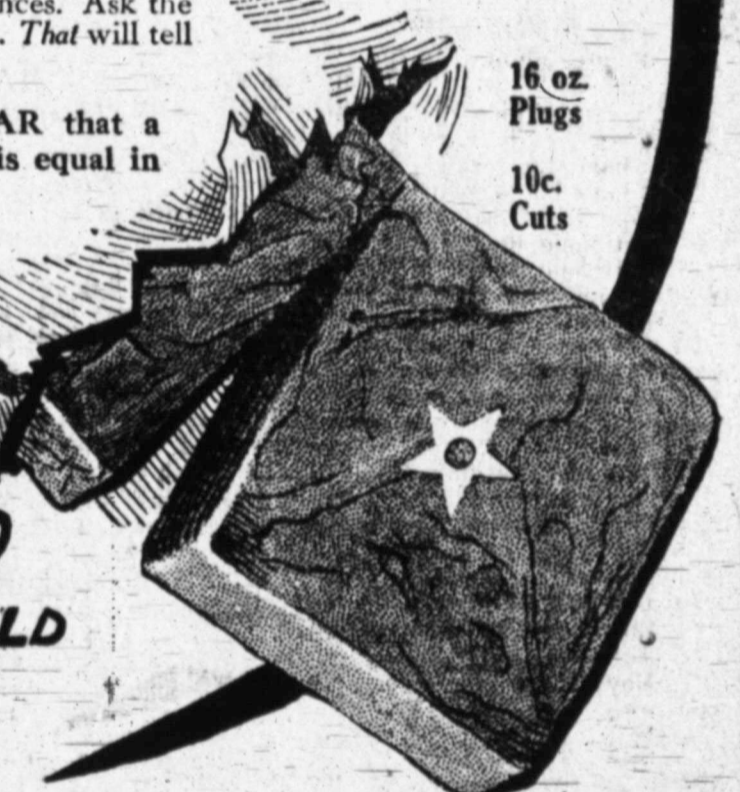

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Wichita Falls, Texas, June 2, 1915



The weather man has promised generally fair weather for the seven days beginning today. Wichita county farmers will get a lot of wheat in the shock if his prediction proves out.

The way things look now the time has just about arrived when it is expected that the non-combatants in Mexico are looking to the United States to feed them while the warring factions fight. And if that proves to be true, then it would seem the time for the United States to intervene is here.

Wichita county farmers who are sympathizers with the allies can't be blamed if they are not hoping that the allies force the Dardanelles straits before they can market their wheat. Hundreds of millions of bushels of Russian wheat are reported waiting to be rushed through these straits as soon as the Turk is conquered. Reports indicate that the Turk is likely to entertain the allies for some time yet and even if the straits should be forced it would take some time for Russia's wheat to start moving and still more time for it to reach the western European markets.

There are at least 150,000 voters who vote the pro ticket every time they get a chance, and as the question of prohibition will be the leading one in the next senatorial race, it would seem that the allies are at some disadvantage. Both Henry and Coquitt are anti, and both are bidding strong for the anti vote. The candidate who can manage to line-up the pro vote on his side stands a mighty fine chance of winning in the first primary. Dr. Brooks seems to be the man who the pros are likely to unite

on. In this connection it might also be remembered that the last time the question of prohibition was made the principal issue in a senatorial campaign in this state the pro was an easy winner, Shepherd defeating Walters. The pros have not lost in strength since that time, and in Dr. Brooks the pros should give him their undivided support, have fully as strong a candidate as a senator Shepherd.

Today is the day it is said that President Wilson will make reply to Germany in the matter of the murder of American citizens and the sinking of American ships. As to whether it will be in the form of an ultimatum to Germany or worded in such a way as to prolong the controversy, is yet not known, except that the feeling generally expressed through the leading newspapers of the United States is that this country is not satisfied with the reply Germany has made to the American note of protest, and that unless Germany does make a satisfactory reply, diplomatic relations between Germany and this country will be severed. But the American people have the utmost confidence in President Wilson, and when he speaks it will be with the voice of something like one hundred millions of people. Germany will be made to understand this shortly. The fact that there are several millions of Germans in this country will make no difference. All who have taken the oath of allegiance will support the president regardless of their natural sympathy for Germany in her war with the allies. There may be a few exceptions but they are so few that it is hardly worth while to take notice of them. When the time comes to put them to the test, and they share the fate of traitors they are deserving of no sympathy.

The future looks good in Wichita Falls right now. Practically every industry in the city is running full time, much new building is in progress, street paving will give employment to many, the harvest fields are calling for help and within the next two weeks every idle man in the city ought to be able to find work. Uncrowded streets for the next few weeks will bring comfort and hope to the merchants for they will mean that every one is too busy to loaf or even to spend money, but they will have the money to spend and it will come in later. Prospects were never so promising and the burn of plenty is rapidly filling. But even with this optimistic outlook the Times don't want to invite outside laborers to come here until every home man who wants to work is given employment.

AMARILLO'S PROTEST HEARD BY COMMISSION
Moving Common Point Line Would Wipe Town off Commercial Map is Claim

Austin, Texas, June 2.—The morning session of the railroad commission's hearing on the proposed increase of freight rates was consumed by the Amarillo delegation in protest against the proposal to move the common point line east of Amarillo. The Amarillo delegation claimed that to do this would wipe Amarillo off the commercial map.

COTTON CROP IN EXCELLENT CONDITION IS THE REPORT

Washington, June 2.—The cotton crop is in excellent condition throughout practically the entire country, the department of agriculture's weather and crop bulletin, issued today indicates. "The late cotton planted in Texas coming up and a good stand is reported" the bulletin says. Corn in the south has been greatly benefited by the warm weather, the bulletin reports.

MORE EDITORIAL COMMENT ON GERMAN NOTE
Cincinnati Volksblatt: If the Lusitania was an English auxiliary cruiser; if it carried guns and ammunition on board, then it was no longer a merchant vessel but a ship of war, and as such was entitled to no protection and no more consideration could be given persons on board than if they were on an armored English cruiser. But if it was a merchant vessel then Germany will admit the blame.

Pittsburg Dispatch: The points raised may seem trifling compared to the main issue set forth in the president's note, but can we as consistent advocates of the arbitration of international questions deny the further consideration why Germany asks? Baltimore Sun: Germany's reply to President Wilson's note on the sinking of the Lusitania is, so far as the main issues are concerned, no answer at all.

Baltimore American: The German note is but a reiteration of propositions concerning which the American attitude has been stated definitely and with a finality of conclusion from which there is no retreating. Louisville Times: The invitation of the United States to judge the premises on which its argument over the Lusitania followed to a conclusion, commits German diplomacy to another blunder. There can be no temporizing on such an issue. Either Germany must make such amends as are possible or the United States must take such action as will compel respect for the lives of its citizens.

Minneapolis Journal: The German note is not a reply to the American note, but a postscript to what Germany's reply should have been. It is a quibble, an evasion, a pettifoggery regarding about minor details. Milwaukee Daily News: The reply on the whole is void of atmosphere than that of friendly purpose. Its good faith, however, will be questioned by many, in so far as it relates to the case of the Lusitania and will be held as an effort to spare for time it is disappointing in this respect.

However, while it has the appearance somewhat of maneuvering, it is to be hoped the matter will be pursued in a manner to uphold the dignity and the justice of its course. Milwaukee Journal: We have trusted to the president the handling of this great international business. Standing behind him today is the whole body of the American people who will support him in whatever course he takes. Milwaukee Evening Wisconsin: Evidently the German marine policy will not be altered pending the discussion which the note invites. The note leaves unaltered the crisis which called it forth. With confidence in the fairness and wisdom and devotion of President Wilson, the American people await further developments. Indianapolis News: The German note will create the most unfavorable impression in the United States.

There can be no surrender of principle by the president. New Orleans States: Germany's lack of tact so often remarked during the war and responsible for her present isolation, again is reflected in the manner in which she has met the American note. She has preferred to meet the righteous American protest against her merciless slaughter by evasions as weak as they are unworthy. Philadelphia Evening Bulletin: Evasion and dilatory purposes are so obvious in the reply of Germany to President Wilson's note as severely to test the temper of the American people. El Paso Herald: Germany's reply is no answer. It does not meet one single point in the American note. It ignores our good will, doubts our facts, brushes aside our arguments, overlooks our threats, acknowledges no wrong, transfers all blame, claims full justification, declares her policy fixed, avoids the whole question of duty to humanity and awaits our next move.

ECONOMIZE HOURS OF STUDY

Too Many Waste Time in Neglecting to Recognize the Inevitable Limitations.

It is in our pursuits themselves that we throw away our most valuable time. Few intellectual men have the art of economizing the hours of study. The very necessity which every one acknowledges of giving vast portions of life to attain proficiency in anything makes us prodigal where we ought to be parsimonious, and careless where we have need of unceasing vigilance. The best time savers are the love of soundness in all we learn or do and a cheerful acceptance of inevitable limitations. There is a certain point of proficiency at which an acquisition begins to be of use, and unless we have the time and resolution necessary to reach that point our labor is an completely thrown away as that of a mechanic who began to make an engine but never finished it.

It is well for every one who desires to attain a perfect economy of time to make a list of the different pursuits to which he has devoted himself, and to put a note opposite to each of them indicating the degree of its soundness with as little self-deception as may be. After having done this he may easily ascertain in how many of these pursuits a sufficient degree of soundness is attainable for him, and when this has been decided he may at once effect a great saving by the total renunciation of the rest. With regard to those which remain, and which are to be carried farther, the next thing to be settled is the exact limit of their cultivation. Nothing is so favorable to sound culture as the definite fixing of limits.—Philip G. Hamerton.

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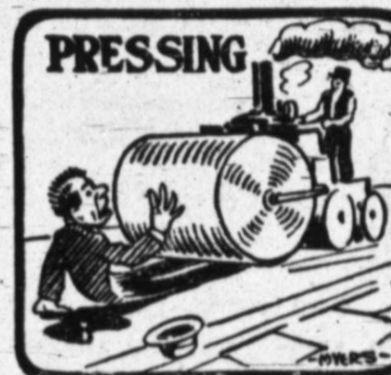
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
