WORD FROM RUSSIA IS BEING AWAITED

IF CZAR SATISFIES ROUMANIA TWO BALKAN NATIONS WILL JOIN ALLIES

Roumania Will Move Against Austria and Bulgaria Will Attack Her Ancient Enemy

By Associated Press. Paris, June 2.—Bulgaria and Rum ania have arrived at a concrete understanding according to a Bucharest dispatch to the Petit Parisien. Rumania having agreed to cede territory to Bulgaria in Dobrudsha, the two countries will enter the war simultaneously, Rumania against Austria and Bulgaria against Turkey. The army staffs of the two powers are said to be busy co-ordinating military plans. Negotiations between Russia and Rum ania over the lines of the Pruth and Banath are said to be virtually complete. As soon as these negotiations are finally completed the latter country is declared to be ready to begin hostilities without delay.

Dobrudsha is a part of Rumania bounded on the east by the Black Sea and on the north and west by the Danube River. As a consequence of the second Balkan war between Bulgaria and Serbia and Greece, Rumania took from Bulgaria a large slice of territory and added it to Dobrudsha province on the south. Much bitter feeling existed in Bulgaria for some time against Rumania on this account, but more recently a change in the relations between these Balkan States was observed. Last December the Bulgarian minister to Petrograd announced that Rumania had arranged to restore to Bulgaria that portion rudsha which had been annex ed by the former country after the second Palkan war.

The Pruth River forms the bound ary line between the Russian terri-tory of Bessarabia and Moldavia, the latter a part of Rumania. Banat is a region in southern flungary bordering on the east of Rumania and on the most fertile districts in Europe. The chief town is Temesvar.

Six persons were killed and four teen others were injured, one of them Mrs. R. E. Hamilton, it was thought could not survive. Most of the dead and injured were members of the Mozart Club of Dallas who had been giving a concert at the Buckner's orphans Home. They were returning o Dallas in an automobile-truck. The Dallas Dispatch-had the following ac count of the accident:

Laughter and the happy shouts of children sounded when the big picnic truck of the Mozart Chorat Club crossed White Rock creek, three miles east of Dallas about 10:30 last night The truck swung out to let an au-

And the truck crunched to the botom of the creek, 10 feet below, turning completely over and grinding the bodies of its passengers into the slimy mud.

Six were killed, two were serious injured, three suffered broken ones and nine were slightly hurt, Three of the dead are children.

GASSES TURN LUNG

ENGLISH ARMY OFFICER DE-SCRIBES HORRORS RESULT: ING FOM USE GASES

Takes Two Days For Men Who In Gases to Die-Nothing

New York .- A letter from Major General Edward Stuart Wortley, com mander of a British army corps in France, is made public here by his brother. Ralph Stuart Wortley of New York, giving this distinguished officer's tribute to the behavior of a Canadian division in France and de-scribing the horrors which resulted

from the use of asphyxiating gases by the Germans.

The effect of these gases upon the men who inhale them, he says, has been to turn all the tissues of the ungs into liquid, and during the two days that it takes for the men to die the victims are "the most hopeless, helpless, sickening sight imaginable." How Gas Is Used.

The letter follows: You will of course have read of he fighting that has been going on round Ypres just lately, and of magnificent behavior of the Canadian division. In their attack on pres salient the Germans made use of asphyxiating gases, This gas is disseminated both in shells and ombs and also from cylinders, which are buried in the trenches with their nozzles pushed through the parapets. The taps of the cylinders are then turned on and the gas which is, as far as we know chlorine, is pumped out. The gas, which is some neavier than air and which is blown by the wind across our lines, sinks in to our trenches and kills or incapacitates any men who happen to be in them. The effect of the gas can also be felt as far back as five or six miles and produces headache and a smarting of the eyes.

"The German papers as well as falsely-accusing us of making use of poisonous fumes, apparently defend their conduct by stating that the dissemination of this gas results in a swift and painless death for those with whom it comes in contact and consequently is less barbarous than subjecting men to an inferno of shell fire from which great physical and mental torture must necessarily be endured.

"I am sure the public carnot have as yet the slightest idea of this last damnable effort on the part of the Germans to disregard all laws of hunanity and civilization

"I have seen our men in hospital after having been brought back from the trenches. There is an need to ask for the ward in which they are, as their groaning is quite sufficient a direction of itself. there are eighteen cases. They are all sitting bolt upright, or swaying back and forwards, gasping for breath their faces, hands and necks a shiny grey-black color, their eyes glazed and nable absolutely to speak or feed. "It takes two days for these men

to die. During these two days they are in the most acute agony, and fi by the slightest chance they recover from the poison they will in all prob-ability be renered useless for life, as the effect of the gas is to turn all the tissues of the lung into liquid. The doctors and nurses are working day and night in the attempt to give some relief. But there is nothing to e done. It is the most helpless, sickening sight imagirnable. Our medical officer who has had a very large experience of the habits of African and Asiatic natives tells us that in all his life he has never

had to deal with such an example of cientific torture. "At first I was inclined to disbe lieve the accounts of the ill-treatment of our prisoners at the hands of the enemy and to put them down to the inevitable exagserations of warfare, but now that I have come face to face with German methods in the gradual but permanent change."

General Stuart Wortley was former on terms of considerable intimacy with Emperor William of Germany A few summers ago when the Emperor was ordered by his physicians to spend some weeks at the English seashore, the general placed his country seat on rthe Hampshie coast, at the Emperor's disposal.

THE FOUR GILDED HORSES

REMOVED FROM VENICE Rome, June 2.—The famous gild ed horses which have adorned for a century the principal portal of the Cathedral of St. Marks at Venice have been removed from that city to place of safety because of fear that they might be damaged by hostile aviators of warsnips. The four horses of St. Mark of bronze and five feet high, are among the finest of ancient hronzes. They probably once adorn-ed the triumphal arch of Nero and afterward that of Trajan. Coustantine sent them to adorn the imperial hippodrome at Constantinople. The Doge Enrico Gandola took them to Venice in 1204 as the spoil of war. In 1797 Napoleon carried them to Paris but 1815 they were returned afer the downfall of Napoleon.

Scores of harvest hands, most o them bound for Western Oklahoma are making Wichita Falls their rendezvous at present and while many are moving on to Oklahoma their places are promptly taken here by new arrivals. This morning before the Northwestern train went out at 6:45 there were probably 200 men gathered on lower Eighth street wait-

Ing to go out.

This city was named as a concentration point for this labor, by the Oklahoma labor commissioner, and it is expected that thousands of harvest hands will gather here during the wheat cutting season. From their ranks will be recruited the forces to gather the wheat crop of Western Oklahoma and Northwest Texas, which is now very nearly ready for the binders. MEXICAN LEADERS

TELLS THEM THEY MUST BRING PEACE "IN A VERY SHORT TIME"

S. Will Lend Support to Soi Group to Set Up Government in Mexico City

Washington, June 2.—In a statement to the American people today President Wilson served notice on the actional leaders of Mexico that un less within "a very short time" they unite to set up a government which the world can recognize the United States "will be constrained to decide what means should be employed by the United States in order to help Mexico save herself and serve

people." Signalizing a departure from watchful waiting" policy which has guided relations with Mexico for mor han two years, the president's state ment was regarded everywhere in official and diplomatic quarters as notice of a new and vigorous policy to etsore peace below the Rio Grande. The statement says in part:

serve her people."

"Mexico apparently is no nearer a solution of her tragical trouble than she was when the revolution first was kindled. Her people flee to the mountains to escape being drawn into unavailing bloodshed. There is no proper protection either for her own citizens or for the citizens of other nations. Mexico is starving and without government. In these circumstances the people and the government of the United States cannot stand indiffe ently by and do nothing to serve their neighbor. They want nothing for themselves in Mexico, least of all do they desire to settle her affairs for her or to claim any right to do so, but neither do they wish to see utter ruin to come upon her; and they deem it their duty as friends and neighbors to lend any aid they prop erly can through any instrume which promises to be effective in bringing about a settlement which will embody the real objects of the revolution, namely, constitutional government and the rights of the people Mexicans ery out for food and present-ly they will hate as much as they fear every man in their country or out of it who stands between them and their daily bread. The govern-ment of the United States must presently lend active moral suppor some man or group of men, if such may be found, who can rally the suf-fering people of Mexico in an effort to ignore, if they cannot unite, the warring factions and set up a govern-ment in Mexico City which the great powers of the world can recognize, a government with whom the revolution will be a business, and not merely a
