

Farmers, City Folks

It may have been too late for some crops, but a good percentage of the area's for some crops, but a good percentage of the area's farmers got some good, soaking rain last weekend, from three-quarters of an inch to approaching three inches, just depending upon "which cloud you were under."

Regardless of the timing, it appears that the rain should be a blessing to most of the cotton farmers, and still be in time to help the maize for the most part.

most part.

"In our business, we like to say 'Rain makes gain,' " said Randy Thomas, manager of the Attebury Grain outlet at Black. That area, to the east and southeast of Friona was where the most rainfall was received.

"The rain really boosted everyone's spirits. We have heard reports of 1.8 to 2.5 inches from our area. This rain was more general than what we've seen this summer, stretching from Clovis to Canyon, and south toward Lubbock," Thomas said.

The elevator spokesman said the rain should help yields and tonage of the maize, as well as haygrazer and sorghum ensilage. The good rain was too late to do much for the corn crop. Harvest of corn ensilage was underway, and interrupted by the showers.

The city of Friona measured 2.1 inches for the week, and folks with lawns and/or gardens were also grateful for the help. July and August have been so dry, that sprinklers have hed to run on a steady basis to keep up with the need for moisture.

City Manager Paula Wilson said that the peak usage this summer has been just over two million gallons per day, back in July. As an example of how the rainfall helped city residents, the usage was 1.7 million gallons last Thursday, August 9. On Wednesday of this week (August 15), it had dropped down to 855,000 gallons.

Parker has application forms to be used by eligible WWII veterans to apply for a diploma, as authorized by the Texas Education Department.

The completed form, along with a copy of the veteran's discharge notification form, must be submitted to the school district where the veteran was enrolled.

Under the TEC code, an eligible veteran for the program is one who:

*Is an honorably discharged member of the

*Is an honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States; *was scheduled to States;

graduation to serve in World War II.

Applications may be requested at the Friona ISD Administration office, located at 909 East 11th Street (Highway 60). The application form is also available on-line at http://www.tea.state.tx.us.

The implementation of this program to award high school diplomas to eligible World War II veterans acknowledges the service of those who left high school before graduation to serve in World War II.

The application form was designed to be user-friendly and thereby support the efforts of eligible veterans to receive a high school diploma.

Russel O'Brian Is **Buried Here Tues.**

O'Brian died Sunday, August 12, at Parmer County Community Hospital, following a lengthy illness.

O'Brian was born June 29, 1910. He married Nora Hogue September 21, 1940, in Clovis, N.M. Nora was the daughter of the C.A. Hogues.

O'Brian moved to Parmer County with his parents, the T.A. O'Brians, in August of 1928. The O'Brians had originated in Kansas, and moved to Medford, Oklahoma where they lived for a time prior to moving to the Friona area.

"It was a good life, but one

"It was a good life, but one of hardships and struggles. Many people came, but few stayed. Only the rugged individuals could stay here during the Dirty 30s," O'Brian's wife wrote for the Parmer County History Book. Many times after one of those big sandstorms, you had to use a shovel to get the dirt out of your house, and cleaning up would take a while, the article stated.

O'Brian was a farmer in the Lakeview community southeast of Friona for most

of his adult life. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Friona. He was preceded in death by his wife Nora August 13, 1984.

Survivors include two daughters, Karen Carter of Dimmitt, Linda Chesher of Friona, a sister, Julia Fairchild of Friona, and a brother, Tom O'Brian of Dimmitt.

Eight grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren also survive.

Pallbearers were Dexter Allen, Donnie Adams, Craig Shields, Kennen Howell, Rusty Carter and Dee Willard.





Evidence of the advanced condition of the 2001 Texas High Plains cotton crop is plain to see as irrigated and dryland fields have rapidly achieved physiological cut-out in many areas.

With plants putting on their last blooms, the crop is expected to mature at a fairly rapid pace unless rainfall returns to the area.

On irrigated cotton rains would probably be more beneficial than harmful as the plant would be more likely to take its full boll load to the take its full boll load to the take its full boll load to however, rains at this stage would most likely only produce regrowth and a fresh crop of squares and blooms that would not produce harvestable bolls.

Those squares and blooms could prove costly though, by sustaining boll weevil populations with a fresh food source as they prepare to enter diapause.

Overall prospects for the area continue to look reasonably poor with dryland cotton not expected to contribute many bales and the irrigated crop only expected to average a bale per acre across the entire region.

Some excellent irrigated cotton is expected to be harvested, but the rest is average or below average in nature.



PET TALK

If Ol' Blue seems to have lost some zip, maybe he needs a pep pill. Pets can require vitamin supple

ments just like their owners, but some extra care might be needed before you start dishing out a lot of pills, says Dr. John Bauer, a veterinary nutritionist in the Small Animal Clinic at Texas A&M University.

The size of the animal, its age, its lifestyle and other factors may play a

big role in determining if your pet needs some vitamins.

"In general terms, if the food you give your pet has a label that says' complete and balanced nutrition,' the pet is probably okay as far as get-ting the proper amount of vitamins," believes Bauer.

"Under most circumstances, there may not be a need to give them extra

may not be a need to give them extra vitamins. But there are exceptions to the rule."

One might be stress.

If a pet is also used as a working animal, such as a guide dog, or service or guard dog, and the animal uses up a lot of energy performing these tasks, extra vitamins could well

these tasks, extra vitamins could well be necessary, Bauer says.

Also, many pet owners prefer to feed their animals home-prepared meals that are similar to food found on any kitchen table. "Under conditions such as these, the owner might not be sure the pet is getting the right amount of vitamins, and he or she may feel the need to give the pet a vitamin feel the need to give the pet a vitamin supplement," adds Bauer. "And they may be correct – the pet may not be

getting all the vitamins it needs."

Vitamins come in liquid drops
that are added to food or chewable vitamins that are placed in the animal's mouth. Drops may be the preferred form, Bauer notes.
"Some animals just don't like

chewable vitamins, for one reason or another," he explains. "Also, many chewable vitamins contain filler material, and these can cause allergic reactions or even gastrointestinal problems.






Back-To-School Eye Examinations
