REPORTED ITALIAN GOVERN-MENT HAS COMPLETE UN-DERSTANDING

Country Not Disposed to Ac cept Terms But French Influence Prevailed

it affects Italy has been obtained ingovernment has reached an understanding with Great Britain and France concerning the terms on which Italy enters the war, if she eventually decides to do so. The agreement is described as follows:

First-A provision for concerted military action. Italy will re-frain from hostilties during the present stage of desulfory trench warfare which would enable Gerl many and Austria to concentrate a large part of their forces against her. She will time her blow simultaneously with a general effort by all the opponents of the Central empires now in the field.

Second-An understanding concerning the territory to be awarded Italy in the event of Italy entering the war and the success of the allies.

Third-A provision that after the war an alliance shall be formed between Italy and the present Triple Entente of Great Britain, France and Russia.

It is intimated that at the outset Great Britain was not disposed to make terms with Italy but that Italy formally declined to consider joining co-operation, boundary readjustment after the war and permanent assistance from the allies.

"In Belgium we have continued to progress in conjunction with Belgian troops in a northerly direction. On the right bank of the Yser near Ypres we took 150 prisoners and a number of guns.

London, April 29.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer, David Lloyd George today made known in the House of

Commons his plan to deal with the problems of the two great consump-tion of alcoholic liquors. He proposes a very heavy sur tax on both spirits and beers containing more than 7 per cent of proof spirits and that the duty on spirits imports be doubled. The Chancellor in his opening sentence indicated that difficulties had been met with as he said "After weeks of trying to find a solution of the question I am prepared

He said: "The proclamation for the special session submits for your consideration the question of change and modification of our insurance laws in respect to the investment of reserves as well as the assessment, levy and collection of a tax on the premium receipts from the policy holders. Your knowledge of this question calls to your mind at once that this is a question largely, of not whether the Robert son law shall be abolished, but wheth er it should be modified along the lines proposed in what is known as the Gibson bill. In my opinion re-cent developments have shown conclusively that we must cultivate ev ery connection and source which might bring more capital into

"It will be urged that the insurance companies will take out as much mass of the people. If the people in the cities and towns want to buy insurance then let them do so, but let the money be loaned to the people in the country at a reasonable rate to pay for homes and develop




