# City's 100th B'Day Not Too Far Away

Maize Days, 2001 is the 45th annual fall festival for Friona, makaing it the third-oldest in the Panhandle, behind Dalhart's XIT Rodeo, 64 years, and Shamrock's Irish Days, 55

It behooves our civic leaders, as well as all of our residents, to make sure the "streak" continues, at least five more years.

Why is that? Well, the City of Friona will officially celebrate its 100th birthday in the year 2006, since the city has always laid claim to the year 1906 as its origin, due to the arrival of the railroad, and the "land rush" brought about by the sale of the XIT Ranch, which covered 99.8 per cent of Parmer County.

In fact, Maize Days grew out of the City's 50th anniversary in 1956, when town leaders, clubs and organizations came together and threw a week-long shindig which included a big free barbecue, a "pony express" race, and a number of events.

So successful was the golden anniversary that these same civic leaders decided "Why not have an event like this every year, so we can celebrate our heritage, and raise funds for local clubs and organizations in the process?"

The name "Maize Days" was chosen due to the prevalence of our area's main crop at the time, maize, or milo, or grain sorghum. For several years in the 1950s, 60s and 70s, Parmer County led the state and nation in the production of maize.

For a number of years, corn replaced the feed grains as the crop with the most acreage, but in the last few years maize has moved back to the fore, due mainly to the extra water needs of corn versus feed grains.

So, here we are, 45 years later (or 95, to be exact), still holding onto our Maize Days. We need to start now, planning for a "bigger and better" celebration in 2006. And while we're at it, we could let the annual festival snowball as we count off the years.

Thank you, God, for the Augel named Barbara that you blessed Friona with for awhile. Heaven should be all the brighter with her presence.

# **Always Tough Tulia**

Is Friday Opponent

When Friona and Tulia meet on the gridiron, it's always a fight to the finish, and that's what is expected when the two old rivals meet Friday in Tulia. Kickoff is 7:30 p.m. at Younger Field.

Last season the Chieftains edged the Hornets, 17-8 at Chieftain Field, in a typical Friona-Tulia game. The two schools didn't play in 1998 or 1999, but three of the previous four games in the 1990s were decided by a touchdown or less. In 1993, Friona won 14-8, after what would've been a tying TD by Tulia was called back. Then in 1994, when the Chieftains won their first district title in 29 years, Friona claimed a 22-14 win after another hard fight, and the '95 Chieftains squeaked by, 19-14.

However, although Friona dominated the series in the 1990s, winning six straight, the Hornets had won the previous six straight, and hold a big lead overall, 26-13, first meeting on the gridiron in 1933.

Coach Mike Scott said the Chiefs have had a good, hard week of workouts, trying to correct mistakes in their loss to Guymon.

# **Hereford Bank Announces Expansion Plans To Friona**

First National Bank of Hereford announced last week that it is making application to establish a location in Friona on West U.S. Highway

The bank ran a legal notice in last week's edition of the Friona Star, announcing the application to the Comptroller of the Currency to establish the new Friona bank.

"This move to Friona was in our long-range plans from the beginning, but some changes in the Friona market pushed our schedule up a little sooner than we expected," stated Wade Easley, president of Hereford First National Bank.

The permanent site for the new bank will be across the highway from another Hereford-based business, Western Chevrolet. The permanent building will be 3500 square feet in size, Easley said.

While the new bank's building is being constructed, the plans are to move in a temporary building to be used until the permanent home is completed.

Easley also announced that manager of the proposed

Friona bank will be Ab Hendley, Jr., who has served as vice president of Friona State Bank.

"We are very excited about the prospect of locating in Friona and becoming a part of that community and area," Easley said. "That market is very comparable to ours, and we feel our bank will be a good fit in the Friona economy."

The new bank will have a group of local stockhorders, and Easley said they are very pleased with this group of local owners.

"I also think we were fortunate to acquire Ab Hendley for the management of the new operation," Easley added. "He has been in Friona for a number of years, and is well-respected in

# Ross Ayers' Rites Held Thursday

Memorial services for Major Gen. Ross Ayers, 91, a former resident of Friona, were held Thursday in Austin. Burial was at the Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery, under the direction of Amey-Rockwood Lane Funeral Home. Gen. Ayers died Saturday, September 1, in Muskogee, Oklahoma after a brief illness.

He was born August 11, 1910, to G.M. and Linda Ayers, in Westminster, Texas. He was one of seven children. He graduated from high school at Cuero.

Ayers attended Texas Tech, where he was captain of the 1933 Red Raider football team. He received his BA from Tech in 1934. He taught school and coached in the Lubbock public schools, where he met and married Marion Ruth Betts in 1940. In 1946 he received his MA from the University of Texas. He is a Distinguished Alumni of Texas Tech and a member of the Texas Tech University Athletic Hall of Fame.

General Ayers began his military career in 1931, enlisting in the Texas National Guard. He was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant, Artillery, in 1939. He was mobilized with the 36th Division in 1943, and served in the European Theater.

He received the Silver Star

Theater.

He received the Silver Star for landing the first artillery piece on the beachhead at Salerno, Italy. He fought at Monte Casino and in the Vosges Mountains in France.

Vosges Mountains in France.

Following World War II, he was promoted to Lt. Col., Artillery. Gen. Ayers was assigned as Command Officer, 36th Infantry Div. Artillery in 1963. In 1965, he was assigned as Commanding General of the 36th Infantry.

In 1969, he was appointed by Governor Preston Smith as Adjutant General of Texas, and promoted to the rank of Major General in 1970. Heretired in 1973 from the service.

retired in 1973 from the service.

After returning from WWII Ayers farmed in West Texas for a number of years. He was an active member of his communities of Lubbock and Friona. After the death of his first wife in 1956, he moved to Friona, and married Flora Mayfield Betts in 1958.

Gen. Ayers served in the Friona Evening Lions Club, American Legion, and National Guard Assn. of Texas. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church, and was a member of First Presbyterian Church in Austin.







# On Chieftains By 21-6

Last year, the Chieftains had their way with the Guymon Tigers in their interstate season opener, 33-0 at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amerillo

interstate season opener, 33-0 at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo.

This year, the weather was somewhat cooler, the Friona fans got to be on the "home" side, but Guymon got even for last year's embarrassment with a 21-6 win.

Whereas last year the Chiefs jumped out to a 27-0 halftime lead, this time Friona had only two first downs to show for a first half in which they had run only 14 plays.

The Chieftains did manage to draw first blood, and scored their only touchdown on a defensive play.

With 4:50 remaining in the first quarter, defensive lineman Eric Rubio knocked the ball loose, and linebacker Adam Bandy scooped up the pigskin and dashed 61 yards for what proved to be Friona's only score. Nathan Haile's PAT kick was low, as the Chiefs grabbed a 6-0 lead.

Guymon answered in short order The Tigers went 63

Guymon answered in short order The Tigers went 63 yards in ten plays, converting six first downs in doing so, and their kick gave the Oklahoma Panhandle team a 7-6 lead with 22 seconds left in quarter #1.

Haile gave Friona a first down with a 12-yard run, and on a third and 12 situation, Bandy hit Andy Carthel on a 27-yard pass play. Carthel made a circus catch on a play that would have been pass interference had he not caught the ball. Since he did, it netted 12 additional yards.

Three plays gained six yards, and on fourth and two from the Guymoon 22, Bandy hit Cody Grimsley in the flat. Grimsley was tackled immediately, and the measurement showed to be a foot short, and Guymon took

# **New Hereford Station** Has 'Positive' Sound

Buddy Peeler's morning
has been hectic. He's made
some on-air announcements,
including citing neighborly
deeds by area residents, and
reading local obituaries the
old-fashioned way-with a full
listing of survivors. He's
pulled tidbits of news from
area papers, pored over a
clutter of faxes and Emails,
answered phone calls, and
even taped a couple of
commercials to pay the bills.
When the station's
mid-morning announcer must
leave the control booth for a
few minutes, Buddy fills in
with some on-air announcements, sending special
greetings to folks at Bootleg
Corner and Grady, New
Mexico.
In the full-throated deep

ments, sending special greetings to folks at Bootleg Corner and Grady, New Mexico.

In the full-throated deep drawl that has been familiar to listeners in the Muleshoe and Hereford areas during four decades, he admits through the microphone as he queues up another gospel tune, that his morning has been wild. To explain, he borrows a line from a radio advertising friend, the late Jim Tucker.

"I'm not sure if I'm washing, or hanging-out," Buddy owns-up over the airwaves.

That's about as pretentious as the broadcast pronouncements get at radio station KNNK, a WTRT member on the Summerfield exchange.

member on the Summerfield exchange.

Positive broadcastingeven if you're positive that 
you're occasionally flustered-is 
the hallmark of 100.5 on the 
FM dial.

Proming forth a positive law.

FM dial.

Beaming forth a veritable hymnal of gospel music during the day, and easy listening tunes worthy of the concert hall in the evening hours, KNNK is a reflection of the philosophies of its owners and founders, Buddy and Alva Lee Peeler of Hereford.

"We feel a radio station is sort-of like a town or region's cheerleader. With our signal

coverage to so many outlying communities including Muleshoe, Dimmitt, Hart, Nazareth, Bovina, Friona, Canyon, Happy, Easter, Vega, Adrian, and portions of Amarillo, we can't be a one-town station. We reach out to a big area as sort of a town crier.

a big area as sort of a town crier.

"Our positive programming that encourages others is an outgrowth of listener response. We hear back from many listeners that what we are playing helps them. We're not bragging, but we feel like what we're doing is a cut above secular radio. It's very personal, and it brings folks back to the radio who had become non-listeners," says Buddy.

The Peelers trace their roots to Bailey County, where they were high school sweethearts at Muleshoe. Buddy worked numerous odd jobs in stores and businesses while growing up in the greater Muleplex. Although he had been a big radio listener, and had dreamed of work in radio, he didn't think he would get a chance. That changed when the late Gil Lamb offered him a job at that bastion of Bailey County broadcasting, KMUL radio, where many home-grown high school students from Bailey County got an opportunity.

"Gil showed me the KMUL control room with all of the knobs and buttons and switches, and I didn't think there was any way that I could learn to run things. But Gil was confident I could learn. One of my jobs was to type the daily program log. I'd go to work an hour before school, and then go back to the station after school until sign-off. I made \$70 a week. That seemed fine to me, to get paid to sit and play records," Buddy explains.

Alva Lee says Buddy had his deep purr of a perfect-for-radio voice even in high school. His voice never

changed.

The Peelers attended a Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce banquet with a contingent from Muleshoe in 1967. That visit ultimately altered their lives.

"Hereford seemed like a real hustling place, and the impression we drew from the chamber banquet eventually led to our decision to move to Hereford," Buddy explains.

Buddy took an advertising sales job at KPAN radio in Hereford in 1968. He stuck with the Hereford station in various capacities of sales and announcing for 27 years, becoming sales manager, and eventually, general manager.

Alva Lee substitute taught in the Hereford school system and also gave music lessons from 1975 to 1985. She served as director of Big Brothers/Big Sisters in Hereford from 1985 through July of 1998.

Buddy left KPAN in 1995, maintaining ownership of a radio station at Levelland for a time. The Peelers felt strong ties to Hereford and wanted to stay in the local area. With a desire to remain in radio, Buddy was starting over at age 58.

He did some checking and discovered that there was no owner for an FM station permit in the Dimmitt area. When the permit window came open, he applied for it with the Federal Communications Commission, and in September, 1995, the Peelers were approved for a 25,000 wat FM station that would have been located south of Hereford, Buddy subsequently filed with the FCC for a 50,000-watt upgrade and a change in tower site.

"We wanted to locate our studio in Hereford as a matter of convenience. A tower in the Summerfield

area would let us do so. Our thinking was to get a station going in 1996, but that didn't happen. We hit roadblocks, and the process of getting the permit upgrade and financing was tedious and frustrating. We needed the FCC upgrade and the loan to be approved at the same time. It took a while, but suddenly everything came together within a week in January of 1998. We began ordering equipment began ordering equipment then, and came into our building at 207 South 25 Mile Avenue in Hereford in April. We had a deadline from the FCC of June 13, 1998 to get on the air," says Buddy.

Alva Lee says they were
skittish about putting a
second radio station on the
air in Hereford, but she's
convinced that the window
opening for a permit and
their decision on format were
"a God thing."

"It took three years of
study and consideration to
surrive at a decision on a
gospel format for KNNK.
Secular radio was all that I
had ever dealt with, but
Alva Lee though we needed
a gospel format. Gospel radio
has turned out to be the right





## Pet Talk

If cats do have nine lives, it may be a good thing: there are a lot of diseases out there that head straight for Felix and Morris. One ailment that strikes fear

One ailment that strikes fear more than any other, however, is probably the feline immuno-deficiency virus, commonly called FIV. Simply put, it's a killer and one disease cat owners should be familiar with and try to prevent, says Dr. Alice Wolf, a feline specialist at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

FIV is in the same family of diseases as feline leukemia, another deadly disease, and it is a cousin of the HIV virus that affects humans. FIV is classified as a lentivirus, or "slow

the HIV virus that affects humans. FIV is classified as a lentivirus, or "slow virus," similar to those that cause pneumonia in sheep, infectious anemia in horses, encephalitis in goats and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) in humans.

"The FIV virus in cats can be found worldwide," says Wolf. In the U.S., as many as three per cent of healthy cats may have FIV, an alarming number considering there are an estimated 60 million cats nationwide. The disease cannot be passed to humans.

Among cats that are sick and are suffering from other diseases, that figure rises up to 15 per cent, adds Wolf.

Cats most likely to get FIV are males, especially those that like to roam wide areas. They tend to come into contact with more cats and acquire the disease.

Indoor cats are much less likely to acquire FIV, Wolf explains.

to acquire FIV, wolf explains.

The most common way a cat acquires FIV is through a bite from an infected cat, Wolf says. "That's why a male cat that roams a lot and may get into fights with other cats is especially prone to the disease," Wolf concluded. concluded.



Hard work. Common sense. Responsibility. Respect.



Every group has a religion. Some secular oriented groups are not aware of their religion and values. But they strongly adhere to them non-the-less. This is a terribly dangerous situation, for one cannot evaluate himself properly if he is unaware of the values he is centering his life around. He is not really in charge of his life. He is drifting in the current of his values without knowing their negative or positive power.

A new social group came into existence in the closing decades of the 20th century. We call it the High-Tech community. Its birthplace is Silicon Valley. Some real saints with godly values belong to this community as their religion. The major tenets of the high-tech community's religion are "technology is the solution to all human problems," "the market is the true test of everything," "money is the highest good," and "all government and regulation is bad." All of these assumptions are erroneous.

High-tech religionists worship the spreadsheet. They think if something cannot be quantified, it has no value. The intuitive and subjective is bad, in their view. Their values disregard the worth of social services and art. They do not realize that all commercial values ultimately depend on good social values to make them work efficiently.

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

# The Seright Family Adopts A New Daughter In Russia

John and Kerre Seright of Lubbock and their son Ryan, age 6, are sharing some nice news with John's old friends in Friona. They are announcing a new addition to their family.

The Serights recently returned from Russia with Alexandra Emily Seright, whose nickname is Sasha. She is 11 years old and shares her new father's birthday of February 18. Until August 7th, little Sasha had lived at Orphanage #3 in the city of Eisk, region of Krasnodar, Russia.

Papa John reports that things are going very well, though Sasha is a little overwhelmed. She has had many "firsts" in the last few weeks, such as her first doll, airplane ride, amusement park, potato chips and the first time to sleep in a room by herself. In Russia, she shared a room with 21 other girls at the orphanage.

John Seright is a 1976 graduate of Friona High School and the son of the late Herb and Billie Dan Seright. He has his master's degree in science and accounting from Texas Tech and is a partner in the firm of Robinson, Burdette, Martin, Seright and Burrows. He has been with the firm for 18 years as a CPA, specializing in taxation, business valuation and litigation support services.

John's wife Kerre is currently a full-time mom. Kerre has her master's degree in German language and a minor in French. She taught German at Coronado High School for 16 years. Kerre notes that even though the Russian language is somewhat different, her experience in language education has helped quite a bit with Sasha's adjustment in America.

Little brother Ryan is also adjusting well

America.

Little brother Ryan is also adjusting well to his new older sister and has even picked up a little Russian along with his parents. However, John says Sasha is learning English at a pretty fast rate. Ryan is in the first grade at Whiteside Elementary and has been quite mature in sharing the family responsibilities of helping to integrate Sasha into her new life.

responsibilities of helping to integrate Sasha into her new life.

Sasha is attending Honey Elementary School in Lubbock due to the ESL (English as Second Language) program there. The Honey program is somewhat customized for each student and there are usually about a dozen students from Europe and Asia. Sasha will likely be gradually integrated into normal curriculum at the appropriate pace.

When acked about their trip to Pussic John said.

When asked about their trip to Russia, John said they flew from Houston to Amsterdam, a nine and one-half hour flight, and then on to Moscow for another three hours and spent the night there. Then they flew on a rather primitive Russian airline to Krasnodar, another three hours, and then were driven for a couple of hours to Eisk.

John reports that Moscow is very much a cosmopolitan city, which tries to cater to Americans. They spent four days in Moscow and took Sasha to the Kremlin, Red Square, the zoo, Gorky Park and of course shopping at the 100-year-old mall along Red Square.

"The cathedrals and other structures in Moscow are some of the most gorgeous we have ever seen," John said. "But once we left Moscow, the rest of Russia seemed to us very much like a third world country."

Ryan decided not to make such a long trip and stayed with his grandmother, Kerre's mom, who lives outside of Big Spring. John says they took an international cell phone with them and were able to keep in touch with family and office part of the time.

The Friona Star asked John about the family's decision to adopt a child from another country. Here is his reply:

"We have been fortunate in many ways and wished to help a child in need by providing a family environment. This eventually evolved into the idea of an international adoption of an older child, since we believe the need is generally much greater than in the U.S. The agency we decided on has strong connections in Russia and matched us with Sasha. We fell in love with her immediately upon receiving her information and a short video. Kerre went to Russia in late February and spent some time with her, which only strengthened our decision," John told us.

The entire process took about ten months, according to John. He said he and the family would be happy to discuss the particulars regarding red-tape, paper work, passports, things to be cautious about, etc., with anyone who is interested in a similar adoption. Under a fairly recent change in U.S. law, Sasha is now automatically a U.S. Citizen.

John told us that it is most important to have a well-connected, honest and knowledgeable facilitator while in Russia. This person really handles everything from start to finish. And, of course, your U.S. agency must be accredited in Russia to monitor the application and followup process.

Russia has around 700,000

"Many parents, particularly single mothers, cannot support a family and must give up their children, sometimes voluntarily sometimes not. Unlike the U.S., there is no welfare system to assist the families," he noted. "In Sasha's case, she had a mother only, a schoolteacher, who died, causing her to be institutionalized."

He added that children in the orphanages are turned out at age 16, even if there is no one to assist them.

John said that after learning about the great need in the orphanages, they took some medicines and toys with them, and purchased other items for the children while they were there. They are planning to mail more items such as shoes, and denim clothing which they love, directly to the director of the orphanage. If intercepted, she will have to pay a 60% of value fee in order to get the items.

"During the court process, the judge asked Sasha if she was going to miss the 'boarding school.' Through the interpreter, her answer was that she would miss her friends but that she was ready to go to her new life," John said.

The Serights had previously sent their new daughter some packages of clothing and other items, and also took quite a few clothes for her with them to Russia. Before they left, little Sasha decided to give everything they had given her to her friends whom she was leaving behind.

# Small Towns Celebrate One Thing Or Another All Across The Country

The City of Friona will be celebrating it's 45th annual Maize Days next week; which means that five years from now we'll have our 50th celebration and Friona will be 100 years old. Maize Days happens to be one of the oldest small town festivals in the Panhandle area.

Shamrock, Texas celebrated their 55th St. Patrick's Days event this past March. But Dalhart has us all beat by putting on their 64th XIT Rodeo and Reunion last month and, Dalhart is now 100 years old.

We are not alone. From Alabama to Wyoming, Americans gather often to celebrate their culture, community heritage, growth and progress. In fact, the festivals' web page on the net says Americans are mad for festivals and no matter what your passion or hobby, there's a celebration out there just for you.

Some of these frolicking fetes can get pretty bizarre, like the UFO Festival in Roswell, New Mexico every Fourth of July. This one is based on the famous "reported" UFO crash outside the city limits of Roswell in 1947. Their Chamber of Commerce features UFO experts, concerts, sci-fi movies, and an alien puppet show.

In fact, there is another Maize Days celebration which takes place right around corn harvest each year in Lincoln, Nebraska. Only this one is spelled MAZE. Location for this event is in Grandpa John's Amazing Maze Cornfield. Each year from the last weekend in September until Halloween some 22,000 people pay \$5 each to pass through Grandpa's maze.

Grandpa John maps out the intricate maze himself on graph paper and each year the maze is different. He then maneuvers his riding mower through the cornfield

to establish the maze. The whole process takes a couple of months to achieve. Grandpa gets someone to take him up in a plane to look over his work and take some pictures. He then does a few last minute adjustments before opening his newest masterpiece to the public.

However, most of these small town festivals are not just a whimsical notion. They are quite beneficial to the local community, with proceeds from concerts, booths, raffles, and other events going to help out local civic organizations, charities and clubs, youth groups, churches, etc. Some local organizations base their entire year's budget on the funds they glean from the annual celebration activities.

Then in Byron, Illinois, for instance, they have the Turkey Testicle Festival every October. This annual event encourages the roasting, frying, basting and eating of gobbler gonads, which, by the way, are located under the critter's left wing and are about human size, or so I am told.

Not to be outdone, of course, Texas has a couple of the strangest food festivals anywhere around. . .the first being Sweetwater's annual Rattlesnake Roundup, which includes a snake meat-eating contest. Since 1958, over 225,000 pounds of restless rattlers have been rounded

up. Besides cooking and eating this diamondback delicacy, their skins are sold to make boots and the venom is sold for medicinal purposes. So the local Jaycees rake in quite a lot of proceeds for the city. The winner of the annual beauty queen pageant is known as Miss Snake Charmer, and there are rattlesnake dances and guided snake hunts.

Then there is the annual potted pork party which is held down in Austin every year in May, known as the "Spamarama." Events include the Spam Toss and the Spam Burger Eating Contest, plus the tug-of-war event in which each team tries to pull the other into a pool of Spam jelly. This one attracts around 10,000 every year.

A Few Creature Fetes
If your festival is not centered around some interesting food product, perhaps there is an animal indigenous to your area, and you could base your festival aound that creature. We look back again to our neighbors in New Mexico; Carlsbad, of course, has an annual International Bat Festival in September, based on the flying mammals out of Carlsbad Caverns. The festival sponsors are trying to get one of the Batman film stars to help them promote the celebration.

Lovington, New Mexico puts on the World's Greatest Lizard Races every Fourth of July at the Chapparral Park Speedway, which is a minireptile racetrack. The largest entrant they've had so far was an eighteen inch iguana. I've heard that they have a hard time keeping the entrants from eating each other before the starting bell sounds.

Throughout the day, in about sixty heats, worms inch up the strings, crossing the finish line at great speed. You can enter your own worm, or buy one on site. The winner takes home \$500.

A well-known elderly fore-caster in town awards the prize and then announces the official forecast for winter, based on the particular coloration or stripes of the victorious caterpillar. We are told that the prediction rate from this event has been 90% accurate for the past twenty years.

Several cities around the country have a Frog Festival, starting with the Calaveras County Fair and Jumping Frog Jubilee in Angels Camp, California. Remember back in grade school when you read Mark Twain's 1865 short story "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County." The current record jump is 21 feet and 5.75 inches set in 1986 by Rosie the Ribiter from Santa Clara, (Continued on Page 5)



# Friona Fire Department Ranks Tops In State For Our Size Town

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department of 2001 has come a long way since the old horse trough and bucket-brigade days when the city of Friona was first established.

Later in the 1920s, anytime there was a fire, the three-man fire department would hook a hose trailer onto the nearest available car or pickup and pull it to the scene of the blaze, where the hose would be attached to the nearest fire plug. If your place was on fire and you didn't happen to be close to one of the town's four fire plugs, you were just out of luck.

The City of Friona currently supports the Volunteer Fire Department with \$2 million dollars worth of equpment. This includes six fire fighting trucks, two resuce units, a suburban, and other equipment such as generators, jaws of life, hoses, and protective gear for the

firemen.

The City places a sizeable sum in its budget every year to support the Fire Department. This is a bit unusual for most towns the size of Friona with a volunteer firefighting force. As a rule, the volunteer fire folks have to get out and raise the funds themselves through charity events and donations in order to keep it all going. That's asking an awfully lot of your civic volunteers.

The Friona Fire Department and Auxiliary members have for several decades participated in statewide competitions and are widley respected for their expertise in firefighting. The Department currently has a membership of 25 which is down just a bit from the usual 30-something, and they are currently recruiting new members.

The Fire Department is like a close-knit family. In fact, some of the current

members are second and third-generation Friona fire fighters. Anyone who would like to consider becoming a part of this well-trained force to protect our community, is invited to contact the Fire Chief Jim Taylor at City Hall, phone 250-2761. These people who protect our town, truly represent the fact that "Friona is the Hometown that Cares."







to 100 boats are entered in the 200-yard race each year, with each manned by a crew of one to eight people. Those who don't win are eligible for the Titanic Award which is reserved for the boat that sinks with the most dramatic

reserved for the boat that sinks with the most dramatic flair.

Probably the strangest of this type of observance, is the Emma Crawford Coffin Festival held each weekend in October in Manitou Springs, Colorado. According to local folklore, Emma Crawford was one of many who came to Manitou around the turn of the century seeking tuberculosis cures in the fresh mountain air and the town's mineral drinking springs. Well, she died anyway at age 29 and was buried on Red Mountain, overlooking the town. A number of years later, what was left of Emma's coffin, including its name plate and brass handles, washed down the mountain.

Now, every year on the Saturday before Halloween, coffins with "live" Emmas and runners race up Manitou Avenue in the shadow of Red Mountain. Each team builds their own coffin and mounts them on tires that must be less than six inches in diameter. One "Emma" rides in the coffin while four others push the craft up the street.

Prairie Du Sac, Wisconsin has their State Cow Chip Throw the last of August. The record toss is 248 feet.

Gibsland, Louisana brings back a gruesome piece of history every year in May with their Bonnie and Clyde Festival. It seems that the famous couple's life of crime ended on a road eight miles from Gibsland where they were ambushed by lawmen in 1934. The big festival event is topped off by a reenactment with guns a-blazing.

In March every year Montpelier, Vermont holds the International Rotten Sneaker Contest. Springfield, Missouri holds the annual Typewriter Toss each year on April 22, which happens to be National Secretaries Day.



Marlington, West Virginia has their Roadkill Cook-Off every September. I'm not

And Sault Saint Marie, Michigan celebrates the coming of spring every March with their Snowman Burning Festival where a ten foot tall snowman is set on fire. But I can't figure out how you can get a snowman to burn.

This last one wins the Momma Carol prize for being the strangest small town

festival in America. East Dublin, Georgia holds the Summer Redneck Games every year in July. A well-known local redneck lights the ceremonial barbecue grill with a propane torch and proclaims "Let the games begin."

The events include the cigarette flip, the mud-pit belly flop, bobbing for pig's feet, the big hair contest, the hubcap hurl, the seed-spitting contest, the bug-zapper

spitball, dumpster diving and the armpit serenade. People actually pump out entire songs using only an armpit. There is not an end to this, because I could just go on and on listing all the funny, strange, interesting and/or disgusting celebrations held in small towns all around this country every year. Some of these make our Maize Days Celebration seem rather mild by comparison, don't they? THE END

# **Catholics Celebrate** 75th Anniversary

The Roman Catholic Diocese of Amarillo celebrated its 75th Anniversary on August 25 at the Amarillo Civic Center Auditorium. People from all areas of the diocese, which covers the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle, joined guests traveling from across the nation in a Eucharistic celebration.

Archbishop Patrick Flores of San Antonio was the main celebrant, and Bishop Charles Grahmann of Dallas gave the Homily. Other guests joining Bishop John W. Yanta of Amarillo and Bishop Emeritus Leroy T. Matthiesen include twelve bishops and a long list of priests and nuns.

The Diocese of Amarillo was created in 1926 by Pope Pius XI. The area was formed from portions of the dioceses of Dallas, El Paso and San Antonio. Originally, the Diocese of Amarillo was comprised of seventy counties in approximately 73,000 square miles. In 1961, the Diocese of San Angelo was created, taking with it the southern 24 counties of the Amarillo Diocese. And in 1983, another twenty counties in the southern region became part of the Diocese of Lubbock, which was created by Pope John II. Within the 26-county Diocese of Amarillo, at the end of the year 2000, there were approximately 54,208 registered Catholics attending 35 parish churches and 13 mission churches.

FRIONA-Father Dunn, pioneer priest of Amarillo, figures in many of the parish histories in many of the parish histories in the Diocese of Amarillo. In 1908, when two Catholic families arrived in southeastern Parmer County, it was Father Dunn who visited them saying Mass in their homes and ministering about once a year.

When Father C.J. Beir was appointed assistant to Father Dunn, priests came to Parmer County more often. In 1910, Father Campbell was stationed in Umbarger and from there ministered to Catholics as far west as Farwell. Father Campbell traveled to the mission churches on his motorcycle.

In 1912, land and an old school building were donated in Bovina. The building was remodeled into the first Catholic Church in Parmer County. Mass was offered then about once a month in the church and in private homes. Catholics from Friona attended the church at Bovina.

In 1920, the first Franciscan Friars of the Atonement came to Hereford. Father Salvador de Giovanni, SA, was named pastor. Bovina and Friona became a mission of Hereford.

In 1948, Father Raymond Gillis, SA, assistant pastor of Hereford, began offering Mass in Friona in an empty building on Main Street, in

in Friona in an empty building on Main Street, in

private homes and in an army barracks in the southwest part of town. The early families attending Mass in Friona were a mixture of Anglo and Mexican.

In 1952, Father Declan F. Gilligan, SA, became an assistant in Hereford, and was named paster of St.

was named pastor of St. Ann's church in Bovina. St. Teresa of Jesus church in Friona became a mission of St. Ann's, Bovina. With the awarding of a grant from Extension Society, St. Teresa's Mission began plans to build a church in Friona. In 1961, Bishop John Morkovsky sold the land previously donated and purchased a plot of ten acres in the north part of town. Under the direction of Father Declan, a steel building was erected to serve as a church until a new church could be built, then to serve as hall or classrooms.

until a new church could be built, then to serve as hall or classrooms.

During the 1950s, Friona and St. Teresa's grew. To raise money to pay for the church, the parishioners made pledges and donations. A clipping from the West Texas Register in 1960 states: "As of January this year, there has been established at St. Teresa of Jesus Church, here, a society of men under the title, 'Sociedad de Sagrado Corazon.' The purpose is to try to raise money for the upkeep and improvement of the church."

Fundraising activities were baseball games, Jamaicas and helping the women of the mission with their projects. The ladies of Friona and Bovina raised money serving Mexican dinners, running queen contests and other activities with the money split between the two communities. These two communities began the traditions of serving Mexican dinners, Turkey dinners and German Sausage dinners, which were a great support to the communities.

In 1969, the St. Teresa's Ladies Society was formed with 32 charter members. In 1970, St. Teresa's completed



council and St. Teresa's was on its way.

Sunday School and sacramental preparation classes were taught by Franciscan Sisters of Mary Immaculate from St. Anthony's in Hereford, assisted by parishioners. Often the two churches held Confirmation preparation classes together and celebrated the sacrament as one large community.

In August of 1972, under the pastoral leadership of Father John Coppinger, Confraternity of Christian Doctrine classes were formed and a Catholic Youth Organization was started. During this time, St. Teresa's Mission thrived with activities such as serving German Sausage and Mexican dinners, organizations of the Guadalupana Society, Knights of Columbus, World Day of Prayer, Right to Life Program, supporting Catholic Family Charities.

In 1976, Father Dermot O'Brien became pastor of Bovina and Friona. He served the communities until his untimely death in February of 1979. During the pastorate of Father O'Brien, Deacon Zeferino Villarreal was ordained to the Permanent Diaconate. Deacon Zeferino, the only Deacon to ever minister in these communities, served both the communities of St. Ann's and St. Teresa's. Deacon Zeferino also died after a long illness in 1999.

St. Teresa's Mission had long dreamed of building a new church. This dream began to be realized in April 1978 with a ground breaking ceremony presided over by Bishop Lawrence M. DeFalco. The church was completed and dedicated by Bishop DeFalco on April 22, 1979.

St. Teresa's Mission flourished under the leadership of many pastors from the Franciscan Graymoor Friars. In 1988, the Friars officially left their ministry in the Diocese. Father Timothy Dran, SA, requested that he be given permission to remain here as pastor of Bovina and Friona. Father Tim remained until his death in 1993. The death of the beloved Father Tim was a severe blow to the communities of St. Ann's and St. Teresa's. He still is remembered most fondly in this community.

membered most fondly in this community.

Father Edward Kieran came to St. Ann's/St. Teresa's in 1993 and served as Pastoral Minister from that time until September of 1994. In September 1994, Bishop Leroy T. Matthiesen appointed Father Ed Sweeney as pastor of St. Ann, Bovina and St. Teresa, Friona. Father Kieran remained as Pastoral Minister in St. Ann and Father Sweeney established a priest's residence in Friona.

This was the first time St. Teresa's in Friona had a resident priest. To provide living quarters for the priest and to have space for a church office, a new rectory building was donated in 1995. This marked a definite growth for St. Teresa's and culminated in St. Teresa's being elevated to the status of parish in July of 1996 with Father Sweeney as pastor.


Through all of these years, St. Teresa's has continued a steady growth in numbers and in spirit. In a history of the parish written in 1982, the author's ending statement was: "We are happy with the progress of our parish-especially with the recent black topping of our parish-especially with the recent black topping of our parish community. We relish the spirit of cooperation and love that makes our parish a gem of greatest brightness. We pray God's continued blessings on us as we continue to travel the continued blessings on us as we continue to travel the road to the New Jerusalem. The road to salvation.



#### riona's First Church-ounty's First Museum

The City of Friona was founded in 1906 by the George G. Wright Land Company of Kansas City, an agency employed by the XIT Ranch owners to sell their range lands in small

the George G. Wright Land Company of Kansas City, an agency employed by the XIT Ranch owners to sell their range lands in small tracts.

In 1908, settlers organized the Union Congregational Church with 20 charter members. The Wright Company donated six lots at what is now the corner of Cleveland and Sixth Streets, and the Congregational Church Building Society of New York made a \$770 (about \$15,000 in today's dollars) so that materials could be purchased. Volunteer labor was used to construct the building.

Friona's first church building was completed and dedicated May 23, 1909. The basement was added in 1916, and served as a center for social activities. In addition, the basement also served as the first town meeting hall, since no public buildings existed at the time.

The original building was a wood-framed structure, and sadly was struck by lightning on August 21, 1921, and burned to the ground.

The City of Friona had no fire-fighting equipment in the early days of its existence. By the end of the next day, over a thousand dollars had been pledged for a new building.

The "new"building was again built with volunteer labor, but this time, adobe was used for the walls. The inside was attractively finished and the outside walls were covered with stucco and painted white.

This building was used until 1969, when the Congregationalists built a new sanctuary. In 1973, the "first" church building was given to the Girl Scouts for their meeting hall and activities. The basement of the building had been home to the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, VFW, and other organizations for years, and the church members wanted the building to continue to serve the public.

The Girl Scouts saw to it that a Texas Historical Marker was placed in front of the building. The scouts had the foresight to have the "site" listed as historic and not the building to

building, and gave the building back to the Congregational Church in the late 1970s. Over the next 12 to 15 years the building was sold from one business man to another, finding use mainly as storage and warehouse space.

Very few improvements were made to the

Very few improvements were made to the interior or exterior over this time period, thus the structure deteriorated to its current state.

In 1992, a business man planned to buy the building and turn it into low income apartments. The building had been sold at a Sheriff's sale for back taxes and was now property of the Friona Independent School District.

property of the Friona Independent School District.

Several civic groups and members of the community, including the Girl Scouts were appalled at the idea of Friona's "first" church building located on a recognized historical landmark being turned into low income apartments.

The Girl Scouts made a bid on the property in the amount of \$2000. The Friona School District, the City of Friona, and Parmer County all agreed to reject the bid, and instead to let the Girl Scouts have the building for the sum of \$486.89 in court costs. The goal was to establish a Pioneer Heritage Chapel and Museum.

The Caprock Girl Scout Council of Lubbock, which governs the local Friona Girl Scout chapter, did not approve of the local chapter owning the property and encouraged them to sell the building.

In 1995, the local Girl Scout chapter held a public meeting to organize an entity to restore the property and create a museum.

From this initial public meeting, a group of citizens interested in preserving the structure and creating a county museum have formed the Friona Pioneer Heritage Society, Inc., a non-profit corporation dedicated to this purpose.

proceed without any intervention from the Texas Historical Commission.

Unfortunately, the scouts could not financially afford the maintenance on the building, and gave the building back to the Congregational Church in the late 1970s. Over individual donations and community involved find-raisers.

building, 100 percent of this has been from individual donations and community involved fund-raisers.

This shows the extent to which the community is behind this project even through these "lean years" suffered in Friona's agricultural based economy.

Now the time has come for the major portion of the renovation.

Until the building is completely renovated, with accessibility for the handicapped, Parmer County will not have a museum to showcase its past, and our children will not have a place to learn of their history and of the struggles and hardships endured by the pioneers of this area.

The current building and site of Friona's "first" church already contains over 90 years of memories. Weddings, funerals, church services, town meetings, and various other memories are all tied to the historic location.

The building is not only the "first" church of Friona, it is also the "first" town hall, the "first" town hall, the "first" Girl Scout house, the first of many things in the Friona area.

Unfortunately, it is also one of the "last" historic buildings left. Years of neglect have taken their toll on the structurally sound building.

Since 1995, members of the Friona Pioneer

taken their toll on the structurally sound building.

Since 1995, members of the Friona Pioneer Heritage Society, Inc., have been working to provide the citizens of Friona and Parmer County with a museum. By renovating Friona's "first" church, the history of our area can be preserved and housed within Friona's historic landmark.

historic landmark.

Once completed, the Pioneer Heritage Museum will house artifacts (both permanent and temporary), thus providing an educational and informational resource for people of all ages. By restoring the chapel area of the building, the museum will also be used for social functions for the community.

The total cost for this project is \$70,750.13 of this amount, \$19,878.50 has been raised through fund raisers and donations, \$17,905.13 has been expended thus far for renovations, and \$52,845.00 is being requested to finish this worth while project.






