The Friona schools opened Monday morning under conditions most Rev. O. B. Annis, scout master, auspicious for a very successful spent three days of last week term, so far as equipment, teachers and enrollment are concerned.

As to attendance, there were 198 opening day, and 352 in the grade school, making a total of 550 students, or an increase of 50 over last year's total enrollment.

The faculty for this term has been decreased by two teachers, with an increase of ten per cent in the student body, thus making much heavier work for the teachers, resulting in that fact that no teacher, not even the superintendent, will have a single idle period during the entire day.

As a result of the above mentioned condition, some of the instructors have almost double the number of pupils under their charge than they are supposed to have.

Five new teachers have been secured in place of some of those who were here last year, and have secured positions elsewhere. Three of these five new teachers are located in the grade department of the school and are Glenn F. Davis, O. M. Stewart and Miss Louise Jacobsen.

New teachers will have charge of the music in the school for the term, but judging from the ability displayed by these teachers during the chapel exercise Thursday morning, the music department has lost nothing by the change, and with all due praise for the teachers who had charge of the department.

The Star hopes to be able to give a complete outline of the school work as planned by the superintendent and his force of splendid teachers.

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

Tri-State Fair Dates Set September 19-24

Fair at Amarillo, September 19 to 24, a group of Amarillo business men visited here Tuesday morn-ing in a sound-equipped courtesy cap of the Cunningham Floral Co. During their brief stay here the visitors contacted local school and chamber of commerce officials relative to this city organizing a delegation to attend the big exposi-

Mason King, head of the Amarillo chamber of commerce trade extension department and a member of the Tri-State Fair publicity committee, declared that if Friona sends a delegation to the fair its members will be given an opportunity to broadcast over an Amarillo broadcasting station. He especially urged all musicians and singers to attend the territorial attraction and display their talents over the radio.

With a gigantic galaxy of at tractions exceeding those of all previous years, the 1932 fair promises to draw more visitors than From morning until late at night there will be some.

Among the attractions to be assembled for the entertainment of thousands are a rodeo, the Wortham shows, largest carnival combinations in the country, night automobile races, a World War pageant, a theatrical show and a big time college football game.

Cash awards totaling \$3300 will be given to contestants in the world's championship rodeo. Not less than 30 racing cars are expected to be entered in the automobile speed classic.
