SERIOUS SITUATION SEEMS PROBABLE

HAIL HERE AND AT HOLLIDAY, ALLENDALE AND PROBABLY AT OTHER POINTS

Likely That Little Wichita Will Go Still Higher and Cause Con-siderable Damage

Probably four inches of rain had fallen up to 3:30 this afternoon. one o'clock the government guage registered 2.95 inches and since that hour there have been two heavy show ers which have probably increased the total precipitation to four inches; all of this fell within a period of slightly over five hours.

The lake was rising slightly at three o'clock this afternoon. The rain was very heavy in that section of Archer county which was drained by the lake.

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All except one of the fourteen head of cattle drowned in the lake late Sunday have been recovered.

With one and a quarter inches-of rain up to noon and with probably as much more since noon, Wichita Falls was thoroughly drenched today, while a heavy fall of hail has probably caused serious damage to wheat and other crops. Several streets were flooded, while the situation on the Little and Big Wichita rivers and Holliday creek will probably be aggravated when the waters from Archer county come down.

Tenth street at the corner of Scott was six inches deep in water at 1:30 today while sidewalks were overflowed on Scott avenue below Tenth for some distance and much water was standing on the streets in that section. The lake east of the city was over Seventh street to a depth of sev-

The fain was heavy in Archer coun ty and may cause a serious situation. The Little Wichita had fallen slightly at Henrietta this morning after the top of the Denver and Katy tres tles and another rise would probably prove disastrous. Holliday creek and Lake Wichita had also fallen considal rain will probably cause additional overflows with possibly greater damage than before. Lake Wichita is already more than two feet over the spillway.

This morning's rain registered over an inch within 20 minutes and was probably more than equaled by that of this afternoon. The rain extended over Wichita, Archer and Wilbarger counties, but did not go very far to the eastward, none being reported at Jolly or Henrietta up to noon today There were three heavy falls of hail in the city. Hail also fell at Allen-dale and Holliday heavier than in this city, and some hail was reported from Iowa Park. Thornberry reported that no hall fell there. This hall, coupled with the inopportune rainfall, has probably resulted in serious damage to wheat and the weather of the past few days has done much to reduce the prospects in this section.

SIX ROOMING HOUSE

Complaints Filed By Sheriff Hawkins Charge Running Disorderly Houses

Proprietors of six rooming house were taken into custody today by Sheriff George Hawkins on charges of running disorderly houses. This the first big raid that has been made, although several arrests had been announced previously. The sheriff is undertaking to clean up the rooming houses, following reports of improper happenings and he has been collecting evidence for several days

Nearly all of those arrested run rooming houses in the business sec-tion or close to it. A number of arrests were made over a year ago when it was found that the rooming houses were being put to improper uses and since that time most of the houses have been run in an orderly manner, but lately complaints have been made that some were returning to former practices.

COWBOY DROWNED

D. BURKETT LOST LIFE AT WIL SON'S RANCH ATTEMPTING

TO CROSS STREAM

Burkett Compelled to Quit Mount and Later Animal Bore Him Down In Current

J. D. Burkett, a cowboy employed at Luke Wilson's county, was drowned yesterday after noon while trying to swim his horse across the Little Wichita River from one pasture to another of the ranch The Little Wichita is swollen by the recent rains to a wide river with a swift deep current. Burkett and three other cowboys attempted to cross the river together. Burkett who was an expert horseman was riding a wild horse. The horse when it reached deep water began to lunge and finally Burkett was compelled to quit the animal and encumbered by boots and spurs, swim for his life. He cried for help and another cow boy swam his horse to him and had taken hold of him to pull him up when Burkett's own horse turned and wam to the other horse swimming over Burkett, drowning him in spite of the efforts to rescue him.

Burkett's body was under the water more than two hours before it was recovered. Undertaker Hill was teleshoned to and met the cowboys who brought the body to the Lake Wichita spillway where they arrived o'clock, four hours after the frowning. It was then too late to hope to use the pulmotor with cess. The body was embalmed and shipped to Fort Worth this morning where Burkett's parents live ...

The peace advocates expected that if Italy decided to remain neutral the allies would regard the prolongation of the contest futile; that if Italy joined the allies Germany would throw ip the sponge. Now that Italy has cast its lot with the allies Germany eems as lar as ever from conceding

ventual defeat. "The action of Italy will only proong the war and postpone German victory," said one of the most prominent officials of the German embassy oday. "Germany is fighting a war of defense and will be successful in keep-PROPRIETORS ARRESTED defense and wiff be successful in keeping her territory free of invaders, no matter how many enemies combine igainst it.

MONUMENT MARKS BRADDOCK'S START

TONE UNVEILED AT ALEXAN DRIA, VA., COMMEMORATING

Colonial Dames and D. A. R. Take Part In Unveiling Ceremonies Today

Alexandria, Va., May 26.—Marking the point from which Major General Braddock and his force of British regulars and Virginia trops, with Colonel George Washington as aide-de-camp, departed from here in April 1755, on the disastrous expedition to take Fort Duquesne, the present site of Pittsburg, Pa., in the war against the French and Indians, an interesting monument was unveiled here today by the Society of the Colonial Dames of Virginia.

Many members of the Society of Coonial Dames, the Daughters of the American Revolution and other patrifrom various parts of Virginia, the District of Columbia Maryland and Pennsylvania witnessed the presentation of the monument to officials of the city of Alexandria. Many of those present will take part tomorrow in the unveiling of a similar monument at Winchester, Virginia.

One of the old British cannon abanloned here by General Braddock surnounts the monument. For 'many years the cannon had stood upright n the earth at one of the city's street corners as a marker and was an object of interest to sightseers. By an act of the city council several years ago the ancient piece of ordnance, brought from England by General Braddock when he came out to Virginia as generalissimo ef all the British forces in the American colonie in the war against the French, was turned over the Mount Vernon Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. That organization today formally presented it to the Virginia Colonial Dames under whose auspices the monument was erected.

Forming the base of the monument and mounting the old cannon are other relics of by-gone days in the shape cobblesones which for more than a century had had served the city of Alexandría as paving in some of its principal streets and which show the ruts worn by the artillery and transport of the Northern Armies during the Civil War. The stones are said by tradition to have ben laid on Alexa dria's streets by Hessian soldiers captured in the War of the Revolution by the Continental troops

ronze tablet on one ste base of the monument bears this inscription:

"This monument marks the Trail taken by the Army of General Braddock, which left in April, 1755, to defend the Western Frontier against the French and Indians. Erected by the Society of the Colonial Dames of Virginia, May 26, 1915.

On the opposite side of the boulder-embedded base this inscription ap-pears on another tablet of bronze: "The Cannon used here was abandoned by General Barddock at old Alexandria, April, 1755. The Cobble stones composing the mount were tak-en from the streets of Alexandria where they were placed in 1785 by act of the Virginia House of Burgesses.' "After taking Fort Duquesne," the General is quoted as saying, "I am to proceed to Niagara; and, having taken that, to Frontenac if the season will allow time, and I suppose it will, for Duquesne can hardly detain me above three or four days; and then I can see nothing to obstruct my march to Niagara."

OFF COAST OF IRELAND TUESEAY

DUTCH LINER RYNDAM'S "S. O. S. CALLS ANSWERED BY AM-ERICAN WARSHIPS

Collides With Tramp Steamer Near Nantucket Shoals Lightship-Passengers Taken Off

New York, May 26.—The Dutch liner Ryndam, which sailed from this port yesterday for notterdam with 77 passengers and a million dollar cargo was badly damaged in a col lision fifteen miles southwest of Nantucket Shoals lightship at four clock this morning with the tramp freighter, Joseph Cuneo, which sailed from Boston last night for Cuba Both vessels were seriously injured The Ryndam wireless report indi-

cated it was struck with such force that hold No. 5 filled almost immed iately. Water flowed freely into the engine room and began to creep up in hold No. 6. The Cuneo's bow were caved in. S. O. S. signals were flashed from the Ryndam's wirless immediately after the collision. The passengers were transferred to Cuneo. One hundred and sixty of the Ryndam's crew if 200 likewise were put abfard the freighter leaving only 40 men aboard to run the ship. United States battleships in

vicinity answered wireless calls. o'clock three hours after the collision, the battleship South Carolina was standing alongside the Cuned The Ryndam's passengers were taken off tre freighter and taken on boar the South Carolina. The battleship was directed by Wireless from the Newport navy yard to convey the pas sengers to this port.
With the South Carolina alongside

the battleship Texas 10 miles away ouisiana alongside the Cuneo, the Ryndam was steaming at slow speed for this port at a point 124 miles east of the Ambrose channel lightship at 10 o'clock this morn-ing. At that hour her captain sent wireless messages to the Holland-American Steamship Company, owners of the steamer saying that Ryndam's engines were much strained but still were holding out. messages from Captain Van Der Huegel asserted that the water was gain-ing in No. 6 hold and that the ship would be lost if the water gained much more. She is expected to reach New York late tonight or early to morrow. So far as the line officials knew there were only six Americans among the passengers. The other passengers, it was said, were Europeans returning to their homes. The Ryndam is a vessel of 7,976 tons register; was suilt in Belfast in 1901. She was 550 feet long. DAMAGE TO THE STEAMER NOT SERIOUS HOWEVER

Nebraskan Sailing In Ballast |To Norfolk Under Contract With U. S. Navy Is Attacked

London, May 26.—The American steamer, Nebraskan, Captain Green, from Liverpool, May 24, for Delaware breakwater was torpedoed yesterday by a submarine at a point 40 miles west of southwest of Fastnet, off the south coast of Ireland. The sea was calm at the time. The crew at once took to their boats and stood by the steamer. It soon was ascertained that the Nebraskan was not seriously damaged. She has been struck forward and her foreholds were full of water. The crew returned on board and got the vessel under way. No lives were lost among the crew. The Nebraskan did not carry any passengers.

The foregoing information was received today by the British admiralty in London, and it was at once communicated to the American embassy.

Immediately that she was struck the Nebraskan began calling by wireless for help. Browhead received the wireless communication at 9 a. m. yesterday from Cookshaven.

The Nebraskan is owned by the American-Norwegian Steamship Co. of New York and is of 2824 tons net register. On her last eastward trip she left for New York May 7 for Liverpool.

IN SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS Austin, May 26.—According to an examination today of the figures of the department of education, bonds have been issued during the last two fiscal years, beginning September 1, 1912 and ending September 1, 1914 for the construction of school houses in Texas that total \$3,741,646. Of this amount, independent school districts voted \$2,277,961. This, according to the department's figures, makes an average of \$1,870,823 per year, or \$5196 per day invested in permanent school improvements in the years indicated. State Superintendent W. F. Doughty has expressed himself highy pleased with the total and in com-mon with other educators in Texas, believes the result of these investments soon will begin to show in an educational way.



MINERAL-WELLS YOUTH ROBBED HOUSES HERE

With the arrest at Mineral Wells of a sixteen year old boy, the sheriff's department believes several of the recent burglaries have been cleared up. Part of the ciothing missing from the Taylor and Oakley homes in Floral Heights and a small portion of the jewary at en from the Garner home have been recovered. The youth will be tried in Palo Pinto county in the juvenile court and if sent to the reformatory from that county will not se brought back here. Several days ago the Mineral Wells officers wrote here that this same boy, after returning from Wichita Falls, had a quantity of fishing tackle which he claimed to nave bought here. No one here had reported the loss of any such articles; later some of the other property stolen here was recovered and the boy's arrest follow cd. The most valuable pieces of the Garner jewelry were not recovered,

having been disposed of. This arrest clears up practically all of the recent burglaries save that of the Floral Heights grocery, which lost about \$40 worth of groceries.

NEWS FROM GERMANY COMES THROUGH LONDON

Static Conditions Interfere With Wireless and No Direct Communication With Germany

New York, May 26.-Wireless com-munication between the United States and Germany has been severely handicapped and probably will continue so until about July 1 by static conditions prevailing in the North Atlantic at this time of the year.

The wireless station at Sayville, L , the receiving station of the Atantic Communication Company, the German wireless concern, has within the last week or two been isolated requently from the sending plant at Nauen, Germany, it was learned to-lay and the same situation exists at Tuckerton, N. J., the sending station for messages to Germany. Such messages as are received at Sayville are for the most part fragmentary, or ofen impossible to decipher.
The electrical activities of the Au

rora Borealis, accompanied by elec-irical storms over the wireless routes are the cause of the difficulty, it is explained, and may be expected to continue several weeks. This means that until normal conditions prevail, incensored communication between Germany and the obtside world will

be limited.
With the enging off of the Germanowned Atlantic cable a; the beginning of the war, Germany had to fall back spon ner wireless plants to transmit news and official or diplomatic mesable or telegraph to all parts of the world. In this way Germany has tept in touch with her diplomati epresentatives in neutral countries, and the German war office statements have been distributed uncensored.

The intensity of the static disturbinces now occurring frequently inrease the wireless distance between sayville and Nauen by the equivalent of 2,000 miles, it is said, a handicap which the Nauen station, powerful as it is, cannot overcome. Messages which are made intelligible are the oint work of four receiving operaors, each getting what he ean, and dacing the fragments together.
