the classes. Each teacher of the various branches is the director of that department in the regular session of the College, a somewhat unusual feature but one which will be appreciated by those privileged to take the ten days work.

Miss Floris S. Culver, College lecturer and demonstrator, will present the problems of domestic science, including cooking, the canning and preserving of fruits and vegetables. The other courses will be given by the heads of the departments: Domestic Art, Miss Virginia Babb; manual art, Miss Anna M. Cron; fine arts, Miss Mary W. Shackelford. The Texas Interdenominational School of Missions will be in session at this time, from June 1 to 10 and its members will take advantage of these unusual opportunities in connection with their other duties. It is expected that 250 or more women will be in attendance for this purpose alone.

Miss Culver's lectures and demonstrations will be on the most practical phases of domestic science and home economics, which can be given in a limited time. Among the subjects to be considered are: fruits, cereals, starchy vegetables, cooking of green vegetables, making of sauces, canning of fruits and vegetables, cooking of tough and tender meats, meat substitutes, quick breads and yeast breads, cake, desserts and child school luncheon. This series will be given in the morning, and the total cost of taking this and the other branches in the ten days will be fifty cents, the fee for enrollment.

A discussion of color, form and art subjects as they affect the home environment for the home will be given in the interior decoration lectures by Miss Mary W. Shackelford. This work will be of special interest to practical home makers, and will include numbers of illustrations of good and bad applications of points discussed.

Miss Cron will treat especially of problems of the practical housekeeper in the planning of homes, woods and their finishes and care. Miss Cron will probably discuss the convenient kitchen and practical points about remodeling the home.

Textiles and clothing, sewing in the home, and the cultural influences of sewing will be treated of by Miss Babb including practical discussions of the teaching of domestic art in the public schools.

The young people of the congregation of the First Presbyterian church and their friends are invited to attend an "indoor picnic" given in the basement of the church this evening. The Westminster Guild will be hostess on this occasion and has announced that all entertainment will be furnished by the Guild, so lunches are expected.

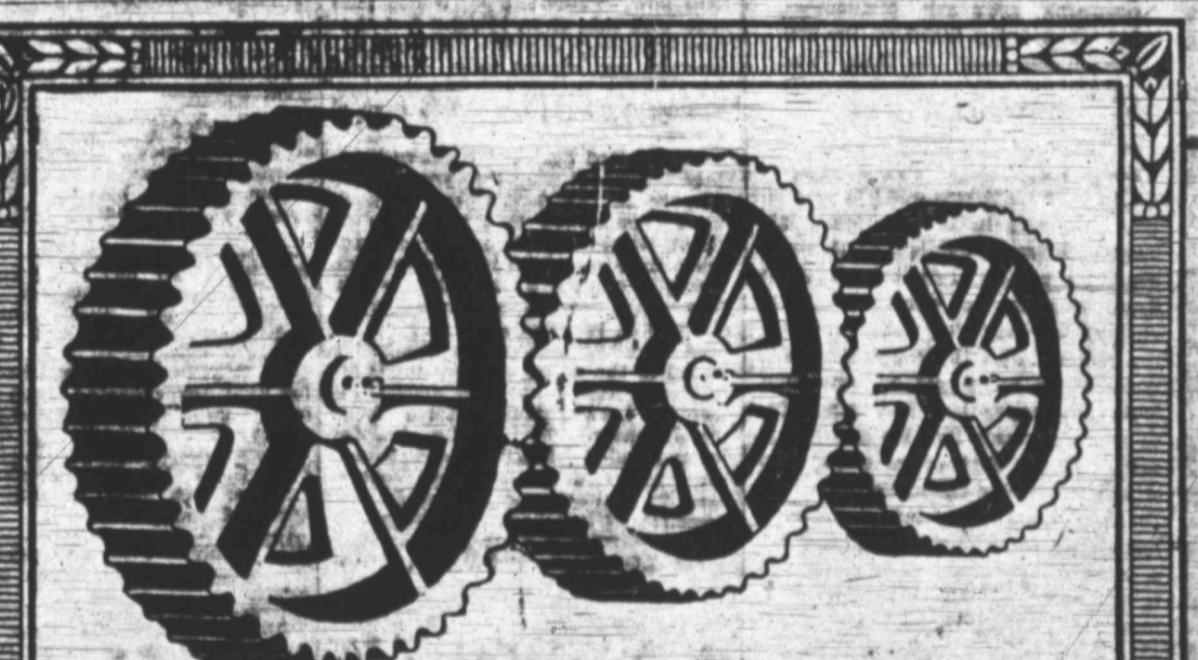

Conservatism still prevails and should prevail as long as the war lasts. There is a tendency on the part of many people to go to the extremes in all their various activities.

The Houston Telegram, a newspaper started and financed by Col. Jack Wolters, has ceased publication and gone into bankruptcy.

The law passed by the last legislature providing a bounty of five cents each for jack rabbit scalps is effective 90 days from its passage.

Nearly all of the twenty-eight prisoners of the Bell county jail are young boys, charged with burglary, declare the dispatches from Belton.

Of course, if it was our boy or your boy who was in trouble, we might have a different opinion of this suspended sentence law.

It often wenders how this globe will struggle on when I catch in, when I sit on my long white robe and sleep with cold but peaceful grin.

It was Henry W. Grady who said: "When every farmer in the South shall eat bread from his own field and meat from his own pastures, and disturbed by no creditor, and enslaved by no debt, shall amid his teeming gardens, orchards, vineyards, dairies and barnyards pitch his own crop in his own wisdom and growing them in independence, making cotton, rice, clean surplus, selling it in his own time, in his chosen market and not at his master's bidding—getting his pay in cash and not in a receipted shortage that discharges his debt, but does not restore his freedom, then shall be breaking the fullness of our day."

tal witness for the State. Before he began to testify, Judge Martin said the State asked that prior to the killing, the defendant, J. B. Lischke in Port Worth bore a good reputation as a peaceable and law-abiding citizen.

"He never did," witness answered. He said that none of the attorneys for Judge Fry ever applied to see the papers, but that Judge Miller of Port Worth did apply. A question as to Judge Miller met with objection as hearsay and as not being binding on the defendant, overruled.

On cross examination, witness said he would not have let anyone see the papers without the consent of Martin and Kay. Judge Stinson said he had not taken part in the raising of any fund to help the prosecution.

ABOUT WARRANTS

There was considerable questioning by Judge McLean as to the manner of issuing warrants and county scrip, the witness saying that the treasurer signed the warrant and the county clerk issued the scrip, that the county judge did not have to sign it.
