Principal Kevin Wiseman has provided the following information for students beginning Friona junior high this year.

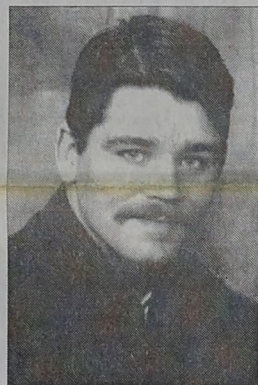

Erika Bermea Montana will be teaching speech and theater arts, and will be working with Joy Morton in speech, theater, drama, and literary activities. Erika is a graduate of the Friona Schools.

Starlia Clayton will be the new speech therapist for the district. Mrs. Clayton has worked for Clovis and Lubbock Schools previously.

will teach fourth grade this year. She has taught for a number of years in Crowell and Dimmitt. Trista is also a Friona ex-student.

Rufus George will teach Industrial Arts at Friona High. Mr. George is from Portales and has many years of experience teaching industrial arts, and coaching in the Clovis school system.

Rolland McNeill will teach math at the high school. Mr. McNeill lives in the Muleshoe area. His wife is employed at Muleshoe ISD. He has taught previously in Jacksboro, Bryson, and Happy.

Kim Hinton will teach English at the high school. Mrs. Hinton comes to Friona

from Muleshoe.

Marti Cohen will join the junior high staff and will teach sixth grade social studies and work with junior high girls' athletics.

Judy Head will teach English at the high school. Mrs. Head has had a wide range of experiences working in public schools and comes here from Lubbock.

Linda Wallace will teach second grade this year as part of a federal class-size reduction grant. This will enable Mrs. Wallace comes to Friona from Bushland.

Combest Feels Good About Farm Program

Congressman Larry Combest voiced optimism about the new Farm Program, which was passed by both the House of Representatives and the Senate prior to the August break by the Legislature last week. As chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, Combest played a vital role in the new bill's development.

"The favorable response to the bill has been better than I had expected. It provides basic support. I am very pleased with the sections on cotton, corn, wheat, feed grains, sugar, livestock and nutrition," he said last Friday, in a tele-conference with several newspaper publishers and writers from his district.

"I hope this is the last year that farmers have to farm under the old farm program," Combest said. "This is the first time we have had a bill that is within the budget," he added.

Combest told the

newspaper reps "We have the size of bill to buy us the room. Now, we just need to arrange the furniture."

The congressman said the new bill will allow farmers to grow what they want, and provide a "safety net," which has been absent in the present bill. The new bill is designed to "kick in" when commodity prices become low, and will benefit those raising livestock as well as crops.

When the Senate, in a late Friday vote, decided to drop a push for an extra \$2 billion for the Farm Program, which President Bush had threatened to veto, it paved the way toward passage of the new bill in Congress.

On other subjects, Combest said he was pleased with the energy bill passed by the House. "We have passed a bill that I feel, after 17 years of frustration with inaction in that field, will prove to be something positive in the energy field," he said.

Ben Kirton Takes Mission Trip To Points In Poland

(Editor's note: Former Friona coach Ben Kirton gave up coaching to enter the ministry. He is attending Christ For The Nations Institute (CFNI) in Dallas and still keeps in touch with Friona friends.

This letter was received from Ben after a recent mission trip to Poland.)

Dear Friona Star:

I appreciate the placement of my note in the newspaper. I had some friends point it out to me as I was visiting Friona a few weeks ago.

As I promised in my last note, I am writing to let you know what a great missions trip I had to Poland and Ukraine. The experience of visiting and tasting different cultures sure opened my eyes, heart and mind.

It also developed a deep appreciation for the life I have in America. To explain the feelings, attitudes, environment and daily life of Poland and Ukraine is too much to fit into a letter. However, I would like to mention a few highlights.

This mission trip lasted 28 days. I went with a group from CFNI called Kaleidoscope. There were 26 in our group. We flew through London to Prague and then by bus to Luban, Poland.

We ministered in Luban, Gdansk and Lublin Poland. Also in Zhitomir and Oblevsk, Ukraine. We then flew out of Kiev back to London.

We ministered by using drama, mime, dance, human video, puppets and music to tell the gospel. One advantage of the fine arts is that it goes beyond the language barrier.

We performed in the streets, churches, mass housing districts, town squares and even in public schools. We visited children's homes, hospitals for kids with respiratory diseases and government housing for abandoned and mentally challenged children. Most every place was receptive to the Gospel.

As for the people, they were quiet but full of hospitality. They did not have much, but they gave what they had to make us feel comfortable. They live simple lives in a very poor economy, especially in Ukraine.

Many do not know how they make it from day to day. However they are a lot healthier than the average

I am trying to be concise with so much going through my head. Though there is much more to write about, I will bring this letter to a close.

I want you to know that even people in Ukraine and Poland have heard about a town called Friona. Many people from Friona contributed towards my trip. They are a blessing.

This trip was awesome; a once in a lifetime opportunity! I hope to be able to visit Ukraine and Poland again some day. Thanks Friona and thanks be to God for this opportunity that has changed my life.

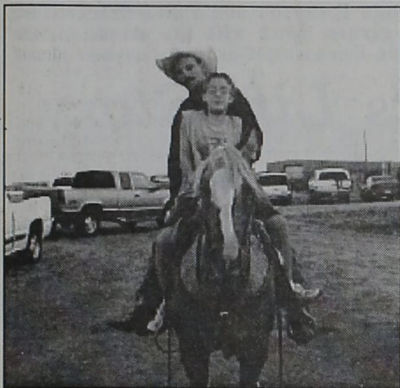

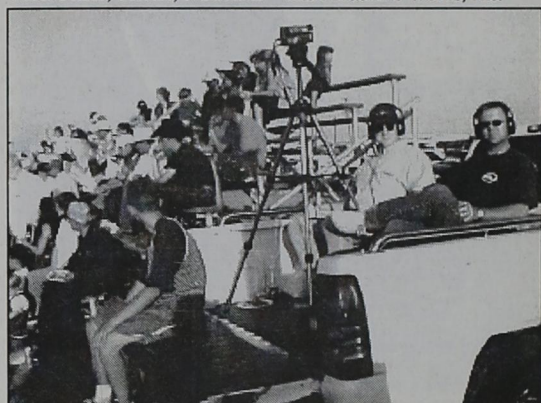

Hazardous Waste Cleanup Is Slated

A Texas country cleanup, agricultural waste pesticide collection and household hazardous waste site has been set for Thursday, August 16 at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe.

The collection site is west of downtown Muleshoe on Highway 84 on the north side of the road.

Banned or unwanted pesticides, properly rinsed plastic pesticide containers, used motor oil, oil filters, lead acid batteries and household hazardous waste will be accepted. Also, lab wastes from local school districts.

If you will bring your mercury thermometers, they can be exchanged for new non-mercury thermometers.

Tire collection is not available at any of these cleanups. Empty plastic pesticide containers must be

clean, triple-rinsed or high-pressure rinsed to be accepted.

There is a two 55-gallon drum limit per participant on oil filter recycling. Filters will not be accepted from businesses that change oil for a fee.

All agricultural chemicals will be accepted excluding pesticides or herbicides containing 2,4,5-T Silvex (quantities less than five gallons can be accepted), biomedical wastes, explosives, compressed gas cylinders, fertilizers, nutrient materials that are neither hazardous nor contain pesticide admixtures, pesticides or wood preservatives containing pentachlorophenol.

Louisa Wilson Submits Life Story

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Louisa Wilson.

My name is Louisa Lydia Wilson (Schlenker). I was born September 25, 1905 to Charles and Amelia Schlenker, in Des Moines, Iowa. I am the ninth child of eleven and have two sisters and a brother still living. Florence (Jackie) Dorsey resides at Prairie Acres, Helen Potts of Friona, Texas and John (Chick) Schlenker of Portales, New Mexico.

We came to West Texas in 1906. I was two months old. We homesteaded in the Rhea Community. I attended school in Bovina for a while, then they built a school one mile south of our house. I graduated from Friona High School.

In the winter, we had a windmill that ran into a tank and the excess water would run into what we called, the dirt tank, which was really a big hole dug in the ground. In the winter, it would freeze and we would get to go ice skating on it. In the summer, Momma would plant a garden by it so that when it ran over it would water her garden.

I also remember that Papa built a trough off the windmill tank that would run cold water through it, and Mama would put milk and left over food in it to keep it cool, so that it would last longer, because we did not have deep freezers or refrigerators then.

I remember that all of us got along very well, and my father was the best. He would play games with us. My father saw to it that when we played games, we played it right. We were not to cheat or anything like that. There were a bunch of us and if we were cheating and everything, it would have been crazy.

I married Ralph Wilson on April 12, 1925 and we had one child, Mamie Lou (Wilson) Welch. I met Ralph when I was in high school. We lived quite a bit out in the country and it took a

long time to get into town, so when I started to high school, I knew Miss Edith Calloway, my friend. So, instead of making that long trip every day, I just stayed with them and went to school. Ralph was her cousin, and would come for visits. Well, we got to know each other, and after one year of college, we upped and married.

Ralph was a farmer, so we moved back to O'Donnell, Texas, where Ralph was from, for quite a while. We lived in the country there, and it got to the point where we decided to move up here. My father needed some help on the farm, and we moved here, so Ralph could work for him.

I was a Girl Scout leader for fifty-seven years, and I loved it. The girls also loved me. They loved me because I would go and stay with the girls, at the Scout House, for an overnight about once a month, and I would let them stay up until at least midnight every time.

I received an outstanding woman of the year award in 1960 and I received a woman

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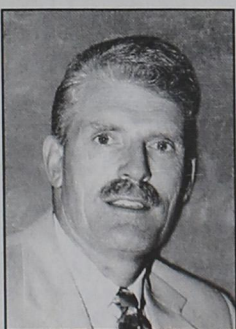
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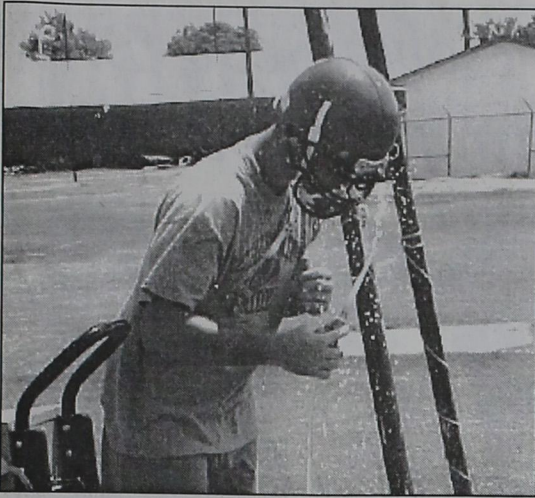
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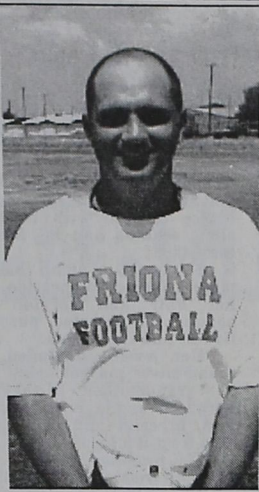

WITH 29 WINS

Mike Scott Off To Best Start At FHS

Beginning his fourth year as head coach of the Chieftains, Coach Mike Scott has the best three-year start of any coach at Friona High School, a check of the football records reveals.

In his three years at the helm, Scott's teams have won 29 games and lost only six, an 82.9 per cent winning percentage.

Scott replaced Don Light, who was head coach at FHS from 1963-67, as having the best winning record after three seasons at Friona.

In fairness to Coach Light,

it probably should be pointed out that he took a team whose program had won only one game in their last 30 outings, and held the longest losing streak, 27 games, in the state, after their second straight 0-10 season in 1962.

Scott was more fortunate, taking over a program shaped by James Morton, who also had a rebuilding job at FHS. However, Scott has done a commendable job in keeping the program at its high level.

The current Chieftain coach, with his 29-6 record after three seasons, becomes the school's fifth winningest coach at FHS. He comes into this season just four wins behind Coach Light, who left the coaching profession after five seasons with a 33-17-1 record at FHS, which included one district title (1965) and one co-championship (1964).

Prior to the 1996 season, when James Morton's Chieftains won five playoff games enroute to the state semi-finals, no Friona team had ever had a 10-win season. The '96 team solved that problem with its 13-2 mark, which included a 13-game winning streak which

fired the team to a school record FIVE playoff appearances and FOUR playoff wins.

For the last five years, Friona teams have amassed a 52-9 overall record (85.2 percent wins) which includes 11 playoff game appearances, three more 10-win seasons, and one 9-2 mark. Friona surely has the top record for this five-year period in the Panhandle-South Plains area.

The 52 wins are more than those in six whole decades, the 1930s, '40s, '50s, '60s, '70s and 80s--all but the '90s, when 64 wins were recorded. FHS has suffered through four 0-10 seasons--1938, '61, '62 and '92, plus 0-7 in 1945 and 0-6-1 in 1939.

During this current "hot streak" for the Chieftains, the teams have fashioned a 6-5 win-loss record in playoff games. Again, prior to the 1996 benchmark team, Friona teams had recorded only one playoff win in its entire football history, by the 1986 team.

Friona has improved its playoff record from 1-7 prior to 1996 to 7-12 at this time. FHS has been in the playoffs six of the last seven years.

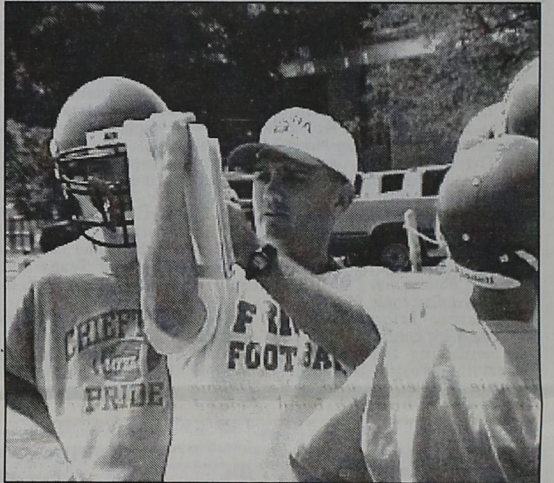

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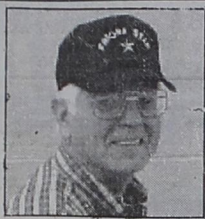
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Out Here

It's been hot! The heat has claimed lives and gave TV reporters the chance to cook steaks on the dashboards of cars for the evening news.

It's not that it doesn't get hot every summer. But now that we are all scared to death of global warming, when the heat index rises, it is big news.

Maybe Dubya can put a gigantic mister in sub-orbit over America to cool us all off. It could be part of our missile defense system.

Nah, I guess not. The Democrats would say that it only cooled the richest one percent and poor people would still be burning up.

I don't know for sure but I imagine that it was hot during the summer in the 40s and 50s when I was a boy growing up in Hillsboro.

We didn't have air conditioners in the house until I was a teenager. Then it was water-cooled window units that always smelled like fish if you let them dry out and started them back up.

There sure weren't many air-conditioned cars and trucks. Only Dr. Smith's big old Buick drove around in the summer with the windows rolled up.

The rest of us didn't notice the heat. A shade tree and a red rag in your back pocket took care of the summer heat. As long as you had a good oscillating fan in the living room, life was cool.

Sometimes we slept in the backyard if it got too hot in the house. A big chunk of ice off of the 25-pound block was great to carry around.

I took my kids, Zac and Megan, home this week and football practice has started. I have been behind all week, so this is a good time to roll out another column by one of my old idols, Paul Crume.

We ran one of Paul's columns a few weeks ago, taken from a book of his columns, *The World of Paul Crume*. To those who asked, I checked and the book is long out of print.

Paul Crume grew up in Lariat, Texas, right here in Parmer County. He was a reporter and columnist for the

Dallas Morning News from 1945 until his death in 1975.

His front page column, "Big D," was a favorite of Dallas readers for years. The following column was printed on July 28, 1969. Thank you Paul. Rest in cool peace.

HOT NIGHTS AND FAMILY HISTORY BY PAUL CRUME

The present heat wave has uncovered some defects in modern education as well as some weaknesses in the modern degenerate character. All people know to do about the heat now is stay in air conditioning, which is the worst thing in the world you can do unless you want to be comfortable.

To beat the heat really you have to meet it face to face and eyeball it down. Our ancestors, who were always singing, "If it was good for Paul and Silas, it's good enough for me," knew how to do this. They had various tricks to outwit the sultry antagonist. When I first came to Dallas, for instance, and lived in a rickety apartment on Ross, you made your hot weather bed on a hard mattress with a single tightly drawn sheet.

You directed on this mattress a fan. If you were rich, you owned something called an oscillating fan, but we didn't. You wet and wrung out a couple of large towels, spread them over you under the fan, and settled down, being careful to sleep spread-armed and spraddle-legged so that no part of you would impart its heat to another part. After a night of this, you woke up with a wonderful feeling of having been purged of everything, especially energy.

Air conditioning robs the ordinary sleeper of the chance of participating in nature.

Air conditioning, I believe, is also responsible for destroying family history as it used to exist.

Family history used to be kept by word of mouth. On a farm in those days, the hot weather bed was a pallet, a single quilt spread for each sleeper on the big front porch that ran the length of the house. When it was still too

hot to sleep, which was anytime before 2:00 A.M., the elders lay there and discussed what had happened to the family. They went into elaborate analyses of motives. What made Cousin Clint quit his wife and move with the children to the remote wildernesses of Mineral Wells? What made Aunt Crecy a witch, though a benevolent one bent mostly on curing erysipelas?

The recurring quotation was, "Nobody will ever know why he done what he did."

Along about dawn, when you could have expected to sleep, you were roused out to get to work. Nobody was worried about the effects of heat on human beings, but working in the full of the day might be hard on the horses.

As a result of these nighttime seminars, I learned very early that there were few saints in our family.

Actually, I do not remember as much of the family history as I might have if I had slept on more pallets. I learned a lot about my uncles that I was too chicken to use against them. Mostly I remember incidents.

There was the time when Uncle Uriah, a pillar of the Baptist church, was mad because the minister, a man contemptibly soft of hands, had asked him to call his go-devil a plowing sled. The preacher thought the correct name smacked of strong language.

"I told him," said Uncle Uriah from the pallet that night, "that no matter what you call it, it's still a go-devil."

And air conditioning or not, heat is still heat.

National School Lunch/ Free Breakfast Program Letter to Households

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The Friona ISD offers a choice of healthy meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.40-Primary, \$1.45-Jr. High, and \$1.55-High School. Breakfast remains \$1.25 for High School and at no charge for all students in Primary, Elementary and Jr. High. Children who qualify under U. S. Dept. of Agriculture guidelines may get meal free or at a reduced-price of \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast (High School only). All meals served must meet nutrition standards established by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed, there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information: 250-3353.

Your children can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your children may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

How do I get free or reduced-price school meals for my children? You must complete the Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals and return it to the school.

- * Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your children's names and case numbers, and an adult household member must sign the form.
- * Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number, you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.
- * Households with foster children. You must include the children's names and the amount of "personal use" income the children received last month, and an adult must sign the form.

Will the form be verified? Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send written evidence that shows that your children should get free or reduced-price school meals.

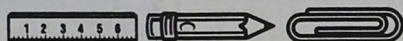
Can I appeal the school's decision? You can talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your form. You also may ask for a fair hearing by calling or writing to JAMES WARREN, ASST. SUPERINTENDENT, 250-2747, 909 E. 11TH STREET, FRIONA, TX., 79035

Must I report changes? If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell us if your household size decreases, or if your income increases by more the \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get free meals because your household gets food stamps or TANF, you must tell us when you no longer get these benefits.

Will information on my form be kept confidential? We will use the information on your form to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health, and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation purposes.

Can I apply for free and reduced-price meals later? You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form.

We will let you know if you are approved or denied.

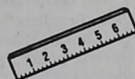

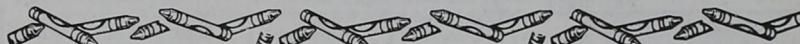
Application forms will be sent home with every child with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school attended by the youngest child or for complete confidentiality, mail the application to Roxanne Hurst, Verifying Official, 909 E. 11th, Friona, TX 79035. Additional copies of the application can be found at each school.

The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy, only the Verifying Official will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year, and our school district strongly encourages everyone to fill one out and send it in. If a family qualifies for only reduced prices, it will significantly reduce the cost of meals. In the operation of the child feeding program, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., 20250.

Again, this year, we will be serving breakfast at no charge to all students in the Primary, Elementary and Jr. High buildings. We thank you for your support. Please do not hesitate to contact the Jr. High Cafeteria at 250-3353 if you need help completing your application.

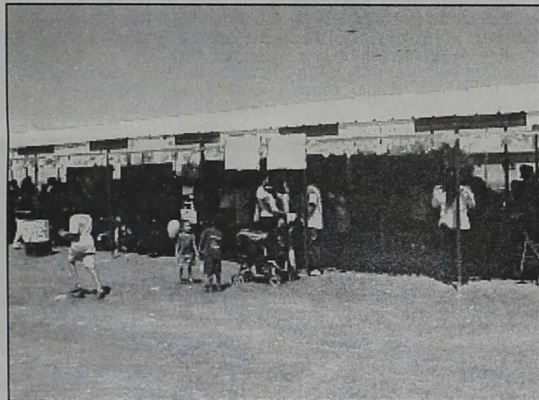

YOUR EYES

Chalazions Differ From Styes

A chalazion is a cyst that forms in a clogged oil gland in the lower or upper part of your eyelid. At first you may think you have a stye, since the symptoms of the two are so similar: sensitivity and pain. In several days, the chalazion becomes a painless, firm, slow-growing bump in the eyelid that can sometimes blur vision. Usually it takes a few months for the chalazia to disappear. This time period can be shortened with various treatment approaches, after you see a doctor for confirmation:

•Lay a warm washcloth over closed eyelids for 10 to 15 minutes, 4 times a day; •Gently press from the lid to the nose to unblock fluid from the gland; •Use prescribed quantities of antibiotic creams, ointments, injections/drops or medicines to further treat your chalazion. If the problem continues for more than a month, the doctor may want to do a chalazion excision.

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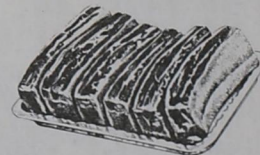
