News was received here this morn ing of the death at Sentinel, Oklar of Monroe Newby, for many years a resident of this city. Death was due to typhoid fever. The funeral will take place in this city Thursday, the

exact hour to be announced later. As one of the earliest settlers of this city, a resident during the frontier days here, Mr. Newby was well known throughout this section, and there are many, especially among the older citizens, to mourn his departure, Although he moved away in 1896, he returned in 1909 and stayed for four years; his last visit here was less than a month ago when he came to the bedside of his brother-in-law, J. T. Staton who died last week. Mr. Newby was ill for about three weeks.

Monroe Newby was born in Wayne county, Illinois, 62 years ago and came to Texas in 1882-with his brother-in-law, J. T. Staton, locating at Waxahachie. In 1886 he moved to Wichita Falls, buying a farm southeast of the city. In 1896 he moved to Oklahoma, where banking and Sentinel occupied his attention. In 1909 when his brother, A. 



ARMORED MOTOR CARS USED IN FIGHTING TURKS

London,-Reporting in detail how the British and French forces took five lines of Turkish trenches during recent attacks on the Gallipoli Pen insrula, a Reuter's correspondent discloses that armored turret motor cars were used in the trench warfare. Heretofore the use of these cars has been restricted mainly to reconnais-sance and raiding, especially in co-operation with aeroplanes, the pur-pose for which they were built. It was a surprise, even to the British soldiers, to have the armored

British soldiers, to have the armored cars come up to help in the rout of the Turks. The cars, which are incorporated as part of the Royal Naval Air Service, had been brought ashore secretly and hidden, in anticipation of the fact that they might be helpful, notwithstanding that the roads there were anything but ideal for automobile work. When the allied movement began of June 4, at uson, the armored turret cars made their way from their station through loose dust, more than ankle deep and over ground pitted with shell holes, and scross the British trenches over bridges that had been laid for them. They moved up to the very edge of the first Turkish line of trenches, but there they had to halt, as they could not leap the deep and wide caverns there they had to halt, as they could not leap the deep and wide caverns which the 'Turks had dug. The appearance of this new and formidable weapon enhanced the general state of confusion and terror in which the Turks seemed to await the attack and when the cars opened fire with the maxim gun which each carried in a turret, they scattered the Turks to the rear.

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, July 13.—Steps to check pellagra in certain South Texas counties are to be taken at-once by he state board of health, following a ecent investigation by Dr. W. A. Da vis, secretary of the board.

Dr. Davis visited Matagorda, Brasoris, Jackson, Fort Bend and Wharton counties, and reported he found the disease on farms in these counties. The disease, he said, prevails among negroes and whites, the latter of the poorer class.
